WONDER why it is that the majority of us seem to have our most thrilling experiences when we are around ten years old. Funny, isn't it? But let's leave that to the psychologists to figure out and get on with our story.

One day, when Mary's mother and father were away and the children all alone, they heard a rap on the back door. The youngsters, eager for any diversion that would relieve the motonony, rushed into the kitchen. Mary's oldest sister, Louisa, who was inclined to be sickly. opened the door.

On the porch stood the strangest looking man the country children had ever seen. He seemed, Mary recalls, about forty and wore a loud, checked suit and a gray derby hat after the manner of race-track touts. In addition to his rainbow clothes, the man actually carried a cane!

The Visitor Indulges in a Queer Prank.

The clothes and the cane fascinated the children, and when the man asked for a bite to eat he was invited into the house. Louisa prepared him some food, while the rest of the youngsters surveyed this city marvel from head to foot

Mary says, aside from his strange getup, the man seemed perfectly normal as he ate his food. They were not the least bit afraid of him and readily told him they were alone in the house. Louisa was particularly kind to the stranger and served him all he wanted to eat. When he had finished the fourteen-year-old girl picked up the dishes and started for the kitchen sink with them in her hands. Although slightly lame and a semi-invalid, Mary says, her sister insisted on helping about the house.

Louisa had just turned her back, her arms loaded with dishes, when the stranger suddenly stuck out his cane and tripped her! Down went the poor







win S. 6bb Elandudno, "Atlantic City" of Wales, Now Is Tourist Magnet

Has Become One of Most Popular Sea Resorts of Britain.

American tourists who visit the British Isles this summer may be drawn to Llandudno beach, which has been called the "Atlantic City of the British Isles."

On the sand hills of Llandudno beach "Lewis Carroll," an Oxford mathematician whose real name was Dr. Charles L. Dodgson, once strolled with the children of his host, Dean Liddell, Recently a white marble marker was erected at the famous Welsh resort to commemorate these walks, and the literary classic, "Alice in Wonderland," they inspired.

"Although Llandudno may still sound quite foreign to most Ameri cans, it is one of the chief seaside resorts of the British Isles," says the National Geographic society. "Situated on the north coast of Wales, facing the Irish sea, it may be easily reached by thousands of summer visitors from Liverpool, Manchester, and the English Midlands.

Beach Is Crescent-Shaped.

"The town itself is built around a vast semicircle of firm, sandy beach with the ends of the crescent tipped with two towering masses of rock, the Great Orme's head and the Little Orme. Neither Nice, nor Deauville, nor Biarritz, nor Scheveningen, nor any of the much-vaunted middle-Europe bathing resorts on the shores of Hungary's Lake Balaton, nas a situation comparable to this magnificent watering place.

"And the Welsh people have made excellent use of the opportunitles which nature presented. A concrete 'boardwalk' (wider than New York's Broadway follows the graceful curve of the beach for more than a mile and a half; countless bathhouses on wheels follow the tide back and forth, being drawn up and down the sands by horses; droves of donkeys are provided for the children's rides when they tire of-digging in the sand; a pier jutting out into the bay for half a mile is the scene of daily concerts and dances, while along its full length are booths of fortune tellers, catch-penny venders, and other allurements which attract those who delight in such diversions while on






