TEN INJURED IN EXPLOSION AT MAYTOWN

TREFFREY'S STATION, POWDER BLAST SCENE

Ten persons were in Martin hospitals Thursday morning suffering from burns and cuts after a powder keg inside Treffrey's Service Station at Langley had exploded and partially wrecked the front of the building.

Several others were reported as having suffered slight injuries but were not hospitalized.

In the Martin General hospital are J. A. Treffrey, 60, owner of the station; Joe Manuel, 23, Langley; Bob Adcock, 16 Pikeville; Grady Frasure, 23, Langley.

Receiving treatment at the Beaver Valley hospital are Billy Murray, 16, Garrett; John Mullins, 24, Langley; Jack Casebolt, 30, Pikeville; Molly Slone, 15, and Gypsy Allen, 17, both of Langley.

Young son of Ted Stapleton, Langley, also received treatment for a slight burn at the Martin General hospital, but was immediately dismissed. None of the nine remaining in the hospitals are believed to be dangerously injured.

The blast took place at 9:30 this morning, force of the explosion huffing those in and about the station several feet, blowing out doors and windows and bulging the stucco walls of the structure. Gauges atop the gasoline pumps were broken and a small quantity of gasoline ignited, but the flames did not extend to the underground supply tanks.

An early report received here said that 17 persons were injured, but this was not confirmed. The injured were taken in passenger cars and ambulances to the hospitals.

ELECTRICITY ON LINE, NEAR BIG SANDY CO-OP LETS CONTRACT ON 114 MILES

With 120 miles of power line already completed and the electrification of approximately 420 homes awaiting the installation of a sub-station, the Big Sandy Rural Electric Co-operative Corporation last week awarded a contract for 114 additional miles of lines construction.

Successful bidder on the new project, for which \$100,000 has been appropriated by the Rural Electrification Administration, was the F. W. Owens Company, Louisville. The low bid of five submitted approximated \$700 a mile, it was said by W. W. Burchett, attorney for the Big Sandy co-operative.

Seventy-five per cent of the 114 miles let to contract this week is in Floyd county, the line to serve Rock Fork and Salt Lick Creeks in both Floyd and Knott counties, both forks of Middle Creek and Cow Creek. Included also in the contract is extension of electrification from Johnson county to within one mile of Inez, Martin county. Lawrence Hubbard, REA superintendent for the co-operative said.

The sub-station necessary for electrification of the 120-miles of line already completed under an appropriation of \$150,000 will be shipped June 7, it was said. This line serves Abbott Creek, a part of Middle Creek, Arkansas Creek and the section between Cliff and Auxier along the Big Sandy river in this county.

Ready for contract as soon as work is begun on the project to be let to contract this week are 150 additional miles of line, most of which is in Pike county. Prater and Mud Creeks will be served by this line. It was said that an appropriation of \$150,000 will be sought for this work.

E. H. SOWARDS, HEART VICTIM

WELL-KNOWN P'BURG MAN SUCCUMBS AT AGE OF 49

Suffering a heart attack while visiting his father at Kingston, W. Va., Everett H. Sowards, well-known Prestonsburg insurance man, died Monday night at the age of 49 years.

A native of Pikeville, and a son of James Sowards and the late Mrs. Hester Auxier Sowards, he was a scion of two of the section's oldest families, the Auxiers and Mayos. He was a grandson of former Circuit Judge Andrew Auxier, of Pikeville.

For years he was connected with his father in the conduct of the Sowards Insurance Agency, one of the largest businesses of its kind in Kentucky. He was married in 1921 to Miss Ruth Davidson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Davidson, Prestonsburg, and had resided here for several years.

Besides his widow and his father, Mr. Sowards leaves a brother, John Sowards, of Pikeville, and one

GRADUATION SPEAKER DIRECTS REMARKS AT BOYS, GIRLS "WHO WEREN'T THERE"

Address of George L. Evans, Frankfort, speaker at the county-wide graduation exercises here Friday night for 302 Floyd county high school seniors, was dedicated to the boys and girls "who weren't there."

"You who are graduating tonight are on your way," Mr. Evans said, "but the boys and girls who are not here with you—they are the youngsters about whom we are concerned. These are the boys and girls who have dropped out of school, who have suffered for lack of parental attention, boys who have lost their lives on hobo jaunts over the country, youngsters who, afflicted by idleness, have gone to jail rather than school."

At the same time he congratulated the graduates whom he described as a select group, since only 18 of every hundred boys and girls who enter school continue study to be graduated from high school.

The graduates were welcomed by Mayor E. P. Arnold, of Prestonsburg. County Superintendent Town

Hall presided at the colorful exercises and presented the diplomas. Advice to graduates was given by Superintendent Ishmael H. Triplett, of the Prestonsburg schools. The graduating classes were introduced by the several school principals.

Students, parents and friends from all sections of the county attended the exercises, the fifth annual mass graduation of the seniors of the county's nine high schools.

The Prestonsburg gymnasium, scene of the exercises, was decorated in the colors of the several schools. The building was divided into sections to accommodate the representations of each school. Music for the occasion was furnished by the Floyd county band, directed by Jesse Elliott, and Robert Wallace, and the Floyd county chorus of singers from various schools under the direction of Mrs. Palmer Hall.

Both the band and chorus were lauded by Superintendent Hall as the South's finest—a statement in which Mr. Evans concurred.

SALARY SLASH VOTE, VOID

ADDITIONAL VOTES NEEDED TO PASS CUT OVER VETO

If the cut in city officials' salaries is to go into effect as voted last week by the City Council, support of at least two of the three Councilmen absent from the meeting will be necessary, it was said this week, to override Mayor E. P. Arnold's veto.

The Council voted, 4 to 1, for Councilman W. A. Rose's salary slash resolution. Councilmen Roe Layne, Bill Fitzpatrick and John G. Archer did not attend the meeting.

The salary schedule as voted would pay the Mayor \$25 a month, the Police Judge, \$25, the Treasurer, \$12.50 and the City Clerk, \$10.

Dick Davis, manager of the city-owned waterworks, told the Council that four of the seven new fire-plugs required by the Actuarial Bureau before issuing a better insurance rating for Prestonsburg have been installed and the remaining three will be placed within the next few weeks.

The Street Department reported that citizens gave full co-operation during Clean-Up Week. The sweeping of trash onto the street from certain places of business was condemned, however, and prosecution of such offenders was discussed.

After attending school five years without an absence or tardy mark against her, she became ill of measles and could not attend the graduation exercises.

FLOYD MINER DIES OF HURTS

WAYLAND FATALITY, 2ND MINE ACCIDENT WITHIN TWO DAYS

Trapped beneath a rock-and-slatefall, Bill Moore, 35 years old, was fatally injured at 7 o'clock Wednesday evening in the mine of the Elk Horn Coal Corporation, Wayland, dying as he was being rushed by ambulance to the Stumbo Memorial hospital, Lackey.

The accident followed that of Tuesday night in the same mine in which Orville Easton, 38, Garrett, suffered a broken back. Easton was taken Wednesday to a Huntington hospital.

"Chuck" Vinson, who worked with Moore, escaped injury by a matter of feet. Moore's chest and side were crushed, a leg was broken and his head was injured. The rock and slate almost completely covered him, it was said here.

The victim was a son of Mart Moore, Wayland. He leaves his parents, his widow and several brothers and sisters. Funeral arrangements had not been completed Tuesday morning.

DEATH CLAIMS CO. ATTORNEY F. D. SHORT

OFFICIAL SUCCUMBS AT PAINTSVILLE MONDAY

Stricken suddenly Sunday night by a cerebral hemorrhage, County Attorney Forrest D. Short, 40 years old, died Monday morning at 2 o'clock at the Paintsville hospital.

Mr. Short's passing was received by hundreds of friends and relatives throughout Floyd county and Eastern Kentucky with deep sor-

row. He had, during the day preceding the fatal seizure, apparently been in excellent health. Driving with his wife during the evening, he complained of feeling ill and shortly thereafter was driven home. As he left the automobile he collapsed and did not regain consciousness.

A son of the late James Short, of Bonanza, and of Mrs. Molly Short, who survives, he was born and reared on Abbott Creek. After having been graduated from Prestonsburg high school, he was graduated from Berea College and for several years was a teacher in this county. He later attended the Jefferson Law School, Louisville, from which he was graduated in 1934, and entered the practise of his profession with S. C. Ferguson, Prestonsburg attorney.

He was elected County Attorney in 1933 and was re-elected in 1937. His term ending with this year, he was a candidate for re-election and had not been opposed by a member of either party.

During his terms of office he worked with two Commonwealth's Attorneys—the late O. C. Hall and John Allen—and distinguished himself by his conduct of investigations into crimes within a matter of hours after the offenses were committed. He also frequently took a prominent part in criminal prosecutions in circuit court.

Featuring Mr. Short's career as a teacher, public official and private citizen was his amiability and courtesy in his contacts with the public. He was a Mason, a member of the Prestonsburg Kiwanis Club and the Prestonsburg Co-operative Business Association, having entered the last-named organization through a desire to help local business, though having no local business interests.

Mr. Short was married on June 1, 1939 to Miss Golda Porter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Porter, of Allen, and to this union was born one son, Larry Douglas.

NINETY-FIFTH BIRTHDAY OF MRS. WHEELER OBSERVED SUNDAY

ANNIVERSARY 'HOMECOMING' FOR RELATIVES AND FRIENDS OF PROMINENT PIONEER RESIDENT OF JOHNSON COUNTY

One of the best-known and oldest families in the Big Sandy valley last Sunday observed in traditional "homecoming" manner the 95th birthday of Mrs. Sarah Wheeler, native Johnson countian and daughter of one of the valley's very earliest inhabitants; mother of 11 prominent children and the amicable "Grandma" to all who know her.

A resident of Paintsville, Ky., Mrs. Wheeler, 95 on May 23, is one of the most widely-known citizens of the valley and her children and their children have carried the family name with prominence into other towns and cities of the state and country.

"Grandma" Wheeler is the daughter of Samuel Justice, who was born in Tazewell county, Virginia. As the story is told, Samuel Justice, at the age of nine years, started with his family on the long journey to a new home in Indiana. Samuel, youngest member of the family, was riding in the rear of the covered wagon.

He became tired of the journey and "dropped off" in the woodlands of what is now known as Johnson county and made his way to the log dwelling of a pioneer who "took him in" and reared him to manhood.

Young Samuel never saw his family for about 50 years, when he succeeded in locating his mother in Indiana.

In the meantime he was married and to the union was born Sarah Justice on May 23, 1846, who in 1869 wed Martin Vanburen Wheeler.





THE BURNING FORK ROAD—A BURNING ISSUE

The Burning Fork road (Magoffin county's name for the Salyersville-Prestonsburg route) is a burning issue as The Salyersville Independent views the impotency of Magoffin county to take care of its own affairs, the inability of the county to acquire right-of-way by credit, or the sincerity, even, of county officials in undertaking to do their share in procuring construction of the road linking the two county seats.

Albert K. Moore, editor of The Independent, hits out, in straight-from-the-shoulder fashion, in citing alleged weaknesses of his own county and of its officials. In doing so, he throws squarely into the face of Prestonsburg and Floyd county civic groups and the Floyd fiscal court a challenge that may be read as the several organizations and the court run—not from, but toward, the issue, we trust.

Writes Mr. Moore:

We have heard much discussion recently regarding the road to Prestonsburg—known to us as the Burning Fork road. At Prestonsburg, a few weeks ago, we were informed that the only hold-up on connecting Salyersville and Prestonsburg was on the Magoffin county side of the line, that the work on the Floyd county section was already underway and nearing completion.

At a meeting held with Highway Commissioner Brown, of Hazard, at the Carpenter hotel some few weeks ago by all the prominent Democrats of Magoffin county—leaving out, by the way, the editor of this paper, who ceases to be "prominent" when he fails to do the bidding of the Democratic machine—we are told that Dr. Brown promised the early construction of the Prestonsburg road. But this promise was, of course, contingent upon Magoffin county securing the right-of-way necessary, and this seems to be something Magoffin county cannot or will not do.

Now Floyd county and its citizens say that county will build this road, including the Magoffin county section, "if they have to take over part of Magoffin to do it."

We would suggest that, if Floyd county has any public-spirited men, or even one such man (Magoffin county has none), who will advance the money for purchase of required right-of-way, or better still will buy the right-of-way and donate it to Magoffin county, then the whole affair can be dumped squarely in the lap of the State Highway Commission and the Democratic patronage bosses, right where it belongs.

From the best of our information, it would not take over one thousand dollars to purchase this right-of-way. Magoffin county could not buy a dozen tomato plants on credit, and there is no provision in the budget, if the county has such, for this purchase. Therefore, it is up to some outside source to help out.

Wouldn't it be too bad if this source of election promises were taken away from the candidates for County Judge before the primary?

If Floyd county wants to benefit from publicity depicting it as dedicated, in practise as well as in theory, to the task of helping a helpless neighbor as well as itself—if we are as interested as we should be in high way improvement in behalf of

Floyd county and another county, besides, then here we have the opportunity to do some actual work worthwhile.

NO ENCOURAGEMENT FROM THE STATE TAX COMMISSION

IT IS estimated that three-fourths of the \$20,000 expected to be saved on Floyd-Knott circuit court costs this fiscal year will be saved in Floyd county; the fiscal court expenditures are budgeted; the state admits it doesn't need the money—and yet Floyd real estate assessments were recently hiked upward fifteen per cent by the State Tax Commission.

Which is little encouragement to officials who would economize.

Floyd county's tax assessment when it left the county Board of Supervisors to be submitted to the Commission was above nine millions of dollars—slightly above the figures demanded by the tax commission last year. Yet a greater assessment was ordered this year, the "blanket raise" was made on owners of town lots and on the farmers.

If the tax commission is bent on raising assessments in the face of economies effected by the county, when revenue is not needed, when the assessment as submitted from the county by the Tax Commissioner and Board of Supervisors is at least equal to the demands of the Commission, the year before—if all that is true, just why should there be any economy when such economy reacts unfavorably to the taxpayers?

Points By Other Editors

EXPERT TESTIMONY

FEW men in the world are better qualified to advise the people of the United States at this moment of world crisis than Colonel William J. Donovan, who spoke in Cincinnati Wednesday night under the auspices of the Cincinnati Fight for Freedom Committee. It is possible to say this not because Colonel Donovan is not more patriotic or devoted to his nation than many other Americans (although none excel him in this regard), but because he has sought out and possesses the knowledge upon which to base an intelligent and accurate appraisal of the world situation.

Colonel Donovan says that the United States is endangered by German aggression. And when he says so, it must be remembered that he is one of the world's most respected military observers; within the last half year he has traveled 35,000 miles through the war zones and theaters of diplomatic and economic intrigue in Europe, Africa, Asia Minor, and England. He has consulted military leaders and has been closeted with the heads of governments. He has carried a shrewd pair of eyes and a shrewd pair of ears through the zones where the most tremendous revolution of our times is occurring.

Colonel Donovan knows whereof he speaks when he depicts the engine of Axis aggression as something that the United States must face alone if England falls. He knows whereof he speaks when he says that it can harm us, and that we cannot appease it.

Colonel Donovan says that a defeat of Hitlerism is vital to the welfare of America and Americans—shopworkers, white-collar men, and capitalists alike. And he is in position to prove it, by personal knowledge, by incontrovertible fact.

Colonel Donovan says that Hitlerism is not invincible—that the aid which it is in our power to give can overthrow the juggernaut of Axis aggression and end the present threat to the continued existence of the world we have known. He says England can endure with our aid; that there are weaknesses in the German situation which will crack under pressure.

In his speech here Colonel Donovan made no effort to impugn the motives or discredit the patriotism of the men who say that we should do nothing, or nothing more, to stop Hitler now. He accredits them with sincerity, and he speaks of them without venom or passion.

This makes all the more effective his assertion that it is the duty of such men to prove that America would not be endangered by a Hitler victory when they say that we should not expose ourselves to the risks involved in insuring his defeat.

The expert opinion of Colonel Donovan emphasizes that risks lie along both courses ahead of America, but it emphasizes that the greater risks, and those with least promise of ultimate benefit to the nation, lie along the course of isolation or half-hearted measures. And America will do well to harken to his words.—Cincinnati Enquirer.



Dr. Ransdell Warns Food and Drink Dealers

Dr. Marvin Ransdell, director of the Floyd County Health Department, is warning all dealers in the county that food and drinks must be protected from contamination during handling and storage.

Many dealers in Floyd county still use refrigerators containing water for cooling drinks and such a type of refrigeration requires careful attention to prevent contamination of drinks, it was emphasized. The regulation of the State Board of Health specifically states that "No bottled or canned drinks shall be cooled by submersion in the cooling liquid or stored in such manner that water comes over the pouring lip." Under this regulation the State Department of Health has approved the use of dry coolers.

Bottled or canned drinks, when found under water at the time of the inspection, may be quarantined and removed from sale by the inspector.

Dr. Ransdell pointed out that many diseases may be transmitted through contamination of drinks while cooling and that it is extremely important that the requirements of the regulation be observed.



Two important items in trip-planning are TIME and COST.

Time: Planning a time schedule depends largely upon the driving habits of the individual and the

section of the country through which one is driving. Much better time can be made in the west and in the south than can be made in the more densely populated north-eastern states.

For an overall average for a long trip allow three hours for each 100 miles. This will give sufficient time for luncheon and rest stops during the day. After determining the total mileage of your tour, divide by 100, and multiply by three. Example: You find that the proposed trip is 9,000 miles—divided by 100 gives 90 units of 100 miles; 90x3 shows 270 hours of driving time an average of 10 hours per day would require 27 days for driving only. Time for sight-seeing or stopovers must be reckoned in addition to the time required for driving.

4-H Clubs Join In Defense Activities

Defense activities in which Kentucky 4-H club members have joined include the growing and preservation of vegetables and fruits, the raising of chickens, pigs, sheep and beef cattle, dairying, the growing of cover and feed crops, the control of insect pests and livestock diseases, and the improved feeding of meat animals. All these contribute to a better food supply for the people of this and other nations.

In selecting 24 district demonstration teams to go to Junior Week at the University of Kentucky June 9-14, it is estimated that 1,000 trained teams went into action. Every one of the 120 counties in the state was represented. Practically every phase of farming and homemaking, food production and food preservation was covered in these demonstrations.

The 4-H club method of learning by actual practice on the farm and in the farm home is reaching approximately 45,000 boys and girls in Kentucky this year. They are learning the best methods—getting a practical education—without leaving

ing their homes and with little or no expense. At the same time many of them are making money.

With the Secretary of Agriculture asking for increased production of certain foods, the 4-H club boys and girls of Kentucky are responding in every community of the state.


