Fish, food rationing representative in charge of the meats-fats program, all persons dealing in meats, fats, canned Bailey, Wheelwright; Dorothy Tur- fish, butter and rationed cheeses are ner Martin, Drift; Harriet Elizabeth required to register and account for their transactions in those commodities. Any who have not registered with the local War Price and

Rationing Board are in violation of Rationing Order 16 of the OPA regulations. Any persons dealing commercially in those commodities by sale, gift or exchange are required to collect rationing points and account for them. Any retail grocer, wholesale grocer, commercial slaughterer, restaurant, dairy selling butter or rationed cheeses, farmer selling fresh or cured meats, butter or rationed cheeses can obtain information from their local War Price and Rationing Board.

A complete check will be made as rapidly as possible, and all non-registered commercial dealers will be held in violation. All commercial dealers are urged as a matter of cooperation with the national war effort to register at once; then operate only under proper qualifications. Any not doing so are willfully contributing to Black Market practises.

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THE FATAL BLOW

SINCE the days of Henry Watterson

The Courier-Journal has been recog-nized as Kentucky's "Democratic Bible." Even though Marse Henry refused to support Bryan and Free Silver and threw the influence of his trenchant pen to Alton B. Parker, even though the paper has always reserved the right to "be itself" rather than the tool of the party, it has been looked upon as the Democratic party's journalistic strong right arm.

Then came, as they say in the movies, the good year 1943. And, lo! The Courier-Journal fell from its high estate in the party.

Instead of rallying 'round the Democratic banner, it sought out the chink in

its armor. It, through editorial naivete or a mischievous sort of sophistry, sapped the party's strength for the all-out campaign that comes in November.

How did it do it?

But how! . . . Its news-stories imputing political wrongdoing to its chosen candidate could be excused, since it does function as one of the nation's great media of news dissemination. But, editorially-there the fatal blow to Democracy was struck.

Following up its news-stories which presented allegations that its candidate, J. Lyter Donaldson, had violated the law, along with Governor Keen Johnson, in filing a falsified election expense account, The Courier-Journal roared back with an editorial, suggesting grand jury action. And grand jury action, sometimes, results in trials.

In one editorial breath this powerful champion of the Democratic party infers Lyter Donaldson should be convicted, if guilty as charged; and it follows in the reader's mind that The Courier-Journal would recommend penal stripes for him, if indeed he has been such a bad boy.

Then, with no appreciable pause for breath, this Goliath among the state's newspapers re-iterates its statement that it considers J. Lyter Donaldson the best timber offered by the Democratic party for nomination for Governor at the coming primary-whether innocent or guilty, convict or free.

It probably fears libel action and therefore does not express its opinion of Ben Kilgore and Rodes K. Myers, the other Democratic candidates, since it infers they are farther beyond the pale than Mr. Donaldson.

But, worst of all, unless it can dig up a murder charge against Judge Willis, the Republican candidate, it leaves the Democratic party without a candidate worthy of opposing him in November.

Now, we ask you, is that any way for the "Democratic Bible," even in a modern version, to read?
