What manner of man am I, anyway, that the people should elect me to the office of Commonwealth's Attorney? Below you will find the answer, and I ask you to check on the truthfulness thereof.

Forty-nine years ago I entered this world in an old-fashioned double-log house on the head of Beaver Creek. I grew up (one of 14 children) on the farm and was schooled in every phase of work and "hard knocks" that go with the average mountain farm boy. I have done every kind of work that goes with "saw-logging" and lumbering; from cutting the timbers in the forest to movng the saw-dust, including "pulling" the lever to saw the lumber.

In addition to the above, I have taught school in the rural one-room schoolhouses. While teaching, I took Law by correspondence, studying that course by night with the old-time oil lamp for a light, and teaching during the day. I completed that course and was admitted to the practice of law.

Then, World War One came, and I went to war, along with your young men of that day. I was wounded in that war just 28 days before it ended, but my wife and baby had to wait nine long months thereafter for my return while I lingered in hospitals recovering. When I did get my discharge I was rated as a disabled veteran and was entitled to vocational training. I then entered college and completed a college course in law, graduating in 1922.

Since 1922, I have been actively engaged in the practice of law among you. I have served as County Attorney of Floyd county one term and as your State Senator one term and I stand on that record as your humble servant.

Who am I, to be seeking this high office? My father was Jay Tackett, and his father was Abel Tackett. My grandmother (Abel's wife) was a sister to the late lamented and much loved Uncle Alamander Caudill, of Hollybush, Knott county. My mother was Sarah Johnson Tackett and her father was Pleasant Johnson. Her mother was a Burke. I married Minerva Wallen and her mother was Ritter Combs Wallen.

I have six children, five sons and one daughter. One son is in Northern Italy with General Clark's army and wears several Battle Stars. Two sons are in the Pacific war and a fourth son was discharged with a total disability last January 31st, after spendng 11 months in hospitals.

It has been baptised in the blood of our heroic soldiers of every war since then, and today our boys are preserving for us and generations yet unborn that right re-baptised with their blood. It is a sacred right and our people will not sell that right which was purchased and preserved for us with blood, sweat and tears.

Upon these qualifications and my idea of how to use and apply them, so as to bring a greater and happier day to our counties, communities and people I submit my candidacy to you, and shall humbly bow to your choice, as God gives you the wisdom to make it.
