



### State Police Pledged To Clean-Up Job

Don Sturgill, Kentucky's commissioner of public safety, has put Northern Kentucky and its legal authorities on notice that State Police will clean up gambling in that area if officials elected or employed to do the job continue to neglect their duty.

We are pleased to see this further evidence of the State Police coming of age. In the past the state has leaned backward to make this state enforcement body secondary to local authorities, and this in theory is good, inasmuch as home rule is to be desired as long as home rule is not a misnomer. But as State Police looked elsewhere while crime flourished under so-called home rule, and as they centered their attention on traffic laws and their enforcement, these nattily uniformed troopers on occasion bore all the authority of a troop of Boy Scouts.

Gradually, the State Police has emerged toward what it should be - an enforcement organization with the authority of the state behind it, mobile, flexible, well-knit, and ready to face up to responsibility.

Commissioner Sturgill notes that "we get complaints from the mountains about bootlegging, but the only ones we get about gambling are from Northern Kentucky."


Let Mr. Sturgill not forget that mountain bootlegging is an offense against the law, even as Northern Kentucky gambling is an offense.

Respectful of the rights of other officers, Stura gill announced that he would, before ordering state troopers to make raids, first of all give the police chief of Kenton county a list of eight or ten suspected gambling places, and thus present the police chief a chance to do the job himself.

Surely Mr. Sturgill knows that the chief of police of Kenton county needs no such list. He surely knows that no local officer ever needs such information. The general public knows it - why should not the enforcement officers? Wherever we can, let us give law enforcement officers credit for integrity of purpose and action. But if we cannot do this, let us not insult them by saying they have not the ability to see the crimes that are committed beneath

We repeat, we are glad to see organized gambling under attack by state police. Organized crime of any kind must be attacked by the best organized forces of law enforcement the state has.

Let us not forget that Eastern Kentucky bootlegging is pretty well organized, too.



vised it, leans forward at an angle from the main body of the tool-holder, giving it greater penetration on less power than is required with conventional cutting tools now in use in coal mining. The tools now in use stand vertically, or at right angles to the main body of the tool holder, and so this old-type tool pushes rather than cuts. Joy contends that the cutting tool he has de vised for greater cutting ability with less pressure will give an increase in the percentage of stoker size coal in the fine coals and also a reduction of carbon con-

tent The cutting tool Joy has devised has two cutting points instead of only one as in the oldtype tool. When one point is dulled by usage, the bit may simply be reversed in the holder. He claims this is the only tool-hold er and cutting tool designed at an

angular position in two parts. The device has an adapter which can be placed in the tool holder to raise the cutting bit to any desired gauge. This feature gives the bit a solid base, thereby preventing the slips experienced with present-day holders, which have only set screws to hold the cutting tool to gauge. A set screw will be used with the Joy tool-holder but its sole purpose will be to prevent the cutting tool from falling out of the holder.

The cutting tool may be supplied with carbide insert tip carbide welded tip or plain tip The tool-holder would be welded to any conventional chain used in the mining of coal and other minerals.





The lowest bid by Sam Nally Co., Bardstown, and Nally & Gib-The continent of North Ameri- son, Springfield, was for grading and drainage of 6.264 miles.

This stretch extends from about a mile south of the Kentucky Turnpike to near the Nolin River in Hardin county. A \$371,742 bridge is under construction across the river. This is Kentucky's first superhighway construction project under the program in which the federal gov ernment puts up \$9 for each \$1 furnished by the state to cover costs. It includes grade and drainage for the bridge approaches.

The Highway Department says the stretch upon which it plans to open bids Aug. 23 for grade and drainage work extends from the Nolin River bridge about four miles south to near Upton.

It hopes to advertise for bids early next year on constructing an interchange near Elizabethtown to connect the new freeway with the toll road and U.S. 31-W.

In the fall of 1958, the department plans to ask for bids to pave the two superhighway sections, interchange and approaches to the bridge.

It's the first countywide pilot area in the United States.

It's the first county to fight Johnson grass on a cost-sharing basis with the federal Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Committee.

Kentucky is the first state to take legislative action against Johnson grass. The 1956 General Assembly designated it a noxious weed and provided that the State Highway Department combat it along roadways by spraying.

Mancil Vinson, assistant state agricultural commissioner, said Johnson grass encroaches upon the most fertile bottom land and chokes out other growth. It atacks soil best suited to row crops, he said, thus becoming a nenace to tobacco and grain.

Mrs. Zan Oberwarth, head of a State Chamber of Commerce Committee that is promoting the campaign, said it's important to mow Johnson grass before it goes to seed. Regrowths are sprayed with chemicals. The final step is cultivation of the ground until fall, when a cover crop is sown.

### Forest Planting Areas Need Brush Control Now

Hardwood brush and low value tree species have proved to be a major problem in site preparation for pine forests, says James Newman, Kentucky Agricultural Extension Extension Service for-

Established brush will shade and deform pine seedlings unless the brush is removed, Newman

Chemical spraying is a good control measure in sites prepara-tion. It should be done in July and August; this work may save

cleaning and weeding work later. Use the chemical 2, 4, 5-T for woody plants, Newman says. Mix one gallon of the 2, 4, 5-T concentrate (four pounds acid equivalent) to 50 gallons of water. Wet foliage thoroughly when applying the spray; remember, too, that it is difficult to properly spray brush taller than five feet.

Newman noted that chemical control of brush (as a site preparation) is now part of the ASC's approved-practices plan, starting this fall. Treated areas must be followed up by spring plantings, of course, to qualify under ASC



Chiggers are the larvae of very mites, Rodriguez noted, only the larvae are troublesome; adult mites do not bite. They attach themselves to the skin, usually at a hair follice, and inject a fluid into the skin. This is what causes the intense itching; secondary infections are sometimes set up by scratching

The larvae will attack chickens birds, snakes, turtles and amphibians, as well as humans and livestock. Many preparations are on the market to relieve the itching caused by bites, as well as repellants which can be applied to the skin; but control in their habitat, grasses, etc. is usually the best method of eliminating them.





The report was compiled from information gathered by the State

The report showed 19,690 graduates were from public schools and 5,854 of those enrolling in college were also from public schools. Approximately 42 percent of private and parochial high school graduates and 30 percent of high school graduates enrolled in college.

Knott county had the highest college enrollment of 52 percent. Fayette county sent 51 percent of its graduates to college and Jefferson county ranked 8th with 42 percent.

Breckinridge county had the smallest number, or 4 percent, going to college. There were 24 counties in which less than 20 percent of the high school graduates went to

Statistics indicated that college anrollment appeared to be stimulated by the presence of an institution of higher learning in the county. At least one college or junior college is located in all but two of the counties in which 40 percent or more of the high school graduates went to college.

Most lakes are full of lost fish ing hotspots. An angler will lo cate an area where the fish will bite within certain regularity. However, when he returns the next season this fish mine eludes him. Jason Lucas, Angling Editor of Sports Afield Magazine, has a pet trick that assures him of al-

ways returning to good fishing. The less experienced anglers may wonder why going back to a spot on the water is difficult. To him, it's very simple; he'll anchor an empty can or jug there which, next time he's out, he can see a long way off. But, this is precisely the wrong thing to do, for the place will produce less and less fish unless he is able to keep it his secret. Of course there's another way. An angler can always place his little buoy about, say, 100 feet east of his good place. But any experienced angler will fish all around such a mark, finally locating the hot-

The only way is to leave no mark at all on the water. Landmarks are the answer. But don't (See Story No. 2, Page 6)



be fooled by the "Go about 50 vards directly out from the white peach house" type of direction. This is entirely useless except as a rough basis from which to begin a search. It will be impossible to locate a central line out from the house, and nobody can correctly estimate distances on wa-

Here is the trick. There is but one accurate way of returning to the spot; it's practically identical to what a surveyor would use, a form of triangulation. Find two conspicuous objects on shore, one some distance behind the other and directly in line with it from where you are. As nearly to right angles to those as possible, find two more objects similarly in line. That's all! Anytime you get both pairs of marks lined up, you must be precisely in the spot you are now: They can't possibly line up anywhere else.

ATTENTION VETERANS

Veterans can't draw VA pen sions in jail after they've been there 60 days. So says Director R. R. Thomas of the Kentucky Disabled Ex-Service Men's Board. The law that cancels pensions of jailed veterans does not apply to prison periods of less than 61 days or to imprisonments before actual conviction, Thomas said. He added that eligible children or the wife of a veteran who has forfeited his pension under this law may receive the pension to prevent hardship.
