



#### Must Everybody Approve?

Racial integration in the schools is now a law of the land, confirmed by the highest court in the land. So is our income tax law.

The latter is unpleasant, and sometimes it and other taxes seem almost confiscatory. Yet there has been no revolt against it.

But this law of racial integration involving equality of human rights is revolting to a part of the county, and so there is rebellion against the authority of the United States.

If the turmoil that has arisen in the South, particularly in the state of Arkansas, is Communist-inspired, Red Russia has perhaps done its most effective work in this country. For the situation creates a dilemma for the President of the United States which threatens, if force is exerted to enforce the law, civil conflict which could clear the way for Red conquest of a divided nation; and which threatens, if force is not brought to bear and the Governor of Arkansas is permitted to exercise his authority in the name of state's rights and in conflict with federal law, to set a precedent for every other Southern state to follow.

Let us suppose that by action of the national Selective Service Act those National Guardsmen of Governor Faubus' were to be called via the draft for Army service-would the rebellious Governor and his armed forces invoke the doctrine of state's rights, simply beause they prefer to stay home, and refuse to obey another federal law?

We deeply sympathize with some Southern communities in the present crisis. We know that their problems are greater than are readily realized, inasmuch as the Negro population in some parts of the South far exceeds the white, and that for this reason some of the opposition of Southerners to integration is not motivated by racial hatred but is regarded as a necessity.

We know also that much of the so-called interest in the Negro race is far from simon-pure idealism. We know that this is a political issue. because there is a heavy Negro vote, and this knowledge is emphasized by the fact that the American Indian and his plight is little-discussed. Perhaps a study of the Indian, his low living standards, lack of educational facilities and the fact that he is shunted off into reservations would disclose the fact that here is, indeed, the most downtrodden people in all America. Interest in the Indian does not mount so high because he has fewer votes.

Yet the sins against the Indian do not erase those against the Negro. The matter of human rights is still there, and on this freedom and this equality America will over the long haul stand or fall.

# Stumbo Answers



It seems that my opponent is unable to read the public records of our Courts and interpret their meaning. His great "to-do" concerning the Gas & Water System purchase is nothing new. It's entire transaction has been properly presented to the courts, both State and Federal, and on each occasion nothing has been brought out that was not already a matter of record in the County Court Clerk's office as to the purchase and the manner in which the transaction was handled. All these facts have been gone into, the attempt to void the bonds by Circuit Court action was dismissed and no appeal taken. Then the recent litigation in Federal District Court at Pikeville, was publicized in the local paper and this case was decided in favor of the County. That decision definitely set out that the County is not liable for the payment of the bonds and interest, that only the water and gas system properties and their revenues can be liable for same.

Mr. Collins does not read the news well either, as The Floyd County Times only recently published the fact that the recent rate increase was fixed by the Federal Court and a Receiver appointed. This is a matter of record in the District Court Clerk's Office in Pikeville, only a short 30 miles if Mr. Collins desires to take a look at the record—or does he want to know the truth of any of his purported writings of fiction?

I might add as to the value of each particular system that Mr. Collins might ask his brother-in-law, George Evans, if the Glo system was priced too high, as he was one of the owners at the time of the sale. The records show who the sellers were, and the price for each system is set out, and if Mr. Collins wants to go to the record in the County Clerk's Office, it is public, has been on record since 1953, and he can publish all the record if he wishes. Yet he has never taken time to read this or bothered to become the so called "champion of the people" until he asks something in return—a vote. In fact, if it were not for election time the "great common people" would be completely ignored by my opponent, as he seems to take to their interest only every four years. I am sure the records will not disclose that I at any time ever received one dime by reason of the purchase of the Water & Gas System and

Mr. Collins would have you believe someone put \$5,000.00 into the Water & Gas System just before this election to have it show a profit. If you recall, suit was pending in the Federal Court at election time and had been for some three months and I am sure no one did or would put up \$5,000.00, since the amount in default, as set out in the litigation, as you will recall, was stated in the Floyd County Times as \$11,500.00. Just another "misstatement.

The County and Fiscal Court were made a party to the Federal suit, and counsel was employed to assist the County Attorney in the matter. Had we not defended the suit, then Mr. Collins would have a right to complain, but since it was properly defended and the County was absolved from all liability, then surely Mr. Collins should not complain that for \$1,500 the County was adjudged not to owe-according to his figures-\$409,950.00. Don't you think on his own statement that he would be straining a point, and had he been County Judge would he have sat idly by and not employed Counsel. The rate increase and operation of the Water & gas System is out of the hands of the Fiscal Court and is being operated by Receiver under orders of the Federal Court, and I am sure neither Mr. Collins nor myself will be so foolish as to suggest what will be done. I believe in recognizing the orders of the Federal Court.

Mr. Collins took great pride in propounding questions in one issue of The Times concerning my appointing one or two County Patrolmen. I have the same right to appoint to this office that he has to appoint Deputy Sheriffs. Have you ever heard of me questioning his appointments? You know I have always found it best to let each elective officer run his own office and if his acts fail to meet the approval of the public, election time will usually tell, and I am sure this November will be no exception to the rule, as I believe the voters are well-informed on matters, not just a few weeks before the election but all through the terms of the office-holder.

One county Patrolman appointed by me had a fine recommendation from Mr. Collins and I herewith submit Mr. Collins' own letter as evidence:

## STATE SEEKS **DELINQUENTS**



Under the new law, if the purported marriage was entered into in good faith by the woman, VA may consider it to have been a valid marriage provided:

(a) It would have been valid had the legal bar not existed; (b) The couple had resided to-

gether for five or more years, immediately prior to the veteran's death; and, (c) No claim for VA widow's

He anticipates a strengthening of feeder prices however, in late fall or early winter. Heavy seasonal sales of feeders will have been completed then.

Fed-cattle prices may move upward, Lanpher's letter says. Receipts for fed cattle may be relatively heavy until late fall; this is based on the larger number of cattle on feed as of July 1, 1957. Market receipts in July and August did not reflect the large num-

Kentuckians may profit by holding feeder cattle, especially grass-fed ones, and feeding them grain, he says. Profits are probable from three sources: (1) Cattle prices are expected to have some general rise in the late fall or winter; (2) farmers could raise grade quality of fed cattle by feeding grains; and (3) cheap feeding grains are likely.

Example: A 550-pound calf of high quality might sell at 22 cents a pound; the average farmer would require from 20 to 22 bushels of corn and around 100 pounds of protein for 200 pounds of grain, Feed costs would have been \$30.40 for the 200 pounds of gain, if corn was worth \$1.20 a bushel, and protein, \$4 a hundredweight. If the selling price stayed at 22 cents a pound, the 200 pounds of gain would be worth \$44, leaving \$13.60 per animal to pay for other costs.

dollars just before the election? 9. Who suggested to you that the rates be raised the last time? Name these men. The people who pay excessive water and gas rates



#### Kentucky Query Is: Who Killed Chief Tecumseh?

By Charles F. Hinds Secretary-Treasurer, Kentucky Historical Society

Frankfort, Sept. 9 (Spl.) - The ld Northwest Indians under Tecumseh were defeated at the Thames in 1813. They had received a severe blow earlier at Tippecanoe, but the death of their great chieftain, Tecumseh, marked their subjection to the white man and the opening up of Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, and Ohio for settlement

Tecumseh became the symbol of their defeat. Most of those who participated in the battle were Kentuckians under Col. Richard M. Johnson of Scott county. Therefore one of the burning questions of Kentucky history has been: WHO KILLED TECUM-

There has been no want for claimants. Johnson himself, when running for vice president in 1836 told about his fact-to-face struggle with an Indian chief. Wounded four times, Johnson received yet another wound from this chief, who advanced on him with uplifted tomahawk, Johnson said that he took careful aim with his pistol and killed the Indian. When one audience cried out, "Thus recumseh fell," Johnson replied that he didn't know it was Tecumseh at the time.
