MAYOR NAMES GROUPS TO AID IN PLANNING

BUDGET JOB INITIATED BY COUNCIL

State Planning Service Payment of \$538 Made; Police To Take Training

A special meeting of the City Council was called here last Thursday night to meet, special problems, and the work of meeting urgent issues was continued the following day.

One matter of immediate concern was to renew the workable program of Prestonsburg with the Department of Economic Development which works with the community in all its improvement planning and to provide payment of \$538 to the Department for its planning services. No payment had been made during 1961. The contract with the Department was renewed for 1962, but the service for this year will cost only \$250.

During Thursday night's meeting Mayor George P. Archer appointed a new Planning Commission. Fred James, the only member of the old commission to be retained, was named chairman. New lay-members are Tom G. Dingus, Willie Mellon and J. R. Camicia. Administration officials on the new commission include Mayor Archer, Councilman Tom O. McGuire and City Clerk Judith Archer.

Dr. Archer also named a Community Development Commission, as recommended by the federal government, to take the place of the old Municipal Redevelopment Commission. Its members are the Rev. Harold Dicks, Paul Branham, Burl Spurlock, H. D. Fitzpatrick, Jr., Dr. Russell L. Hall, Charles Conley, Hubbard Francis, Robert Jones, the Rev. T. W. Chisholm, Arbor Jones, R. V. May, Marvin Music, C. B. Latta.

Work on a city budget was begun by Earl Flower, Burl Spurlock and members of the Council. The Planning Commission was requested to re-zone the Highland avenue area to make of it a light industrial area in order that the proposed strawberry processing plant can be put into operation there.

RELEASED FROM FLOYD JAIL SMOOTH NEW YORKER'S LUCK RUNS OUT IN COLUMBUS, OHIO

The luck of Oscar Joseph Baynes, 41-year-old New Yorker, finally ran out Saturday evening at Columbus, O., but in a long trail from New York to Floyd county and beyond he picked up a good automobile from Jailer Lawrence Hale and a considerable spot of cash from others.

Baynes' connection with Floyd county began when he became acquainted with a Melvin man somewhere outside Kentucky. They parted, and soon Baynes came to visit at Melvin. He brought along an automobile he had bought in New York with a down payment of \$50. While at Melvin he ran up a store account and sold the automobile.

The Kentucky State Police learned that the car sold at Melvin was mortgaged and resold, and Baynes was lodged in the county jail here to await grand jury action. He stayed through two terms of court without being indicted by the New York auto dealer. The car wasn't worth a trip to Kentucky, he said.

But Baynes was indicted on a charge in connection with the Melvin store account but here again luck smiled on him. The indictment was found defective as it was inadvertently drawn in the name of another man and Baynes was released January 18 from jail.

Out of jail, he began to work on automobiles for persons around the courthouse. He was a good mechanic. He did a job on Sheriff Henry Hale's car and others at an improvised shop near Oscar Salyers' Gulf Service

AUTO MISHAP CLAIMS TWO

Miss Lewis, Companion Victims At Lexington; Burial On Daniel's-Cr.

Miss Armina Lewis, 21, formerly of Banner, and a companion, Eugene West, 29, of Lexington are dead as the result of an auto tragedy in Lexington, Wednesday of last week. A third passenger in the car, Margaret Sue Hyde, 16, is in critical condition in the Good Samaritan hospital here.

Miss Lewis died instantly in the crash of the car as it struck a concrete street marker on Henry Clay Boulevard at 1 p.m. but West, the driver of the car, survived two hours.

The car, after striking the marker, sheared off limbs of nearby trees to a height of 10 feet, threw Miss Lewis out and rolled on top of her. She suffered fractures of the neck, hips, right arm and both legs. West, who was also thrown from the car, suffered a skull fracture when his head struck a tree. Miss Hyde had both legs broken in the impact.

Miss Lewis was a daughter of the late Callie Lewis and Clarence Lewis, of Banner, who survives. Besides the father, three sisters and a brother survive; Mrs. Barbara Foley, New London, Ohio, Mrs. Imogene Blackburn, of Endicott, Miss Dorothy Lewis and Benny Ray Lewis, both of Stanville.

Funeral rites were conducted at 2 p.m. Friday from the Tom's Creek Free Will Baptist Church, the Revs. William Amburgey and Isaac Stratton officiating. Burial was made in the Lewis cemetery on Daniel's Creek under the direction of Hall Brothers Funeral Home.

West, a veteran of the U. S. Army, was buried in Lexington.

AREA GROUP SEEKS AID

Watershed Legislation Proposed by Delegation; Denney Attends Meeting

Thirty-eight spokesmen from 16 East Kentucky counties Monday urged White House aides to support legislation which would help qualify their area for aid under the Small Watersheds Act.

They told the President's representatives that unless such intangible benefits as the encouragement of wildlife, recreation, antipollution activities, and tourism were considered, their counties would never be able to qualify under the cost-benefit ratio.

Congressman Carl D. Perkins, Hindman, who introduced the delegation, said the President's assistants seemed hopeful that the law could be changed to set the ratio differently.

The East Kentucky group was led by Dillard Murphy, of Morgan county, director of the Eighth District Soil Conservation District, a state unit.

With him were Roy R. Denney, representing Floyd county; Henry Collinsworth, Catlettsburg; George L. Ramey, Paintsville; Mrs. Treva Howell, Jackson; Joe C. Brown, Wolfe county; George Branham, Sheldon Maggard, Knott county; and Earl Kinner, publisher of papers in Wolfe, Elliott and Morgan counties.

Representative Frank A. Stubblefield, Murray, attended the meeting, as did Paul Kelley, member of the staff of Representative John C. Watts, Nicholasville.

Stubblefield, a member of the House Agriculture Committee, which would handle the proposed legislation, said his committee has been giving sympathetic consideration to the problem of a too-high ratio of costs and benefits.

Counties in the region concerned are Floyd, Morgan, Boyd, Greenup, Lewis, Lawrence, Johnson, Carter, Elliott, Rowan, Knott, Magoffin, Breathitt, Wolfe, Fleming and Martin.

COLLEGE SETS CLASSES HERE

Morehead State Offers Courses for Second Time For Regional Students

Morehead State College will again offer extension classes here, beginning February 12 at 6 p.m., it was announced this week by Walter Frasure, assistant county superintendent of schools.

"Courses offered will be on the freshman and the sophomore levels," he said. "Any teacher seeking higher rank and interested persons may enroll if previous credit in these courses has not been earned," he added.

Classes will meet weekly from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. and are scheduled as follows: Monday evenings—English 101 and English 102, Writing and Speaking, Geography 100, Fundamentals of Geography.

Tuesday evenings—History 242, United States, 1865 to Present, Psychology 153, General Psychology.

Thursday evenings—Science 104—Physical Science and Mathematics 101, Business Arithmetic.

Adult persons who have not completed grade or high school may enroll as special students, Frasure noted. Persons may audit classes without being required to take the examinations.

Textbooks for the new classes may be purchased on the first evening of the classes and books that were used in the first section of the extension work may be sold back to the college, Frasure said.

Persons desiring additional information on the scheduled classes, are urged to contact Frasure at the office of the county superintendent of schools.

BREAK CHARGE JAILS DUNCAN

Perry County Parolee Held To Grand Jury; Quarterly Court Meets

Amos Lee Duncan, one of three men accused of a recent break into an Estill place of business, was held to the grand jury last week under \$5,000 bond by Trial Commissioner Harold Stumbo. Unable to execute the bond, Duncan was jailed.

Duncan was at liberty under parole from a 21-year armed robbery conviction in Perry county at the time of the alleged break, and it was said here action would be taken to revoke his parole. It was not learned if this has been done.

In a quarterly court session of two days last week 19 convictions were gained, 10 of them by jury trials, while two defendants won acquittals. Twenty-nine cases were dismissed. Those convicted by juries:

SCHOOL STUDY MADE FRIDAY

Accreditation of PHS Envisioned At Meeting; Evaluation Is Planned

Dr. Morris Clerley, Kentucky representative of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools Accreditation committee, of Lexington, and Woodrow Allen, principal of Prestonsburg high school, held a two-hour conference here Friday to study the problem of reaccreditation of the school which was dropped by the association two years ago.

Clerley came here by invitation of Charles F. Clark, county superintendent of schools, who has been working on the problem of reaccreditation for several months.

The most serious deficiency of the high school here that led to being dropped by the association was the employment of teachers who did not meet association standards. This has now been corrected by the employment of fully-certified teaching personnel, Clark said.

The next step to put the school back on the accredited list is self-evaluation by the school staff which will be done this spring. Following this, the association will send an evaluation committee before December this year. That will be the earliest the association can act, it is said.

Clark, in commenting on the move to put the school back on the association's approved list, said he envisioned no reason it would not be accomplished.

JUNIOR COLLEGE BILL OFFERED IN ASSEMBLY

Prestonsburg Woman Injured In Collision With Transport Truck

Mrs. Clarence Martin, of Allen, suffered possible internal injuries Wednesday morning when the auto which she was driving collided, head-on, with a tractor-trailer transport truck on U. S. 23, a short distance south of Sugar Loaf.

Mrs. Martin is at the Prestonsburg General hospital where it was said that, barring complications, her condition is favorable to her recovery. Her children, Freddie Martin and Mary Lou, escaped with lacerations.

Mrs. Martin was driving toward Prestonsburg. Whether her car skidded was not learned, but it was known the car was on the wrong side of the highway when the crash occurred. The car, a Ford sedan, actually ran beneath the front end of the truck, and Mrs. Martin was imprisoned for about an hour by the dashboard which was crushed downward onto her legs and by the steering wheel which jammed backward against her body.

The auto was reduced to wreckage, and the escape of Mrs. Martin and children was regarded as almost miraculous. The driver of the truck was not injured, it was said.

RANEY AIRS BRIBE OFFER

Alleges Pikeville Man Offered \$5,000 for Aid In Organizing Senate

State Senator Tom Raney, of Pikeville named Charles Justice of Pikeville, Wednesday of last week, as the man who he charged brought him a \$5,000 bribe offer at the direction of former Gov. A. B. Chandler.

He introduced a resolution asking the Senate to direct the newly created Joint Legislative Investigating Committee to look into the matter. The Senate will act on it later.

Raney thus identified on the Senate floor the "friend" he reported on December 31 had come to his home with the offer if he would vote with Chandler supporters to organize the 1962 State Senate.

Raney had said the friend also told him that Chandler had promised to see that Mrs. Raney was appointed clerk of the Senate.

Chandler, in New York last week and unavailable for comment, denied any knowledge of such a proposition at the time Raney first made it public.

"If he says I made such an offer there isn't a word of truth in it," Chandler had said. "I have an awful lot of friends, but I don't want to be responsible for what my friends do for me."

SCHOOL PLAN INTRODUCED BY SEN. WARE

Site Purchase Fund Goal Nearing As Pledges Made; Five Colleges Planned

The fight for a junior college to serve this area drew a step nearer a showdown and possible success last week as a bill to create a system of five-year community colleges in Kentucky was introduced in the General Assembly and as the drive for a \$100,000 toward purchase of a college site here neared its goal.

Pledges of contributions continued to trickle in this week. Few of the larger companies which have been solicited for help in purchasing the college site have been heard from, and this assistance is needed, leaders of the drive said.

The junior college legislation was introduced in the state Senate by Senator James C. Ware, of Covington. The Administration bill is co-sponsored by Senators Ware, J. D. Buckman, Burnis T. Martin, of this county, O. O. Duncan and Archie Craft, of Letcher county.

Senate Bill 113 would set up junior colleges in Prestonsburg, Hopkinsville, Somerset, the Hazard-Blackey area, and Elizabethtown, in order of "greatest need." It would also convert the present U. K. extension centers at Ashland, Covington, Henderson, and Cumberland to community colleges. The bill, however, does not mention the U. K. Fort Knox Center.

The university's board of trustees would have the same powers over the colleges, all of which would be designated "public" and that include "community colleges" as if they were the university.

The Governor would appoint an unsalaried, seven-member local advisory board for each college. A member's term would be four years. Each board would advise the U. K. board and the head of the community college on the operation of the college.

No appropriation for operation of such colleges has been included in the Governor's budget for the 1962-64 biennium. He has said that construction could be financed by issuing state revenue bonds.

BERRY PLANT SLATED HERE

Strawberry Processing To Serve Area Counties; \$100,000 Benefit Seen

Increased strawberry production is expected in seven Eastern Kentucky counties this summer in connection with establishment of a strawberry-processing plant here.

Carl Abbott, of Milton, Kentucky, who has leased a building for the processing operation, said he anticipates receiving berry crops from more than 200 acres in the seven-county area. He said the total includes 75 acres already in strawberries and that farmers have agreed to plant approximately 150 additional acres in berries.

From 80 to 100 persons will be employed for about five weeks in processing the fruit. One agricultural expert estimates that this year's crop may bring the growers about \$100,000 on the basis of previous yields and average prices over the last several years.

Abbott, who has been processing berries at Portland, Tennessee, for 19 years, said bulk of the production will be in Floyd, Johnson and Martin counties, with lesser volume to come from Pike, Breathitt, Lawrence and Magoffin.

Instrumental in drawing Abbott's interest to the Area were W. W. Magill, of the University of Kentucky's Horticultural Department; Robert M. Jones, Floyd county agricultural agent; Claude Christian, Johnson county agricultural agent, and Cliff Latta, Prestonsburg attorney.

State Economic Development Commissioner E. B. Kennedy called the planned processing operation "a fine example of what can be done to stimulate diversified farm production in Kentucky, increase farm income, and provide jobs in farm-related industries."

Kennedy pointed out that the project dovetails with efforts of his agency's Agricultural Development Division to augment farm income.

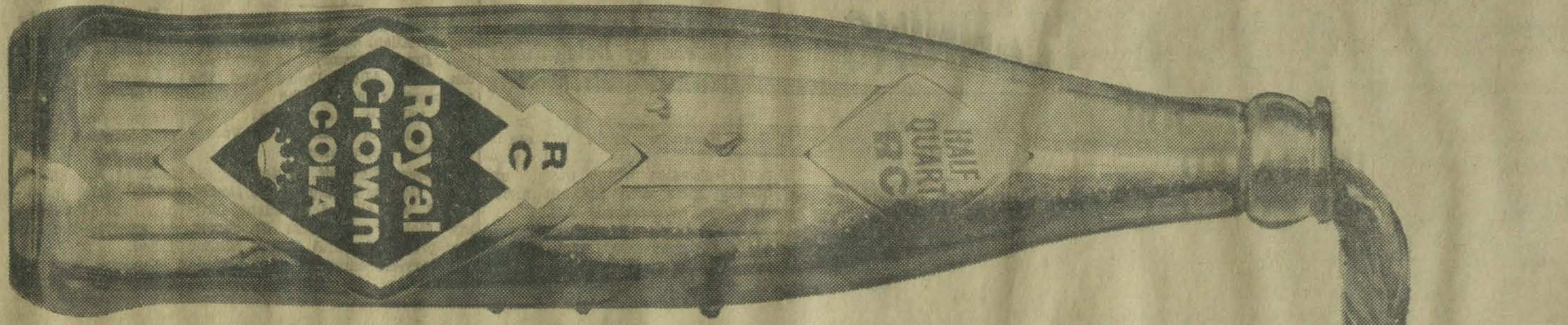

Justice also was emphatic in denying that he had ever approached Raney with such an offer.

Raney speaking to the Senate on a point of personal privilege, identified Justice as a lawyer and successful businessman who is well known in Pikeville and Pike county.

Raney said he was airing his grievance in the Senate because a special Pike county grand jury adjourned Tuesday after investigating Raney's charge without returning any indictments.

The grand jury said it did not feel there was sufficient evidence "either way" to warrant an indictment. Its report added:

"From the evidence heard it appears that there is no evidence to support the charge other than Mr. Raney's testimony. At the same time, there is no evidence to refute the charge other than the sworn statement of the person accused."

Justice was one of the witnesses to appear before the grand jury. After the Senate had approved Governor Combs' biennial budget bill, Senator Raney obtained the floor to air his grievance. He said he had refused to until now to make public the name of the person he said acted as intermediary for Chandler because of the grand jury investigation in progress.

"My purpose, my friends, in making it public was that I wanted to show the people of Pike county and my district that there are sometimes those people in public office who do not believe they should come here and sell their souls for a lousy 30 pieces of silver or a lousy \$5,000," Raney said.

"I am going to name the man and the man responsible here today before I sit down, a man who is a lawyer, a man who has been admitted to the bar, a successful businessman, well known in the community of Pikeville and in Pike county.

"His name is Charles E. Justice," Raney said.

Raney, in a subsequent speech to the Senate, corrected the name of the man he accused. He said the offer was made by Charles Z. Justice, son of former Highway Commissioner Zack Justice, of Pikeville, a prominent Chandler supporter of several years ago.

Processing of the berries at Prestonsburg will involve capping, cleaning and sugaring. The fruit will be put in large cans for shipment to Lexington for freezing.

**New School Legislation Envisions Major Changes In Educational Set-Up**

Representative Allen Slone said here last week that, if a conflict with the state constitution can be avoided, he will seek to amend House Bill 58 which he and Representatives M. B. Denham and William Vickers introduced.

The bill, as it now stands, provides for the election of members of county boards of education by countywide vote but does not specify that all candidates for board membership shall be elected at one election, every four years. It is this failure to space elections four years apart and to elect all board members at one election that the Floyd Representative hopes to correct, if possible.

As the bill now stands, two board members would be chosen at one election and three at an election two years later. In that respect, the bill would not change the present law.

**Hazard Asks Assistance  
On Urban Renewal Work;  
Whisman Unveils Project**

A group of Hazard residents  
Monday told federal officials in  
Washington they need help in  
launching an ambitious new urban-  
renewal project involving a six-  
story community center, play-  
grounds, and an outdoor swimming  
pool.

William L. Slayton, commissioner  
of the Urban Renewal Administra-  
tion, said the plan "sounds like a  
good one," and that a reconnais-  
sance team will visit Hazard "in  
the very near future" to study its  
feasibility.

After the meeting at Slayton's  
office, Representative Carl Perkins  
(D., Hindman) said he has been  
informed that the Urban Renewal  
Administration has approved a  
\$15,660 federal grant to pay for  
planning site improvements in the  
area where a new hospital is to be  
built on High street.

The "Perry-Hazard Community  
Center" project was unveiled by  
John D. Whisman, administrator  
of the Kentucky Area Program of-  
fice, who said it is in its earliest  
stages of planning. It would be  
located on Main street in the lower  
end of town.

The project would include a new  
courthouse, farmers' market, office  
building, recreation center and  
space for shops—all under one  
roof. Across the street an outdoor  
swimming pool is planned. Wad-  
ing pools, a baseball field, and ten-  
nis courts are slated for nearby  
areas.

No formal application has been  
submitted to urban-renewal au-  
thorities, Whisman said. He in-  
dicated that Hazard needs help on  
technical planning before a formal  
proposal can be readied.

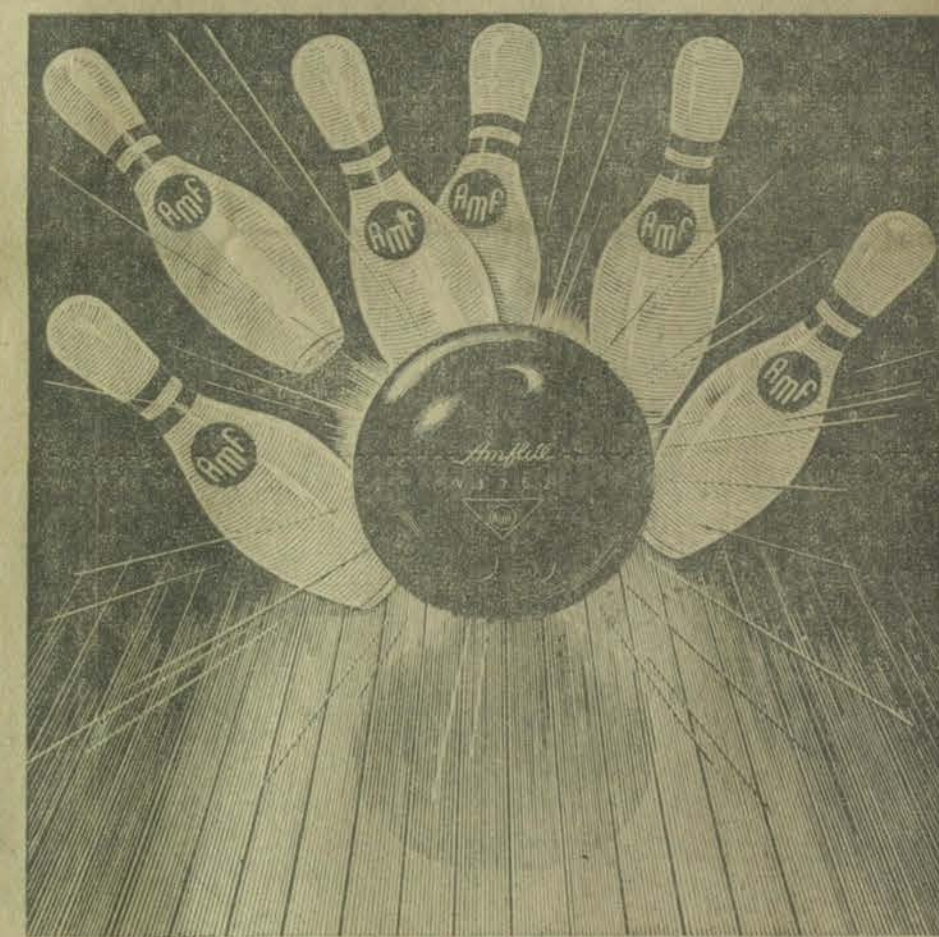

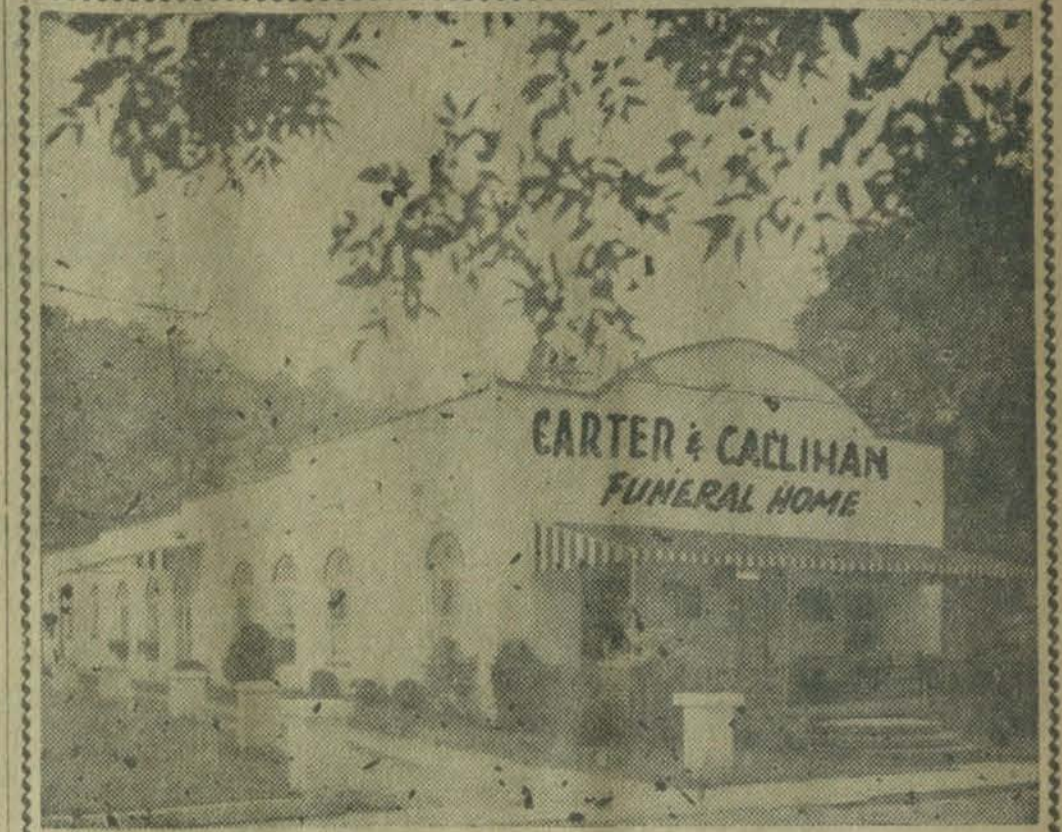
