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### A Great Spate of Words, No Cure for Our Sickness

It is a simple, elemental thing to register anger, horror, sorrow, even to run the long gamut of poignant emotions, at such a monstrous offense as was committed in Birmingham, Alabama last Sunday morning. But the murder of innocent children has raised voices more eloquent than ours, voices more stentorian than ours, and so we would refrain from devoting this space to any such expression.

Let our lament, then, be for the land and the age. In other years, black men were lynched-hanged. burned, butchered, almost literally drawn and quartered-for a variety of offenses which white men committed with a reasonable degree of impunity. Those were evil days, but white men protected colored churches then, they did not indulge in the mass slaying of Negro children.

The question of human rights now has become, lit-erally, a far-flung battlefront. The right of a human being to walk among his fellow humans has become confused with a multitude of things: on the part of whites, fear-fear of the growing power of a minority, of its potential, of inter-marriage, and fear of loss of superiority; on the part of Negroes, of generationsold fears and prejudices, suspicion of the race which has been their masters, suspicion of motives as well as acts, strident demands for immediate action on their behalf without thought of the consequences for both white and black.

Hatred wells up in the North as well as in the South. In many cities there is a Negro "ghetto," true; and in many cities the white who strays into Negro quarters does so at the risk of his life.

It may be considered a naive approach to the sub-ject, but the fact remains that the solution to this and all other man-made quandaries must come from outside of man. Only the spirit of Him who said, "Suffer little children to come unto me"-and who looked as he spoke, it is almost certain, upon not a white-skinned child among all those around Him-will end "man's inhumanity to man.'

"Christian" America! A black man and a white will battle each other in a prize-ring and embrace each the other's sweating, stinking body, and pound and pummel each other, round by round, and end the fray with a handshake-and yet the two will not sit down together in friendly conversation. Cultured individuals of the white race will by the thousands pay dearly for seats at Carnegie Hall to applaud the glorious, Godgiven voice that is Marian Andersen's-but let Marian Andersen bring the black brood that is her family into their churches, the next Sunday morning, to worship the God who loves her and them all!

Who speaks for "the Brotherhood of Man," and who mocks the very meaning of the words? And who mouths the hypocritical claim that "I live by the Golden Rule" & Sounding brass and tinkling cymbals-all a mere beating of tin pans and blowing of horns, mostly our own !

Last Sunday morning, just before the dynamite exploded, those colored children in Birmingham, Ala-bama were studying the Sunday School lesson, "The Love That Forgives." An almost forgotten lesson—one which all of us need so desperately to recall.
