They included the mayor and council members on the ground that the officials had permitted construction of the retaining walls and had refused to correct the situation, meanwhile permitting additional walls to

"We need to know the velocity profiles in the arteries of the body as well as in heart-lung machines," Dr. Knapp says. "With the velocity profiles recorded we help to determine the shear stress produced by the walls of the new machines blond on the walls of the arteries and on the surfaces of blood clots."

Dr. James F. Lafferty, acting director of the Wenner-Gren Laboratory, is setting up a laser flow meter to measure the velocity of liquid through such systems. With flow in small tubes the laser system is important because it is the only proven means of measuring velocity at a discreet point without disturbing the flow. He explained that the laser beam is scattered by microscopic particles in the water and the frequency of this scattering can be measured.

"Dr. Knapp and I will use the information to compare the velocity of the blood from an artificial heart to that of a normal heart," Dr. Laffenty said. "This information will be essential to the people who will be designing the heart-lung machine."

Dr. Knapp adds: "If we can supply information to the building of the second generation herrt-lung machine - the type of materials that should be used and perhans design factors, too - we will have been most pleased with the research pro-
