### Regional Hospital Fund Reaches \$70,000 Total

Dr. Wells' was the second \$6,000 pledge made Tuesday. The other contribution consisted of a \$1,000 pledge from Mr. and Mrs. R. V. May, of Prestonsburg, for the building fund and \$5,000 by the R. V. May Company, distributor of oxygen and oxygen equipment, for the purchase of inhalation therapy equipment to be placed in the new hospital.

Major pledges already have passed \$70,000, the Rev. Skiff said. A total of \$150,000 must be pledged from the four-county area which the hospital will serve before construction can be done under federal grants and loam.

The proposed hospital will be built on a site fronting on US 23, between Prestonsburg and Paintsville, and its regional

The general fund drive to give all residents of the area an opportunity to have a part in the hospital will be launched, early next month.

Petition Circulation Under Way in County For Poll This Year

Circulation of a petition to request Floyd county's second local option election within a perind of little more than two years has been started in the

The petition later is expected to be submitted to the County Judge to set a date for the election. It was said here this week that an August date will be asked by "wet" forces.

Approximately 3,200 signatures will be required on the petition. Sponsors of the movement for a wet-dry vote were quoted as saying this week they will attempt to collect 7,000 signatures as a show of strength

The hard-fought 1966 local option election was won by "dry" forces, and this was followed by a lengthy contest suit, which the drys also won.

The most recent local option election in Eastern Kentucky was held in Boyd county, which again voted dry.

The latter would serve as executive secretary.

### HUNGER IN THE HILLS

Are Eastern Kentuckians hungry? If so, why? A New York Times writer implies that much of the blame rests upon elected officials at the county level who penalize the poor, or reward them, according to how they have cast their votes.

The fact that most of us aren't hungry doesn't mean that the spectre of hunger has been banished. It is quite possible that, despite all the millions spent on food stamps, school lunches, employment for the poor and a multiplicity of other programs which are a part of the War on Poverty, people yet may starve in this land of plenty.

People may be hungry for a number of reasons, and none of them are based on any individual's desire to see anybody starve. Dependent children go hungry because strumpet mothers neglect them and spend the money on themselves and their consorts, for instance. Fathers spend on whiskey and beer the money that should be spent for food.

There is a sizeable gap between starvation and malnutrition, but one may be mistaken for the other. Malnutrition is a fact, almost a way, of life for many. Ignorance of food values, carelessness, plain laziness may result in many the child becoming undernourished. And even the child from a comfortable home may wind up in the same category if he isn't discouraged when he would prefer a soft drink to milk or a candy bar to a wholesome meal. A survey by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in 1965 showed that a number of families with incomes of \$10,000 a year were still suffering from dietary deficiencies. One comment by USDA is apropos:

"Above all, we need nutrition education, particularly for low-income groups. If families don't know how to use donated foods or the food they buy with stamps-if the youngsters fail to translate the meaning of the Type A lunch and breakfast programs into their own dietary habits and patterns, they will simply perpetuate poor nutrition into the next generation. This is particularly true where the very poor are concerned. Instead of improving the quality of their diets, they often prefer to eat more of the same poor diet. More of the was deleted. Then there is a deeper cause of malnutrition. A form of starvation gnaws at the vitals of a larger group because of the intestinal parasites which infest a large part of the population. This very real threat to the public health and the development of many thousands of young Americans is emphasized by every study. But the sufferers are merely studied to death-little has been done.

Many literally are starving because intestinal parasites—the worms—get the food before those who ate it does.

All of which reminds us -it's going to require more than recriminations voiced against a few officials to reach and serve those who most sorely need help.

Gateh for challenging the medical profession for its indifference to persons infested with intestinal pacrositos; also for the facts made known by Mrs. Mary Jane Dunn, director of the Office of Economic Opportunity for Breathitt, Owsley and Lee coun-

Since 1997 we have had three screening programs in Floyd county that revealed 65 percent to 80 percent of persons living with poor sanitation being infested with one to four types of clestinal parasites. The first OEO project funded for Floyd county made possible a treatment program after finding this situation. Environmental changes were made, wells were chlorinated. For a year an eduos tonal proram teaching prevention was carried on.

A parasitologist from Atlanta, Ga. visited us and told us it would take five years to eliminate this situation that is sapcing the blood and energy from hase victims. 





### Martin Friends Of Education Reply To Superintendent Clark

In the last two weeks' Floyd County Times Charles Clark, Superintendent of Floyd County Schools, has clothed himself in a white mantle of educational self-righteousness in pleading for support of the proposed school at Eastern. From the article one would be led to believe that there are no friends of education in and around the City of Martin, whose children now suffer without a GRADE SCHOOL at all, and who, if Mr. Clark has his way, will soon have no HIGH SCHOOL either.

We do not argue with Mr. Clark's idealistic statements about Floyd County education and its needs; but as many good writers have done before him, he has misconstrued facts to justify a course of action wrongfully conceived, and dictatorily executed, under his leadership, without consideration of the feelings of parents and, more importantly, without consideration of the pressing needs of school children in the

Martin and Right Beaver area. In the past, and even now, Mr. Clark has refused to confer with interested parent groups on his plans. WE HOPE he will read what we consider the TRUE facts concerning the construction of the proposed Eastern School as well as the resultant loss of adequate educational facilities at Martin.

Here are some facts Mr. Clark, has overlooked,

or at worst, has misconstrued: 1. The present enrollment of the Martin High School would comprise over 40% of the total enrollment of the four schools scheduled for consolidation, and is the only one of the four having the required number of students to maintain a high school other

than on an emergency basis. 2. An educational survey in 1961 concluded that a COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL should be located at the forks of Beaver Creek; or within a two mile vicinity. The right and left beaver creeks join within a few feet of the City limits of Martin; yet the Eastern location is 7 to 8 miles from the city.

3. Present construction plans for Floyd County, as announced by Mr. Clark, exhaust the school construction budget, thus leaving no funds available for needed remedial or new construction for either the grade or high school in Martin.

4. In location of the proposed school at Eastern, Mr. Clark has ignored these factors: (a) A fire department and police department

to protect the proposed school: the nearest adequate fire and police protection is located at Martin. (b) Hospital and medical care; the nearest

(c) A suitable water supply and sewage disposal system; again the nearest is at Martin.

All of the above now exist in the City of Martin. All are adequate, well designed, and have been conceived, developed and constructed at great expense, time and effort on the part of officials and citizens of the city. Whatever of these services which can be furnished at the proposed Eastern School site can only be second class, inadequate and constructed at considerable and additional expense to the school taxpavers OF ALL OF FLOYD COUNTY.

Mr. Clark says experts selected the Eastern site. We challenge Mr. Clark to deny that he and one or perhaps two board members, only, with other COUN-TY OFFICIALS, selected the actual location which was approved by the State Board of Education purely as a matter of course.

Mr. Clark in his article of last week seems to say

you are not a friend of education: 1. If, as a citizen of Martin, you complain that your grade school children attend school in damp, insufficiently lighted basements, without adequate exits for fire or other emergencies,

2. If, as a citizen of Martin, you believe your fourth class city with adequate, police, fire, water, and sewer services should be the only such city in the State of Kentucky without a sigh school; even though the Court of Appeals in 1939 directed the
