Two-City Water System Studied

90% HUD Funds Seen for Work, Officials Told

Discussion of plans for a Prestonsburg-Paintsville regional water system were continued last Thursday evening at a meeting of Prestonsburg water system officials with Howard K. Bell, Engineers, Lexington, and Joe McCauley, executive director of the Big Sandy Area Development District.

The system, it was said, holds "high priority" for a 90 per cent Housing and Urban Development (HUD) grant. The proposed hookup if the two systems would involve the expenditure of an estimated \$2,000,000.

The regional system would leave the Paintsville and Prestonsburg water systems operating as separate units, as at present, but would provide insurance against a water shortage in either, it was pointed out. Only a valve would separate the two, and this could be opened to provide help for either from the other system at any time of water shortage.

Prestonsburg water now goes in Auxier Water Company lines as far as the new Porter school, north of the Combs Airport at Blockhouse Bottom. Paintsville water extends in the direction of Prestonsburg as far as the American Standard area. Union of the two systems would possibly be made in the vicinity of those two points without interfering with the Auxier system.

Capacity of the plant for the system would be 3 million gallons a day, and the system would serve areas along the route of the mains. Salyersville and Allen could be included in the hookup, if interested, it was said.

Bell Engineers made the preliminary study for the project two years ago.

Bill Harvey Howard, superintendent of the Prestonsburg Water & Gas System, said this week that preliminary engineering work has been completed for a new gas system in West Prestosburg and that it is hoped bids can be asked on the work within the next two months. The project will cost an estimated \$50,000. Gas lines in West Prestonsburg are about 40 years old, and the line loss of gas there

Floyd Solid Waste Program To Open First Landfill, Oct. 21

Floyd county's solid waste program by 12 feet wide and 7 feet deep. County will become partially effective Oct. 21 when the first landfill established by the county will be opened on Turkey Creek, near Maytown.

Date of the opening was set Friday by which rates for dumping were set to be effective until a countywide program can be developed.

The charge for dumping waste hauled to the site will be 50 cents per load for pickup trucks and \$1.50 for dumptrucks. Scales may be installed later at the landfill for the weighing of loads, County Judge Henry Stumbo said.

The landfill will be open till 4:30 p.m. daily, it was indicated. Judge Stumbo said the county is preparing to erect a caretaker's building at the landfill site. A chain across the entrance will protect the site from after-hours dumping.

"We expect everybody who can get to the landfill to dump their wastes there and to end the use of unauthorized dumps," Judge Stumbo said.

Workman Trial At Coming Term Not a Certainty

Commonwealth's Attorney Harold J Stumbo said Tuesday that ability of the state to bring to trial Bobby Workman on a charge of murder in the slaying of James Chaffins at the November circuit court term here will depend upon the success of the extradition action he expects to take shortly to return Workman

He said Workman's attorney has indicated he will fight extradition.

To Stumbo's request that Workman come to Frankfort for a polygraph (lie detector) test by a State Police expert, the accused man's attorney replied that Workman had already taken a test administered by the Marcy Consulting Service, Dearborn, Mich., and that it showed Workman had no knowledge of the crime. As an alternative to Workman's coming to Frankfort, the attorney suggested that Kentucky State Police send a polygraph expert to Michigan, at

Stumbo said such an arrangement "is impossible," that the State Police will not send a representative to Michigan. Besides, he said, he has offered Workman immunity from arrest if he will make the trip to Frankfort for the test, and will permit him to return to Michigan and go through the regular extradition

Troopers Seize Two Suspects In Bank Cases

An attempt to force their way into the Hindman home of W. R. Smith, chairman of the board of the Bank of Hindman, and the subsequent holding of two of the Smiths' neighbors as hostages resulted Monday in the arrest of two men sought as robbers of banks at Sandy Hook and

The two were arrested near the top of Pine Mountain by Kentucky state troopers after a wild chase from Hindman through Whitesburg, with helicopters being used to guide police cruisers. Held in jail at Hazard are Clifford Hall, of Whitesburg, and James Herbert Fultz, of Morehead.

The two men had inquired in downtown Hindman of the location of the Smith residence. Mrs. Marie Webb Smith, wife of the banker, was alone when one of the two men rang the doorbell. When she opened the door, he asked her if Bill Smith lived there, drew a revolver and with his left hand beckoned his waiting accomplice to join him.

Mrs. Smith slammed the door shut and it automatically locked. The frustrated visitor—it was not learned here which of the two first approached the home—fired three shots through the door as Mrs. Smith ran to lock doors at the rear of the house. Then a shot which may have been from a shotgun was fired through a bedroom window.

The two men then raced to the nearby home of Brode Duke, there forced Duke and his sister-in-law, Oma Smith, into

Murder Case To Open Circuit Court Term

The first day of the November criminal term of circuit court will be marked by a trial growing out of one of Eastern Kentucky's most sensational murder

The case of Robert Sykes, one of four men accused of the Pike county murder of Mrs. Boone Deskins, has been transferred to the Floyd court for trial, and the date has been set for court-opening day,

Three of Sykes' alleged accomplices in the slaying of the woman have been convicted in Pike circuit court trials. Her husband is now serving a 21-year pen

The Floyd court has been plagued by continuances after cases have been docketed, and so Circuit Judge Hollie Conley has deviated from his regular procedure for the coming session. He has announced that he will have the entire docket called on the first day of the session, then set specific dates for trial in only those cases that are ready for

It is possible that the only other murder case to be heard here during the term is that of Bobby Workman, who is accused of the slaying on Arkansas Creek five years ago of James M. Chaffins.

While a Pike county case is being transferred here for trial, the murder indictments against Eddie Jones and John Martin in the separate slayings of Lawrence Conley at Garrett and James Clayton Conley, near Wayland, have been venued to the Pike circuit for trial. The September grand jury voted indictments against Jones, his father, Agnel Jones, and Martin. The new indictment against the Joneses has not been venued to Pike county. Circuit Judge Conley has disqualified himself for the trial if it is held here and has certified the case for a special judge. Two other Floyd murder defendants,

James and Otis Gibson, who are under indictment for the shotgun slaying of James Ollie Conley, has also been shifted on change of venue to the Magoffin circuit court for trial. Date of the hearing has not been set.

offers no offensive characteristics. Because of ths "dump concept," the court has been months ingetting a landfill established. "People don't want to sell or lease sites and many think a landfill would be a litter such as they have seen at these hilltop and roadside dumps," Stumbo said.

No other sites are now available, but the court continues to seek three more. When the landfill service is established countywide, a system of collection will be formed and rates established for homes, businessses, schools and others.

The Turkey Creek landfill has been approved by the fiscal court for opening Oct. 21, but the court still awaits its approval from state agencies which have had test results, soil samples and the like in their possession between two and three months, Judge Stumbo said.

"They haven't approved the site, but anything is better than the dumping everywhere, any time that has been going on in the county so long," he added.

Smith's car, and they drove away, replacement of all gas lines in Prestonsburg will be made. This, at current estimates, would cost \$500,000.

> At last week's meeting of the Water and Gas Commission Bell Engineers were directed to proceed with final plans for upgrading the water system here to give the plant a filtering capacity of 2 million gallons a day and a plant capacity of 11/2 million gallons.

This can be done, Howard said he has been assured, for about \$70,000 through use of a new filter and with the system's own employees doing the work. The new filter which would double the filtering capacity is a mixed media (anthracite coal) filter. The change would be made from the present rapid sand filters.

Members of the Floyd County Emergency and Rescue Squad worked for two hours last Wednesday morning in an effort to free Robert Hunley, 30, of Salyersville, from the cab of a coal truck after Hunley apparently lost control of the vehicle which ran over an embankment on the David Road.

A rescue squad spokesman reported that a break in the road near the accident scene, or foggy conditions that morning, may have caused the mishap.

The truck rolled onto the driver's side, pinning Hunley's foot under the door, and squad members found it necessary to place jacks under the cab before Hunley could be removed. Rescue efforts began at 7:30 a.m. and Hunley was taken from the scene to Highlands Regional Medical Centr about two hours later. Hunley was released Monday after being hospitalized for a bone fracture and cuts and bruises.







When an amateur golfer attributes a low score to "some good luck," you can usually go along with that simple reasoning. But when he shoots a 145 in an 18-hole tournament, defeating 200 competitors, you can be sure that real golfing skill had a lot to do with it too.

WHEREAS, Kentucky Statute 26.270 calls for the appointment by ordinance of police court judge pro tem to fill the office when the duly elected judge is absent for a time,

THEREFORE, the Board of Trustees of the City of Wheelwright does ordain the following:

The duly elected police judge will appoint as needed a judge pro tem to serve when the duly elected police court judge of the City of Wheelwright is absent and thereby cannot fulfill his office; and in case of vacancy of the office, the Board of Trustees will appoint a judge pro tem and notify the Governor of the State immediately of this vacancy.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with or inconsistent with the provisions of ths ordinance are herby repealed. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage, as required by law.

Nurse Finds New 'Bed Sores' Remedy

A Veterans Administration nurse has discovered a cure for skin ulcers, or "bed sores," by combining the skills learned both as a nurse and a housewife.

Gladys C. Wallace, of the Louisville, VA hospital, had tried every recognized method of dealing with a gunshot wound in the abdomen of a 21-year-old Vietnam veteran paraplegic. When the wound refused to heal despite the best of care, she sprinkled him liberally with karaya vegetable gum powder and wrapped him in a well known plastic kitchen wrap. Healing started the next day and was complete within a week.

A surgeon and Mrs. Wallace then treated the young veteran's leg ulcers and a deep ulcer over his spinal cord with karaya gum in the form of rings. All healed. He has gained 60 pounds and is active and happy.

The hospital has since used karaya vegetable gum and powder for more than 100 patients, including paraplegics and quadriplegics with decubitus ulcers, amputees with infected leg stumps, and

The average times for complete healing have seen seven days for the more superficial ulcers and widely affected skin areas, 14 days for ulcers extending down to the muscle, and 75 days for wounds involving muscle.

The karaya treatment is now being used in other hospitals in Kentucky, with results comparable to those at the VA hospital. No untoward effects or complications have been reported.

The Louisville VA hospital has undergone a deluge of requests for information on the treatment from medical and nursing professionals both in the U.S. and foreign countries.


Describing the therapy in an article in the June 1974 issue of the American Journal of Nursing, Mrs. Wallace says no single reported method for treatment of chronic skin ulcers has proved as a successful as this.





Our Fragile Earth

By DR. JERRY HOWELL **Director of Environmental Studies** Morehead State University

The energy crisis will be discussed in problem, the energy issue is certainly the environmental issue of the '70's.

How did the U.S. and most of the rest of the world get into this predicament? Although the current crisis was precipitated by international happenings, the roots were many and varied. In the first place, more than 95 per cent of our energy is supplied by what we call "non-renewable" resources-oil, coal, natural gas. These fossil fuels were produced through eons of time by the deposition and decomposition of plant and animal remains in the earth's crust.

It has been estimated that world coal reserves are sufficient, at present rates of use, to last for more than 1,500 years. An estimated lifetime as low as eight years has been made for natural gas supplies. Oil reserve lifetimes have been estimated as short as 25 years and as long as 75 years. Unfortunately, these estimates can give a false sense of security.

Bertram, of Jamestown, requested an opinion regarding a proposal by a private individual, the owner and manager of a local radio station, that he provide dispatch service to the law enforcement units of Jamestown, Russell Springs and Russell county. The Attorney General's office replied that the proposal was legal because the general emphasis of such a dispatch service is for the public safety of the citizens of Russell county.

Phillip R. Hodges, of Owensboro, indicated that the city of Calhoun presently is drawing up a new zoning ordinance, but the City Commission has not felt that an ordinance with strict ruling on the rebuilding of nonconforming uses is required. He asks whether a city with a low rate of growth, still is required to include any certain level of restrictive rebuilding classifications. The Attorney General's office answered in the affirmative. Kentucky law states that when cities and counties exercise the power to zone, the regulations must contain, among other things, a provision for nonconforming use of land and struc-

Paul M. Baker, prosecuting attorney for the city of Jeffersontown, asked for an interpretation of the words, "other public places," as it appears in Kentucky laws concerning drunkeness. His specific question refers to a case in which an intoxicated man was arread in a parked automobile in a parking lot of an establishment which was closed. 



Floyd Funds To Carry On **Unemployment Battle Increased**

By JAN CONNOLLY

The new Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) is helping combat rising unemployment rates in pocket areas of Kentucky, Governor Wendell H. Ford said recently.

In Floyd county, fundings for CETA public service employment have recently been increased to \$74,441.

The monies are part of Kentucky's total \$3,237,153 grant to hire unemployed in areas with over 612 percent unemployment. Statewide, Kentucky's unemployment rate has been consistently below the national level. However, there are counties with limited job opportunities which are being ssisted by CETA.

Latest figures show that Kentucky's unemployment rate is 5.1 percent as compared to the national average of 5.6 per cent.

CETA is a public service employment program which adds to and provides employment as does the Emergency Employment Act (EEA), administered by the state Department of Personnel The service unit chairman reported under the direction of Personnel Commissioner Cattie Lou Miller.

will make more jobs available soon. The

number of individuals who fill the actual

job slots will depend on the turnover rate.

CETA is not a permanent public work program like those of the 1930's, said Willard. The difference is the goalwhich is training through temporary employment for future unsubsidized jobs and permanent employment.

"There is a commitment on the part of the local public official to transition at least 50 percent of these employees into unsubsidized jobs each year," the commissioner said.







Gen'l Fund Receipts Up



For persons trying to fight rising building costs and inflated interest rates, a mobile home may seem very attractive. But before sinking thousands of precautions.

a dealer who will honor a warranty or guarantee when and if repairs are needed. To find out about a dealer, you may check with the Consumer Protection Division and the Better Business Bureau. Ask the dealer to give you the names of might be very helpful in making your

check for damages or faulty workmanship. Check the exterior for dents or for joints which do not fit tightly. On the inside, look for water spots on the ceiling or on the floors that might indicate leakage. And while you are inside, look at the appliances. Check each one, making sure they all work properly. Notice the brand or brands of the appliances so that later you may find out if servicing is available and convenient. Ask the dealer if all items within the home are included in the purchasing price.

Shoppers frequently compare mobile homes by length. If you do this, take care that the length of the hitch or an awning or any overhang is not included in the length stated by the dealer.

As in all consumer purchases, it pays to study the contract very carefully. If there are any terms you do not understand, don't sign the contract until dollars into a mobile home, take some you have discussed it with someone who does understand it. Insist that any oral It is very important to do business with promises made by the dealer are put into writing and will not be excluded by the general warranty on the contract.

Study the warranty to determine what the actual coverage is for the mobile home. 



To Vie for Scholarship



James David Flanery, Prestonsburg High School senior, is Floyd county's only semifinalist in the competition for a 1975 Merit Scholarship, it was announced this week by Ronald L. Hager, principal of the school.

As a Merit Program semifinalist he was among the highest scorers in the nationwide aptitude-qualifying test administered to more than a million students in about 1700 schools.

Semifinalists must qualify as finalists to advance in the competition for Merit Scholarships. To become Merit Program finalists, the semifinalists must be endorsed by their schools and recommended for scholarship consideration, confirm their high PSAT-NMSQT scores with an equivalent performance on a second examination, provide evidence of high academic performance, and supply information about their other accomplishments. Over 90 percent of the semifinalists are expected to become finalists. Each finalist will be considered for Merit Scholarships and will receive a Certificate of Merit in recognition of distinguished performance in the competition.

Every finalist competes for one of the National Merit \$1000 scholarships, allocated on a state basis according to each state's percentage of the total U.S. graduating high school seniors.



After leaving Columbus, the Rev. Mr. Smith went to Hopewell and lived on a farm purchased by his brother and served as pastor of Hitchins Methodist Church at an annual salary of \$300.

He married the former Rebecca Wooten in 1918 and the same year joined the Methodist conference and was assigned to the South Portsmouth-Mt. Zion-Bethlehem-St. Paul Circuit. The Rev. Mr. Smith attended Mayo College, leaving home on Mondays and returning

Floyd County Health Notes

By CONNA J. GRIFFITH (Health Educaotr)

Not enough children are being immunized to assure that epidemics will not occur. Last year, there were over 400 cases of measles and of rubella, or threeday measles, in Kentucky.

One of the main problems is that many parents wait until their children approach school age before having them immunized. This leaves the child unprotected during the first four or five years of his life. Children should be immunized against polio, measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria, tetanus and whopping cough by the time they are two years. Statistics indicate that the percentage of young children immunized against these diseases has been declining at an alarming rate in recent years. As a result, diseases that were once well controlled are becoming a problem once

Last year, only 78 per cent of Kentucky's two-year-olds had completed their oral polio vaccine series. Anyone who remembers the polio epidemics of the 50's, when thousands of children were permanently disabled, knows this disease is very serious.

Polio isn't the only problem. Kentucky's statistics for rubella and measles show that 22 percent of the two-year-olds have not been immunized against rubella and 20 per cent have not been immunized against measles. Some people still regard measles as a harmless disease but before vaccines were available, hundreds of children died each year from the disease.

The Floyd County Health Department urges parents to check their records to make sure their children are fully protected. Parents whose children have not completed their immunizations, or parents who aren't sure whether their children have received all their immunizations, should check with their own doctors or here at the Floyd County Health Department right away. Seeing that every child is fully protected will help prevent epidemics.

October is designated as Immunization Action Month. The Floyd County Health Department offers free immunizations, Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 4

Monday, October 21, the Floyd County Health Department will hold two clinics. One clinic will be held at Ethel Osborne's Store in Bypro, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. with the following services being offered: TB skin tests, blood pressures, immunizations and diabetes screening.

The other will be a pap smear clinic from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the old high school building in Wayland. The public health nurse reminds all women that they should have a pap smear at least once a year. The services at both of these clinics are free and open to the public.

The Floyd County Health Department will be holding a glaucoma clinic Friday, October 18, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Glaucoma is a serious disease that can cause blindness slowly and painlessly, and it usually occurs in persons oer 35 years of age.

The public health nurses urge all persons age 35 and over to take advantage of this free service, since glaucoma can be prevented by early detection and treatment.





SPE Lecturer to Speak At E. Kentucky Section



Dwight K. Smith, technical supervisor with Halliburton Services in Duncan, Okla., and a 1974-75 Distinguished Lecturer for the Society of Petroleum Engineers of AIME, will be the guest speaker at the October meeting of the East Kentucky Section of SPE. The meeting is scheduled for Thursday, Oct. 24, at 6:30 p.m. at the Paintsville Country Club in Paintsville.

Smith's speech, entitled "Cementing-The Foundation for Successful Oil and Gas Recovery," will assess cementing processes used by the industry over the past 60 years.

A 1943 graduate of Oklahoma Baptist U., Smith joined Halliburton Services in 1946 where he has served as an advisor for the first commercial hydraulic fracture treatment and for materials and techniques in the cementation of large diameter shafts in the mining industry and thermonuclear holes. An author and co-author of 18 technical papers and the SPE "Cementing" Monograph and holder of seven patents, Smith is also a member of the National API Mud and Cement Standardization Committees and chairman of the API Arctic Cementing Task Group. He is an active guest lecturer in adult education schools at Oklahoma U., U. of Texas, Texas A&M U., and various adult education groups throughout the world.

Ext. Service Offers Fall Coin Drying Tips

If you are planning long-term storage of your 1974 corn crop, you should dry the corn to a 13-13.5 percent moisture level. That is the recommendation of Otto Loewer, Jr., Extension agricultural engineer at the University of Kentucky

College of Agriculture. Loewer says higher rates may be acceptable if you plan to feed the grain before spring. Of course, grain which is to be sold immediately should not be dried lower than the base moisture level specified by the buyer.

If you use an in-bin drying system, Loewer recommends keeping the system running continuously until the grain is dry. He says the drying process will continue even when it is raining, although high humidity will slow down the drying process somewhat.

If you use a batch-in-bin or portable drier, you should cool the grain before putting it into a storage bin, according to

the UK ag engineer. He also recommends cleaning grain either before or after drying and before it goes into storage. If grain has not been cleaned before it is put into a bin, a spreader system should be used in the bin to keep fine particles from building up and blocking air movement in the grain.

Poisonous Plants of our Region

(Concluded) POISON IVY . . . POISON OAK . . . If you are allergic to ivy poisoning and get a good rash of it, you may have to go to the hospital. I've seen this poison raise blisters on people the size of a hen's egg. Those with sensitive skin seem most susceptible. Some persons who have thick, tough skin can handle poison vine without any ill effects. You don't have to come in direct contact with the vine to get the poisonous oil sprayed on your skin. If you should disturb it or cut the vines with a hoe, they splatter the misty oil on you. A dog wading through a patch of poison ivy can transmit its poisonous oils to persons. A good rule to remember is: "Leaves of three, let it be; leaves of

five, let it thrive." Poison ivy, or poison oak, has three leaflets, with the end leaflet on a longer stem. The pretty vine called Virginia creeper, or "sour vine" by some, has five beautiful leaflets, which are not poisonous. In autumn, its leaves turn a glowing purple.

What is the difference between poison ivy and poison oak? They are essentially the same; they have different forms but the same poison, which is called "toxidodendrol." When the ivy climbs a

Boaters Are Urged To Play It Safe

Frankfort, Ky.-Records of the state Division of Water Enforcement show a substantial decrease in the number of boating fatalities on Kentucky's waters so far in 1974 in comparison to last year's totals.

The number of boating fatalities which occurred in the state through Sept. 30, 1973 was 47. Through that date in 1974, the number of boating fatalities was 30.

Water Enforcement Administrator Doug Shoulders said that the decline is especially encouraging because it has occurred during a year in which there has been a greater volume of recreational boating activity on Kentucky's waters than during any previous

"Now that the weather is starting to get cooler, most of the boaters on the lakes will be fishermen," said Shoulders. "They should be aware of some additional problems which the fall months bring to their sport.

"For instance, fishermen normally go out in the early morning or late evening when it is especially cool and, therefore, they will have on heavy bulky clothing."

"This heavy clothing would make it especially difficult for them to swim if they fall overboard. It is highly desirable for anyone on the water at this time of year to wear their life preservers," Shoulders said.

Shoulders said that fog is especially bad on the lakes in the early morning during the fall and this presents another

"Boaters should be extremely cautious when traveling on the water during heavy fog. Speed should be reduced because other boats, debris and stumps are not seen as readily as under normal conditions," said Shoulders.

"Boaters should also be aware that Kentucky law requires that when their boat is anchored or in operation in open water during hours of darkness and other periods of poor visibility, they must display a white light visible to a boat approaching from any direction."

tree or fence post it is simply "poison ivy;" when it stands upright with no visible support, it is called "poison oak." That's all the difference there is and both are equally dangerous to persons who are susceptible. Poison ivy climbs trees by means of aerial roots, which fasten on the bark with a firm hold. Its greenish blossoms produce white berries, which are eaten by many birds; these scatter the seeds over a wide area. Birds and animals can eat the leaves or seeds without harm. I've seen mules eat a big bait of poison ivy and they seem to like it. The Indians ate the leaves in the spring as a way of immunizing their skin against the poison. If you are overly sensitive to poison ivy, no doubt your doctor can give you injections to render you immune. I know they are effective, as I took them once and have never been seriously poisoned since. Caution: Do not scratch the blisters, as this tends to spread the infection and risks more infection.

Antidote: Laundry soap and warm water; or a strong solution of baking soda; also the application of Calamine lotion is good. Severe cases should be treated by the doctor.

Poison Ivy is a member of the Cashew Family and is distantly related to the poison sumac.

Cocklebur . . . In sandy soil, cockleburs often spring up as if by magic. They have hardy seeds, which may lie dormant in loam for many years, then at the right time, sprout and produce the young plants, which are deadly to livestock, especially hogs. The early spring shoots are the most poisonous. I've seen hogs lying down in great misery after eating a bait of young cockleburs. Their belly turns a greenish-purple from the poison, and they vomit and froth at the mouth. The poisoned animal soon gets too weak to stand but lies on its side, moving the legs rapidly with a running motion until


Antidote; for cocklebur poison mineral oil is a good treatment; also whole milk given by a stomach tube if necessary.

The ripe burs of cocklebur are obnoxious to persons and livestock. They have barbs like a fishhook for fastening onto hair or clothing. They often cause mats to form in a horse's mane or tail, and are a menace when matted in sheep's

Cocklebur is in the great family of Composites, the stems are red-spotted and the leaves are large, hairy and rough; they are heart-shaped, toothed and lobed. The only good feature about the cocklebur is, it holds the soil from washing and helps to enrich it. Soil is always loose and loamy where the cockleburs grow.

Clinics Begin in State Cities Frankfort, Ky.-Alcohol driver content of 12-14 per cent) or five ounces of

education clinics held by the Kentucky Department of Transportation began in 10 Kentucky cities during the period Oct.

Alcohol Driver Education

Enrollment in the clinics, according to Driver Licensing Director F. E. Hodges, consists of first offenders convicted of driving while under the influence of an intoxicant. With an average of 25 in each clinic—and 10 clinics now in session approximately 250 first offenders have embarked on an educational course which seeks to prevent their becoming second offenders.

The ADE clinics came about as a result of the passage of House Bill 190 by the 1974 General Assembly. That law amended former legislation which required that the Department of Transportation revoke for six months the license of any driver convicted of operating a vehicle while under the influence of an intoxicant.

Traffic judges are now allowed to recommend that the person convicted of drunken driving keep his operator's license if he is a first offender and if he agrees to attend the ADE clinic in his

"Due to the existence of the ADE clinics," said Hodges, "we will now have a valuable opportunity to identify and to educate drinking drivers.

Hodges said the ADE clinics are modeled on the Driver Improvement Clinics which the Division of Criver Licensing has administered since 1965.

"However," added Hodges, "the ADE clinics deal specifically with attitudes concerning drinking and driving. We believe the drinking driver to be a special problem because national traffic safety statistics indicate that a drinking driver is involved in oer 50 per cent of the accidents in which a fatality occurs."

In order to complete the 10-hour ADE course, the enrollee must attend the twoand-one-half hour sessions four successive weeks. No test is given at the completion of the course. Class participation is encouraged, however, and officials believe that attendance in itself will cause the person to absorb enough information about drinking and driving to make him less apt to be a repeat offender.

The following are some points discussed during the sessions:

DWI is driving while under the influence of an intoxicant. An intoxicant can be alcohol (which it is in 90 per cent of convictions: or drugs (illegal or legal, they result in 10 per cent of the cases.) "Under the influence" means that a person's decision-making abilities and reactions are impaired to the point where driving is affected.

A person is legally "under the influence" when a breathalyzer test indicates a reading of .10 or above. A reading of .10 means that a person has onedrop of alcohol in their blood stream for every 1,000 drops of blood.

What is a drink? What one person might think is one drink, might actually be four or five drinks. For example, a water glass full of whiskey might contain six ounces. That would be six drinks since 1 ounce of whiskey (or bourbon, scotch, etc.) is considered one drink.

The human body is capable of metabolizing one drink per hour. The following constitutes one drink(one ounce of such things as 100 proof whiskey, gin, scotch (mixed or straight), twelve ounces of beer (the standard size of a bottle or can), two ounces of fortified wine (alcohol content of 18-22 per cent), four ounces of regular wine (alcohol

pop wine (alcoholic content of 9-11 per cent based on body weight and average body chemistry).

At the clinics, charts were handed out from which the class could estimate how many drinks it would take for them to be over the line (.10) on the breathalyzer. For example, a person who weighs 180 pounds can have 9 drinks in four hours and would register .104 on the breathalyzer and therefore be considered under the influence of an intoxicant. Another person weighing 200 pounds could have the same number of drinks in the same amount of time and would register .094 on the breathalyzer and, therefore, not be considered under the influence.

The ten clinics had their first sessions last week. Eight additional clinics will get under way in November at Pikeville, Cynthiana, Glasgow, Harlan, Hazard, Mayfield, Owensboro and Winchester.

Tallent, native of Langley who served as assistant coach at GW for five years, was named head coach in mid-August to replace Carl Slone, who resigned to return to his alma mater, the University of Richmond, as head coach.

Practice for the 1974-'75 season will run for nearly seven weeks before the opener on December 3 at Fort Myer against the University of Delaware. Tallent is anxious to get started as expectations are high for a banner year.

In contrast to many coaching situations where a new coach is brought in to rebuild a program, Tallent steps into a ready-made position. With 10 lettermen back, including five players who have been full-time starters, GW is anticipating its finest basketball campaign

Four of the starters will be playing together for the fourth year while the fifth played nearly the entire season a year ago as a freshman. Leading the returnees are senior Clyde Burwell, Haviland Harper and Keith Morris along with junior Pat Tallent, younger brother of Coach Tallent. Tallent is in his fourth year at GW but had to sit out all but three games last year because of knee surgery. He regains that year of eligibility. Also back is sophomore guard John Holloran, who stepped in for the injured Tallent and did an outstanding job in the backcourt, finishing his first year with a 10.1 average and second-high assist man with

Hallowe'en Has Competition— There Are Modern Monsters, UFO's

During this season of goblins, witches and warlocks, there is much to learn about ghosts, spirits and "haints" and not all of it is something to laugh about.

One Eastern Kentucky family experienced moving objects a few years ago. In a Western Kentucky home lived an attractive woman, with flowing hair and gown, but she was nothing but a willowy, wispy ghost. A Floyd countian remembers a disappearing tree. A Morgan county woman still is reluctant to discuss the galloping horse that made nightly runs to a tree that figured in a Civil War incident. She vows she heard the horse, but never saw it, even though she was at her window when it raced by.

Yes, this is the time of fodder shocks and jack-o'-lanterns-a time when most people find someone to take along when they must be about after dark.

What family is there who does not recall dark nights when everyone sat around listening to ghost stories. Often, the subject was not intentional but would get started with someone commenting, "That reminds me of an experience I had about 20 years ago. It was a dark night and a slow rain had started to fall. I had been across the hill to call on a sick neighbor and was on my way home when I had to pass this woods near a cemetery . . . '

In Lee county's Devil's Creek area, people still talk about the Eversole ghost. A man had been hanged, and when a haunt began frequenting the hanging spot, it was taken to mean the man was innocent and his spirit was not at ease. However, as it turned out, this ghost was aided and abetted by a man named Eversole, who took advantage of the stories by using a sheet on a wire to terrify the neighborhood.

But there are modern monsters too. A Texas man in 1969 said a monster over seven feet tall picked him up, sleeping bag and all, but dropped him when he saw a piece of chicken and grabbed it to eat. This hairy monster was both apelike and manlike.

There also have been sightings of flying saucers, weird creatures and strange ships.

Much farther away are the sightings of Big Foot, the Abominable Snowman, the Lochness Monster and other creatures.

But these modern haunts and goblins seem to come from nowhere and without reason. But they do about the same thing that hill-ghosts did-frighten people out of their wits.

So, be on the lookout for strange things, at least until after All Hallows night.



What Folk Lore Signs Indicate For Winter

year and its difficult to tell if Kentucky will have a hard winter, but if you believe in the age-old indicators, get ready for plenty of snow.

Author-naturalist Nevyle Shackelford of Beattyville says according to the old timers "the number of fogs in August indicates the number of snows for the following winter. A few fogs or small fogs mean few snows or small snows."

The National Weather Service here reports there were 14 fogs in August. On one foggy day, the visibility was onequarter mile or less while visibility on the other 13 foggy days was better than onequarter mile.

On that basis, it would appear there will be 14 snows this winter but only one hum-dinger.

Another snow indicator according to folk lore author William E. Collins, Sr. of Liberty is found inside the persimmon. According to legend, says Collins, if the germs within the seed of a persimmon is shaped like a spoon there will be plenty of snow. If the germ is shaped like a knife, a sharp, cutting winter is ahead but if the germ looks like a fork, an open winter with mild conditions should occur.

Farm Director Barney Arnold of WHAS radio says "I pitched that out on the air and a lady said she opened a persimmon seed while I was talking and the germ inside was shaped like a spoon which means we're going to be shoveling a lot of snow."

Perhaps the most well known sign of a hard winter ahead is, as Shakelford notes, "When the Woollybear caterpillarshave more black on their backs than

brown."

Arnold says Wolleybears with black bands on their backs are indeed showing up this year.

University of Kentucky Entomologist Rudy Scheibner says the Woollybears "They always do have black bands and there are a couple of different species. There's yellow Woolleybear and there's a typical Woolleybear that is orange with the black band in the middle and there's one that is halfway between this yellow and chestnut-brown color - sort of a fawn brown."

Scheibner says "I think maybe this might be sort of a confusing thing that the average person thinks this is a color phase of the Woolleybear. They're all caterpillars in the larval stage of the

Shackelford says a traditional sign of a hard winter ahead "is when the fur is extra thick on the belly of a coon, bear or fox." Collins agrees and adds "That would apply to cattle and horses too." He says extra heavy coats on animals early in the fall, whether on the belly or elsewhere, designate a cold winter

coming up.
Richard "Red" Bayer, curator of the
Louisville Zoological Gardens, says the fur-bearing animals "are starting to fill

"The wolves I believe we've noticed more than anybody else. We have Arctic wolves that we just got in the spring.
About two weeks ago they got their full coats back and it was just incredibly fast the way it occurred," Bayer said.

Bayer notes that the fur on most of the zoo animals is going to be thick in comparison with past years but he says there

hasn't been much change with the raccoons yet although "the goats and sheep

are taking on coats pretty heavily now."
Shackelford and Collins say a large production of acorns and walnuts is a prelude to exceptionally cold weather. Collins says he hasn't seen many acorns or walnuts in Eastern Kentucky and Shackelford agrees "In this part of the country there are not many walnuts

and no acorns.' In Spencer county, Kenneth Milburn says "We've got 25 or 30 walnut trees and I've noticed only four or five trees with any walnuts on them."

The folk lore experts also claim that if the husks on ears of corn are tight and thick and if the ears of corn are heavy there will be a hard winter.

Shackelford says "I had one farmer pull back the shuck and I noticed they were thin and loose." Tommy Mayes, a Simpson county corn grower says "Its about medium heavy— really about

Shackelford says he's always heard if the Bald-faced hornet builds his nest high in the trees, a bad winter is ahead. Collins says he heard it the other way around,"
"When hornets build their nests near the ground its a sign of a cold or severe

Scheibner says "They'll build in hedges, any kind of leafy protection and more or less hidden. I would guess it would have something to do with the current growing season. If the leaf growth is higher in the trees, they'll go higher. In any one year you can find them almost anyplace but I usually find them fairly close to the ground, not more than a foot to six feet above the ground."

A sure sign of harsh weather ahead

A sure sign of harsh weather ahead says Shackelford is "When cherries and spring flowering bushes bloom late in the

University of Louisville Botanist Prof. Varley Wiederman says "Now a lot of the spring flowering plants will bloom a second time around because of their daylength responses. If they've had a particularly favorable summer in respect to the amount of moisture and a number of things, they'll go ahead and bloom in the fall. Forsythia is famous for that."

Shackelford says "One of the farmers around here told me he found a blackberry briar had three or four ripe berries on it and two or three red ones. Its just one of those anomalies of nature. Sometimes a plant, when there's a long summer season and excessive rainfallsometimes trees will bloom twice. Fruit trees and some berries will have fruit on them. I have raspberries in my garden yet, but of course they're everbearing and you can expect that."

Kentucky folk lore also predicts a hard The folk lore signs are confusing this winter when the leaves are thick in

> Wiederman and Schnieder say they have not noticed the leaves to be particularly thick. Collins says he has noticed the trees and shrubbery have "unusually heavy foliage-the heaviest I

Collins says if Kentuckians had been alert earlier in the season they would have been given a sign of what kind of winter to expect.

"From the time the first catydids holler its three months to the first frost. They hollered pretty early this year," Collins said.

Collins says "When large flocks of geese fly south in the early fall" its a sign of a bad winter ahead. Mayes says he hasn't noticed any geese but "I've spotted some early flocks of ducks flying south over Simpson County."

Can you take folk lore forecasts as accurate indications of what the weather

"There are a lot of these signs and you never know," Schnieder says. "1 remember they used to put a grape leaf in pickles and it did help prevent softening because the grape leaves have an enzyme in them. You can't poo-poo some of these things."

"Whenever I hear these su-perstitutions," Scheibner says, "I try to account for them in some way. Its like the story of the Indian who was always an expert on what the severity of the weather would be. Some skeptic found there was going to be a hard winter by reading a forecast and asked the Indian what to expect. The Indian confirmed the forecast and added 'I know because white man hauling in lot of wood.' "

Shackelford, who says the only way to find out for sure what kind of winter is coming is to see if the wishbone of a goose is black, confesses-

"I don't put much stock in these signs-I put more stock in the weather bureau."


