## Judge Dismisses Complicity Case Against Woman

For a time, Brenda Prater may have helped conceal the facts about the death of a Tram woman last month, but there is no evidence she was an accomplice in murder, District Judge Harold Stumbo said at a hearing in the case last Thursday.

Mrs. Prater had been charged with complicity to murder her half-sister, Teresa Lynn Smith, on April 22. Her fiancé, Otto Honaker, has been charged with murder in the case.

On a motion of defense attorney Janice Porter, Stumbo dismissed the complicity charge. Instead, a grand jury will consider indicting the woman on a charge of hindering prosecution.

Also at the request of the lawyer, and over an initial demurrer by Asst. County Attorney Eric Hall, the \$40,000 bond set originally was reduced to an unsecured \$10,000.

The bond of Honaker, initially set at \$200,000 cash, was reduced Wednesday to \$20,000 cash on a motion of Honaker's lawyer, Ned Pillersdorf. Honaker posted the bond and was released Thursday on condition he not associate with Mrs. Prater or other potential prosecution witnesses.

In asking that her client be freed on an unsecured bond, Porter said Mrs. Prater had no assets but was willing to

## Board Meeting Here This Week First in County

The state Board of Education, which met on two days this week in Prestonsburg, accepted a plan of action worked out by Floyd school officials last month to deal with management problems turned up earlier by state inspectors.

The plan involves streamlining the school system's maintenance and janitorial departments, tighter control of lunchroom and activity accounts in individual schools, and better access for citizens at monthly board meetings.

Don Fightmaster, the state official who has been monitoring Floyd schools for more than a year, noted that the present plan of action, together with recent additions to the Floyd school system's accreditation requirements, represent the latest moves in an exchange between state and local boards that began in February last year.

Monitoring of the school district here will continue, Fightmaster indicated Tuesday morning, as the state panel wrapped up its meeting, which began Monday afternoon in the Prestonsburg High School cafeteria. The cafeteria was decorated with a large banner welcoming the state board and Superintendent of Public Instruction Alice McDonald. The meeting was held in Prestonsburg as part of a continuing effort to improve contact between the board and the general public by holding some meetings away from Frankfort, said Board Chairman James Ratcliffe.

On Monday, the board heard an advisory commission recommendation that, beginning in 1990, students be required to stay in school until they graduate or turn 18. The present practice of allowing students to drop out at 16 with their parents' consent sends a wrong message to students—"It says we do not expect them to get a high school diploma"—the board was told.

Supt. McDonald predicted that recent regulations reducing class size and directing remedial programs toward younger students will help lower the dropout rate. She asked the state Department of Education to respond to the commission recommendations at the next board meeting.

In another report, the board was asked to approve a proposal that would widen the range of persons who can be lawfully hired as coaches and assistant coaches. While current regulations require that only teachers be hired as coaches, the proposed change would allow others with equivalent education to be employed in that capacity. The suggestion came from a joint committee of the state board and the Kentucky High School Athletic Association.

## School Board Moves To Tighten the Rules

As Mark Hunter found out last week, school administrators here are running a tighter ship. Prodded by state education authorities, the Floyd Board of Education issued at its Wednesday meeting a lengthy set of rules designed to insure that money is better accounted for, goods are purchased at the lowest cost, buildings are properly kept up, and teachers avoid any conflicts of interest.

Hunter, a woodworking teacher at Betsy Layne High School, asked if he could use the school's carpentry shop on weekends to make a few things for himself. The board, sensing a potential conflict of interest, turned him down.

Although there is only one Pepsi distributor in town, the soft drink was put out for bids, anyway. Bids also must be asked on everything from diesel oil to class rings, the board directed.

To be paid for checking a freezer on the weekend or driving a bus for a class outing, a person must have board authorization, submit a time sheet, and be paid through the payroll office.

At Spruce Pine Elementary, where someone figured it would cost \$8 to deposit in the bank the 40 cents taken in the lunchroom each day, weekly bank deposits were authorized; the same for six other rural schools. For the others, deposits must be made daily. No school activity account will run in the red. Principals will keep tabs on all money coming in and going out.

In response to a recent state audit that found many faults in the operation of the school lunch program here, Food Service Director Frankie Francis defended his staff but submitted a thick plan of action to bring the program into compliance with state directives. "We have some fine, hardworking people. We're getting good mileage out of people working for a very low wage. They can't be expected to be head nutritionists or CPAs. They have been hurt," Francis said.

Low wages were also cited by Health Coordinator Ned Bush as one reason the

## \$77,720 Award Voted In Case

Jurors were asked last Wednesday to decide whether Franklin H. Keathley, Sr. was genuinely disabled in a 1982 automobile accident near here or just malingering.

In a complaint filed in Floyd Circuit Court, the former Hager Hill man—he now lives in Florida—asked for \$685,000 in damages as a result of injuries he said he suffered when a semi-trailer ran into the back of his pickup on U.S. 23, just south of the Floyd-Johnson line, on Feb. 16, 1982.

After hearing conflicting medical opinions, 10 jurors agreed to award the plaintiff \$77,720. (A verdict is given in civil cases if at least nine of the 12 jurors can agree.)

Keathley, 50, said he was stopped behind the truck of a flagman—who had halted traffic on U.S. 23 to allow a laden coal truck to enter the highway from Johns Creek—when another truck driven by Theodore T. Huesing, of Milford, Mich., hit him from behind.


A welder, Keathley said his back was so badly injured he could no longer work, an opinion backed by Dr. Charles J. Hieronymous, the family doctor who examined him here. But Dr. Joseph V. Urrichio, Jr., an orthopedic surgeon in Florida who examined him at the request of the defense counsel, said he could see no reason Keathley could not do the same work now that he could do before the accident.

## Guidance Counselor At School Arrested On Morals Charge

A guidance counselor at Betsy Layne High School was charged by state police Friday on a sodomy count involving a 17-year-old boy.

In swearing out a warrant for his arrest, Det. Fred Bailey said that Melvin Cooke, of Harold, "engaged in deviate sexual intercourse with a minor" on April 18. The youth is a senior at the school and police allege the incident occurred in the counselor's office there.

Cooke, 45, is married and the father of teenage children. Before submitting his resignation, effective Friday, he was employed in the Floyd school district for three years, coming here from Millard High School in Pike county.

He was released on his own recognizance Friday pending a scheduled appearance in district court on June 5.

## Pikeville Man Held On Bond of \$25,000

A 22-year-old Pikeville man was charged here last Thursday with the rape of a woman at Auxier the previous Saturday.

In a preliminary hearing in Floyd District Court, State Det. Danny Stumbo said the woman reported that Benjamin Castro, Jr. came drunk to her apartment around 5 a.m. She recognized him as the husband of a relative and let him in, after which the assault took place, the woman reportedly told police.

Bond was reduced from \$50,000 to \$25,000 after defense attorney Jerry Patton noted that Castro has a job and also that he had turned himself in to police.

A Floyd Circuit Court grand jury will consider this week whether to issue an indictment in the case.

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**Safe Electricity Use Stressed**

Today's society enjoys innumerable conveniences and technological advances because of the use of electricity. And because electricity is so readily available—at the flick of a switch—it is sometimes taken for granted and not used in a safe manner.  
 May is "Electrical Safety Awareness Month" and Kentucky Power Company along with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission urges consumers to safely use electricity in all their activities.

"Electricity can do many things for us, but it only takes a few seconds to be injured or killed if some safety precautions are not taken. We are in the business of providing electricity. We work with it every day and know how to handle it. Unfortunately, a large number of people know very little about electricity. This is one reason we join in this effort to promote electrical safety, particularly in the home," said W.W. Zoellers, manager of Kentucky Power's Pikeville Division.

To heighten customers' awareness of electrical safety the company has available copies of a checklist or audit which can be used in the home. Following the steps in the audit a customer can easily determine if his home is electrically safe. Copies of the brochure can be obtained by visiting the local Kentucky Power Company office.

The brochure features a series of questions which allow a user to identify potential electrical safety problems in the home, take the appropriate steps to correct any problems, and then periodically re-inspect the house to ensure no additional hazards arise.

"The checklist covers all areas of a house. For example, a consumer should check the wattage of bulbs in light fixtures because high-wattage bulbs in equipment designed for low-wattage use are dangerous. A fire could result," Zoellers explained.

Another area concerns extension cords—a common item in the home. Zoellers said cords routed in walking areas can be tripping hazards. Or if the cords are wrapped around objects or covered by rugs, they can become overheated and cause a fire. Also, frayed or cracked cords are definite fire hazards.

Although repair work on electrical wiring or appliances should be done by qualified individuals, homeowners can make a few simple checks to determine whether a safety hazard exists.

"If an electrical outlet or switch is very warm or hot to the touch, then something is wrong. Unusually warm outlets mean an unsafe wiring condition exists. All people can check things like this to make sure their homes are safe," Zoellers added.

The checklist also includes an explanation of electrical grounding and the proper use of three-prong grounding adapters. Zoellers emphasized the need for proper grounding to avoid electrical shock.

One particular area of the home which should be checked is the kitchen, where appliances are limitless. Zoellers mentioned the need for a periodical check of kitchen appliances to make certain no electrical cords have been damaged. He explained all appliances which require ventilation should be properly installed to avoid overheating, and any unusual noise from a large appliance such as a refrigerator, range, or freezer is a signal a problem might exist.

Zoellers also pointed out that extreme caution should be taken in bathrooms. No electrical appliance should be used

near water. Also, hair dryers and other electrical appliances should not be placed where they can fall into water.

In addition, if a portable electric heater is used in a bathroom it should be placed where there is no danger of it being tipped into water or water being splashed onto it.

"These are only a few things which involve the safe use of electricity in the home," said Zoellers. "We want our customers to use electricity to its fullest and in the safest way possible. The more knowledge our customers have about electricity the better the chance for its safe use. We hope this checklist or safety audit will be helpful in heightening consumer awareness of electrical safety."



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
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## Spelling Bee Runnerup

## Food Prices In April Run 'Dead Heat' With Month Ago

Lower prices for poultry, dairy and grain products offset higher tabs on pork and produce, bringing Kentucky's April food price index to a virtual dead heat with last month's average.

A selected group of 40 food items cost shoppers an average \$60.08, the Kentucky Farm Bureau marketbasket survey found, just barely above the March index of \$60.03. The current figure is .3 of 1 percent below the finding of April 1983, and just about 8 percent above the average in April 1981, four years ago.

Of the six food groupings represented in the survey, only beef showed a stable price line during the 30-day period. Pork cuts gained an average 2 percent in price from March to April with fruits and vegetables showing an identical increase.

On the down side, poultry and eggs fell by 2.8 percent, dairy products were 1 percent lower and grain-based foods showed a 4.3 percent decline.

This month's bargain list, made up of items showing a significant price decline, included chicken breasts, down 7 cents to \$1.51 a pound; large eggs, off 6 cents at 69 cents a dozen; dill pickles, down 9 cents a bottle to 97 cents; cheddar cheese, falling 21 cents a pound, to \$2.53; and corn meal, off 10 cents at \$1.23 for a 5-pound bag.

Price gainers in the April survey included vanilla ice cream, which averaged 8 cents higher at \$1.67 for a half-gallon; Idaho potatoes, up 21 cents to \$2.57 for a 10-pound bag; tomatoes, sky-ing 28 cents a pound, to a record average of \$1.27; and corn oil, up 6 cents a bottle to \$1.67.

At the farm level, lower livestock prices were reported by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, helping the overall farm price index drop to a level 11 percent below its year-ago figure.

Analysts were predicting higher cattle and hog prices in the summer and fall months, with corresponding increases in retail cuts. But plentiful supplies of chicken promised to prevent major

price run-ups on livestock markets.

Grain prices were virtually unchanged in the latest monthly report by USDA, mirroring the stable trend of most retail price patterns for food in recent months. Except for seasonal swings, the Kentucky marketbasket average has traced a nearly flat trajectory since the beginning of 1984.

In the April marketbasket survey, Tompkinsville showed the lowest price index while Louisville posted the highest figure. Overall, volunteers working through Kentucky Farm Bureau Women canvassed retail food tabs in 23 Kentucky communities.

Those local averages are Tompkinsville, 56.88; Scottsville, 56.93; Richmond, 57.09; Salyersville, 57.44; Glasgow, 57.99; Greenville, 58.63; Campbellsville, 58.79; Greensburg, 59.12; Elizabethtown, 59.22; Lexington, 59.54; Owensboro, 59.69; Morehead, 60.39; Georgetown, 60.40; Shelbyville, 60.42; Greenup, 60.50; Murray, 60.63; Henderson, 61.01; Somerset, 61.34; Hopkinsville, 61.87; Brandenburg, 62.62; Grayson, 62.89; Falmouth, 62.96; and Louisville, 64.96.

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

be released into the custody of her father, Curtis Anderson, an Assembly of God preacher in Pikeville. Stumbo agreed to the arrangement, commenting, "I don't believe the Commonwealth has much on this woman."

Prosecutor Hall noted that the 13-year-old girl who originally confessed to the murder but later recanted said Mrs. Prater was the one who suggested making it appear as if the child was responsible. According to the original story, the child and the victim were arguing over housework—the one armed with a .357 magnum, the other with a butcher knife—when Smith was fatally shot in the back. To support the story, the juvenile was encouraged to handle the alleged murder weapon and a knife was placed in the victim's hand, he says.

The later version had Honaker and Mrs. Smith arguing, with Honaker going to his truck to get the gun; Smith, who was outside for a time, was shot as she burst back into the house.

Questioned by Mrs. Prater's attorney, Det. James Rederick said Prater told him she had sent Smith from the house when Honaker went out for his gun and, prior to Smith's return, had tried to calm Honaker down. When Mrs. Prater told police the story implicating the juvenile, Honaker was nearby, noted the lawyer, who suggested that Honaker had a reputation for violence and that she was afraid of him.

Throughout the hearing, Mrs. Prater shook with anxiety, sometimes covering her face with her hands. Honaker sat impassively in the body of the courtroom.

centration in the city water supply rose as high as 180 ppm, but it dropped to 14 ppm after the system was flushed out. The current high readings, according to Jackie Bradley, Wheelwright Utilities field superintendent, appear to have been caused when someone overturned barrels of the sodium-rich polymer used as a flocculent in Remine's coal-washing process and left on site after the operation folded.

Even after numerous phone calls Friday, Roger Recktenwald, executive director of the Big Sandy Area Development District, said it was still not clear who had authority to clean up the spill—Remine has posted an armed guard at the site, pending resolution of various lawsuits filed against the company—or who should pay for it. Tons of contaminated soil may have to be removed from the area, which drains into the abandoned mine workings where the city's water is collected, Recktenwald said.

Remine Coal is a division of Pioneer Coal Preparation, of Derbyshire, England. Its president, William Gadsby, lives in London. The firm apparently secured a contract with the federal Environmental Protection Agency to reclaim the Wheelwright slate dump. "It was supposed to be a reclamation project," Recktenwald said, "but it's more like destruction."

washrooms sometimes run out of toilet paper or the hallways are not swept. At \$3.41 an hour, janitors don't get a "high monetary reward," he noted. But the plan of action submitted by the school board Wednesday held Bush responsible for 10 tasks designed to improve housekeeping in the schools.

Ulysses S. Horne, supervisor of buildings and grounds, set the record straight on a comment attributed to him by Don Fightmaster, the state official whose March 5 report criticized the school district's maintenance program. In arguing that the school board should provide stronger leadership and more money, Fightmaster quoted Horne as saying that "any attempt to comply with (a state-mandated maintenance plan) is futile because it will not be carried out by the board."

What he really said, Horne insisted last week, is that the board "would not vote for maintenance repair if it meant a deficit in the school system."

In accordance with a new state law requiring regular evaluation of teachers and administrators, Asst. Supt. Ron Hager announced the formation of a committee—comprised equally of teachers and administrators—who will work out a system for reviewing work standards. Teachers named to the committee are: Rodney McKinney, Wayne Combs, William Reynolds III, Genevieve Slone, Sharon Ann Stumbo, Peggy Francis, Karen D. Hall, Clara Johnson, and Roberta Luxmore. Administrators on the panel are: William Hughes, Gary Frazier, John Pitts, Russell Frazier, Ralph O'Quinn, Daniel Branson, Ulysses Horne, Ronald Hager, and Gary Newman.

A committee was also formed to develop a uniform code of discipline for the schools. It includes: Debbie Hall, Prestonsburg High School student, and Steve Dawson, McDowell High School student; parents Dolores Smith and Ruth P. Akers; teachers Harold Burchell and Joyce Watson, McDowell Principal Gary Frazier, Asst. Supt. Ron Hager and board member Dr. Mary Hall.

The first day of classes next school year will be Thursday, August 8, although teachers will be back the previous Monday, according to a calendar adopted by the board.

Pikeville accountants Linton and Co. were again hired to make the annual audit of school district books for a fee of \$9489.

# Insurance Head Asks Limits on Coverage

On the argument that arson would be less attractive to desperate property owners if it did not pay as handsomely, insurance companies operating in this area are being encouraged to limit coverage to the actual value of the home or business they are insuring.

In an April 25 letter to all insurance firms doing business in Kentucky, state Insurance Commissioner Gilbert McCarty urged the companies to design "market value or actual cash value" policies as a way of providing coverage for homeowners in Class 9 and Class 10 areas, where losses have been forcing many underwriters to stop writing homeowners insurance.

The effect of the proposal, said Prestonsburg insurance agent Blaine R. Hall, would be to limit the amount of coverage to the amount the home could be expected to bring on the current market. Also, homeowners wishing to buy insurance can expect to be put through a credit check similar to what they now expect when they apply for a bank loan, he said.

The tighter policies will not be unwelcome to many homeowners, who find their coverage—and their premiums—growing annually because of inflation-hedges built into the policy by the insurance company. "Over a period, coverage can get to where it's twice what the house is worth," Hall said.

Even on new homes, banks have been so eager to make loans and insurance companies to sell insurance that building a home and insuring it for much more than it is worth has been for some homeowners a hedge against future financial difficulties, Hall said. "By insuring a home for more than it would

cost to build it back, insurance companies are just enticing arsonists," he said.

The aggressive sales push that saw insurance firms reap record profits in 1977 and 1978 has since caught up with them, as claims made on imprudent policies have resulted in six straight years of underwriting losses.

One result is, it can be a lot easier now to get a mortgage loan on a home than to get the home insured. And, as a new county bond issue makes more money available here for home construction, a growing tension may be felt between bank officers eager to lend money for homes and insurance companies reluctant to insure them.

Under present arrangements, a person buying a home in a Class 9 or Class 10 area in this county has no choice but to insure it at high rates under the state "Fair Plan"—a mandatory pool, to which all insurance firms contribute, for providing coverage in high-risk areas. What your banker may not tell you, as he or she gives you a mortgage loan on a \$65,000 home, is that it will cost you \$1275 a year to insure it under the Fair Plan.

The no-frills actual-cash-value policies which could become available here if insurance firms follow the commissioner's lead would provide reasonable coverage for homeowners without providing an incentive for gamblers, Hall said.

But even if a bank is willing to finance a \$100,000 home at the head of a hollow, don't be surprised if your insurance company will write only a \$40,000 policy on it, he warned. And, if you're looking for generous coverage of "contents," don't be surprised if somebody comes by to check on the furniture.

# Classroom Trailers Empty As Fire Inspection Delayed

Two urgently-needed classroom trailers have been ready for six weeks but are still unoccupied for want of inspection by the state fire marshal's office, school officials said at last Wednesday's meeting of the Floyd Board of Education.

But the Commissioner of the state Department of Housing, Buildings and Construction said it is his department that has held up the inspection and the reason is that Floyd school officials have failed to submit simple site plans for the trailers.

The Floyd school officials' charge came in response to a question put at the previous board meeting by Regena Laferty, president of the Clark Elementary School PTA. A trailer there and another at McDowell High School only await inspection by David Wheeler—identified as a Paintsville-based inspector with the fire marshal's office—before students can move in, said Ulysses Horne, the school district's maintenance manager.

Horne said he had called Wheeler several times to request an inspection and encountered an answering machine each time. Messages left on the machine never got a response, he said. Assistant Superintendent Ray Brackett said he had left a message on the machine three times and twice called Wheeler's supervisor, John Hudson, to no avail.

Inquiries by a Times reporter revealed, however, that, while Hudson works for the fire marshal's office, Wheeler does not; rather, he works in the division of new construction in the Department of Buildings, Housing and Construction. Moreover, Wheeler says he told Brackett six months ago that site plans must be submitted before an inspection of the trailers could be made.

Commissioner Charles A. "Chuck" Cotton told the Times yesterday (Tuesday) that he had instructed Wheeler to inspect the trailers immediately and to advise school officials here on what steps they must take—including the submission of site plans—to have them approved for student use.

In other responses to questions put by citizens at the previous meeting, Martin grade school principal William Hughes told Everett Akers that the parent-teacher organization there was disbanded several years ago because it was deeply divided and ineffective. "All they did was argue with each other," he said.

The principal resisted Akers' suggestion that visitors be allowed to sit in on classes without prior notice. "As principal, I don't presume to walk in on a class at any time," Hughes said. "The teacher is a professional and deserves some consideration."

There is no other place for teachers to park their cars but on the school playground, said Hughes, who noted that he did not want them to "take up space all day in public parking areas."

The time of the monthly board meeting will not be changed to accommodate Wednesday-night churchgoers, Board Chairman Dr. J. D. Adams told the Rev. Tim Jessen, who asked for a change on behalf of the Floyd County Ministerial Association. "It's going to stay Wednesday because Wednesday is more convenient for me," Adams said. "Churchgoers can come after their prayer meeting."

Among questions put to the board Wednesday was one from Charles Collins, who asked if the board could meet at least once a year in each of the four county high schools as a way of promoting contact between the board and the general public.

Virgil Hall, president of the Wheelwright High School Academic Boosters' Club, asked the board to install an air-conditioner the club bought for the school's computer room and to provide a teacher's desk. Rebecca Abner, of Banner, noting that McDowell and Maytown schools appear to be kept clean and in good repair, asked the board to enforce policies to insure that students in all county schools enjoy a "clean and pleasant environment."

Everett Akers wanted to know whether all teachers are teaching in their field and whether citizens could sit in on teacher in-service days. He also asked for a list of the qualifications of all school personnel.

Dolores Smith, of Allen, urged the board to "demand excellence, from the top all the way down." Noting that she and her husband are employers—they operate R. and S. Truck Body Company—Mrs. Smith said, "We ask for excellence and, by and large, we get it," and added, "You get what you expect and what you want."

Supt. E. P. Grigsby, Jr. said school officials will respond to last week's questions at next month's board meeting.

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Mark Soil Stewardship Week

The Floyd County Conservation District will join the nationwide observance of Soil Stewardship Week, May 12 to 19, Chairman Lloyd Wells has announced "Tomorrow Together" is the theme of the 1985 observance. The 1985 booklet for the observance points out that human survival depends on other living things—the grasses and grain, fishes and birds, wild and domestic animals—and that all depend for basic necessities on soil and water.

This year, the soil conservation movement in America marks its 50th anniversary. During the Dust Bowl era of the '30s, conservation districts, local units of government, were founded to take soil conservation information and techniques out to farmers and ranchers. But their task has grown. Now conservation districts also work with urban and suburban citizens in protecting construction sites, school yards, shorelines and parks from erosion. And they are involved in work to clean up the nation's waters.

Since 1955, the National Association of Conservation Districts has sponsored Soil Stewardship Week, in cooperation with the nearly 3,000 conservation districts, as one way to emphasize the importance of good stewardship of our basic soil and water resources.

Materials especially designed to carry the 1985 theme of "Tomorrow Together" are being distributed through local conservation districts to clergymen, lay leaders, civic and educational organizations and to individuals participating in the observance.

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Backyard Naturalist

"Gardening With Wildlife" is apt to mean, to most people: inviting birds to a banquet, or perhaps being visited with inveterate gate-crashers such as rabbits and squirrels. But there are some highly desirable guests that respond beautifully to proper invitations: butterflies.

Flowers and birds bring color and life to a garden, but lively, colorful butterflies add a delicate grace note as nothing else can.

What kinds of invitations entice butterflies? A few particular plants, well positioned. Butterflies are drawn to:

- Nectar-bearing, compound flowers such as those in the daisy family—zinnias, marigolds and asters. Old varieties, more like the wild original species, usually provide more nectar than highly hybridized and/or double flowers.
- Butterfly bushes: *Buddleia davidii* and *B. alternifolia*.
- Spring bloom such as lilacs, azaleas and golden alyssum *Aurelia*.
- Late bloom such as goldenrods, michaelmas daisies, gaillardia and blazing stars, *Liatis*.
- Many herbs, especially hyssop, the sages and catnip.
- A wide variety of flower colors, but favorites may be orange, pink, lavender, purple, yellow and white.

Here are some tips on planning your butterfly garden:

- If possible, place your flowers where they receive full sun for most of the day.
- If you raise vegetables, plant some butterfly flowers among the vegetables. The blooms add color and some of the flowers act as companion plants to vegetables, warding off some insects that might otherwise require pesticide treatment. Some visiting butterflies are excellent garden-crop pollinators.
- To satisfy butterflies' entire lifecycle needs, you might try to provide for them in their caterpillar phase: red clover or alfalfa for sulphur butterflies; parsley, dill, loveage or fennel for the black swallowtail group; the milkweeds for monarchs and queens.
- To avoid a severe setback in your butterfly-gardening efforts, use chemical and biological pest controls sparingly, if at all.
- For optimum butterfly attendance, provide perpetual butterfly bloom from late March through early frosts.

Even when a gardener gets off to a fast start, butterfly gardens take time to build. In future columns we'll explore other attractive ways and means to create a butterfly habitat. Meanwhile, if you've had some success attracting butterflies into your yard, let me know so that I can share your findings with other readers.

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
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

## Morehead Alumni Group Backs Embattled Prexy

The Morehead State University Alumni Association, Inc., has announced its support of MSU President Herb F. Reinhard after the MSU board of regents tabled his request for a one-year contract extension as president.

In a resolution adopted by unanimous vote of its Executive Council, the Association said:

"The Executive Council strongly endorses the direction and leadership being provided Morehead State University by the administration of Dr. Herb F. Reinhard and encourages the support of this leadership by all who are interested in the future of this institution."

Alumni President David Bolt, of Morehead, said copies of the resolution were being distributed to MSU faculty and staff members and the board of regents.

"The Executive Council is concerned that the public be aware that we are proud of President Reinhard's leadership and that we fully support his efforts to strengthen our alma mater," Bolt said.

Dr. Reinhard assumed the MSU presidency last July 1 on a two-year contract which expires June 30, 1986. His request for a one-year extension of that contract was tabled at a recent meeting of the Board of Regents.

Dr. Reinhard, who assumed the presidency on a two-year contract last July, said he was "surprised, but not overly surprised" by the board's 5-4 vote to delay a decision on a one-year extension.

"The vote says a lot for the future direction of Morehead State University," he said, adding that he would begin looking at other opportunities.

"I did not come here to be a one- or two-year president," Dr. Reinhard said. He also noted that he believed that the majority of MSU's alumni, faculty, students and the local community was not represented by the vote.

Dr. Reinhard, who was inaugurated as MSU's ninth president two weeks ago, said he would not again place his request on the board agenda. "If the board comes back to me with an offer, I'll be

glad to discuss it, but I may have several questions to be answered," he said.

Regents in favor of tabling the request were Mrs. Patricia A. Burchett, of Paintsville, who proposed the motion; Walter W. Carr, of Morehead, Circuit Judge James M. Richardson, of Owingsville, Eunice Caston, of Winchester, and faculty regent John Duncan.

Voting against the motion were Dr. Forest M. Skaggs, of Lynch, Lloyd Cassity, of Ashland, Board Chairman Robert M. Duncan, of Inez, and student regent Michael Fox, of Olive Hill. Harry LaViers, Jr., of Irvine, was absent.



**Vaccine Use Delay  
At End in Kentucky**

The Kentucky Department for Health Services has notified local and district health departments that there is no longer any need to delay giving booster shots of the diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis or DTP vaccine.

Health Services Commissioner Carlos Hernandez said the advice was given after the U.S. Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta withdrew the recommendation on delaying the booster doses of DTP vaccine earlier this week. "The concerns of a nationwide shortage of DTP vaccine have lessened since a second company resumed distribution of the product, Hernandez said. "We expect to receive additional doses of vaccine shortly. Therefore it is no longer necessary for physicians and local health departments to delay the booster shots."

In December 1984 the Centers for Disease Control and the state Department for Health Services advised physicians to delay the fourth and fifth shots in the five-dose DTP series because of a projected nationwide vaccine shortage. The delay recommendation only related to DTP booster shots usually given to children 18 months old and again between ages four and six.

"We did not have a vaccine shortage in Kentucky, although such a situation might have occurred if we had continued the normal DTP booster immunizations along," Hernandez said. "We currently have an ample supply of several thousand doses of DTP vaccine on hand. With a resupply order expected this month, we are advising our local health departments to resume normal DTP vaccinations and to call back any children who failed to receive the fourth or fifth DTP doses since December and are still under age seven."

Approximately 165,000 children, newborn infants through age six, are immunized with DTP vaccine each year in Kentucky.

# Grants To Help Efforts To Reduce Dropout Rate

More than \$1 million in grants will be awarded this year by the Appalachian Foundation to support community efforts to reduce school dropout rates, it was announced recently in Washington.

"Great progress has been made in recent years in reducing Appalachia's chronically high dropout rates, but in far too many counties we still trail the rest of the nation in the percentage of our students who stay in school until graduation," said former Virginia Governor Linwood A. Holton, chairman of the Appalachian Foundation.

Holton was joined at a press conference announcing the dropout reduction program by Winifred A. Pizzano, federal co-chairman of the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC).

The ARC has allocated \$1 million in federal funds for the Foundation's program, which will be matched by local sources, both public and private.

"We are convinced that Appalachia's economic future depends on improving the education and training of the region's children," Pizzano said, noting that more than 700 vocational and technical schools have been funded by ARC during its 20-year history.

Both Holton and Pizzano stressed that the purpose of the Appalachian dropout reduction program is to support local programs that use successful methods for encouraging students to stay in school. "Not every approach will work everywhere," Holton explained, "but it is our hope that when projects prove successful in one community, they can be introduced in other, similar communities across the Appalachian region."

According to Holton, the Foundation will accept applications for funding from local sponsors who meet the following criteria:

- Are located within the boundaries of the 13 state Appalachian region;
- can certify active involvement in the project by local civic groups and the business community, in addition to school system personnel;
- can secure commitments for additional funding from state and/or local sources—public, private, or both—to "match" the Appalachian Foundation grant;
- can assure the Foundation that no grant funds will be used to pay for any activities already under way.

Holton said the Foundation will announce its grants in several phases during 1985. Pre-applications for the first round of grants must be received no later than June 15th, he said. After all pre-applications have been reviewed,

No Yoke folks...an eggstensive search is on for the world's furthest and fastest flying chickens to compete in the 14th Annual International Chicken Flying Meet (I.C.F.M.)—the Olympics of chicken games. Hundreds of chickens are eggpected to fly the coop May 18 at the annual eggstravaganza which takes place on the 1100-acre Bob Evans Farm near Rio Grande, Ohio.

Poultry pilots need not put all their eggs in one basket at this year's I.C.F.M. as there are several events in which chickens and humans can compete. Cockle-doodle-does will fill the air as early as 9 a.m. when the "rooster crow contest" takes place. (one for the money, two for the show, three to get ready and four to crow!) During the "chicken run contest" the fastest chicken-on-two-drumsticks completing the 40-yard dash with the best time will get the worm.

No entry fee is charged for all of this flighty fun with cash prizes of \$100, \$50 and \$25 awarded to the farthest flying chickens, and a grand prize of \$500 for the champion chicken who cracks the current flying record of 302' 8". Eggstra chickens are available to borrow at the meet on a first-come first-serve basis so everyone can take part in this eggstravaganza.

An Olympic-style procession will precede the one o'clock chicken flying contest led by a torch bearer with the eternal torch lit from "Mount Egg." Wearing their finest feathers, the chickens and trainers will be judged for being the "most unique chicken," the "most outrageous trainer," "best matched chicken and trainer," and the "best team award," for groups of more than a coop-le.

The first International Chicken Flying Meet held at the Bob Evans Farm set a fine eggssample 13 years ago and has continued each year since. Bob Evans, the International Flight Commander, began this barnyard sport after recalling his boyhood eggssperiences of growing up on a farm and tossing chickens from barn lofts to see how far they could fly. To date, chicken flying squadrons have hatched in 22 states from California to New York.

**CANCER**  
*Answerline*  
American Cancer Society

Question: "When are men at risk of developing prostate cancer?"

ANSWERline: The typical prostate cancer patient is aged 55 or older. The incidence rate for this form of cancer increases with aging. In terms of signs and symptoms, a man in the later years of life may be at risk of prostate cancer if he is experiencing such difficulties as inability to urinate; painful or burning urination; blood in the urine; pain in lower back, pelvis or upper thighs. It must be emphasized that these signs and symptoms are more likely to indicate prostate conditions other than cancer. However, the possibility of cancer exists. Therefore, older men should have regular physical checkups including examinations of the prostate. And, they should seek medical attention for any urinary problem.

Question: "Is the American public well informed about cancer?"

ANSWERline: In a 1978 study prepared for the American Cancer Society it was shown that the public has a relatively high awareness of cancer's warning signals and, more people than ever before are having checkups that include cancer tests. Nonetheless, there are important gaps in knowledge. For example, most people underestimate how prevalent cancer is in the U.S. If current rates continue, one-out-of-four Americans will develop some form of cancer. The study also showed that the public believes, incorrectly, that the chance of surviving cancer is extremely low. There are over three million Americans alive today who have a cancer history and some two million of them can be considered cured.

Question: "How is leukemia diagnosed?"

ANSWERline: Leukemia is diagnosed by microscopic examination of the blood and bone marrow cells. Blood samples are taken in the usual way by drawing a small amount of blood from a vein in the arm or finger. A bone marrow sample is taken by using anesthesia to permit a needle to enter the bone at the top of the hip or breastbone. The samples are examined for excessive numbers of abnormal white blood cells which are characteristic of specific types of leukemia. The blood samples reveal the quantity of various blood cells and components and whether leukemic cells have entered the circulatory system. Throughout treatment of leukemia, blood and bone marrow tests are also done to measure the body's response to treatment and to determine whether the disease is under control or if recurrence is taking place.

Request: How can I get the latest cancer statistics for a high school term paper?"

ANSWERline: The American Cancer Society Unit in your community will be pleased to give you a free copy of the latest edition of its "Facts & Figures." It will contain current information about cancer incidence, survival and death rates in the U.S. and abroad and offer facts about specific forms of cancer.

Question: "What causes 'smoker's cough'?"

ANSWERline: Certain cells of the lung have tiny hairs, called cilia, which help cleanse the lungs by sweeping mucus towards the throat. Constant irritation of the lung cells by cigarette smoke causes the cilia to disappear. Without cilia to sweep it away, mucus becomes trapped in the lung until it is forced out by what is known as 'smoker's cough.' This cough signals a change in the lung which may develop into cancer.

Request: "Can you list the major forms of cancer and explain which ones are treatable?"

ANSWERline: The major forms of cancer in the U.S. include cancers of the lung, breast, colon-rectum, skin, uterus, oral cavity, and the blood and lymph systems. For most of these forms of cancer effective treatment does exist. When the cancer is diagnosed in an early stage, the possibility of long-term healthy survival or cure is excellent. For two of the major forms of cancer, lung cancer and the most common forms of skin cancer, it is possible to prevent disease. Approximately 80 percent of lung cancer could be avoided through elimination of the cigarette habit. Most skin cancer could be prevented if people avoid overexposure to the sun.

**Ky. Arts Council Seeking Artists For Special Program**

The Kentucky Arts Council is soliciting applications from poets and theater artists interested in participating in its Artists in Education Program during the 1985-86 school year. The Council anticipates needing artists for both short-term (five-ten days in length) and long-term (from 12 weeks to nine months in length) residencies in various parts of the state, including rural areas.

During a residency, the artist is a resource to the school and community and may be expected to conduct such activities as workshops-classes; lecture-demonstrations; readings or performances; teachers' inservice sessions; and other activities. A portion of the residency is set aside as the artist's time to devote to his or her own work. The artist's stipend ranges from \$4,800 for 12 weeks to \$12,000 for nine months. Artists interested in the position should contact the Kentucky Arts Council for a complete position description and application form. Deadline for applications is May 20. WHEREAS, the continuation of the Job Corps program is critical to turning economically disadvantaged youth into more responsible, employable and productive citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Commonwealth of Kentucky has six Job Corps Centers and thirty-five hundred training slots making Kentucky the largest provider of Job Corps training in the nation; and

WHEREAS, the elimination of the Federal Job Corps would result in the loss of employment for over fourteen hundred Kentucky citizens employed in the Job Corps Centers that operate an annual budget of approximately forty-five million dollars; and

WHEREAS, the loss of a forty-five million dollar industry will have a severe effect on the economy of the Commonwealth of Kentucky; and

WHEREAS, the elimination of Job Corps will seriously impede Kentucky's efforts to maintain a well-educated workforce which is a crucial element to economic development;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

Section 1. That the Commonwealth of Kentucky urges the Congress of the United States to continue funding the critically needed Federal Job Corps.

Section 2. That a copy of this resolution be sent to each member of the Kentucky delegation to Congress, the presiding officers of each House of Congress, and the President of the United States.

## Unemployment Drops In Big Sandy Area

Unemployment declined from a revised February rate of 14.6 percent in the Big Sandy district to a preliminary rate of 11.2 percent in March. Martin county was at one end of the scale with a rate of 5.7 percent while Johnson county was at the other end with a rate of 13.4 percent. Martin county had the sole single-digit unemployment rate in the district.

Floyd county's rate was 13.3; Magoffin, 12.4; Pike county, 10.6.

The monthly sample of claimants of unemployment insurance benefits showed 47.8 percent had worked in mining, 16.9 percent in trade and 12.0 percent in construction.

The unemployment rate for the Kentucky River district fell from a revised February rate of 17.1 percent to a preliminary March rate of 14.6 percent. Breathitt county had the only single-digit jobless report at 8.8 percent while Letcher county led the region with a rate of 20.4 percent.

The monthly sample of claimants of unemployment insurance benefits showed 49.2 percent had worked in mining and 11.8 percent each in trade and services.

Compared to March last year, 106 counties reported lower rates, 13 had higher rates, and in one county the rate was the same.

Half of the state's 120 counties reported double-digit rates, compared to 77 in February and 78 in March, 1984.

Woodford county's 2.7 percent rate was the state's lowest. It was the first time since November, 1984 that one of Kentucky's counties reported a rate below 3.0 percent. Nine other counties reported rates below 5.0 percent in March. They were Scott (2.9 percent), Fayette (3.4), Trimble (3.7), Bourbon (4.1), Jessamine and Madison (4.3 percent each), Shelby (4.6) and Carroll and Franklin (4.9 percent each).

Letcher county reported the highest rate, 20.4 percent, followed by Edmonson with 19.8 percent, and Crittenden and Owsley, with 18.1 percent each.



WHEREAS, the City of Prestonsburg, Floyd County, Kentucky, is incorporated under the provisions of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, and desires to grant a franchise for an electric power company to own, maintain, construct and operate its electric power transmission and distribution lines upon, along, over and under the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and other public places of the City of Prestonsburg, Floyd County, Kentucky, and

WHEREAS, there exists a public necessity for adequate service of electric power and energy to the citizens of the City of Prestonsburg, Floyd County, Kentucky, and

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, FLOYD COUNTY, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1

That there be sold at public auction to the highest and best bidder, the franchise, privilege, right and authority to acquire, maintain, construct and operate in, above, under, across and along the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and other public places (as the same now exist or may hereafter be laid out) of the City of Prestonsburg, Floyd County, Kentucky, lines, poles and equipment for the distribution of electric energy, either by means of overhead or underground conductors, with all the necessary or desirable appurtenances for the purpose of supplying electric energy to said City and the inhabitants thereof, and persons and corporations beyond the limits thereof, for light, heat, power, and any other purpose or purposes for which electric energy is now or may hereafter be used, and for the transmission of the same within, through or across said City.

SECTION 2

Said lines and appurtenances shall be constructed so as to interfere as little as possible with the traveling public in its use of the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and public places.

SECTION 3

The franchise, privilege, right and authority shall be in full force and effect for a period of twenty (20) years from the date of the passage of the ordinance granting it.

SECTION 4

The grantee of this franchise shall save the City harmless from any and all liability arising in any way from negligence of the grantee in the erection, maintenance or operation of said lines and appurtenances.

SECTION 5

The grantee of this franchise shall have the right and privilege to take up such portion or part of any pavement and make such excavation in the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and other public places of the City of Prestonsburg as may be deemed necessary for the construction and maintenance of its lines, wires or cables, but whenever the grantee of this franchise shall begin the erection or other equipment, it shall promptly and diligently prosecute the work to completion and leave the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and other public places where such work is done in as good condition of repair as before such work was commenced.

SECTION 6

Wherever in this franchise either the City of Prestonsburg or the grantee thereof is referred to, it shall be deemed to include the respective successors and assigns of either, and all rights, privileges and obligations contained in this franchise shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of, the respective successors and assigns of said City and said grantee, whether so expressed or not.

SECTION 7

The grantee of this franchise may make such rules and regulations covering the furnishing of said electric energy, as may be fair and reasonable and consistent with the standard practice of the grantee. Said grantee may charge such rates for electric services as shall be fair and reasonable. The said grantee shall render service under said franchise of like quality, that is, adequate, efficient and reasonable, to that now being rendered to said City.

SECTION 8

The consideration paid by the successful bidder for the franchise, privilege, right and authority provided

for herein shall be complete compensation and consideration for said franchise, privilege, right and authority, and for the use and occupancy of the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and other public places of the City, in lieu of any street or alley rental or of any charge for the use or occupancy of said streets, thoroughfares, alleys, sidewalks, bridges, public ways and other public places of said City, and in lieu of any pole tax or meter tax.

SECTION 9

David Evans, City Administrator of the City of Prestonsburg, Floyd County, Kentucky, is hereby appointed Special Commissioner to sell said franchise, privilege, right and authority hereby ordered sold, and said Special Commissioner is directed to offer said franchise for sale at public auction and shall sell same to the highest bidder at the front door of the City Building in Prestonsburg, Kentucky at 10:00 a.m., on May 20, 1985, after he has advertised the time, terms, conditions and place of sale, pursuant to law, by inserting a notice of sale in the Floyd County Times, Prestonsburg, Kentucky, a newspaper of general circulation in Prestonsburg, Floyd County, Kentucky, once a week for three (3) consecutive weeks prior to the date of said sale, said advertisement to include this Ordinance.

SECTION 10

Bids and proposals for the purchase and acquisition of the franchise, privilege, right and authority hereby granted shall be in writing and shall be delivered to the Mayor upon the date and at the time fixed by the Special Commissioner in said advertising for receiving bids. 



**Value of Landscaping Told By Realtors Group**

As spring and summer arrive, why not consider improving the landscaping around your home? While it is difficult to place a price on how much trees, shrubs and flowers will increase the value of your property, a well-landscaped home usually sells more quickly and at a better price than one that is not, according to the Big Sandy Board of REALTORS.

The right shrubs and trees can screen the house off from a busy street and soften the impact of noise without blocking it out completely.

A shade tree on the south side of your home can block sunlight in the summer and lower the inside temperature by as much as ten degrees. While trees and flowers are added over the years, a new house generally requires grass and foundation plantings. The yard can be seeded or sodded depending on budget considerations. You may want to consider various colored shrubs for blooms throughout the seasons. You can consult a nursery for details. Perennial flowers that return each year or annuals that bloom only one season can be added for seasonal impact.

Trees come from the nursery with root systems balled and burlapped or potted, depending upon size. While larger trees are more impressive immediately, they are also more difficult to plant and more expensive. While trees are appropriate in the front yard or at the sides of the house to serve as a visual frame, be sure that visitors to your home have a clear view of the front door since it welcomes them into your home.

In addition to the satisfaction provided by sensible, effective landscaping to increase both the beauty of your home and lower your utility bills, you can take heart in knowing that landscaping will be an asset when it comes time to sell, the Big Sandy Board said.

**Traffic Deaths  
Rise in State**

"The state's traffic death toll has exceeded the previous year's total for the first time in two years," State Police Commissioner Morgan T. Elkins announced recently.

The 1985 total of traffic fatalities rose to 183 deaths, compared to 182 for the same period of April, 1984. Kentucky's traffic fatalities had been in a downward trend since 1982. The 1984 fatality count set a record for the lowest count in 23 years.


Snow and inclement weather helped to hold the count down during the beginning months of 1985, according to Elkins. But, during the pleasant weather the fatality rate has been inching up. More drivers are on the road and speed-related accidents have increased.

The Kentucky State Police is asking citizens to help reduce traffic fatalities. "Police alone cannot prevent accidents and injury," said Elkins, "because the safety attitude of the individual driver is a most important factor."

Morgan stresses drivers and passengers should buckle-up safety belts and place children in child safety seats. Last year 98% of fatal accident victims were not protected by safety belts and 766 people died. Of this number, 285 were either totally or partially thrown from their vehicle killing 208 victims. Only two escaped, uninjured.



**Heartworm Disease Is Problem In Dogs**

Canine heartworm disease, a serious and potentially fatal disease, is found wherever there are mosquitoes.  
Long white worms are the cause of the disease. Adult worms, which reach a length of six to 14 inches, live in the right side of the heart and in nearby large blood vessels. A dog may have a few to several hundred worms in its system.  
When a mosquito "bites" an infected dog the mosquito takes up the blood which may contain microscopic immature forms of heartworms called microfilariae. The microfilariae incubate in the mosquito for about two weeks, becoming infective larvae. Then, when the mosquito bites another dog, the infective larvae are passed into the second dog, infecting it. The infective larvae migrate through the tissues of the body for about three months, then enter the heart where they reach adult size in another three months.

The mosquito is the only natural agent of transmission for heartworm disease in dogs.  
Large accumulations of adult worms impair circulation of the blood, which can result in serious damage to a dog's heart, lungs, liver, and kidneys. The important thing for dog owners to remember is that a great deal of damage can occur before any outward signs of heartworm disease are noticed. Usually a dog can lead a nearly normal, healthy life with a few heartworms in its system, but in advance stages they can cause difficulty in breathing, loss of weight, coughing and fainting and may cause the dog to tire easily and grow restless. If not detected and controlled with proper treatment, heartworm disease can lead to congestive heart failure and death. A healthy-looking dog with heartworm is a source of infection to other dogs in presence of mosquitoes.

The only way to detect heartworm disease in its early stage is through a blood test.  
Once a dog is tested and found free of heartworms, a preventive program is started. In this area, a dog needs to take preventive medicine every day from March to December. Do not give the animal the preventive medicine without first determining that the dog is free of heartworms. If preventive medicine is given and the animal is infected with heartworms, the medicine can be fatal.  
Most dogs can be successfully treated for heartworms if the disease is detected early.

### "Kids On The Block" Help Others Understand Handicapped Better

There are new kids in Kentucky who could play a big role in helping young people learn how to accept others who are "different."

They are handicapped kids, and they've learned how to deal with their various problems humorously. Yet seriously so that other young people can understand better about their handicaps.

Their names are Brenda, Melody, Renaldo, Ellen Jane, Mandy and Mark. And they are puppets.

They make up the new group called "Kids on the Block," and they are available to travel the state as part of a new program sponsored by the Kentucky 4-H program.

Wendy Stivers, 4-H Extension specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, said the program which is being offered for the first time by 4-H in Kentucky can be presented to schools, businesses or civic groups.

"Our target is young people aged 9 to 19," Stivers said. "But we'll put the program on for younger groups too."

She added, "Our purpose is to help non-handicapped young people to have empathy and understanding for what a handicapped person has to deal with."

That can be a touchy and difficult task, so the set of four puppets are ideal for approaching the serious subject humorously. Each of the puppets has a different handicap. Mark has cerebral palsy and is confined to a wheelchair which he calls "cruiser." Brenda has a weight problem. Renaldo is almost totally blind. Melody wears glasses, but perhaps her biggest "handicap" is her brothers who tease her a lot. Ellen Jane has Down's Syndrome and Mandy is deaf.

The "kids" pop questions to each other frequently such as "What's C.P.?" "How do you go to school or play?" "Do you ever have any fun?" "Do you ever get mad cause you can't do stuff other kids do?" Or "Don't kids tease you and laugh at how you talk?"

And the Kids on the Block answer the questions.



After each skit they open up for questions from the young people viewing the performance, Stivers said. Normal children often feel more free to ask a question of the puppets, she said.

Stivers said that the Kids on the Block already have performed at Taylorsville in Spencer County, Richmond in Madison County and at three different schools in Webster County. She said the new puppet program was very successful in each of those cases and she considers it off to a very promising start.

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## KET To Place Videotapes, Equipment In David School

KET and the David School in this county are forming a summer partnership. As part of an on-going drop-out prevention effort, KET is placing video equipment and videotapes in the school with emphasis on basic math and reading skills.

This video equipment was purchased as part of KET's "GED Study-at-Home/Drop-Out Prevention" program, which began with a pilot project last fall in 18 eastern Kentucky counties. The program was funded by a major grant from the Ashland Oil Foundation.

According to Brenda Griffin, director of Adult Learning Services at KET, "the equipment and videotapes will hopefully allow the small teaching staff at David School to give more individualized instruction to their students. This cooperative effort is intended to reinforce basic skills by using KET's series as a learning resource," she added.

David School was one of the drop-out prevention models highlighted in the "Dropping Out, What's It Worth?" documentary, which aired November 12, 1984, on KET. According to Dan Green, director of David School, enrollment at the school has doubled since the programs aired. Enrollment at the

private alternative school for students 7-12 is now at 100. The program seeks to help a student obtain either job placement, a high school diploma, or a GED certificate.

Says Green, "We are most grateful to KET for sharing our story with the general public, and we hope other counties would consider setting up a similar program."

The equipment will be installed at the school today (Wednesday) when Griffin and J.C. Blevins, utilization specialist at KET, will conduct a teacher training session on effective utilization of KET's programming.

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



### Frog Season Near

Kentucky's bullfrog season is fast approaching, and sportsmen are reminded that this year there's a new opening date and time.

The 1985 bullfrog season will open at noon on the third Friday in May (May 17), and run through Thursday, October 31.

The major change in bullfrog season is the time of day the season opens. In past years the season opened at midnight, which meant that the next day there were a lot of sleepy-eyed people walking around who had been up most of the night chasing bullfrogs. The noon opening time this season should make that first night of froggin' a little easier on lots of folks!

The daily creel and possession limits remain the same: 15 bullfrogs per day (from noon to noon), with 30 bullfrogs in possession. A hunting or fishing license is required to gig or hand grab frogs, but if a bow and arrow, or .22 rifle is used, a hunting license is needed. Anyone "fishing" for bullfrogs with angling tackle must have a fishing license.

It should also be noted that it's illegal to have a gig in possession while on a stream or lake from November 1 through January 31. Giggling season for rough fish began February 1 and extends through May 10.

Froggin' is one of summer's most enjoyable pastimes. It's not only fun, but can provide some excellent table fare. Frog legs are a delicacy that command high prices in restaurants. When salt and peppered, floured and fried up in a skillet of hot oil or bacon grease, they're great eating. The white meat is tender and juicy; frog legs are usually served with fried fish fillets, cole slaw and hush puppies.

Frog giggin' is a good way to break up the hours during all-night fishing trips. Anglers casting the banks at night for bass should try taking along a frog gig sometime. Many of the mud-bottomed, willow-lined embayments on large impoundments in Kentucky support good bullfrog populations. Likewise, small creeks, as well as rivers and swampy areas provide good habitat, although most people associate bullfrog giggin' with farm ponds.

Bullfrogs are abundant throughout the state, and they are an under-utilized resource. In fact, their habitat may be increasing, since nearly 500 farm ponds are built in Kentucky each year. An estimated 50,000 farm ponds already exist, and bullfrogs can surely be found on most of the 13,000 miles of streams and rivers in Kentucky.

The bullfrog (*Rana catesbiana*), is known for its jumping ability, and distinctive deep-voiced "jug o'rum, jug o'rum" call which can be heard on summer nights. Bullfrogs can be taken by prowling the banks of ponds or streams in waders, or floating down rivers and creeks in canoes, johnboats, bass boats or inflatable rubber rafts.

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## Kentucky Fishing Report

Frankfort, Ky., May 6—At most of Kentucky's major lakes, bass are going onto the nest to spawn, and statewide fishing was generally good during the May 4-5 period covered by this report. The lake-by-lake rundown, as reported by conservation officers or creel clerks at each lake, is as follows:

**KENTUCKY:** Creel clerk Don Fortenberry reported moderate to heavy fishing activity for crappie on minnows and jigs at 10-13 feet, and light to moderate fishing activity for bass, with anglers casting plastic worms in 1-4 feet of water over grassy and brushy areas. The lake was clear to muddy, stable, one foot below summer pool and 68°.

**BARKLEY:** Moderate fishing activity was reported by creel clerk Norman Brantley with crappie being taken on minnows in 7-14 feet of water. Bass were being caught in embayment headwaters on spinnerbaits, and catfish over rip-rap along bridges and marina breakwaters. The lake was clear and stable at summer pool, and 72°.

**BARREN:** Officer Donald Depp reported moderate fishing activity with bass being caught early and late on surface lures and plastic worms off points. Crappie were being caught in 12-20 feet of water by drifting minnows. Crappie and catfish were being caught in the tailwaters. The lake was clear, rising, 13 feet below summer pool and 68°.

**NOLIN:** Officer Sammie Renfro reported heavy fishing activity with crappie being taken on minnows and jigs over stickups in 10-12 feet of water. Bass were being caught by casting crankbaits over points and stickups. Tailwater activity was heavy for trout. The lake was clear, rising, eight feet below summer pool and 75°.

**ROUGH RIVER:** Officer Harold Belt reported moderate fishing activity for bluegill on worms and crickets. Bass were being caught on surface lures along all types of banks, and on points.

**TAYLORSVILLE:** Officer Joe Bland reported moderate fishing activity with bass being caught on black jigs and spinnerbaits in 2-5 feet of water around stickups. Bluegill were being caught by still fishing worms and crickets, and in the tailwaters, activity was heavy with anglers catching bluegill and crappie.

**HERRINGTON:** Heavy fishing activity was reported by officer Charles Goode and creel clerk Bill Pinkston. Bass were being caught by casting crankbaits and plastic worms early and late, and at night over medium depth banks and points. Crappie, white bass, and a few limits of hybrid rockfish/white bass were being caught on minnows and jigs. The lake was clear, stable, four feet below summer pool and 67°.

**CUMBERLAND:** Light to heavy fishing activity was reported by officers Randy Wilson and Fred York. White bass were taken at night along rockwalls and points in 20-30 feet of water. Walleye were being taken on nightcrawler/spinner combinations over flooded willows and mud banks. Black bass were being caught by casting surface lures along shoreline cover in embayments. Moderate activity was reported for trout in the tailwaters. The lake was extremely clear (20 foot visibility), stable, seven feet below summer pool and 68°.

**DALE HOLLOW:** Officer Marvin Edwards reported moderate fishing activity. Bass were being taken by casting topwater lures and drift fishing large minnows off medium sloping banks. Bluegill were taken on crickets and worms over submerged cover and off steep rock walls. The lake was clear, stable, three feet below summer pool and 70°.

**LAUREL:** Light fishing activity was reported by officer Bob Delph. Bluegill were being caught on worms and crickets over stickups. The lake was clear, stable, one foot below summer pool and 69°.

**CAVE RUN:** Officer Mike Gilliam reported moderate to heavy fishing activity. Bass were being caught casting crankbaits over heavy cover; in timbered embayments, muskies were being taken by casting jerk baits. In the tailwater, fishing activity for crappie was moderate. The lake was clear to murky, rising, one foot below summer pool and 64°.

**BUCKHORN:** Moderate fishing activity was reported by officer Billy Joe Napier. Bass were being taken in

shallow water on plastic worms, and catfish on night crawlers off mud banks. Some crappie, bluegill and muskies were being caught in the tailwaters. The lake was clear to murky, at summer pool, stable, and 68°.

**GRAYSON:** No report available.  
**DEWEY:** Officer Dalton Conley reported light to moderate fishing activity. Crappie were being taken by anglers still fishing minnows over cover in eight feet of water. The lake was clear, stable, at summer pool and 70°.

**FISHTRAP:** Light fishing activity was reported by officer Don Bevins. Crappie were being taken in 5-10 feet of water over brush stickups. In the tailwaters, fishing activity was light for trout. The lake was clear, rising, eight feet below summer pool and 70°.

One Man's View of Drunk Driving Problem...

# The Threat of Arrest Held Top Deterrent

Although stiffer penalties for drunk drivers may scare a few people into sobering up before they get behind the wheel of a car, longer jail sentences won't conquer the problem.  
So says Dr. Gary Sykes, professor of justice administration at the University of Louisville. "Most of the time our approach to drunk driving has been to increase the severity of the penalty. But people don't believe they'll get caught, so they don't worry about the penalties."  
Instead, police officers need to saturate areas where most drunk driving accidents occur and let drunk drivers know that the chances of arrest are high, Sykes said. "If you can increase the likelihood of being caught, that has the strongest impact. People will alter their behavior if they think they will be caught."  
Sykes researched drunk driving in Superior, Wisc., when he was a professor at the University of Wisconsin,

but he didn't just compile facts and interpret figures. He became a police officer.  
For a year, Sykes worked without pay as a patrolman in Superior, a small city that is home to 95 bars, 65 of which are located in the same 15-square-block-area. Superior's drunken driving problem was compounded by sailors from the Great Lakes Naval Training Center and truckers hauling grain to waterfront shipping companies, Sykes said. In addition, Superior is located just across the bay from Duluth, Minn., where the legal drinking age is 19 and the bars close at 1 a.m. The legal drinking age in Superior is 18 and bars close at 2 a.m.  
During his stint on the force, Sykes studied the city's traffic accidents and found that 40 percent of them occurred in the 15-square-block-area of bars on weekends between midnight and 3 a.m. Aided by a federal grant, he set up a special enforcement unit to increase police surveillance there.  
Sykes saturated the location with officers in five patrol cars whose sole duty was to look for drunk drivers. Looking for minor infractions that allowed them to pull over drivers, the officers stringently screened suspects for intoxication on Fridays and Saturdays from 8 p.m. to 4 a.m.  
The area soon became populated by police vehicles with noticeable spotlights, Sykes said. And as if the beams weren't enough to let drinkers know the police were out, bar owners began warning patrons to be careful because the police were on the streets and looking for them.  
The rate of personal injury accidents declined 20 percent, with the sharpest drop occurring on Saturdays during the most accident-prone hours. Officers also wrote dozens of citations and collected \$30,000 in fines over the five-month experiment.  
Although the total accident rate did not change dramatically, Sykes said that the number of personal and property damage accidents was reduced. A drop in auto thefts and burglaries also took place.  
Sykes maintains that intensified enforcement will work in cities of all sizes. "You can study the accident patterns, target the areas where you have a high incidence of alcohol-related accidents, and heighten the surveillance there."  
The only catch is the necessity of filling the high-surveillance squad cars with officers who won't be called away for other duties. "You have to have officers who are focusing in on those areas, and are free from normal calls so they're not tied up."  
All in all, said Sykes, the program has had "significant impact."


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


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## Art Exhibit Winner

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



# WHICH FACE WILL IT BE, DOC?

Well, Doc, on election day, which face are you going to wear, since I know you have got more than one. 

**Fertilizer Made at Home**

Over the years Gorman Collins, of Prestonsburg, has accumulated approximately two tons of leaf, grass and sawdust compost. This stockpile furnishes an annual 15 to 16 wheelbarrows of rotted material for his garden. Periodically fresh grass cuttings, leaf rakings and sawdust are added to the pile. To speed the decay of this matter, Mr. Collins adds nitrogen and lime to aid bacteria. When compost material is needed he digs from the bottom of the pile where bacteria have had a chance to thoroughly decompose the organic matter. This rotted compost adds fertility to his garden and keeps the soil loose and friable.

Soil that is high in organic matter is also more resistant to soil erosion. For all these reasons, good farmers try to add organic matter to their soil by spreading manure on their fields, leaving the crop residue (corn stalks, etc.) on the soil surface and growing cover crops to plow under in the spring. 



C. The Ordinance provides that pursuant to the Act, the Bonds will not constitute an indebtedness of the County within the meaning of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

D. The Ordinance authorizes the Trustee to make procedures for the disbursement of the proceeds of the Bonds.



ACTION WOULD CHECK CLAIMS ON ROAD FUND

Judge Hill Acts On Contention That Deficit Exists

1928 LEVY ADOPTED

Suit was filed in circuit court Tuesday by County Judge Ed Hill, acting as a taxpayer of Floyd county, against each member of the Floyd county Fiscal Court and Jo M. Davidson, county treasurer, seeking to enjoin the allowance of future claims on contracts payable from the road fund, except on contracts already let and under construction.

This action, which is held a new move in this county, was taken to prevent further drain upon the road fund, which has already against it claims aggregating thousands of dollars more than the revenues which will go into it this year.

The suit was filed on the grounds that there has already been allowed against the road fund claims approximating \$81,000, which is payable out of the 1927 revenue, while the revenue to be collected and paid into the road fund for 1927 will total only the approximate sum of \$31,000, which would leave a deficit of \$50,000. It is held that this amount is beyond the constitutional limit and that it is prohibited by the laws of Kentucky.

As a result of Judge Hill's action, all members of the court signed an agreed judgement between the magistrates and the county judge, supporting the suit and prohibiting further allowances of claims against the road fund.

Tax levy was adopted for 1928 by the fiscal court in session, Monday, Tuesday, and the general fund levy was placed at 50 cents, which is 10 cents more than the levy of 1927. Levy for the road fund was placed at 20 cents; sinking fund, 20 cents; school fund, 50 cents; county poll tax, \$1.50; and school poll tax, \$1.00.

REPORTS CASE OF PARALYSIS

URGES FINISH OF BRIDGE AT CLIFF

Span May Be Completed Within Week, Engineer States

In a letter written October 4, to the state highway commission, J. D. Harkins, Prestonsburg attorney, calls the attention of that body to the need of immediate action in opening the bridge at Cliff for the convenience of motorists traveling between Prestonsburg and Ashland.

The bridge at Cliff is practically completed, with the sub-floor in, wooden blocks and tar on the ground, but during the past two or three weeks, he pointed out, no visible work has been done to finish the structure.

It is possible that the Trail can be used for six weeks yet, Mr. Harkins stated. "It seems to me to be most unfair to the taxpayers and the traveling public for the slight additional work to complete the bridge to be held in abeyance indefinitely," he continued, adding that it will cost no more to rush the bridge to completion now than to wait until such time as it will be of no profit until next year.

Mr. Hess, division engineer, said this week that the bridge would probably be finished within the next six days.

### Match Flower Colors

Get to know people well and you may begin to see trends in the colors that surround them. They may prefer to wear blues but to decorate their houses in earthtones of browns and greens. Or they may like to wear reds and oranges and to surround themselves with similar bright colors.

Many people are having color analyses done so their clothing will better compliment their complexions and hair color. Perhaps rather than putting in whatever bedding plants we randomly buy and bring home, we should do more color analyses of the locations where we will plant or uses we will make of the flowers.

If your house is fronted with red brick, then red geraniums may not enhance or even show up well against the house. But use the same red geraniums against white or gray paint and the flowers will attract anyone's eye. Bright yellow marigolds or white petunias would be better choices in front of the brick. Or use a buffer of green kochia or silvery gray dusty miller between the red brick and the red geraniums and the foliage will help make the needed color transition.

If you spend a lot of time on a patio or porch, buy foliage and flower plants that will create the mood you prefer. If you go to your porch to relax, cool colors such as whites, silvers, blues and purples will help set the mood. Try blue ageratum and salvias, purple petunias, white petunias and impatiens, or silvery-leaved ground covers and herbs.

If your outdoor area is for entertaining where you want a more excited mood, use warm colors like yellows, pinks, oranges and reds that advance towards the viewer. These bright colors are easy to get with zinnias, portulaca, gerberas, gazanias, impatiens and dahlias, or with the brightly colored foliage of many coleus and caladiums.

Many people have outdoor summer parties for which they carefully select the colors of dishes, napkins and tablecloths. Why not just as carefully select coordinating bedding plants to put up in small containers for place settings or a composite centerpiece that breaks apart at the end of a party to furnish each guest with a gift plant.

A hostess might even go so far as to design her garden color scheme to compliment dresses she might wear. Or for an outdoor wedding, plants can match or contrast with the bride's bouquet or her attendants' dresses.

An advantage to using bedding plants to coordinate with special events is that they can be purchased in bloom or close to bloom for instant color. Starting from seed may take too long or may not bring flowers into bloom at the appropriate time.

Not only can flower colors be carefully selected but so also the colors of many vegetables. Buy transplants of some of the new yellow and orange tomatoes or yellow peppers to give more color contrast to summer meals or even to match table settings or flowers.

Color is important in many aspects of our lives, and its importance should not be overlooked when we plan our gardens. If bedding plants are not labeled

as to color, check the variety name or ask a salesperson. If the theme of your party is "How to cool off in the summer," and baked Alaska will be the dessert, flaming red flowers may spoil everything.

**Vest's Famed Tribute to a Dog**

You've heard all your life that "a man's best friend is his dog."

The year was 1870, and Old Drum lay dead from a bullet wound on or near the property of one Leonidus Hornsby in Johnson county, Mo. Old Drum was a foxhound formerly owned by Charles Burden.

Burden sued for \$150, the maximum allowed as a claim in that type of case, and a verdict was given for Hornsby. The case was then appealed until it reached the Missouri State Court of Appeals, where Francis Cockrell, later to be a U.S. Senator from Missouri, and Thomas Crittenden, later to become governor of the "show-me" state, were to represent Hornsby.

Burden was represented by Col. Wells Blodgett, who had been Burden's attorney of record throughout the trials.

The docket was crowded that day, and Col. Blodgett, believing himself outclassed by the attorneys for the defense, began to search around for help. He found it in the person of George Graham Vest, born in Kentucky on Dec. 6, 1830 and a former Confederate Senator. Vest would be elected to the U.S. Senate from Missouri eight years later.

Vest agreed to assist in the case, and when Judge Foster Wright called the case after giving the jurors a break for supper, the courtroom was packed with spectators who had heard that Vest would represent Burden in the appeal.

Legend and romance add that Old Drum himself must have been in the shadows cast by the kerosene lamps, as Vest began to speak:

"The one absolutely unselfish friend that man can have in this selfish world, the one that never deserts him, the one that never proves ungrateful or treacherous, is his dog. A man's dog stands by him in prosperity and in poverty, in health and in sickness. He will sleep on the cold ground, where the wintry winds blow and the snow drives fiercely, if only he may be near his master's side. He will kiss the hand that has no food to offer; he will lick the wounds and sores that come in encounter with roughness of the world. He guards the sleep of his pauper master as if he were a prince. When all other friends desert, he remains. When riches take wings and reputation falls to pieces, he is as constant in his love as the sun in its journey through the heavens.

"If fortune drives the master forth an outcast in the world, friendless and homeless, the faithful dog asks no higher privilege than that of accompanying him, to guard him against danger, to

fight against his enemies. And when the last scene of all comes, and death takes the master in its embrace and his body is laid away, there by the graveside will the noble dog be found, his head between his paws, his eyes sad but open in alert watchfulness, faithful and true even in death."

The jurors that night awarded \$550 to Charles Burden, and a little bit of eternity to Old Drum and George Vest.

Not all of Vest's eloquence was recorded that night; it is said that he concluded by referring to the Biblical narrative of the dog soothing the sores of Lazarus as he sat and begged at the rich man's gate.

Complete accounts of the trial and drama which attended it are scarce. One of the best is contained in The People's Almanac, Vol. 1, published by Doubleday. More complete information can be obtained from the Kentucky Historical Society in Frankfort, at least regarding Vest and the trial.

Any dog lover can fill you in on the details of the heroics and companionship of dogs in particular and pets in general.




The 1985 graduating seniors will receive their diplomas from MMI's chairman of the board of trustees, Judge David Knox.
