Wheelwright official quits, agrees to exile

Wheelwright City Commissioner Charles Harmon resigned his seat on the commission Tuesday and agreed to an immediate exile from the county amid charges he held his wife at gunpoint Monday night during an altercation at their home in Wheelwright.

Harmon was arrested Monday by Kentucky State Police trooper James Slone and charged with first degree unlawful imprisonment and fourth degree assault, spouse abuse. Floyd County Sheriff Paul Hunt Thompson said that Harmon allegedly held his wife at gunpoint during an altercation at their home in Wheelwright.

During his arraignment Tuesday afternoon in Floyd District Court, Harmon agreed to stay out of Floyd County, except to attend court proceedings on the charges, and asked that the felony charge of unlawful imprisonment be waived to a Floyd County Grand Jury.

Judge Danny Caudill told Harmon several times that if he returned to the county for any reason other than a court date on the charges, he would be subject to immediate arrest. The judge also told Harmon that he could have no contact with his wife or violate any other laws in state or out of state. If Harmon violates any of the bond provisions, his \$20,000 surety bond will be reconsidered at that time, Judge Caudill said.

Harmon told Judge Caudill that he would abide with the provisions of his bond and pledged that he would have no contact with his wife. Harmon asked for "a little time" to get his affairs in order before he left the county.

Judge Caudill did not appear to be in favor of letting Harmon have any additional time before relocating out of the county. Harmon spoke up and said he would leave the county immediately after posting bond.

Harmon asked to be allowed to get his vehicle from the Wheelwright area and Judge Caudill asked if there was anyone who was willing to bring it to him.

Wheelwright Mayor David Marlee Sammons, who was present at the arraignment, volunteered to bring Harmon's car to Prestonsburg.

Harmon told Judge Caudill that he was preparing to take a job out of state and had to report for that job by Tuesday.

Prior to Tuesday's arraignment, Harmon signed a letter of resignation from the commission and in that let-

ter he agreed "to physically leave the city of Wheelwright" and not return.

Mayor Sammons said after Tuesday's hearing that a replacement on the commission will be appointed within the next 30 days.

Ohio man wanted for murder is caught here

An Ohio man wanted on a murder charge in that state was arrested Tuesday morning by Floyd County Sheriff Paul Hunt Thompson and deputies at a residence in Martin.

Lawrence Smith, 20, of Ashtabula, Ohio, was taken into custody by sheriff's deputies just before 10 a.m. Tuesday and is being held for police officers of the City of Geneva, Ohio, in connection with Saturday's beating death of 21-year-old Randy M. Marshall of Geneva.

Geneva Sergeant Daniel Dudik notified the sheriff's department at 1:20 a.m. Tuesday that Smith was wanted in that state on a murder charge and that he could be in Floyd County.

Sheriff's dispatcher Tim Stephens notified lieutenant Lloyd Powers, who was stationed at Left Beaver Townhouses, that Smith could be in the Left Beaver area.

Powers noticed a vehicle in the townhouse parking lot with Ohio tags, which turned out to belong to a member of Smith's family.

Powers notified Sheriff Thompson at approximately 6:30 a.m. Tuesday and the two searched an apartment at the Left Beaver housing project.

Smith was not at that residence and officers were tipped that he could be at a residence on Bucks Branch near Martin. Powers, Thompson and deputy Ricky Thomsberry went to the Bucks Branch home and found Smith hiding in a closet.

Geneva police chief James Pearson said Tuesday that Smith and Marshall were acquaintances and that Marshall's body was found Saturday afternoon in Tuttle Court near an elementary school in Geneva.

Robinson guilty of homicide; jury can't agree on sentence

A Floyd County jury deliberated for almost six hours Friday before finding a Floyd County man guilty of reckless homicide, but jurors were unable to come to an agreement on a prison sentence.

Prosecutors were seeking a verdict of murder against Larry Robinson of Prestonsburg, in connection with last year's death of William "Bucky" Rose.

Rose died after being run over by a pickup truck driven by Robinson on Memorial Day, 1993, at Banner. Robinson had been following Rose and his wife, Mary, with whom

Robinson had developed a relationship while the husband and wife had been separated.

Because the jury was unable to agree on a prison sentence, Judge Combs will sentence Robinson on September 23.

The jurors deliberated for about five hours during the sentencing phase before announcing that they were deadlocked on the issue.

Under state sentencing guidelines, reckless homicide is a class D felony which carries a 1-5 year prison term. A person sentenced to a one-year term may be eligible for parole after serving four months; under a two-year term parole is possible after serving five months; a three-year term,

seven months; a four-year term, 10 months; and a five-year term, 12 months.

State probation and parole officer Paula Johnson testified that there is no assurance that a prisoner would be granted parole after serving the minimum sentence.

During deliberations Friday, jurors came back at approximately 3 p.m. and asked special Judge Doug Combs if they could go to the site where the accident occurred.

Judge Combs told jurors that if they went to the site, they could not discuss the case and no one could give them any information about the accident.

When jurors returned to their de-

liberations, Judge Combs admonished spectators in the courtroom that he "would not tolerate anyone for any reason trying to circumvent the process" of the trial.

No specifics were offered about the judge's comments, but throughout the trial it was apparent that there was animosity between the two families involved in the case. Security was tight during the three-day trial.

Judge Combs cautioned that if he received any more reports of "problems" between spectators, the courtroom would be cleared and the process would continue "without the benefit of spectators."

"I'm dead serious about this," Judge Combs said.

Coal education program expands to Floyd schools

"The hill was very high. Some of us were afraid the bus was going to roll off the hill. Some of us wanted to get in the middle," said fourth grader Sarah Billiter, as laughter rippled through her audience Monday night at May Lodge.

Her audience was Floyd County teachers, and Billiter, a student at Millard Elementary in Pike County, was explaining the trip she and her classmates had taken to a coal mine.

Billiter and her classmate, Michelle Parks told the teachers about the things they had learned about the coal industry through the CEDAR (Coal Education Development and Resource) program which began in Pike County last year.

This year, the program will branch out into Floyd County. CEDAR's purpose is to improve the image of coal through education by integrating the study of coal into the classroom curriculum.

"It's a nice way to learn — a fun way to learn," said John Justice, chair-

man of CEDAR, Inc. "It's a way to educate them more about their immediate surroundings."

CEDAR supplies educational material, speakers, and financial assistance through grants, and also hands

out first class awards to winners. The top prizes for winning teachers are an all-expense paid trip to Myrtle Beach, North Carolina, and a \$1,000 cash prize.

Christian Academy at Martin where he is a kindergarten student. Lafferty, who put the fish on ice for preservation until it can officially be identified, said that it is the "wickedest looking fish that I have ever seen."

"Really, we have no idea what it

is," he said. "Several who have seen the fish say that it is a piranha." Lafferty said that he was fishing downstream from the other two when they hooked the piranha.

"When I got there I didn't know what they had caught," he said. "We showed it to an old gentleman who

was there and he said that he had seen every kind of fish there was, but nothing like that."

Piranhas are known for their razor-sharp teeth that is used to attack its prey. It is most commonly found in South American waters.

So, how did it get in Dewey Lake? While no one knows, Lafferty thinks there is an answer.

"Dan Wilson, who is the marine biologist from Hager Hill believes someone must have had one in an aquarium and turned it loose," explained Lafferty.

Everyone has heard the stories surrounding the piranhas. They have been pictured as fish that can devour a human body at will. The movies have capitalized on the notion that you'd best stay away from waters where they swim.

Piranhas are favorites of tropical aquarium owners, who enjoy keeping them but soon tire of them because of the expense to feed one. Because of that, wild piranhas have been introduced into some rivers and lakes in the United States. The most common is the Southeastern part.

While the piranha can be a serious problem for fish in other waters, they rarely attack people. But Lafferty said the fish he has is vicious looking.

"It has the sharp teeth but the bottom ones look like human teeth," he said. "The fish are found in waters like in Brazil. They can average in size up to 20 inches long."

The one that Lafferty caught weighed in at four and a half pounds. It measured 17 inches long and seven inches wide.

"The chances of catching a fish like this are slim," he said. "Your chance of winning the lottery is better than catching a piranha."

Photos of the fish have been sent to Tennessee for a definite identification. In the meantime, Lafferty has put the fish on ice and when it is all over he plans to have the fish mounted.

"With the teeth showing," he said.

"What else does the 'Cooter' enjoy?"

"Fishing and baseball are my life," he admitted.

Marshall died from blunt trauma to the head, Pearson said, and police believe he was killed around 8 a.m. Saturday. The murder charge was filed against Smith in Ohio on Monday.

Police believe that Smith and Marshall had argued Saturday morning and "subsequently Marshall was killed," Pearson said.

Pearson explained that Smith had friends and family in Floyd County and that officers had been tipped the suspect may be headed to the area. Pearson was pleased that Smith was arrested so soon.

"We appreciate the assistance of the local authorities and that they were able to apprehend Smith so quickly," Pearson said.

After checking Smith's records, sheriff's deputies discovered that Smith is wanted on eight charges in Floyd County. On August 10, a bench warrant was issued for Smith's arrest on charges of harassing or simple assault on a police officer; driving a motor vehicle under the influence of alcohol; disorderly conduct; third degree criminal mischief; no registration receipt; expired temporary tags; no operators license; and no insurance.

The Floyd County charges were brought by Prestonsburg policeman Ricky Conn after an incident at the Holiday Inn this spring. Conn said Tuesday that he stopped a vehicle occupied by Smith and two other persons on U.S. 23 after receiving a report from security personnel at the Holiday Inn. Conn said that Smith assaulted him during the arrest.

Conn also added that Smith was wanted in Ohio for a parole violation at the time of his arrest earlier this year. Ohio authorities declined to extradite Smith for the violation on a "first or second degree assault" charge, Conn said. Conn said that Smith had a lengthy criminal record.

Geneva police officers are expected to arrive in Floyd County Wednesday to extradite Smith, Pearson said.

Packages containing information about the CEDAR project will be sent to Floyd County teachers by September 15. Grant applications will also be in the package, Justice said, and he encouraged teachers to apply for the funds. Teachers must submit the grants by November 15.

"We try to give everyone who applies at least enough grant money to do what they say they're going to do," Justice said.

CEDAR officials will review each grant and cut out any excess. CEDAR doesn't fund the purchase of big ticket items, such as video cameras, which can be rented, Justice said. They will consider funding such items as computer modems that will be used to reach a lot of students on an on-going basis, he explained.

In the Floyd County school system, CEDAR is being coordinated by Patricia Watson and Gary Frazier.

CEDAR is a joint effort of the North Carolina Coal Institute and the Coal Operators & Associates, Inc. of Pikeville.



The U.S. Department of Labor has certified the company as an "adversely affected employer" under the federal Trade Act, which provides assistance to employees of businesses and industries hurt by import competition.

The certification covers all workers involved in the exploration and drilling of crude oil who were laid off by the company on or after June 14, 1993. Laid-off employees who exhausted their unemployment insurance benefits before they were called back to work or found another job also may be eligible for retroactive benefits.

Qualified workers may apply for financial assistance, training, and job search and relocation assistance.

At last, her wheelchair had been released and Suzanne was geared up for school

and independence.

Suzanne's pigtails were a'flying and she was wearing a new dress as we waited for the bus to arrive. The telephone rang. It was Earl D. Ousley, director of transportation, checking to see if little Suzanne is ready to go to school.

The bus arrived. Suzanne was so excited, I could hardly keep the wheelchair in the driveway. At last, the big bus swung into place. The lift was engaged, lowered into place.

Apprehensively, Suzanne moved her wheelchair onto the lift, locked the brakes and was raised high into the air — when suddenly, the lift broke and Suzanne was almost spilled, strapped to a wheelchair, headfirst. Had it not been for Bill Hackworth, bus driver, and Sherry Baldrige, bus aide, Suzanne might not be here.

Bill quickly disengaged the lift and slowly lowered her to the ground. Suzanne was shaken and scared beyond crying. She doesn't understand danger.

The right gear was loose, bent and needed repairs. Quickly, Bill informed Mr. Ousley of the incident and Stevie Spriggs, school bus mechanic was here within 15 minutes. Stevie got a handle on the problem and got it repaired temporarily.

Suzanne was lifted slowly and securely, and off she finally went to school.

Stevie told me at school he will take apart the lift and make sure it is working correctly.

Earl D. Ousley, Bill Hackworth, Sherry Baldrige and Stevie Spriggs: "Thank you." Each of you deserve a merit increase or some kind of special acknowledgment for working under hazardous duty.

Suzanne's school year has started out at last — still alive.

Just to give you an example of how wacky the wonderful world of "justice" can be, look at two current high profile cases.



Ex-judge, U.S. attorney Jean Auxier dies at 94

Jean L. Auxier, a former U.S. attorney for the Eastern District of Kentucky and Pike County circuit judge, died Sunday at the Veterans Affairs Medical Center on Leestown Road in Lexington. He was 94.

Auxier, a Republican, was a Pike circuit judge for a term in the 1950s, and previously had served a term as Pike County attorney. He became an assistant U.S. attorney in 1958, and in 1960 was sworn in as U.S. attorney for the Eastern District of Kentucky. His stint as U.S. attorney ended soon after Democrat John F. Kennedy was sworn in as president in 1961.

Auxier, a Pike County native, attended Centre College, where he roomed with John Sherman Cooper, a Republican who went on to become a U.S. senator and ambassador. Auxier received a law degree from the University of Virginia and served in the Army during World War I.

He held several jobs as a young man, working as a teacher at Pikeville College, a surveyor and a sawmill employee. He began practicing law in 1925 and retired in the 1970s.

He could speak several languages, including French, German, Spanish and Latin, and had been a pilot and ham radio operator.

Auxier was a past president of the Kentucky Historical Society, and a member of the Sons of the American Revolution, Filson Club and Pikeville First Presbyterian Church.—*Lexington Herald-Leader*

Pike County man dies of gunshot wounds

A Pike County man who was shot in the head

and chest Sunday morning died yesterday at University of Kentucky Hospital.

The death of Robin David Kilgore, 23, of Hellier, has been ruled a homicide and an arrest is pending, said Howard Dobson, Elkhorn City police chief.

He declined to release further details until the arrest is made.

Kilgore was discovered by police about 7:15 a.m. Sunday at Eagle Flats, a wooded area in Elkhorn City where people often fish and camp, Dobson said.

Kilgore was a coal mine foreman.—*Lexington Herald-Leader*

Farmer dies in tractor accident

A tractor accident claimed the life of a Lawrence County farmer Sunday night. John E. Wilkes, 38, suffered a fatal head injury when the tractor he was riding flipped over on his property about 18 miles north of Louisa. "He was going to park his tractor and had a bush hog on the back of it," said Lawrence County Coroner Aaron Moon, who pronounced Wilkes dead at the scene. "He was going up a steep area that was kind of rocky and, with the weight of the bush hog on the back, the tractor turned over."—*Lexington Herald-Leader*

Two area coal companies contribute to construction of Martin County School

Martiki Coal Corp. and Pontiki Coal Corp. recently announced a \$200,000 cash contribution to the Martin County Board of Education toward construction of the new Warfield Middle School.

"The award will be given once financing for the school has been arranged and construction has begun," said Charles Wesley, vice president of operations for Martiki and Pontiki.

"We understand the overwhelming need for a new middle school in this county. In better times, we would have liked to have given even more. Market conditions for East Kentucky coal have not recovered as much as we'd hoped, so we're trying to fulfill our commitment to the school as best we can, despite the tough times we've had so far this year."

The small size and restricted shape of the Warfield School construction site would make it difficult to do site preparation with Martiki's or Pontiki's equipment, which is designed for much larger areas, Charlie said. So the mines are contributing \$200,000 instead to help defray construction costs.

Martiki and Pontiki cleared and grubbed the land this spring. Mine management has been a vocal advocate of the new school, meeting several times with the Martin County School Board over the past year to discuss plans.



Spending bill includes \$22 million for ARC highway projects

Funding for Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) road projects in Kentucky has been increased to \$22 million for next year, according to Rep. Harold "Hal" Rogers.

After the House-Senate Conference Committee finished work recently on the FY 1995 Energy and Water Development Appropriations Bill, Rogers, a member of the Conference Committee, said the increase "would help bring better roads, economic development and new jobs to Southern and Eastern Kentucky."

The \$22 million will be used to construct and improve Kentucky highways on the Appalachian corridor system.

"Nothing is more important in Eastern Kentucky than good quality roads," Rogers said. "These funds will allow ARC to help Appalachia improve its roads and provide long-term economic growth for our region."

The funds will be used for several projects including U.S. 119 in Letcher County, U.S. 119 in Pike County at Bent Mountain and at Coburn Mountain.

The final version of the Energy and Water Appropriations Bill, which also includes many other flood-related projects for Southern and Eastern Kentucky, is expected to reach the floor of the House of Representatives this week.

Low-income families may qualify for new program to ease medical bills

Beginning September 1, low-income Kentuckians may qualify for a new program that will help ease high medical bills.

The Discount Option Program (DOP) will be available for people with gross income at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty level. For example, a person with a monthly income of up to \$1,227 or a family of four with a monthly income of up to \$2,467 could be eligible.

A patient certified for DOP will pay the same rate for medical services as the state pays for Medicaid recipients. The DOP participant is still responsible for paying the medi-

cal service provider, but will get a discounted rate. For example, a person certified for DOP would pay a doctor the same fee for an office call as Medicaid pays.

"This program is not a cure-all for medical expenses, but it can give some relief to people who are struggling financially," said Cabinet for Human Resources Secretary Masten Childers II. "Often these people are workers who do not have medical insurance or can't qualify for insurance for some reason.

"Many people will not go to the doctor when it's necessary because they can't afford it. Although DOP will not completely eliminate the cost, it will lower the price and that may be enough to help someone get treatment."

The DOP participant must see a doctor in the Medicaid program or receive other medical services from Medicaid providers to qualify for the discount. Service providers will include physicians, pharmacies, hospitals, dentists and medical professionals who currently participate in the Medicaid program.

The only Medicaid providers not included in the program are long-term care facilities.

Kentuckians can apply for DOP beginning September 1 at the Cabinet for Human Resources local office: The Department for Employment Services, Department for Social Insurance, Department for Social Services, local health department and regional mental health offices. Most of these sites are listed in the community telephone books under "Kentucky State Government."





Information superhighway reinforces food safety

The information superhighway serves as a reminder to follow food safety principles as you prepare school lunches.

"Just as a computer can succumb to a virus when downloading a file, your mishandled lunch can harbor bacteria that transmit bytes of foodborne illness," said Sandra Bastin, extension food and nutrition specialist at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

(Foodborne illness is caused by eating food contaminated with microorganisms or toxins that grow when it is left in the danger zone—40 to 140 degrees F.—for an extended period of time, generally two to four hours. Very young and very old people are especially susceptible.

Symptoms range from flu-like symptoms to death.)

"From booting up to downloading, remember to use "FS-DOS" ("Food Safety Depends on Savvy") to maintain a safe route on the superhighway," Bastin said. "Look through windows for some savvy written in the 'FoodPerfect' format."

Bastin gave these savvy recommendations:

- Setup lunch by putting a gel pack or juice box in the freezer to keep perishable food safe until lunchtime. To maximize cooling, retrieve it just before leaving for school.

- Wait until the last minute to take sandwiches or salads from the refrigerator.

- Search for foods that will last until lunchtime without refrigeration. These include fresh fruits and vegetables, cookies, pretzels, crackers, cans of fruit, and shelf-stable packaged pudding.

- Delete foods that could be a problem, such as cream pies, mayonnaise-based salads, and cold cuts and meats.

- Compose soup for cool-weather lunches. To keep soup safe (above 140 degrees) rinse a thermos with boiling water just before filling it with boiling-hot soup.

- After exiting the bus, car, or bike, store your lunch indoors in the coolest place possible.

- Bacteria are too micro to see; so clean-looking hands aren't necessarily safe. Always wash hands before eating lunch to send bacteria into cyberspace.

- Download perishable leftovers and their wrappings into the trash after lunch. Even if you use frozen gel packs, they can't keep food safe all day.

How does a group say good bye to a school that has served them well for over sixty years? That question will be answered over the Labor Day weekend as students, teachers, coaches, principals, and staff members meet to celebrate the accomplishments and say good bye to a small school located on the banks of Frasure Creek in McDowell.

To get an overall perspective of the school, I interviewed someone from the 1934 class (the first graduating class), the 1964 class (about the middle of the school's history), and a member of the 1993 class (the last class to graduate from McDowell.)

Melvina Perry Newman was a member of the first graduating class of McDowell. Approximately thirty-two students began as freshmen but only nine graduated in this class. Palmer Hall was her principal and some of the teachers included Joe Moore, Town Hall, Boone Hall and his wife Hollie B. Of course there were no school buses to transport the students, and they did not have a yearbook to record their memories.

Melvina went on to become a teacher and taught 35 1/2 years here in Floyd County. Her last thirteen years of teaching were spent at John M. Stumbo where she taught math. Her last year of teaching was done under Gary Newman who happens to be her son.

Melvina now spends a lot of time making quilts which she gives to her children and grandchildren.

Thirty years later much had changed at McDowell. Ruth Ann Turner Hamilton (daughter of Buster and Anna Rae Turner. Buster went to McDowell until his junior year at which time he went off to war) remarked how the size of the class had grown to over eighty by this time.

By this time George L. Moore was the principal at McDowell and students had modern buses for transportation, access to dance instructions provided by Mr. Moore, senior trips to Washington and New York, and many other activities that made McDowell students think they were the best in the county. Students during this era also had two of the most dedicated teachers in the world, Violet Moore and Francis Turner.

Ruth Ann went back to college after having two sons and now works in the primary block program at McDowell. She, like many teachers in Kentucky feels the pressures of KERA but continues to strive to provide quality instruction for her students.

With class sizes going up and down slightly over the years, we finally came to 1993. The new school at South Floyd was supposed to open in the fall of 1992, but construction delays gave the class of 1993 their dream—to graduate from McDowell High School.

Stacy Compton was a member of that class. During her stay at McDowell she had Bob Hall, Phil Paige, and Don Daniels as principals. By the time Stacy graduated, students were doing their class work on computers and video cams, but the old spirit of McDowell was still there.

Stacy is attending Morehead University were she is working on a K-4 teaching certificate.

Is there lead in your tap water?

In Part I, I explained that some PCC students and a few others in the community joined me in a small project to see if our household tap water had any lead in it and, if so, how much. We managed to collect 210 samples of tap water from about 100 homes in ten Eastern Kentucky counties. Included in this total were samples of tap water from the PCC Zoology lab, the first-floor drinking fountain in the Science Building, and the distilled water which was used to rinse the sampling bottles given the students. Of the home samples, half were collected from the (kitchen) tap of each participant at the beginning of the day, before anyone had used it. The other half were collected from the same taps after they had been used for an hour or so. Dr. Vahid Majidi of the University of Kentucky Chemistry Department consented to do the analysis of the samples for no fee. (Normally, it costs \$20 to \$40 for just one sample to be analyzed for lead in a commercial lab!)

A few weeks ago, I received the results. The good news is that, of all the samples analyzed, lead was detected in only four of them (samples #6, #9, #19 & #27). Two of these (#6 and #19) had lead levels which were higher than the 15 parts per billion (ppb) maximum limit for drinking water set by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). All four samples were those which had been taken by the students early in the day, before the taps had been used. No lead was detected in the samples they took from the same taps an hour or so later.

It was a pleasing idea that most of the samples did not show any lead. But, as Dr. Majidi pointed out, if the samples were not treated with nitric acid very soon after they were collected (to stabilize them), the data may not be accurate. On the other hand, the EPA says that water can stand for as long as two weeks (14 days) in their sampling containers before being treated with nitric acid and analyzed for lead, without losing too much in the way of analytical accuracy.

There is no way of knowing for sure how much time passed between when the students sampled their tap water and when they brought it in. Most likely, this is why the EPA prefers sampling to be done by only a few who are reliably uniform in their collection procedures. They note, however, the difficulty they have in getting people to agree to have water-samplers go into their homes before anyone uses their kitchen tap in the morning (Would you agree to it?). Because of this difficulty, EPA data on lead in tap water across the country is not sufficient enough to be helpful in their program strategies concerning lead in drinking/tap water (Federal Register, June 7, 1991). In the PCC project, therefore, we will

just have to assume that the students followed through on their water collections according to instructions!

Most lead in household tap water comes from the leaching out of lead from copper or lead materials used in the plumbing system. If the water is highly corrosive, more lead gets into it. Furthermore, the public water-service line leading into the household plumbing system may also contain lead materials.

In our project, the homes which had lead in their tap water have relatively new household plumbing systems, which would likely rule out indoor plumbing as a source of lead. Interestingly, all four homes are supplied by well water, not city water. Perhaps there is lead in the pipes leading from their wells to their indoor plumbing. Or, maybe, the well water itself is contaminated with lead. In either case, the students, especially those whose tap water had very high lead levels, are advised to exercise wisdom and have their well water sampled for lead and take further measures if necessary. If there is no lead in the well water, then it is likely that the source of lead is in the pipes which lead from the well to the house. This means that the pipes should be replaced. Suffice it to say that the students and their families should not drink the water unless they run it for a long time (i.e., several minutes) beforehand.

In Part III, I will discuss what measures can be taken to insure that your drinking water is free from contaminants such as lead. Stay tuned, and as I say to my students, "Get ready to take some meaningful notes!"

Caffeine: cause for concern?

Many of us have a love-hate relationship with caffeine—or perhaps a love-worry relationship. We enjoy the taste of many caffeinated drinks, and many people rely on caffeine's boost to start their morning or make it through a long day. But we worry about caffeine's reported dangers, and wonder how bad for our health it really is.

Caffeine is sometimes said to raise blood cholesterol or blood pressure levels. However, current research has not found any consistent increase in high blood pressure from greater caffeine consumption, or any decrease in blood pressure among people with hypertension who stop consuming caffeine. Likewise, while some studies have found increased blood cholesterol in particular groups of people drinking five or more cups of coffee daily, no consistent link with total blood cholesterol, LDL ("bad") cholesterol, or HDL ("good") cholesterol levels has been identified.

What about caffeine and cancer risk? Studies in the past suggested that caffeine might increase risk of pancreatic or bladder cancer, but further research has revealed no cancer risk associated with caffeine. Some concern has also been raised about decaffeinated coffee, but there is no evidence that decaffeination processes used today pose any risk.

Caffeine may pose problems during pregnancy, because it is associated in some studies with delays in fetal growth or with increased risk of miscarriage. The Food and Drug Administration has recommended that pregnant women limit use of caffeine, although most researchers note that completely avoiding it does not seem necessary.

People have different reactions to caffeine. Some note greater stomach pains (presumably due to increased stomach acid), heartburn, nervousness or sleep difficulties with increased caffeine. Actually, coffee's effects on the stomach and intestinal tract do not seem to come solely from caffeine, as decaffeinated coffee has many of the same effects.

If your use of caffeine is causing problems for you, or if your physician has recommended that you decrease caffeine, cut back on it gradu-

ally to avoid caffeine-withdrawal headaches. If you choose to continue drinking moderate amounts of caffeine, then put aside worries about its safety. It's more important to focus your attention on establishing eating habits that have a major impact on your health, such as the low-fat diet with plenty of fruits, vegetables and whole grains advocated by the American Institute for Cancer Research.

Where are they now?

Franklin Delano "Set" Branham was a household name back in the late '40s when he starred in the Prestonsburg Blackcats' backfield. Branham left a legacy on the gridiron that is still remembered by Blackcat fans from that era.

Branham, now 66, will be long remembered as the player who became too old to play out the 1948 schedule for Prestonsburg.

"We knew that it (my ineligibility) was coming," he said in a recent telephone interview from his home in Salt Lake City, Utah. "It wasn't any surprise. However, I didn't realize it until I picked up a copy of the Courier-Journal and (a sports story)

said, 'Unless Branham can prove otherwise, tonight will be his last game.'

"We played Ashland that night. It was my last game. I was too old to play after that."

He held several school records when he left the Prestonsburg campus. In 1947, he scored 129 points for the Blackcats.

Branham was chosen as the Most Valuable Player in the Flood Bowl Game in 1947. He was chosen All-Big Sandy the same year.

He was All-Southern, All-State and All-Big Sandy in 1948. Branham was named to play in the East-West All-Star Game, but he chose not to play.

"Coach John Eibner, my high

school coach, said that in the event of an injury, I would lose my college scholarship," recalled Branham.

Eibner was hired as the coach at Miami University and Branham had planned to go with his former coach.

"But, it didn't work out," he said. "Coach Eibner told me that he could get me in at Baylor (Waco, Texas) or at the University of Utah in Salt Lake City. I asked him, 'Where in the world is Salt Lake City?' I've been living here now for 44 years."

He played four years of college

football with the University of Utah where he made All-Conference in 1952. He led the conference in scoring and punt returns that year.

Not only did Branham grace the gridiron, but the basketball court for Prestonsburg where he averaged 23 points per game his senior year. He was named to the third team All-State in 1948. He was the 58th District's Most Valuable Player,

and named to the All-Big Sandy team, and All-District, All-Regional teams in '48.

"Ed Diddle, who coached at the Western Kentucky University, tried to get me to come to Western," said Branham. "Adolph Rupp offered me a scholarship at Kentucky. I turned


Bear Bryant down at Kentucky on a football scholarship. But Rupp and I became good friends, as well as Bryant.

"Actually, Bryant had signed me illegally," said Branham. "My brother Bob had told me when I went to Lexington, not to sign anything. But when I got there, they told me that if I wanted to get a scholarship at Kentucky, to just sign the paper and it didn't mean anything, I signed."

"But later, I told them that I wasn't coming to Kentucky that I was going to Baylor. Bryant let me out of it."

"He put his arm around me before I left his office after sitting


The football stayed in Paintsville's possession almost the entire fourth quarter when they were only able to

there three hours and told me that he would do whatever he could to help me. He's the greatest coach to ever coach the game," said Branham.

The former Blackcat once again found himself honored when he was named to the Kentucky All-Star basketball team. The team was to face the Indiana All-Stars.

Again, he was asked not to play in the game for the same reason he missed the football All-Star game -- fear of injury.

Baseball was a big part of Branham's life when he played for the Blackcats and excelled for Prestonsburg. In 1948 Prestonsburg won the state championship with a team that went 36-0. Branham was named All-State catcher on that team.

After college, Branham played pro football in the Canadian League until an injury to his knee forced him to retire from the game.

"I had to have a total knee replacement," he said. "In the Canadian League there is no blocking. I was hit, and hit hard, on a punt return. It tore my knee up. I was told if I saw daylight (when I was hit), to go with it; if not, get out of bounds. I didn't get out of bounds."

The former Blackcat said that he

never, ever wanted to get into the coaching business.

"I know what to do and how to play the game, but I just didn't have the ability to get it across to the kids," he said.

Branham recalled the time he made the drop kick famous again.

"It was against Pineville and we were behind," he said. "Instead of kicking off a tee, I thought I could do it by drop kicking the football. I did and it went through the uprights from 29-yards out."

"Coach Eibner called me to the side and said, 'What are you doing? That went out in the 1890's. He was glad that I did it, though.'"

Branham said that he has good memories of Prestonsburg and still enjoys coming back.

"Prestonsburg is the greatest town in Eastern Kentucky to me," he said. "When my name was a household word, they treated me like a king. They are still good to me when I come back. It's still a thrill for me to visit there. I have great friends in Prestonsburg."

Branham has since retired from work, but says that he has a couple of things that he is looking into to keep him busy. He is planning a move from Salt Lake City, Utah, to a smaller town.

"It's a town of about 800 people," he said. "That's my kind of place."

Notice of Explanation**

The City of Prestonsburg intends to undertake improvements to construct storm water drainage facilities in the Goble Roberts community within the City's corporate limits. Project elements include construction of 8,620 L.F. of storm water drainage pipes, as well as 43 catch basins, appurtenances, and 5,930 L.F. of sidewalks. These improvements will address drainage problems throughout the community and divert storm water into the Levisa Fork of the Big Sandy River.

These improvements are needed to provide adequate drainage of storm water to alleviate public health and safety problems associated with standing water. This project is located in the 100 year flood plain. Proposed improvements to install storm water drainage structures in the Goble Roberts community cannot be taken in any other location. There is, therefore, no practicable alternative to the proposed project.

The lack of adequate storm water drainage currently causes health and safety problems associated with stagnant, pooling or standing water (growth of mold, mildew and algae, breeding area for mosquitoes and other insects which carry disease, reduction in areas of pavement, parking and sidewalks which ice over in winter months).

Floodplain impact will primarily take place during construction. All drainage pipes will be subterranean and pose no long-term adverse impact. Sidewalk and catch basin construction will assist in mitigating drainage problems and will not pose permanent adverse impact upon the floodplain. Infall and outfall areas will be designed to prevent permanent adverse impact upon waterways caused by siltation and erosion.

Minimization procedures during construction will include siltation barriers, vegetative cover and erosion control measures.

Failure to provide these improvements would result in the continuance of public health and safety hazards caused by lack of adequate storm water drainage. It is the City of Prestonsburg's judgment that the improvements proposed in the Goble Roberts Storm Water Drainage Project outweigh consideration of Executive Orders 11988 and 11990.

The other agency involved in this project is: Department of Housing and Urban Development (Kentucky Community Development Block Grant Program).





Allen Central had taken an 8-0 lead, a lead they held through the first three quarters. The Rebels were very impressive on defense until the fourth period when Elkhorn scored all 16 points.

It was a combination of good defensive plays by Allen Central's Brad Blackburn, Thomas Jenkins and Shawn Robinson.





"Give Howard Schnellenberger two weeks to prepare for a big game and he's going to find a way to win. Look it up."

That from an ex-UK football player and Schnellenberger contemporary who says he will be rooting for the Wildcats Saturday, "but I'm betting my money on Louisville."

The man begged anonymity. Schnellenberger's record with "two weeks to prepare?"

The cover of the University of Louisville football media guide shows pipe-in-hand Howard in repose with hardware from the Fiesta Bowl '91 and Liberty Bowl '93.

But the "two weeks to prepare for a big one" against Tennessee last year did little to change a 45-10 shelling in Knoxville. And UofL's 1992 season opener at Ohio State? Buckeyes, 20-19.

Since coming to UofL,

Schnellenberger's teams are 1-4-1 in season openers on the road.

Louisville, 7-4. After an 0-2 start the Cardinals will string together six in a row, then lose a close one to Boston College and a stampede loss to Texas A&M. UofL will swamp Tulsa.

No bowl bid for an independent with 7-4 howsoever. Except of course, Notre Dame.

Kentucky is going to win eight times and do an encore in the Peach Bowl.

Stop laughing. Here's a synopsis on how:

LOUISVILLE, Sept. 3. Curry's UK teams are 4-0 in season openers at home. Last time Kentucky lost a season opener The Gipper was starting his second term in the White House and Nixon was re-inventing himself, 1985.

UK 41, Louisville 23. Co-players of the game: Randy Wyatt and Moe Williams. Remember these names: Kurt Supe and Donte' Key.

at FLORIDA, Sept. 10. Gators feel the weight of being ranked No. 1 (Street & Smith) ... may be distracted by a date at Knoxville next week ... haunted by last season's last-gasp win in Lexington ... and hunted by Melvin Johnson's skull & crossbones crew.

Not enough in Gainesville.

Florida 31, Kentucky 21. MVP: Jaysuma Simms.

INDIANA, Sept. 17. A score to settle from Hoosiers' 24-8 nose-rub in Bloomington last September. UK has won four of last five from IU in Lexington.

Daymon Carter arrives. He and Moe Williams rush for 100-plus yards each, becoming first UK backs to do so since George Adams and Marc Logan in 1984, (against IU.).

Kentucky 33, Indiana 12. MVP: Carter and Williams.

SOUTH CAROLINA, Sept. 24.

A must win and must be injury-free for Kentucky with trip to Auburn in five days for Thursday night game (ESPN). Because of stunning pass rush, UK's secondary has a field day against Hollywood Steve Taneyhill.

Kentucky 30, S. Carolina 6. MVP: Howard Carter.

at AUBURN, Sept. 29. Tigers are coming off a perfect season and could be again. Last time UK won on The Plains Bill Curry was a kid. A freshman at Georgia Tech, 1961. Enough said.

Auburn 29, Kentucky 7. MVP: None.

at LOUISIANA STATE, Oct. 15. While the Bayou boys play at Florida, Oct. 8 UK enjoys an open date, allowing injuries to heal and Mike Archer to re-tool the defense for his favorite foe. A must win for Curley Hallman.

Kentucky 25, LSU 15. MVP: Reggie Rusk.

AT THE TURN. Curry's team

takes a 4-2 record into the second half, but with no national notice yet, and no bowl speculation. Media herd naysayers churn out reminders that Curry's UK teams are 5-15 in the second half of his four seasons.


Oct. 31, UK came from ahead three times to lose to State, 37-36.



Bassin' with the Pros

PLASTIC GRUBS, NEW INTEREST FROM BASS PROS

Each year, it seems, at least one old lure gets re-discovered by professional bass tournament fishermen. The most recent discovery? The plastic grub, which has been around more than 30 years.

"What happens is that we're constantly looking for a lure or a technique that hasn't been used so we can show the bass something different," explains North Carolina pro Guy Eaker of the Evinrude Outboards Pro Staff. "Very often, all we do is take an old, established lure and use it a different way, which is what we're doing with plastic grubs."

Plastic grubs are basically short plastic worms measuring two to four inches in length. Some have straight tails and others have curled, swimming tails, but all have traditionally been fished with a leadhead jig-type hook.

"The newest way we're fishing grubs is on a Carolina rig," says Eaker, "rigging with a 1/2 ounce sinker and

a 12 to 18 inch leader. It's an excellent lure for fishing off points, around rocks, or in current.

"I use a grub this way when conditions are really tough and the bass aren't biting. I just crawl it along the bottom because it looks like a small crayfish."

Another way Eaker likes to fish plastic grubs is with a light slip sinker as a Texas rig, in which the hook is imbedded into the grub to become

weedless.

"The best way to fish a grub this way is around boat docks and piers where you simply cast, let the lure sink a foot or two, then slowly swim it back," says the Evinrude pro. "With the swimming motion the grub really looks like a small baitfish."

"You can fish plastic worms and lizards the same way, but there are times when the bass want something smaller, and that's when the grub

really pays off."

When he fishes a grub with a slip sinker, Eaker prefers a 1/8 to 3/16 ounce sinker and a 1/0 or 2/0 hook. He normally uses 10 pound test line and a 6 1/2 foot medium heavy spinning rod.

"One of the things that makes the plastic grub such an effective lure is its versatility," continues Eaker. "It's really good when you're fishing extremely clear water, because it's a

small lure. You can also use it with heavier tackle and flip it into brush or weeds just like a jig.

"The heaviest bass I've ever landed with a grub weighed over six pounds and was caught by flipping into heavy vegetation on Lake Chickamauga. Don't let the lure's small size discourage you, because it will attract big bass."

"I think you'll see a lot more of the bass pros discovering plastic grubs

again in the coming year because it really is a good lure."

An extension handle is available from OMC System Matched Parts and Accessories that fits all late model Evinrude and Johnson tiller control electric positioning motors. It's made of aluminum with a nylon sleeve that locks over the tiller handle of the motor, staying secure without screws or bolts. It adds 18 inches of reach to the handle.



TWELVE DOLLAR TOMATOES

Wilma and I didn't raise a garden this year. We had a dandy last year, though. As a matter of fact, we had one of the finest crops of tomatoes you've ever seen. Why, some of them were as big as a baseball, and they were each worth something like \$12.

Of course, \$12 is a rough estimate of their value, but that's got to be close. I mean, if you figure what we spent on the three plants themselves, plus the man hours (at minimum wage) that we spent digging and scraping and weeding the huge 3 x 4 feet solid-rock backyard garden plot, we must have had at least \$108 in those nine vine-ripened, organically-grown beauties.

Anyway, what got me to thinking about gardens was an article in *Newsweek* a couple of weeks ago by Jim E. Riviere, director of the Cutaneous Pharmacology and Toxicology Center at North Carolina State University. (Okay, I confess. I have no earthly idea what it is that he's the director of, but it sure sounds impressive, doesn't it?)

Called "Stop Worrying and Eat Your Salad," the gist of this article was that he'd concluded that today's food is safe to eat; that scientific methods of mass

producing produce is much safer than certain "alarmists" would have the general public believe; that the dangerous pesticides and stuff that at one time cast fear into the hearts of consumers who sliced, diced and prepared their julienne fries, are now subject to advanced food-monitoring systems. Thus, in his

opinion, everything — the produce and the monitoring — has been so improved that there's no longer any danger in stuff we eat that has been grown on big farms away from here. When I was a kid, my dad's benevolence was known throughout Society Row, for not only did he raise enough garden to adequately keep our large family in vegetables all summer long, but he also fed all the widows and elderly in the community. I'm sure he didn't use pesticides.

Riviere addressed this too: "True, if you nurture

your garden with tender, loving care — and no pesticides — you may increase your yield. But how do you feed metropolitan New York by growing produce on small-scale farms and backyard plots? You don't."

Riviere appears so sold on the benignity of modern farming methods that he surmised that produce grown nowadays may even be safer than some of the "natural poisons" found in many common plants. For example, he cited apples, lima beans, cherries, apricots and peaches as having low levels of cyanide. He even suggested that more kids were harmed from choking on grapes and peanuts than were made sick from eating pesticide-treated vegetables and fruit.

I'm not entirely sure whether the man is really talking safety or economics; whether he's saying the food is absolutely harmless, or that we couldn't afford it if it were produced any other way. There's a possibility he just might be right on both counts. While my homegrown tomatoes may have had no chance of being tainted by chemical contamination, at the same time, I'd hate to pay for a visit to a salad bar that featured \$12 tomatoes.

Governor proclaims Sunday as statewide Rondal Hayes Day

On Saturday, September 3, residents of Hueysville will pay tribute to one of their own. A ceremony honoring Rondal Hayes, a life-long resident and leader of the community, will be held at Allen Central High School. The ceremony will include tributes to Rondal and special singing, followed by a reception.

During the ceremony a proclamation signed by Governor Brereton Jones declaring Sunday, September 4, as Rondal Edwin Hayes Day in Kentucky, will be read.

The event is taking place during the Hueysville/Bosco Homecoming on Labor Day weekend, and many of Rondal's family and friends, including former residents of the communities, are expected to attend the ceremony.

Rondal is a reluctant, and modest, honoree. "It ought to be done for somebody else," protested Rondal, who will turn 79 years old on September 7. "I've not done anything. I'm just one of the young'ins here in the mountains."

But according to a book that contains page after page of tributes written by people of Hueysville whose lives he has touched, Rondal's devotion to his community has made a difference.

"You are the person I would like to model my life after," one wrote. Another wrote, "No one can measure the impact your life has made on many young minds as we grew up in Hueysville."

Another writer declared, "You are a giver. You're always doing for others and never asking for anything in return."

Rondal gained his reputation as a giver through his church work at the Church of Christ and his years of working as a storekeeper and postmaster at

Hueysville.

In 1941, Rondal began helping his father, the late Frank Hayes, in the family general store business and in the post office. He also followed in his father's footsteps by becoming involved in the Church of Christ.

He has held various church offices, such as elder, treasurer, teacher of the adult Sunday school class, leader of the church youth group, and church bus driver.

As volunteer youth group leader, Rondal worked as activities director, chauffeur and counselor.

He became a father image for many teen-agers who grew up in the church, married and, because of his influence, are now raising their children in the church, according to his wife Irene, who is also active in church work.

For years, Rondal was an active layman who visited the sick and shut-ins. He also had an active visitation ministry at Golden Years Rest Home at Lackey and he organized their annual picnic at Dewey Lake.

Up until he became ill a couple of months ago,

Rondal still drove the church bus for Sunday

school. He no longer teaches Sunday school classes, but he remains an elder of the church.


"I'm the oldest elder there," he said. "I see that the church runs smoothly, or as smoothly as possible."

Governor Jones authorized the proclamation after Hamlet Lovely of Garrett asked State Senator Benny Ray Bailey to talk to Governor Jones about a Rondal Hayes Day proclamation, said Irene.

"Hamlet is a dear friend of the family," Irene said. "Rondal watched him grow up as a little boy in Hueysville."

The proclamation states that Rondal "has devoted his life to the service of the people of Hueysville through unselfish devotion to the well being of its people... during many decades he has been a community leader, both as a retail merchant and postmaster of Hueysville... he has become a second father to many of the young people of the community through his church work and counseling... and he unselfishly vacated his position of postmaster to devote his time to the reconstruction of the community's Church of Christ... and he never lets a call of help by those in need go unanswered."

The public is invited to the ceremony at Allen Central High School which will begin at 6 p.m. on Saturday night.

I opened the yearbook cover and 15 years of my life disappeared.

Could that skinny high school junior with the Afro hairdo really be me? Most people who know me now probably wouldn't believe it unless they saw my name under the picture.

I can hardly believe it myself, and I lived it.

I relived a lot of my life recently when my mother sent me an arm-load of old school yearbooks. Most of them hadn't been cracked open in at least a decade. My wife and I thought it would be fun to dust them off.

They opened my eyes in more ways than one. In fact, I couldn't shut my eyes that night after viewing them again.

Seeing those familiar faces, even touching the letters on the covers, flooded my head with so many memories I couldn't shut them off to rest.

Looking at my Rowan County yearbook from eighth grade sent me tripping to the day we had a retired substitute teacher so nearsighted that she used a magnifying glass to read.

One of my classmates sent a paper airplane her way that missed her nose by a fraction of an inch.

"Boy," she scowled as she held up her magnifying glass to get a better look.

"The flies are really bad in here today."

Not nearly as bad as we were in some respects.

Another classmate that day demonstrated his near-perfect siren imitation. Right away, most of the heads in the class—including teacher's—turned to the window and the four-lane highway outside to glimpse the ambulance that didn't exist.

"Gee," our substitute teacher said. "I hope no one is seriously injured."

Funny how you can remember those hijinks like yesterday when you couldn't recite from your algebra classes to save your life.

NOT ALL LAUGHS

Turning those old pages also took me back to some of the toughest days of my life—especially my freshman year of high school.

I headed into high school fresh from being president of my eighth grade class. I smiled in my picture taken for the freshman class session.

I wasn't smiling inside, though.

It bugged me that I was popular and accepted mostly because I played sports while kids who didn't dress as nicely as I did or know the right people didn't count.

So I unplugged myself from school society. Ate lunch alone. Frowned a lot. Gambled. Avoided people. Told the girls to get lost—well, most of the time.

I did pay attention to a certain senior who had just broken up with her boyfriend. She asked me twice to invite her to the high school prom.

"Hey cutie," she said. "When you going to invite me to the prom?"

I wanted to tell her "Today, right now. This second. Will you?"

But I didn't.

Such a question from a senior blew me, the freshman, away both times. I just stood there, tried to mumble a response and smiled mostly. I never asked her.

But seeing her picture in the yearbook still made me wonder if she was serious back then.

I finally got over my mad-at-the-world stage and was elected sophomore class president after a friend nominated me as a joke. I transferred to Elliott County High School for my junior year and started over. I met my future wife that year. I made some of the best friends I ever had in a place very dear to me.

But looking at those yearbooks from the late 1970s is about as close as I want to get to being a teenager again.

I miss a lot of people and wonder what happened to many others. And it would be nice to have enough hair left to do the Afro again.

But being that age can leave you feeling like you just walked into the middle of a prize fight.

How do you figure out who you are? Which person do you date next? What are you going to do with your life?

It's difficult enough figuring out which clothes match each day.

It's also hard to believe how much society has changed since I graduated high school in 1980, which seems like last week to me.

The faces staring back at me from my senior yearbook had never heard of AIDS, fax machines, MTV, crack cocaine, Barney or the information highway. We had occasional fights, but nobody brought guns to our high school back then. And sex was a mystery to many of us before we hit junior high school.

Those old yearbooks made me feel like I came from a different world.

Guess they gave me the picture in more ways than one.

Rolling pie crust and pastry

Good pie crust only starts with the recipe. The rest of the secret is in rolling it out and placing it in the pie plate. Start with a rolling pin and a lightly floured cloth-covered surface. Cloth helps to keep the pastry from sticking.

* Flatten ball of dough slightly with your hands. Then, roll pastry from center to the outside edge in all directions. Give pastry a quarter turn, occasionally and lift the rolling pin as it approaches the edge for even pressure.

* Roll pastry about 2 inches larger than inverted pie plate and about 1/4" thick. Take care not to roll too thin.

* To transfer pastry, fold bottom pastry into fourths. Unfold gently in pie plate with point in center, taking care not to stretch pastry.

* Fill bottom pastry, as desired. Repeat with top pastry, cutting slits in top before folding into fourths. Tuck the 1-inch overhang under edge of bottom crust. Pinch top and bottom edges together to seal pastry.

* While fluting decorative edge, press a 2- to 3- inch strip of aluminum foil over fluted edge so that crust doesn't brown too much. Take away foil 15 minutes before end of baking time.

Final touches

You can add your own decorative touch to a 2-crust pie. In place of slits in crust, top with leaf or other shapes cut from pastry scraps. Overlap small cutouts of pastry for a designed edge.

BUTTERY FRENCH APPLE TART

1 jar (24 ounces) applesauce
1/4 cup apricot preserves
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
4 tablespoons (1/2 stick) butter, divided

Butter Crust*
2 1/2 cups peeled, cored and thinly sliced apples

2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice

Preheat oven to 375 F. In a medium saucepan, cook apple sauce over medium heat, stirring frequently, until reduced to two cups, 10 to 15 minutes. Add apricot preserves, vanilla and one tablespoon of the butter; cool, stirring occasionally. Pour into baked Butter Crust (recipe follows). Toss apples with lemon juice. Arrange in concentric circles over applesauce. Melt remaining three tablespoons butter; drizzle over apples. Bake until apples are tender and lightly browned, 40 to 45 minutes, rotating tart after 20 minutes. Cool on a wire rack. Serve warm. Yield: eight portions.

*BUTTER CRUST

1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/3 cup cold butter, cut in chunks
2 tablespoons cold water
1 egg yolk

In a food processor fitted with a metal wing blade, combine flour, sugar and cinnamon. Add butter; process until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add water and egg yolk; process just until mixture leaves the side of the bowl. Or, to prepare by hand, combine dry ingredients in a medium bowl; cut in butter to resemble coarse crumbs; add water and egg yolk; mix well until combined. On wax paper, press dough together into a five-inch circle; wrap and chill at least one hour. Working quickly, on a lightly-floured surface, roll dough into a 12-inch circle. Ease into a 10-inch tart pan with a removable bottom or a nine-inch pie plate; trim or flute edges. Prick bottom with fork tines. Chill until firm. Bake in a preheated 425F. oven for five minutes. Cool before filling. Yield: one crust.

GLAZED BAKED APPLES

1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 1/2 cups water
1 tablespoon freshly squeezed lemon juice
2 tablespoons freshly squeezed orange juice
6 to 8 baking apples
1/4 teaspoon red vegetable coloring

Combine 1 cup of the sugar with cinnamon in saucepan. Add water and strained fruit juices. Bring to a boil, and boil for 5 minutes. Wash medium-sized apples and remove about three-fourths of the core of each apple, cutting from stem end and leaving a solid base. Peel, leaving about 1/4 inch of peel at base. Place in a shallow baking pan and pour boiling syrup over apples. Bake at 375° for about 30 minutes or until apples are tender. Baste frequently. Remove from oven when done.

To remaining 1/2 cup sugar, add the red vegetable coloring and stir with a fork until all sugar is thoroughly colored. Sprinkle tops of each apple with a little of the colored sugar. Put under broiler about 4 inches from

heat. Baste with syrup in pan and continue sprinkling on more sugar until apples are glazed, about 15 minutes.

Remove from broiler and place apples on serving platter. If syrup is still somewhat thin, cook down until quite thick. Pour over apples, filling centers well. Cool until syrup is set, or chill in refrigerator if to be used for a meat accompaniment. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

APPLE PIE A LA ZING

4 cups pared, sliced baking apples
2 cups OCEANSPRAY®
Fresh or Frozen Cranberries
3/4 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup sugar
1/3 cup flour
1 teaspoon cinnamon
3/4 cup chopped walnuts, optional
Pastry for a 9-inch two-crust pie.
Preheat oven to 425°. Combine all ingredients, except pastry, in a medium mixing bowl. Mix well. Pour into a pastry-lined pie plate. Cover with top crust. Seal edges and cut several slits in top crust. Bake 50 minutes or until golden brown. Cover edges with foil if they brown too quickly. Makes one 9-inch pie.

ALL-AMERICAN FRUIT CRUMBLE PIE

Crust
1 cup Quaker oats (quick or old fashioned, uncooked)
3/4 cup all-purpose flour
1/2 cup (1 stick) margarine or butter, melted
1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
Filling
2 cans (21 oz. each) apple or peach pie filling
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
Crumble Topping
1/3 cup Quaker oats (quick or old fashioned, uncooked)
1/4 cup all-purpose flour
1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
3 tablespoons margarine or butter, chilled

Heat oven to 375°F. Lightly grease 9-inch pie plate. For crust, combine all ingredients; mix well. Press evenly onto bottom and sides of prepared pie plate. Bake 12 to 15 minutes or until golden brown. Cool slightly. For filling, combine all ingredients; pour into prepared crust. For topping, combine dry ingredients; mix well. Cut in margarine until mixture is crumbly; sprinkle evenly over filling. Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until topping is golden brown. Serve with ice cream or frozen yogurt, if desired. 8 servings.

WALDORF SALAD

2 cups diced unpeeled apples
1 cup diced celery
1/4 cup coarsely chopped, unsalted, dry-roasted walnuts
1/2 cup raisins or halved seedless grapes
1 teaspoon fresh lemon juice
1/2 cup yogurt cheese*
In a bowl, combine all ingredients. Mix well, cover and refrigerate. Serve cold.

Serve over salad greens. Serves 6.
*To make yogurt cheese, you need 1 16-ounce container plain nonfat yogurt. Place a double thick layer of fine-mesh cotton cheesecloth or paper coffee filters inside a colander that does not rust. Place colander in a deep bowl. (Colander must not touch bottom of bowl.) Pour yogurt into colander and cover with plastic wrap. Refrigerate for 8 hours or overnight. Discard drained liquid and place yogurt in a small bowl. Cover and refrigerate.

COUNTRY APPLE PIE

10-inch Two-Crust Pie Pastry (below)
1 cup sugar
1/4 cup Gold Medal all-purpose flour
3/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
Dash of salt
8 cups thinly sliced pared tart cooking apples (about 8 medium)
4 tablespoons whipping (heavy) cream

*Heat oven to 425°. Prepare pastry. Mix sugar, flour, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt. Stir in apples. Turn into pastry-lined deep-dish pie plate, 9x1 1/2 inches, or regular pie plate, 10x1 1/2 inches. Drizzle with 3 tablespoons of the whipping cream.

*Cover with top crust that has slits cut in it; seal and flute. Brush with remaining whipping cream. Top with leaf or other shapes cut from pastry scraps if desired. Bake 40 to 45 minutes or until crust is brown and juice begins to bubble through slits in crust. 8 servings.

10-INCH TWO-CRUST PIE PASTRY

1 cup shortening or 3/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons lard
2 2/3 cups Gold Medal all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon salt
7 to 8 tablespoons cold water
*Cut shortening into flour and salt until particles are size of small peas. Sprinkle in water, 1 tablespoon at a time, tossing with fork until all flour is moistened and pastry almost cleans side of bowl (1 to 2 teaspoons water can be added if necessary).

*Gather pastry into a ball. Divide pastry in half; shape into 2 flattened rounds on lightly floured cloth-covered surface. Roll pastry.

APPLE BLOSSOM CAKE

1 1/3 c. salad oil
3 eggs
3 c. sifted flour
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. nutmeg
1 tsp. vanilla
2 c. sugar
3 c. chopped apples
1 1/2 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. cloves
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1 c. chopped pecans
Beat together salad oil and sugar. Beat in eggs and apples. Sift together and stir in flour, soda, salt, cloves, nutmeg and cinnamon. Stir in vanilla and pecans. Bake in greased tube pan for 1 hour at 350° degrees. Top with cinnamon icing below.

CINNAMON ICING:

Beat 2 cups powdered sugar, 1/2 cup butter, 1 teaspoon cinnamon with enough milk or cream to make as thick or thin as needed to spread. (Recipe provided by Floyd County Extension Service)

OLD FASHIONED STACK CAKE

7-8 c. plain flour
1 stick margarine, softened
1 lb. box light brown sugar
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. apple pie spice
1 egg
1 c. buttermilk
After sifting flour (you won't use it all) into a large mixing bowl, make a well in the flour. Put in the margarine, sugar, salt, soda, spice, egg and buttermilk. Work into the flour by hand until dough is slightly stiff. Divide

dough into 8 equal portions (about the size of a small teacup), knead on a floured board, then press into greased and floured 9 inch cake pans. Bake layers in 400 degree oven about 10 minutes (until brown). Sift unused flour back into storage container.

Filling:
4 c. fresh or canned applesauce or sauce made from cooked dried apples,
1 teaspoon apple pie spice and sweetened to taste.

Stack up layers with the applesauce between each layer. Do not put applesauce on top player. It's best to stack layers while they are slightly warm, and if allowed to age a day or so in a tight container. (Recipe provided by Floyd County Extension Service)

THREE-USE APPLE ROLLS

4 c. diced (1/4 inch) pared apples
2 c. sugar
1 c. coarsely broken pecans
3 c. flour
2 tsp. baking soda
1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. allspice
1/4 tsp. nutmeg
3/4 tsp. cinnamon
1 c. butter or margarine, melted
2 tsp. vanilla
2 large eggs, slightly beaten

Grease and flour two 1 pound tall coffee cans. In a medium bowl, stir together the apples, pecans and sugar. Let stand 1 hour, stirring often so mixture makes its own juice.

In a large bowl, stir together the flour, baking soda, salt, allspice, nutmeg and cinnamon. Add apple mixture and stir well. Stir in butter and vanilla. Stir in eggs. Turn into prepared coffee cans. Tie a 2 inch wide band of double foil around the top of each. Bake in preheated 325° degree oven until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean—1 hour and 15 minutes. Place cans on a wire rack to cool for 10 minutes. Remove foil. Turn out onto wire rack. Serve warm as a cake, or with a sauce as a pudding; or cold as a tea bread, accompanied if you like with cream cheese. (Recipe provided by the Floyd County Extension Service)

APPLE BUTTER

8 c. cooked apples
5 1/2 c. sugar
1/3 c. vinegar or lemon juice
1/2 c. cinnamon drops
3 drops cinnamon oil
Cook. Stir constantly for 20 minutes. (Recipe provided by Floyd County Extension Service.)



Fall is best time to put nitrogen on your lawn

If you want an attractive lawn next spring, apply nitrogen to your cool-season grass this fall.

"Fall is the best time of year to start applying nitrogen to cool-season grasses such as Kentucky bluegrass and tall fescue," said A. J. Powell Jr., Extension turf specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"Fall and early winter fertilization helps grass recover from summer weather stresses, mechanical injury and pest and disease damage," he added. "One to two nitrogen applications, about four to six weeks apart, is enough for most home lawns."

Powell said grass develops a better root system, becomes very dense, and has much better late fall and early spring color in response to fall nitrogen application. Dense turf with a strong root system is more heat and drought tolerant and combats spring weed invasions.

One disadvantage of spring nitrogen application is that it helps weeds more than the grass, according to Powell.

"Crabgrass and other summer annuals respond to nitrogen much more readily than bluegrass or tall fescue," he said. "Spring and summer nitrogen fertilization increase the need for irrigation, thatch control, weed control chemicals, and possibly disease and insect control chemicals."

Another disadvantage of spring nitrogen fertilization is that it can promote disease development in cool-season grasses, according to Paul Vincelli, Extension plant pathologist.

"Early spring fertilization encourages leaf spot disease in Kentucky bluegrass and late spring fertilization encourages brown patch in tall fescue," Vincelli said.

Powell advised people to take a soil test to determine if phosphorus (P), potassium (K) and lime are needed before fertilizing this fall.

"You can supply the recommended nutrient rates by applying a fertilizer containing only P or K, or by using a complete fertilizer, such as 10-10-10," he said. "Once you have a high level in the soil, little additional P or K usually is needed for several years."

Information on taking soil samples is available through county Extension offices.

Powell said the rate of nitrogen applied is another important consideration.

"A good rule of thumb is to apply one and a half pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet," he said. "The fertilizer analysis will dictate how much fertilizer you will need to get this rate of actual nitrogen."

"For example, you would need 15 pounds of a 10-10-10 to get one and one-half pounds of actual nitrogen. With a 33-0-0, you would need four and a half pounds of fertilizer to supply one and one-half pounds of actual nitrogen."

"Turf quality is based on uniformity more than any other factor," Powell added. "Autumn and early winter weather conditions contribute to cool-season grasses' response to fertilization in terms of texture, density and root growth. Fall fertilization promotes turf persistence and year-around quality."

For more information, consult Extension publications "Principles of Home Landscape Fertilization" (ID-72) and "Lawn Fertilization in Kentucky" (AGR-53). Both are available from your county Extension office.

Blue mold activity minimal in Kentucky tobacco fields

Blue mold poses a minimal threat to treated Kentucky tobacco fields this growing season.

"Most confirmed blue mold was in fields where preventive treatments had not been applied," said Bill Nesmith, plant pathologist at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. "Blue mold developed primarily at isolated sites in fields where conditions were conducive for spore production, such as partial shade and prolonged leaf wetness during the day. Disease activity decreased rapidly with topping and sucker control application."

"Blue mold activity in Kentucky generally is limited to the south central region," he added. "Isolated cases have been confirmed in Casey, Taylor, Wayne and Washington counties."

Nesmith said all blue mold activity in untreated fields appears to be caused by Ridomil-sensitive strains. "All evidence suggests that only the Ridomil-sensitive isolates are present, so far," he said. "Another good sign is a high level of gum on tobacco leaves; this usually correlates with a low level of blue mold activity."

Nesmith said blue mold should not become a significant concern at this late date. "However, he said strong activity in surrounding states could threaten late crops in Kentucky."

"The disease is active on burley tobacco crops in Eastern Tennessee, extreme southwestern Virginia and Western North Carolina," he said. "Spores produced in this region could become a source of inoculum for late crops in Kentucky, depending on wind patterns. Southerly winds over this region could bring spores into Eastern Kentucky; southeasterly

winds could carry spores into the central region."

"With spores around, some late crops could experience the disease," Nesmith added. "The possibility is greatest where crops were overly fertilized, or are in areas highly conducive to disease development. Avoid post-layby nitrogen applications because juvenile tissues are much more susceptible to blue mold than mature tissues."

Since most crops are beyond layby, Ridomil cannot be used. Thus, timely topping and harvest are the best disease prevention options. Top the crop, apply MH-type sucker controls, and allow normal waiting intervals to harvest.

Approaching strange dogs

Whether incidents of dogbites come in multiples or just seem to, because one such incident makes the reporting of a similar incident more likely isn't quite clear—but it does seem that when you hear of an attack by a dog, you'll hear of several more before things settle down.

You'll also not likely see much written down about how to make up to strange or unfamiliar dogs, and only a little more about why dogs bite, the understanding of which is the first step toward avoiding an incident.

So here's some advice on how to make friends with a strange dog.

Imagine you're the mail carrier, or a delivery agent, or just a neighbor coming to pay a welcoming visit. You walk up the sidewalk to the porch and there you notice, for the first time, this huge animal just outside the door.

What do you do?

The obvious first move is to ask the owner if the dog is friendly with strangers. The owner is the best judge of an animal's disposition, and it almost always makes a difference if the owner introduces you and the dog sees you are friends. Assume the owner says the dog is safe.

Use common sense. What would be your reaction if the dog suddenly jumped to its feet, stood up on its rear

feet and grabbed you around the neck with its front paws? You'd probably panic.

Why, then, wouldn't the dog panic if you (who are already standing on your rear feet) attempt to reach for its neck and head area?

Remember that dogs depend heavily on their sense of smell for identification as well as protection. The dog has never seen you, therefore your smell is neutral.

The dog will, first of all, come up to sniff you out. After a short time, close your hand and extend it under the dog's nose, offering it for smelling purposes.

Do not keep your hand open and do not hold it above the dog's head, lest it think you are about to hit it.

In time, the dog will most likely let you know it is ready to be petted.

The key is to go slowly and let the dog set the pace of the introduction.

Remember that dogs may bite when they feel threatened, so don't threaten by being too pushy or impatient. Don't try to take away its toy or its food. If it is asleep, don't awaken it by shaking or poking at it.

If the animal starts to growl or bark, bares its teeth and stands straight-legged with its tail held up, back off.

These are generalities from the handy-dandy library.

More specific information can be obtained from your veterinarian, who is trained in animal psychology and behavior and would welcome the opportunity to help you avoid injury.

The interaction between people and animal is one of the things in which he or she specializes.



Positive Changes in Prestonsburg



Mark Vanderpool explained the power of positive thinking as described in Dr. Patrick Porter's book *Awaken the Genius*.

The first hypnotherapy clinic in Eastern Kentucky, POSITIVE CHANGES of Prestonsburg, opened to clients in August. Mark Vanderpool, Prestonsburg native and certified hypnotherapist, is conducting sessions, mainly for weight control and to stop smoking. According to Dr. Porter, "Our name POSITIVE CHANGES describes exactly what we do. We help people to make positive changes in their lives. Changes are accomplished through the use of hypnosis, so that the conscious mind is in a state of relaxation and perhaps subdued. Then the unconscious mind becomes more aware and suggestions are more readily accepted."

Hypnosis to treat medical conditions is not new. The American Medical Association approved the use of ethical hypnosis in 1958. Since then, hypnosis has gained widespread acceptance and is being used in a multitude of ways at hospitals and care centers in America. The chair of

Anesthesiology at Mount Sinai Medical Center says, "Hypnosis is a valuable tool in managing chronic pain and certain diseases. For pain like migraine headaches it is the most potent weapon we have."

Hypnosis is also effective in improving sports performance Vanderpool said. "Research in the field of sports psychology has indicated to us that five minutes of effective mental rehearsal of the perfect performance is worth more than two hours of rote practice drills," says Vanderpool.

"What we would do in the therapy center is train the aspiring athlete to use mental exercises such as focused guided imagery to produce outstanding results on the field and to produce those results consistently."

"All serious athletes occasionally experience what might be called a 'peak state'—that moment of white hot intensity where everything just falls into place unconsciously and automatically and the performance is flawless and seems effortless. With the right mental training to supplement the physical practice, the conditions for peak performance can be duplicated more consistently."

Vanderpool adds that "Our student success program is one of my favorite areas to work in. Much of what applies to a stunning athletic performance can also contribute to a stellar academic performance. Much of what I do in my work with students comes directly from the material in Dr. Porter's book *Awaken the Genius*. Soon we will be doing an *Awaken the Genius* seminar here in Prestonsburg and that will enable many people to benefit simultaneously from this high quality material. Currently, the ATG material is being implemented in a number of different school systems on the secondary level and starting this fall it will be part of some of the developmental courses at Prestonsburg Com-

munity College."

When asked about what has drawn him into this field, Vanderpool responded, "I have long held a keen interest in human potential and in helping people improve the quality of their lives. I didn't always have a clear sense of the best way to live that purpose and I have perhaps chased down few blind alleys along the way; however, ultimately, all of my experience has contributed to my learning, evolution and growth, and I'm now able to do exactly what I've been preparing for the last eight years."

Caring For The Cancer Patient At Home

(NAPS)—Here, for a change, is some good news about cancer. Not only is science making progress against many forms of the disease, the American College of Physicians—a nonprofit professional association of internists—has created a guide to help family and friends care for cancer patients while they're at home.

The 426-page workbook contains 21 plans for dealing with problems such as pain, nausea, fatigue, hair loss, changes in sexuality, anxiety and depression. It also has information on caregiver needs, getting information from medical staff and using community resources. Each topic is presented in a problem-solving format to help the reader analyze the situation, decide if professional help is needed and work toward a solution.

The guide says:
• **Successful caregivers** are informed, creative and optimistic. They take care of themselves with proper diet, rest and relaxation. They help maintain a positive outlook by doing things they enjoy. They don't dwell on mistakes or expect to be perfect.

• **Fight fatigue** by planning short activities for times when the patient feels best; and allow time to rest in between. Agree on what's most enjoyable or necessary to get done each day.

• **React to depression;** don't ignore it. Try to find something that is going right. Try to

increase the patient's social activities.

- **Stimulate appetite** by using plastic utensils, which take away a bitter or metal taste associated with chemotherapy, and using small plates and portions. Encourage the patient to eat with others.
- **Minimize nausea** with dry crackers, cold food and ginger ale.
- **Combat weight loss** by offering frequent snacks, using more butter and sugar in cooking and enriching whole milk with nonfat dry milk.

Fatigued? It could be CFS

It feels like the flu, but the side effects never subside. Mild fever, sore throat, body aches, chronic headaches, joint pain and general listlessness are a few of the symptoms characteristic of chronic fatigue syndrome (CFS). CFS is a physical illness of unknown origin, distinguished only by debilitating fatigue and flu-like symptoms.

Profound fatigue—the hallmark of the disorder—usually comes on suddenly and persists or relapses throughout the course of the illness. Unlike short-term fatigue, however, which may accompany illnesses such as the flu, CFS symptoms linger for at least 6 months and often for years.

Chronic fatigue syndrome is not simply feeling tired. CFS is not even exhausted. Victims of CFS are completely debilitated by the illness and almost all everyday activities are next to impossible. Many people afflicted with CFS find it difficult to even raise their heads for more than a few seconds and a trip from the bed to the bathroom may leave them exhausted for hours. Some CFS victims are forced to take naps during meals in order to get enough energy to eat.

"It is important to be sure to properly diagnose patients with CFS," said Jane J. Xenos, D.O., a Santa Ana, Calif., osteopathic family physician and clinical professor at the College of Osteopathic Medicine of the Pacific in Pomona, Calif. "It is vital for a physician to explore all the symptoms of the patient, including the degree of their fatigue and the results of physical and laboratory examinations, before confidently diagnosing CFS."

Many CFS victims feel the need to slow the pace of their lives and avoid situations that are physically or psychologically stressful. Complete avoidance of activity is not healthy either so it is important for the physician interaction at whatever level the patient can manage without exacerbating the symptoms.

"As a physician, it is critical to be on the lookout for unrelated medical problems, and avoid the danger of interpreting every new sign or symptom as a manifestation of CFS," said Dr. Xenos. "The physician must always be alert to the patient's changing condition, especially because CFS typically dominates such a large portion of the victim's life and sometimes may be able to overshadow additional medical problems."

There is no universally accepted treatment for CFS. In fact, sometimes several different treatment approaches may need to be tried before the patient reaps any benefit. Although most people do recover from CFS, the route back can take months or years, and many never regain full health. The key is to recognize CFS symptoms early and schedule regular medical check-ups to monitor the illness.

Is less better?

Today people are taking a renewed and proactive consumer attitude toward health care. It is demonstrated by an increased willingness by patients to ask their doctors the hard questions. It is more far-reaching than just health care plans and the necessity of medical tests. It has reached the most basic level — the need for prescription medications.

If you aren't already asking your doctor why and how much do I need of this medication, now is the time for you to feel comfortable and empowered to do just that.

There is a new catch phrase in long-term disease control with medication. It's called step-down therapy. Very simply it means that when a disease, such as high blood pressure, has been under control for a period of time by a certain dose of medication, it may be time for you to ask your doctor if a lower dose might be just as effective.

According to the Joint National Committee on Detection, Evaluation, and Treatment of High Blood Pressure, the doctor's treatment plan for a patient should include attempts to decrease the dosage of high blood pressure medication while maintaining life-style modifications such as weight control, sodium reduction, and exercise.

This new concept has proven highly effective with many medications for other diseases, such as chronic depression. For the millions of Americans on daily medication for disease control, step-down therapy offers an opportunity to do more than save money. It also means taking less medication, which may lower the risk for experiencing harmful side effects.

If you are on daily medication, ask your doctor if less would be just as effective. You have the right as a patient and consumer to be kept informed and keep your medications at the safest and lowest effective level.

Permanent lifestyle change equals permanent weight loss

Most Americans have a desire to weigh less. Many try dangerous fad diets to lose the five to 10 pounds that they gained over the holidays. However, they usually end up adding the weight back on, plus an additional five to 10 pounds after they go off the diet.

Why is this? Primarily it is the false belief that weight loss can be achieved through a temporary lifestyle change. But permanent weight loss is achieved through a

permanent change in lifestyle. These lifestyle changes usually include a reduction in the number of calories

from fat in your diet as well as an increase in regular physical activity.

The reason a low-fat diet promotes weight loss is because fat is more calorically dense than protein or carbohydrates. Thus, a low-fat diet will satisfy your appetite while you are consuming fewer calories. Also, fat calories are more easily digested and turned into body fat than protein or carbohydrate calories.

The best activities for weight loss are cardiovascular exercises such as

biking, liftings, rowing, walking, running, and other continuous activities. For optimal results, exercise continuously at least 30 minutes at least three days per week. This activity should be sustained at an effort level at which an individual could hold a conversation (but not sing).

The longer an individual exercises, the higher the percentage of the calories being used comes from body fat.

Also, the lower the intensity of the exercise, the higher the percentage of calories being used during exercise comes from adipose (fatty) tissue. The individual may use fewer calo-

ries during moderate intensity physical activity, but more of the calories are coming from adipose tissue.

During moderate physical activity lasting 30 minutes or more, 70 percent of the calories used come from adipose tissue versus only 20 percent of the calories used come from adipose tissue during high intensity physical activity lasting five minutes.

In conclusion, permanent weight loss is not best achieved through diet alone. A permanent lifestyle change including a low-fat diet along with regular physical activity will result in

an individual reaching and maintaining ideal body weight.

Tip of the Week: Use reduced fat margarine and skim milk when baking.

Rebels hope playoff berth is in '94 season picture

Be careful if you denote a tender spot in this year's Allen Central football team.

They are still smarting over last season when they just missed making the playoffs by dropping a 35-34 road loss at Phelps.

The Rebels finished 4-6 last year, but it was a stronger 4-6 than anyone realized.

"The Phelps game was a big disappointment to all of us," said defensive lineman James Osborne. "We had some good plays and we had some bad ones, too. We should have won the game because we had the potential to win it."

Coach Glenn Reeves ballclub was young last year and still competed. Fans are wondering what will happen in 1994 with more experience returning.

"We're faster and stronger this year," said Osborne. "We'll have a little better line, although we will be smaller in size. But we will have more speed and muscle this year."

The Rebels lost 12 players from last year's squad, the biggest name being Glenn Floyd, who just dominated out of the backfield.

Coach Reeves will have revamp his entire backfield behind Adam Coleman (5'10", 155), who replaced Brad Blackburn (6'0", 165) at quarterback midway in the season last year.

Coleman, like most first-year quarterbacks, got his baptism early and proved that he could, as a sophomore, throw the football with some accuracy, but according to the Allen Central coach, Blackburn is hot on Coleman's heels.

"Right now Adam's our top quarterback," said the Allen Central mentor, "if he keeps up the good work. He is a very enthusiastic player and seems to be taking the leadership role."

"But we have Brad right back on his heels again. He would like to take that position back."

Blackburn had started at the signal calling spot since he was a freshman until midway of the season last year. But according to Coach Reeves, Blackburn has shown more promise this year.

"When someone like Brad challenges Adam, that makes him want to work hard and that is good for the team," he said. "Brad has been impres-

sive in camp and practice."

Josh Reeves (6' 0", 185), Gordon Reeves (6' 0", 155) and Shane Blackburn (5'10", 135) is also getting a look at the quarterback slot. The Allen Central coach is not taking any chances if one of his two quarterbacks goes down.

"You have to have someone that can at least hand off the football on a running play," he stated. "We don't want to be caught in that situation where we don't have anyone."

Out of the backfield, the feature back will be Beau Tackett (5'7", 165 sophomore), who Coach Reeves is very excited about.

"Beau will be our feature back this year," he said. "He's going to be a good one. He is strong and he runs the football so well."

Joining Tackett in the backfield will be Gordon Reeves, who Coach Reeves says is going to surprise a lot of people.

"We watched him in camp this year and he is coming along real good. He will impress you. He has natural ability and has some good speed," he said.

At fullback will be Josh "The Plow" Reeves. "They call him 'The Plow' because he will run right at you and over you."

Allen Central experimented with moving lineman Shawn Robinson (6'3", 245) in the backfield but the move was short-lived.

"I tried to run the football in camp this year but Coach Reeves said that I was needed more on the line," said Robinson.

"He is such a big kid and an outstanding defensive player that we needed him more up front than in the backfield," said Reeves.

Osborne, who played in the backfield last year, will also find himself on the line both ways.

"I don't have any hard feelings about the move to the line," said Osborne. "We're hoping to have a winning season this year and that's our goal."

Chris Bailey (6'3", 235, sophomore) will anchor down the center spot on the offensive line. "That is where it all starts," said the Allen Central coach. "A good center has to be solid and Chris played there for us last year. He's getting better but he's still young. I think he can come on for us."

At one offensive guard will

be Osborne. "James is a big kid that can run," said Coach Reeves. "So, we needed to move James up there to help us out."

Robinson will be at the left tackle. "He's a heck of a blocker," said Reeves. "He has good technique."

Levi Wells (6'0", 245, sophomore) will play one tight end position with Blackburn hanging out at the other.

"Brad will also help out in

blocking situations," Reeves said. "Both are good blockers."

A new kid on the block, Phillip Robinson (6'1", 240, sophomore) will work in at a guard slot. "He has good size and he is going to do a good job for us."

Senior Jy Shepherd (6'3", 265) will be at a tackle position.

"Jy is a senior and an enthusiastic player," said Coach Reeves. "He doesn't have the

speed the others have but he's a big kid. He has good size and he can keep them out."

Shepherd said that the Rebels should be a playoff team this year.

"We're seniors this year and it will be our last year on the field," he said. "I think we should go to the playoffs. Not just go, but seed deep. We've been working hard all year. We went to camp and if you can pass camp, we can sure win a few ball games back here."

Thomas Jenkins (6'3", 175, sophomore) will play the tight end slot or split end.

"Enough has been said about Thomas," said Coach Reeves. "He's got the hands, the ability and speed to have a great season."

"This year he has been concentrating more on his blocking and it will make him tougher for basketball," Reeves stated.

Jenkins said that the team has adjusted to Coach Reeves philosophy and the Rebels are ready to run.

"We came in last year and Coach Reeves was new," he said. "Nobody was used to his style. Now we're getting used to it and things are looking better."

"The team overall is a lot stronger. This year we will be a strong team in our district."

Jenkins explained that hitting the weights in the off season has made the team stronger.

"We now have a nice facility to lift weights in," he said. "Coach is just practicing us real hard."

The sophomore tight end said that a week in camp this summer seemed to bring the

team closer. "We'll do what we have to do to win this year."

On the defensive side of the football, Osborne will be at the nose guard slot where Coach Reeves expects him to give some center problems.

"James mixes it up good in there," he said. "He's quick and fast and he will give some center some trouble."

Mark Varney (5'10", 195, sophomore) will be at a tackle when the Rebels need down size.

"Mark plays with a lot of heart," said Coach Reeves. "He has good quickness."

The other side will find Shepherd in position but Coach Reeves doesn't necessarily want Shepherd to go both ways.

"We want to give him rest

when we can," he said.

Robinson will be at a defensive end slot with Wells at the other.

Josh Reeves and brother Gordon Reeves will be at line-backer slots.

"Josh is a mash mouth type of player," said Reeves. "He likes to mash it up. He will hit you and Godon will also."

"Gordon lacks a little bit in size but we want to get him in there where he can come on and play."

Where help is really needed for Allen Central will be on the speciality teams. Jenkins will be the last line of defense for the Rebels while he roams at free safety. "I always wanted to go with a tall basketball player as my free safety," said Reeves. "Thomas has good speed and he's tall."

At the corners will be Matt Varney (5'10", 160, sophomore). Craig Crace will be the other.

"Craig came on and showed us a lot of things in camp this year."

Coach Reeves stated that he had three sophomores that will be at defensive back.

"We may get burnt," he said. "Traditionally Allen Central has been able to hold the line, but they just get burnt long."

"In our secondary, we're concerned," he said. "We were last year. But this year we're more aggressive."

Jenkins will handle the kicking for the Rebels this season. Coach Reeves said that he has shown a lot of promise at the slot.

"He's been able to get down on the 5-yard line," he said. "We cannot allow the other team to start on our 20-yard line. Thomas has been doing a good job there."

Blackburn will do the punting for the Rebels. Coach Reeves said that Blackburn averaged 40 yards last year. "Overall, our speciality teams look good," said Reeves.

Gary Webb (6'0", 155, senior) and Mark Varney will handle the field goal attempts.

"If we have to go long we will go with Jenkins," he said.


Coach Reeves said that he will continue to work on the speciality teams and his offense before his team takes the field against Elkhorn City August 26.







Defense will spell Bobcats' season

Optimism is running high in the Betsy Layne Bobcats' football camp and the optimism can be justified after a 5-5 season last year.

An optimistic attitude can be further justified because the Bobcats will return their entire offensive line and all are seniors.

Coach John Derossett has put his team through the "mill" this past summer and he is optimistic, though guardedly so, that the Bobcats will have another fine season.

"In the winter we were real good in the weight room, real good in summer conditioning," he said. "For this team to be successful, we've got to take the weight room and summer conditioning and apply them to the game."

Derossett thinks that his team has good overall strength this year with fair speed.

"Compared to last year, we have better speed," he said. "We are going to be a strong team physically. That, too, needs to be applied to the game."

A 5-5 finish last season was the best the Bobcats have enjoyed in several years. "That was a good year for

us," said Derossett.

But the Betsy Layne mentor said that with a few breaks his team could have enjoyed

a possible 7-3 season.

"We were close to being 7-3. This year we would like to take it one better than that. We'd certainly would like to have a winning season."

Players usually set personal goals, as well as team goals, when a new season rolls around. Derossett said that an attitude of determination to meet those goals highlighted camp this year.

"Lot of the kids have written goals about doing better than last year," he commented. "I know these kids and they are fully capable of doing just that."

"But at the same time, it's like turning over your hand. We could be 8-2 or 2-8. We could have a 7-3 season or go 3-7. It depends on how hard we work in practice and how hard we go out and tackle in the game."

"I think the key to it is Betsy Layne going out and getting on fire early, too; Betsy Layne going out and getting on people early; Betsy Layne getting up and staying up," said the Betsy Layne

mentor.

While the offensive line returns intact this year, the defensive side of the football team will not lag far behind. In fact, the Bobcat coach thinks the line will be stronger than expected.

"We will be pretty strong on defense," he said. "I think we will have a good defensive line. We have some strong players returning that are quicker. They have played in the system for a while now so we should have a fairly good line."

On the defensive side, Betsy Layne will run the 5-3 with the "Mud Creek Boys" at the linebacker slots. Rocky Hamilton (5'7", 180, senior) will anchor the left linebacker position, while Jarrod Newsome (5'9", 165, sophomore) will be on the right side. In the middle will be Jason Hamilton (5'7", 246, senior).

"Those three can line up and play a little bit," said Coach Derossett. "They all three do a great job."

Questionable this time of the year is the Bobcats' secondary.

"Those who saw the Magoffin County game have questions. We have good players back there and they are good athletes."

Willie Meade will be in the secondary and will be able to use his basketball skills in football.

"Willie is a great athlete," said Coach Derossett. "He's just got to take his athletic ability and transfer it to the football field. He's going to be a great football player."

Craig Hamilton (5'9", 140, sophomore) will split the quarterback duties with Brent Akers (5'9", 170, senior). Derossett said that "right now, one is not any better than the other."

"Brent may throw the ball a little bit better. But I'm confident in their abilities. We don't really say who's going to start. I may give one the nod just before the game and say, 'You're at quarterback.'"

Derossett was quick to note that both are running backs playing the quarterback slot.

"We'll be all right there," he said. "It will take some time in throwing the football. But our running game is solid."

In the backfield will be Rocky Hamilton, who will be playing only his third year on the gridiron.

"Rocky's Rocky," said

Derossett. "His name says it all. He's hard. He's tough. For a kid that's just played three years of football, he's developed more football skills in three years than anybody I have ever seen as far as organized football goes."

Derossett said that it was a shame that Hamilton hadn't played years earlier, because he could have been a greater player.

"If this kid had played when he was in the fifth grade, I don't know where he would be right now. He's a great football player."

Chris Hicks (6'1", 180, junior) has been impressive in preseason and will get a shot in the backfield.

"Chris has looked good in scrimmage for us," the Betsy Layne coach stated.

Another newcomer who is expected to help the Bobcats is Wesley Collins, who came out late.

"He has good wheels," said Derossett. "He can run. He needs to apply it to the football field."

Last year defensive guard, Jason Hamilton, will be converted to the fullback slot. Jarrod Newsome will also carry the football at times for the Bobcats, as will Rodney Hamilton (6'2", 242, senior).

"Rodney probably has more talent than anyone on this team," said Derossett. "He could be an outstanding fullback."

A couple of heavyweights will anchor down the Bobcats' defensive line. "Bubba" Combs (6'4", 290, senior) and Shannon Hall (5'10", 295, senior) will form one of the best weight lifting lines around.

"We're the greatest weight lifting line you've seen," said Derossett.

Add John Hall (6'3", 305, senior) to the picture and you have a strong trio.

Technique-wise, Derossett says that sophomore Stewart Hall (5'8", 220) is his best offensive lineman.

"He doesn't look like anything, but he puts himself in good position to play," the Bobcat coach said.

Depth on the both lines will be a plus this season for the Bobcats.

"We will go two deep there this year," Derossett said. "We won't lose much when we come in with other players. We can send in Brad Kimbler (6', 237, sophomore) for Combs and let him rest a series. We have Shawn Keathley (6', 240, sophomore) and some other real good sophomores. We don't lose much mileage there."

Coach Derossett feels that he has as good a line as there are "in the mountains."

"But they got to get down in that uncomfortable position, play football and hit hard. We will be good on the offensive line."

Rodney Hamilton, who Coach Derossett describes as a very good athlete, will be at the nose guard slot on defense. World-lifter, Shannon Hall will also see time at the nose guard spot.

"Shannon can lift the world," said Derossett. "He's so strong."

On the left side at defensive tackle will be Combs, who probably had his best game against Fleming-Neon in scrimmage this year.

"He stood people up," said Derossett. "He played both sides of the football and just did a great job."

Derossett stated that positions on the right side of the line are up for grabs.

"It's there for whoever wants it," he said. "Darrin Reynolds (5'10", 214, sophomore) did a great job for us there. Rodney and Bubba have a lock on the left side, but the right side is open."

Tim Hunt (5'11", 210, junior) will be at the center position. "Tim is one of the hardest workers on our team," said Derossett. "He comes to work every day. Some players are up or they are down, but Tim is on an even flow. He's getting better everyday."

Stewart Hall will play the left guard spot. Keathley will be at left tackle. "Big" John Hall will be on the right side.

Betsy Layne's coaching staff has worked hard during camp on the speciality teams.

Combs will handle the kicking and has been averaging 40 to 50 yards.

"I hope we can get that kind of kickoff in a game," said Derossett. "Really, we have to emphasize speciality teams. In the grids you don't get much of a chance to work on those."

Derossett said that he wants the Bobcats to dominate that aspect of the game.

"We're a ball-control offense," he explained. "We like to control the ball and move up and down the field. Our philosophy is keep the ball and keep the clock."

Good sound defense is vital to this team, according to Derossett. "We have to play that good defense and, sooner or later, we will push the ball into the endzone."

"That's all we talked about this summer is good solid

defense."

Running back Rocky Hamilton would like to rush for a 1,000 yards during this, his last year.

"That is a personal goal that I have set for myself," he said. "That and I would like to lead the county in scoring."

The third-year player thinks that the Bobcats will be a surprise team this year and that a perfect season is not unrealistic.

"I think we have a real good chance to be 10-0 this year," he said. "If we beat Paintsville, it will put us on the map."

Hamilton said that the Bobcats will return their entire offense line and that will be a very strong area for them.

"We hit the weights hard this summer and everyone is coming back off the offensive line. John Hall and Jason Hamilton are going to be a big help to this team. Brent Akers will be the lead blocker for me this year. Tim Hunt — we will depend on him a lot."

Hamilton said that the Bobcats have a winning attitude this year and that two sophomores, Stewart Hall and Shawn Keathley, will help the team.

"Bubba" Combs is one of the top defensive players in Eastern Kentucky and should draw a lot of attention from colleges this year.

Combs thinks last year's 5-5 finish is just the start of a strong tradition that will be at Betsy Layne for years to come.

"We're going to be a lot better this year," he said. "We've all been together so long."

While it was a disappointment that the Bobcats did not make the playoffs last year because of sitting out the district, it has become a motivat-

ing factor for Combs this year.

"It was tough to see teams like Pikeville, Prestonsburg and Phelps make the playoffs and we didn't. We beat Phelps last year and still they were in the playoffs."

Combs says that he intends for the disappointment to be an incentive this year to go


out and play harder.

With defense set, Blackcats must fill holes in backfield

The year 1993 was Prestonsburg High School football team's finest hour. Or make that year. The Blackcats were almost unstoppable through 15 weeks of an outstanding season.

Except for the 13-12 setback at the hands of Mayfield in the Class 2A championships, the Blackcats were unstoppable.

To say that Prestonsburg lost a host of talent from their 14-1 team is to put it mildly. Gone due to graduation are Kyle Fitzpatrick, Ryan Elliott and Kevin Vaughn off the defensive side. Gone out of the backfield is the trio that carried the football: Seth Hyden, Dwayne Garza and Jody Cornette.

Prestonsburg coach Bill Letton says the Cats' defense is in place, but there are some holes to fill in the offense.

"Defensively, we seem to be a lot further ahead than our offense," he said. "That's probably due to the fact that we were able to fit people into slots easier defensively than offensively."

Coach Letton said that the Prestonsburg coaching staff was still trying to experiment with some different combinations in the backfield and the line of scrimmage.

"Against South Laurel (a scrimmage game), I think we played really well," he said. "We had a little hard time moving the football offensively."

"We did a lot of experimentation. We hope to have those things worked out before the first game."

The Prestonsburg coach knows that his team will be on the hunt list this year after advancing to the state finals last season. But that doesn't bother him or the team. In fact, they prefer it that way.

"I rather have it up there — our name — and people gunning at me, than to be down at the bottom and gunning at somebody else."

"We realize the fact we're not going to sneak up on anybody," he said. "We've got to be prepared every week, and especially this year when it looks like our district is absolutely wide open."

Prestonsburg is trying to work many different combinations on their offensive line and several players will be looking at new positions this year.

"We're using Larry Morris and Mike Shepherd on the

line of scrimmage and in the backfield," said Letton. "If they're not in the backfield, then they will be on the line of scrimmage at the guard slots."

Letton said that the two stable positions on the offensive line belong to Jason Spencer at center and Tim Lewis at tackle.

Last year's nose guard, Paul Collins, will be moved to the other offensive tackle for now Letton said.

"If we move Larry or Mike to the backfield, we're looking at bringing in John Layne and Ricky Johnson off the bench. They're getting some quality playing time," he said.

Coach Letton likes this year's defensive line and expects a repeat of last year's performance.

"We're pretty well solid up front," he said. "Collins is set at nose guard and Lewis and Jason Spencer at tackle."

While those positions are set, the end spots will be filled by three vying for the spots.

"We have three people who can play the two positions," he said. "Tim Layne, John Lyons or Nathan Hall. All three will see some time there. We feel like that group is playing pretty well right now."

Junior Thomas Ratliff is a fixture at the quarterback slot. Despite an injury, Ratliff has been impressive.

"Thomas has had a real good preseason," said Coach Letton. "He has a pulled thigh muscle and that's a nagging thing. But he's throwing the football a lot better."

Letton explained that the Blackcats will look to put the football in Ratliff's hands this year a little bit more than last.

"We'll let him run the triple option and let him make some decisions back there for us," he said.

Robbie Risner will see playing time at fullback with Blake Leslie running at tailback. Flanker position will be filled with Chad Spurlock, but Letton is not ready to settle on the three alone.

"But there many others that we have been using back there," Letton explained. "John Morris, Larry Morris, Mike Shepherd, Brian Jones, Jason Blackburn, Tim Layne and others. We just want to give them all a good look."

Gavin Hale has impressed the Prestonsburg coach at tightend. "Gavin has done a real good job for us there," he said. "He needs to work on his blocking more. He's aggressive enough. He just needs to work on his posi-

tioning and foot work a little bit. But he's been working hard on that."

First-year player Ryan Ortega will use his athletic abilities to fill the other end spot.

"He's just a good athlete," Letton said. "He can do something with the football. So we're trying to give him some

opportunity and get the ball to him quick.

"We want to let him get in the open field because he has such good speed."

Letton stated that the Blackcats' speciality teams are in need of hard work, but he is confident that they will come around because they will be a big part of the

makeup of this year's team.

"We've got to work hard on our speciality teams as we did last year. Losing some of the fire power that we had on offense, we've got to compensate for that somehow. One way we can is with quality speciality teams."

Letton explained that good field position was vital for this year's team.

"We've got to be a good field position team. That's the way you do it with good defensive speciality teams."

Ratliff will do the kicking for the Blackcats this season, although the Prestonsburg coach doesn't want him to do the kicking off.

"He probably couldn't handle the extra points with his bad leg," said Letton. "Mike (Shepherd) will do the punting."

Coach Letton is looking for new kid Ortega to be a very pleasant surprise for the Blackcats this year.

"We have some more young players who are going to get to play some quality minutes. I have been real pleased with their efforts. You will see a lot of new faces out there this year and we're expecting big things from all of them."

The veteran football coach likes five to six teams that could win their district this year and he feels that no one will go untouched.

"Several teams have legitimate shots at winning the district this year," said Letton. "I don't see anyone going undefeated in the district."

Returning players makes Whitesburg a legitimate contender.

"They have got a lot of players back from last year, primarily on the defensive side," he said. "When we played them, they started seven sophomores and they held us to 16 points. They are going to be a strong contender."

With the return of a healthy Rusty Fletcher, Letton sees Sheldon Clark coming back in the contender picture.

"They will have a real strong football team again," he said. "We played them last year with Fletcher and he's a quality player."

"They have two transfers from Paintsville (the Marcum brothers) and I heard some other players transferred in. They will be ready to play."

The surprise of the district, according to Letton, could very well be Magoffin County.

"They will be a big sur-

prise this year," he said. "They have turned some heads this summer in passing scrimmages. They made a good showing in the South Floyd gridorama."

While M.C. Napier will once again be a school after consolidation was postponed, Letton thinks that the Navajos will still be tough.

"They always have a huge defensive line," he said. "They moved the Dixon boy to a running back and that's going to make them more versatile on offense."

"Morgan County had the kid that I was very impressed with last year at quarterback," he stated. "It's just going to be wide open with five to six teams really mixing it up."

Winning the first four games will not be an easy task for the Blackcats, but that is the way Letton prefers it.

"The first four are going to be tough for us," he said. "We open with Pikeville and every one knows the tradition they have. We then go on the road to play Lafayette and I don't know yet what they have. They have some talented athletes and throw the ball a lot."

Prestonsburg will return home to host Whitesburg before traveling to Belfry.

"That's four tough ones to start with," he said.

Prestonsburg will face district opponents Whitesburg, Sheldon Clark and Shelby Valley at home and Letton doesn't minimize the importance of all three games.

"Those three games are must-wins for us," he said. "We have to be ready to play hard, not only here, but on the road as well."

The Prestonsburg mentor is still basking in the dramatic win that his ballclub won over then-undefeated Danville last year.

"No doubt it was the biggest win for me," he said. "It probably was the most active that I have ever been on the sidelines. It will be tough to top that one, but maybe we can."

Letton said this year's ballclub will have to play strong defense.

"We need to solidify our offense and we're got to fill in our backfield. We have got players who are ready to step in and do just that."

Coach Letton said that this year's Blackcat team can repeat a return trip to Louisville.

"If we can improve our speciality teams, we can be right back."







Good luck to all Floyd County teams

With consolidation over, South Floyd hopes for good season

South Floyd High School will begin their second year of existence this season and Coach Donnie Daniels is hoping for a better 'second-time' around than the first.

The Raiders failed to win a game last year, finishing the season at 0-10. But Coach Daniels thinks the 1994 season will be different.

"Biggest thing for this team this year is conditioning," he said. "We're a team that always has to play our way into shape."

The numbers are down for South Floyd this year after dressing 60 last year.

"We're down to between 35 and 40 kids this year," said Coach Daniels. "I think the reason we had a big turnout last year was on account of the consolidation."

"That contributed to the season last year. I wanted to ease things over between the two schools and make a good transition. It kind of got away from me and I'm trying to clean that up this year."

Daniels said that some of the players will have to go both ways and conditioning is very important when the numbers are down.

"I want to emphasize that more this year," he said. "We are improving at offense though. We still don't have great foot speed. But we're better overall than last year."

Daniels said that foot speed and quickness will be major points in his team winning some ball games this year.

Youth will highlight this ballclub since they are predominantly sophomores and freshmen.

"We're going to be very young," said the Raiders' mentor. "We have a great sophomore class and a good freshman class that came in this year. I'm pleased with the kids that came out, but we would like to had more."

Coach Daniels stated that those that did come out will work their way into some playing time on the freshman level.

"We're still in the growing stage. Any time you start a new school, you're going to be in a growing stage," he said.

The veteran coach said that over the years (including the Wheelwright years) he has seen much improvement. In his first year at Wheelwright the Trojans won one game, went on a three-game losing

streak, came back with another win.

"We then lost one and ran off three straight wins," he said. "After that everything just seemed to take off for us."

The following year the Trojans won their first three games of the season and last year Coach Daniels said it didn't seem his team came out of the box to play.

"Last year we had a lot of inexperienced players. This year most have experience," he said. "We improved in the off season but another area we have improved in is attitude. Our kids have a better attitude than what they had last year."

Daniels said that the younger Raiders are working hard to make the season a successful one.

"I don't have to explain something to them three times," he said. "Just once and they go out to do it."

The defensive line for the Raiders will be a youthful group with only two from last year returning. Daniels said that he will have two sophomores on the line without any seniors.

"We're going to have to go with a young group on the defensive line," he said. "There just not as much depth as I wanted there. It could be a problem for us later on."

Andre Faine and Aaron Caudill, both sophomores, will be at the defensive guards slots.

"Both are big and are working on getting better foot speed," the Raiders' coach stated. "We have a good nucleus to work in there."

Pete Dawson will also be playing the positions as well. "Pete is doing real good in there," said Daniels. "He's just got to get up more speed."

Last season's quarterback, Aaron Hall, will move to a defensive tackle slot. "Aaron is having a heck of a pre-season," Daniels said. "The other tackle position is up for grabs right now. Kevin Stancil is working hard. Bo Rogers, a first year player, could be there."

Daniels said that he was looking for two that had good chemistry.

Kevin Johnson will be a one linebacker position. Johnson played at defensive end last year and was primarily used as a tight end on offense.

"Kevin had a heck of a year in the off season," said Daniels. "He worked extremely hard."

Also seeing playing time at a linebacker position will be Jarrod Compton (6'0", 200, senior), Travis Johnson (5'11", 175, sophomore), Colby Little and Chris Isaac.

"We expect these to step up and give us a breather," said Daniels.

The question mark for Coach Daniels will be his offensive line.

"That's a big question mark for us right now," he said. "Right now we have Jarrod and Shawn (Curry) coming back from last year. After that we will put Jason Woods (6'0", 200, sophomore) at center."

First year senior Kenny King (6'0", 185) will play at a guard slot along with Dawson. Stancil will play tackle and will be a first year starter.

"Kevin has worked real hard in the weight room this

year," said Daniels. "He, like others, needs to get his foot speed up."

A couple of freshmen are expected to see some time at tackle.

"Joe Caudill and Nathan Reed have worked real hard, for me," said the Raiders' mentor. "They have looked real good at tackle. I have no complaints at all about them. They are working out fine."

Three will compete for the signal calling position with a freshmen waiting in the wings. Justin Ray (5'10", 165, senior) appears to have the inside track as he returns after sitting out last season. Terrance Mullins (6'1", 170, sophomore) will be the backup quarterback with Aaron Hall available for duty.

"Terrance has been out with a weak knee," explained Daniels. "He has shown a lot

of good things he did before.

"Then I got a freshman that's going to be dynamite, Nick Compton. He needs to get a real good season under his belt. He is going to be a dynamite kid to watch in the next couple of years."

Coach Daniels expects his backfield to be a strong one this season led by senior Chad Slone (5'11", 180).

"We'll have two seniors and a junior back there," Daniels said. "Chet McCarty (5'8", 175) will run at full-back with Adam Wright (5'11", 185) as the other back."

"These three, as long as they stay healthy, should have a good year. We've got some kids coming in, sophomores and freshmen, that are real good."

"It's just going to take seasoning with some of them," he said.

Travis Johnson will split time at split end along with Little and William Willard (5'7", 170).

"You throw Kevin Johnson in at tight end and he's going to be a big asset for us," explained Daniels. "We found a capable back up in Scotty Johnson (6'0", 170)."

"Scotty will be playing some defensive end for us, along with Marcus Little. I wouldn't hesitate putting any of those kids in there. If the others are not getting the job done, I wouldn't hesitate a bit to make a move with the younger ones."

When asked about the Raiders speciality teams,

Daniels responded with "Oh, what a question."

"Our punter from last year is ineligible this year. We're trying to feel out and see who we can get. Justin is our best punter but I hate to use a quarterback as a kicker."

"He's the best kickoff man that I have got right now," said Daniels. "When they're exposed like that, they have a tendency to get hurt and I don't want that. I hope someone will step and get the job done."

Coach Daniels said that Pikeville should rule their district this year, but Phelps could be a surprise team.

"Late last season they were one of the better teams in our district," he said. "Coach Bill McKinney did a heck of a job with them."

"Elkhorn City will be a tough team with a new coach and a good number out this year. Allen Central. Glenn (Reeves) has a lot of kids back from last year. I look for him to be a sleeper, a darkhorse."

Daniels feels that his team could cause some problems and make a playoff spot.

"We just have to do things right. We can't afford to make mental mistakes and we can't give the football up. That's one of the things we can't do and make the playoffs."

The South Floyd coach feels that the strength of this ballclub lies in their attitude.

"We want to go out and win that first game and show we are for real. This team will jell."
