


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Man implicated in 214 burglaries

Two students reinstated after hearing

After two Osborne Elementary students apparently failed to notify school personnel that a classmate had a gun at the school last week, the Floyd County Board of Education said Tuesday that the issue may be addressed at the board's next meeting.

The board conducted expulsion hearings during a special meeting Tuesday night for three students accused of having a gun on the school grounds, and noted that the school system's 1997-98 student handbook does not specifically address the issue of students failing to report a gun or weapon on the premises.

The board decided not to expel two of the students for the incident because their involvement with the gun was minimal. The only reason they were suspended by the principal is because they were aware another student had the gun on school property and they did not report it.

Although the student handbook does not address the issue of a punishment for students who fail to report seeing a gun on school grounds, the board indicated the issue would be placed on the agenda for a board meeting in the near future.

Last Friday, principal Paul Tackett suspended three students — Brandon Hamilton, Charles Ray and Adam Little — for having a .25 caliber handgun at the school the day before.

Ray and Little were apparently suspended along with Hamilton, who allegedly brought the gun to school, because they were aware the gun was brought onto school premises, but neglected to report the incident to school officials.

At the request of Ray's and Little's parents, the board held closed expulsion hearings during Tuesday's special meeting and decided not to expel the students after considering several factors.

One of the students apparently had the firearm in his backpack, but the board agreed there was "insufficient evidence the student ever intentionally possessed the handgun...and there was) evidence the handgun was placed in his book bag without his knowledge."

In determining that the other student would be permitted to return to school, board member Johnnie Ross noted that the board considered the student's minimal

Prison project is go!

A four-county effort to promote economic development in the Big Sandy region paid off in a big way Wednesday when a \$100 million federal prison project was officially approved.

The prison, which will be built on the Honey Branch site in Martin County near the Big Sandy Regional Airport, is a cooperative effort between Floyd, Johnson, Martin, and Pike counties, and is expected to dramatically boost the economy in the area.

"This decision is the green light we've been waiting for," U.S. Representative Hal Rogers said Wednesday in announcing the approval of the Honey Branch prison site. "Now, we can begin

to reap the benefits this prison will bring to our area."

The venture to build a 1,000-bed high security prison on the Honey Branch site in Martin County was proposed earlier last year by the four Big Sandy counties when they teamed up to form the Honey Branch Industrial Development Authority, Inc.

The Honey Branch site is located near the Big Sandy Regional Airport in Martin County.

Rep. Rogers said the prison is expected to cost approximately \$120 million to build and will generate a significant number of local construction jobs, as well as sales to local suppliers of ma-

terials and services.

When complete, the facility will have an annual payroll of \$25 million, employing approximately 400 people at an average salary of \$32,000, Rogers said.

"The jobs and economic opportunity this project will bring to the region mean the world to our people," Rogers, who chairs the House subcommittee that funds the Bureau of Prisons, added.

Rogers said he worked to bring the penitentiary to Eastern Kentucky because of the area's "high quality work force and the interest of local officials and civic leaders."

The Honey Branch Development Authority is seeking \$3.5 million funding

from the state's Local Government Economic Development Fund's Regional Industrial Park Program to build the prison.

The Industrial Park Program was formed to assist underdeveloped areas of the state and to fund multi-county projects with coal severance taxes.

Utility services in Prestonsburg and Martin County are expected to supply financial resources toward extending water to the project site, and the Paintsville Utility Company has proposed to provide wastewater service to the industrial park, as well as the Auxier

Woman suffers hypothermia after leap from burning boat

When a houseboat at Dewey Lake caught fire Wednesday, an area resident apparently had two options — burn with the boat or face the possibility of drowning in the frigid waters.

Audrey Nickell chose the lake's cold waters and jumped off the boat before suffering any injuries from the fire. But, her escape from the flames placed her in another dangerous predicament.

Nickell was found wrapped in a blanket and suffering from hypothermia when a Floyd County Emergency and Rescue Squad volunteer heard a faint knocking coming from another houseboat.

Derrick Calhoun, a rescue squad volun-

teer, said Wednesday afternoon that he heard Nickell's faint knocking as squad members were preparing to drag the lake.

"She apparently got off the (burning) boat and got on another one," Calhoun said. "She had barely enough energy to knock on the door."

Calhoun said the rescue squad, state police and a park ranger had conducted a preliminary search around the area for approximately 20 minutes before Nickell was able to make enough noise to be heard.

"She had been unconscious and didn't hear all the commotion," the rescue squad volunteer said. "She was just barely responsive."

Murder victim was lured to her death, cops say

The investigation into Tuesday's murder-suicide reveals that Earl Ray Campbell apparently lured his wife, Debbie, to the Lancer residence before shooting her to death and turning a gun on himself.

The bodies of 43-year-old Debbie Kendrick Campbell and her estranged husband were discovered around 2 p.m. Tuesday when local authorities responded to a shooting incident at Mr. Campbell's residence.

Prestonsburg Sgt. Anthony Castle, who is investigating the incident, said Thursday that statements taken from Lillian Blackburn, Mrs. Campbell's mother, who witnessed the shootings, and from other witnesses indicate the shootings were premeditated and motivated by jealousy.

Mrs. Campbell had filed for divorce from her husband in Floyd Circuit Court on January 30, four days prior to her death. The two separated in December and were living in separate residences, according to court records.

Mr. Campbell had apparently contacted his wife and requested that she go to the residence to pick up some income tax papers, Sgt. Castle said.

The sergeant said Earl Ray Campbell's vehicle had been hidden nearby at Cablevision, because Debbie Campbell would not stop at the residence if he was home.

"She thought he wasn't home."

"She thought he wasn't home," Sgt. Castle said. "She never did see him — He stuck the gun barrel around the (kitchen) door and shot her."

Shortly thereafter, Earl Ray Campbell died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound. Sgt. Castle said Mr. Campbell shot himself with a .38 caliber handgun.

Local authorities and other emergency agencies surrounded the residence and tried to make contact with the occupants after the initial report.

After kicking open the door, Sgt. Castle and Floyd Sheriff Paul Hunt Thompson stormed through the residence and discovered the bodies.

The murder-suicide shocked Mrs. Campbell's attorney, Tim Parker, who filed the divorce papers just days before the shooting and who indicated Tuesday afternoon that there was no evidence the couple "had this kind of problem."

There was no reported history of domestic violence between the Campbells and, the two had apparently reached an agreement for the

Storm not as bad as predicted, but bad enough just the same

This week's winter storm may not have been as harsh to Floyd County as it was to other regions in the state, but the snow left many area residents in the dark and numerous motorists on foot.

Initial weather reports predicted Eastern Kentucky counties could receive as much as a foot of snow Tuesday and Wednesday.

Although areas within Floyd County received various amounts of accumulation, they did not get close to the predictions.

Michelle Roth, a teacher at

Adam's Middle School, where students participate with the maintenance of a weather lab, said Thursday that approximately 3.22 inches of snow fell in the Prestonsburg area.

But that amount of heavy, wet snow and ice caused numerous power outages throughout the county.

More than 21,000 customers throughout the state were without power Wednesday because of heavy, wet snow and ice, according to American Electric Power (AEP) media advisories. On

contact with the firearm; his remorse over the incident; and his cooperation with the principal's investigation.

Board member Carol Stumbo stressed that the board considers the boys' failure to report the incident to school personnel a "very serious" matter.

Stumbo said the board has agreed to consider a new policy which would punish students more harshly for similar actions.

Throughout the special meeting, board attorney Jerry Patton continued to note for the record that the student, accused of bringing the gun to school, and his parents were not at the meeting.

The expulsion hearing for Hamilton was continued and rescheduled for February 17 because of the "unavailability" of the stu-

dent and because his parents were not properly notified of the hearing.

The student handbook requires that parents of students accused of an expulsion offense be notified by registered mail prior to a formal hearing of the charges.

Principal Tackett said last Friday that Hamilton denied bringing the gun, which reportedly was not capable of being discharged because of a faulty firing pin, onto school property.

In other action Tuesday, the board met in a closed session to discuss litigation.

The board did not consider any motions in regard to the litigation when it came back into the open meeting.

At the board attorney's request, though, the board agreed to have

Thursday, the number of customers without electricity decreased to approximately 11,300.

Melissa McHenry, with AEP's Corporate Communications Department, indicated Thursday that more than 1,000 Floyd County residents were without power Wednesday and that 323 customers remained without electricity Thursday in the Weeksburg, Arnold Fork of Right Beaver and East Point areas.

Aside from the county's trouble with power outages, snow covered roads created a difficult and dangerous situation for many motorists in the area.

Several accidents were reported in the county Tuesday night and several motorists were forced to abandon their vehicles by the roadside due to slick road conditions.

The Floyd County Sheriff's Department had extra officers on duty patrolling for stranded motorists during the snow. Deputies transported those stranded residents to their homes.

In some cases, vehicles were abandoned and left in the road, blocking traffic and preventing snow plows and other highway equipment from clearing the roadways.

Tow trucks were dispatched to various locations throughout the county to remove those vehicles.

According to the sheriff department's dispatch logs, several accidents with injuries were reported, but information on specific incidents was not available.

A representative with the Floyd County Emergency and Rescue Squad said Wednesday that the rescue squad worked a two-vehicle accident Tuesday night on the top of Abbott Mountain.

Nickell was transported to Highland's Regional Medical Center, where she is listed in stable condition.

Calhoun said the state police contacted the Floyd County Emergency and Rescue Squad at 1:15 p.m. Wednesday after Nickell's family members said she may have been on the boat and that they could not find her.

Within 15 minutes, the rescue squad arrived at the scene and launched a boat into the lake. Calhoun said there had been some difficulty getting the rescue squad's boat in the water because of the low water level.

Twenty minutes after the rescue squad's boat was launched and a search was conducted, Nickell was located.

"We were pulling out to get everybody ready to start dragging (the lake)," Calhoun said.

At the scene, a man who identified himself as Nickell's father speculated that the house boat's furnace may have caused the fire.

Kentucky State Police are investigating Wednesday's incident. The Floyd County Sheriff's Department also responded to the scene to offer assistance.

The most significant economic development effort of our era in The Big Sandy region is off the drawing board and in the works.

On Wednesday, Congressman Hal Rogers announced that the Honey Branch federal prison project had been given final and official approval, meaning the \$120 million facility will, in fact, be built near the Big Sandy Regional Airport in Martin County.

The Student Religious Liberty Act

Kentucky legislators passed a law twenty years ago requiring "the posting of a copy of the Ten Commandments, purchased with private contributions, on the wall of each public classroom in the state." But, according to the legislature, the poster had to also note that "The secular application of the Ten Commandments is clearly seen in its adoption as the fundamental legal code of Western Civilization and the Common Law of the United States."

The law, of course, was struck down by the United States Supreme Court, which said that "If the posted copies are to have any effect at all, it will be to induce the school children to read, meditate upon, perhaps to venerate and obey, the Commandments...[And] this is not a permissible state objective."

The case was *Stone v. Graham*, and in disagreement with the majority of the nation's highest court was the unnamed leader and protector of conservative thought, Justice Rehnquist. Rehnquist defended the Kentucky legislators, saying that the majority's decision is without constitutional grounds to stand upon. He pointed out that "religion has been closely identified with our history and government," and that "the history of man is inseparable from the history of religion. Kentucky has decided to make students aware of this fact by demonstrating the secular impact of the Ten Commandments."

With the Supreme Court's interpretation of the First Amendment, through Cases like *Stone*, there has been built a high-wall between religion and its values and public education in America. Many in the Kentucky General Assembly today are still trying to find a way over, or around, the wall. But what has, most recently, replaced their bold efforts of twenty years ago—such as the required posting of the Ten Commandments in every classroom—is the careful and skillful world play of two bills currently working their way through the legislative process.

The House has passed, and sent on to the Senate, a bill simply prohibiting school personnel from interfering with voluntary, student-initiated prayer during non-instructional time. The same bill passed through the House in 1996 but was rejected by a Senate which, perhaps, recognized the potential conflict with similar Supreme Court decisions. Even the authorization of voluntary prayer, according to the court, can be seen as the unconstitutional endorsement of religion.

A more elaborate approach has been taken by the State Senate with their passage last week of the "Kentucky Student Religious Liberty Act." If passed, the act would "define terms; prescribe rights of students to participate in various religious activities at school, subject to certain conditions; prescribe administrative remedies and a civil action; define the relationship between the Act and the Constitution, and other federal, state, or local law; prohibit teachers from encouraging any religious or antireligious activity; require the Department of Education to send copies of the Act to local school officials and to provide guidance on the implementation of the Act."

The bill is a long way from requiring the Ten Commandments to cover the walls of every classroom, but the opposition that is aroused by its proposal is just as outspoken. Namely, the ACLU, who would be leading the charge to have the law declared unconstitutional.

But the careful drafting of the bill might save it from a Supreme Court that has been chipping away at the liberal constitutional interpretations of the past several decades.

In the words of Chief Justice Rehnquist, who has gained more allies than opponents on the court over the last several years, "It would come as much of a shock to those who drafted the Bill of Rights as it will to a large number of thoughtful Americans today to learn that the Constitution, as construed by the majority, prohibits [a] Legislature from 'endorsing' prayer. George Washington himself, at the request of the very Congress which passed the Bill of Rights, proclaimed a day of 'public thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many and signal favors of Almighty God.' History must judge whether it was the Father of his Country in 1789, or a majority of the Court today, which has strayed from the meaning of the Establishment Clause."

Judicial independence integral to maintaining the rule of law despite outside pressures and glaring spotlight

In the media spotlight of high public interest trials, such as the Massachusetts *pair* case where all parties issued multiple statements, day in and day out, and people picketed outside the Cambridge courthouse, it is important to remember the true role of the court and the judge who presides over the trial.

The true role of the judge is not to be a caricature in a made-for-television sitcom, where the viewer tunes in for entertainment and then clicks to another channel. The true role of a judge is not to be reduced to a 25-second sound bite on the evening news. The true role of a judge is not to be shaped by pressure groups promoting a particular outcome.

Rather, the true role of a trial or appellate judge is to uphold the rule of law and ensure that justice is done. This principle is at the core of our democracy. This critically serious business requires that a judge protect the rights of all participants in a trial as well as the public interest. This principle is what has made the American legal system the most copied judicial system model in emerging democracies around the world.

The judicial process requires time to un-

fold. It is deliberative and thoughtful, designed to ensure that all issues are carefully weighed and considered. It is designed to produce the truth. Without this careful and deliberate process, under the rule of law, the strong fabric that binds Americans together would fray and democracy would be weakened.

Judicial decision making, however, does not occur in a vacuum. Our judicial system is at work in the jury trial process when a jury considers the evidence and arrives at a verdict on the facts. The system is at work when a judge conducts the trial and reviews the verdict of the jury in light of the law, and again when the appellate court reviews the decision of the trial court. This dynamic system of judge, jury and appellate review is what makes America's judicial system so unique and effective.

As the world reacts to the decision of Massachusetts Superior Court Judge Hiller Zobel, Americans should understand the judges' decisions are not determined by the glare of the camera lights, nor as Judge Zobel put it, "by a plebiscite," nor by partisan pressure bought to bear on the jury or the judge.

An independent judiciary is a necessary, vital and irreplaceable constant in the American Democracy, which continues to successfully evolve after more than 200 years.

That's our American system—and it works.

Russell Briggs, vice-president and chief operating officer of Highlands Regional Medical Center and chairman of the board of the Compensation Hospital Association Trust (C-HAT) has been named to the Board of Directors of The Virginia Insurance Reciprocal (TVIR). The Kentucky Hospital Association Trust (KHAT), and the Compensation Hospital Association Trust (C-HAT) recently merged with TVIR.

Their goals were to provide cost effective alternatives to the commercial markets for these coverages while giving insureds a role in governance; and to offer timely claims resolution, case management of claims, monitoring of treatment plans, and coordination of return to work processes.

With the advent of managed care and the trend toward mergers and consolidations in the health care industry, KHAT and C-HAT found it increasingly difficult to meet their

HB 434 would improve access to education for low-income Kentuckians

Access to education for low-income Kentuckians would greatly improve under legislation introduced by Representative Tom Burch and co-sponsored by Representative Greg Stumbo.

"This bill is win, win, win," said Debra Miller, director of Kentucky Youth Advocates (KYA). "It is a win for Kentucky's parents, children and employers."

The law creates Kentucky Educational Access for Parents (KEAP) to provide assistance and support services to low-income students who pursue full time post-secondary education.

Access to education was identified as a critical concern by low-income parents who spoke last fall at public forums about the impacts of welfare reform attended by over 450 Kentuckians statewide. KYA and another statewide organization, Kentuckians For The Commonwealth (KFTC) have worked with a broad coalition of groups to develop legislation addressing this issue and strongly support its passage.

"The federal welfare law locks people in low-paying jobs," said KFTC member Fannie Morris of Madisonville. "Our legislation

allows students on public assistance to pause their time clock while they progress in higher education so they can get a good job.

It also guarantees that low-income parents have access to support services, such as child care and transportation, while they go to school," Morris added.

A number of national studies have shown that the higher the educational level, the better the chance a person can escape welfare and earn a living wage. Research by the Economic Policy Institute indicates that high school graduates earn 28 percent more than non-graduates. College graduates earn an additional 65 percent more (1995 figures).

"I've held, I don't know how many, part-time jobs," said Robin Burchett, a student at Prestonsburg Community College who spoke at a public forum on September 26, 1997. "It makes more sense for me to stay on welfare while I get my education, so I can get a job that earns a living wage."

HB 434 will likely be considered first by the House Health and Welfare Committee. Citizens may leave a message for legislators by calling 800-372-7181.

Citizens group adds video to lobbying effort

A statewide citizens group with a history of making the voice of the average citizen heard in Frankfort added a new twist to its lobbying efforts this week.

Members of Kentuckians For The Commonwealth (KFTC) delivered to lawmakers, videos of welfare recipients speaking about life on welfare and what they need to free themselves from public assistance.

The video features the testimony of five student-parents and an interview with Ron Crouch, director of State Data Center at the University of Louisville. The parents spoke at public forums sponsored by the Kentucky Youth Advocates (KYA) and KFTC last fall in Prestonsburg, Covington and Louisville.

The video was distributed this week to all members of the House Health and Welfare Committee, which deals with welfare related legislation. KYA and KFTC members are asking legislators to support HB 434, which will provide greater access to higher education for low-income Kentuckians.

The video is primarily material from public forums sponsored by KYA and KFTC to give people an opportunity to comment on the impact of welfare reform," said Mimi Pickering, a video-maker with Appalshop in Whitesburg. "Lots of people, mostly women, spoke out about the importance of education to their ability to support their families.





"Influenza 1918" presented on KET

Early in the morning of March 18, 1918, a young private reported to the Army hospital at Fort Riley, Kansas, complaining of fever, sore throat and headache. Then, another sick soldier appeared, then another and another. By noon, the hospital had more than 100 cases; in a week, there were 500. Forty-eight soldiers died at Fort Riley that spring. No one knew why.

The American Experience "Influenza 1918," airing on KET at 9 p.m. Monday, February 9, presents the story of the worst epidemic the United States has ever known. Before it was over, the flu killed more than 600,000 Americans—more than all the combat deaths of this century combined.

America in 1918 was a nation at war. Draft call-ups, bond drives, troop shipments were all in high gear when the flu epidemic appeared. American soldiers from Fort Riley carried the disease to the trenches of Europe where it mutated into a killer virus. Returning troops brought it back home. By September, the disease spread swiftly to the civilian population, moved quickly down the eastern seaboard to New York, Philadelphia and beyond. That month, 12,000 Americans died of influenza.

It was a flu unlike any other. People could be healthy in the morning and be dead by nightfall. Others died more slowly, suffocating from the buildup of liquid in their lungs. Doctors, who had incorrectly believed the flu was caused by bacteria, could not stop its spread. People lived in fear of contamination and many hid in their

homes. October 1918 saw the epidemic's full horror; more than 195,000 people died in America alone.

Then, just as suddenly as it struck, the calamitous disease abruptly began to vanish. By mid-November, the numbers of dead were plunging. "In light of our knowledge of influenza," says Dr. Shirley Fannin, a Los Angeles County public health official, "we

do understand that it probably ran out of fuel. It ran out of people who were susceptible and could be infected."

The first public celebration of the rite was held at St. Martha's Church on November 29, 1994. Since then, the church has offered the prayer service annually and more than 75 unborn infants have been commended.

St. Martha's Church is urging anyone seeking solace and comfort from this type of loss, to participate in the February 21 prayer service. Resources for dealing with grief will be offered in the church hall immediately following the ceremony and refreshments will also be served.



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

Jude implicated in 214 Ohio burglaries

Former Martin County Alternative School student David Eric Jude waived extradition last Tuesday in Martin District Court and was picked up Wednesday by two Delaware County Sheriff's deputies at the Big Sandy Detention Center.

Deputies Matthew Dick and John Burke also came to the Martin County Courthouse to pick up copies of taped statements in which Jude, 19, had claimed to be a "fence" for stolen property.

But, according to Martin County Sheriff Darrel Young, who reviewed a copy of the Ohio police department's investigation into a burglary ring in the Delaware County area, Jude's involvement appears to be much more serious.

Detective E.A. Schamps told Young that he believes Jude commits the burglaries and then likely goes to a flea market in Clinton Township, Ohio, as well as another fence in the northern Columbus area, and sells the stolen merchandise.

VanHoose to answer to charges

Mayor expected to plead innocent in district court

Louisa Mayor James L. VanHoose was expected to plead innocent to the 24 counts of official misconduct he faces during his arraignment scheduled Wednesday in Lawrence District Court.

VanHoose's attorney, John David Preston of Paintsville, said he would enter a not guilty plea, but declined further comment on the case.

VanHoose was indicted on the charges by a Lawrence County Grand Jury last month after they heard testimony from a former city worker, a city mechanic, and a worker hired through federal aid program and state investigators.

The resulting indictment contained 24 incidents where the mayor had allegedly used city employees to do private work on his home, flower shop and van.

VanHoose has also declined comment on the case.

Since all of the charges contained in the indictment are misdemeanors, the case was sent back to the district court level. Each count of official misconduct carries a penalty of a fine and up to a year in prison.

The grand jury also refused to indict the mayor on four other counts due to lack of evidence presented.

At the arraignment, the judge will likely set a date for a pre-trial conference to hear motions filed, and may set a tentative trial date.

Schamps said Jude may have been involved in as many as 214 burglaries, one quarter of all those committed in the past two years in Delaware County.

One of the more high profile burglaries linked to Jude's group involves the home of Wendy's Famous Hamburgers founder Dave Thomas, near Gahanna, Ohio.

Police retrieved fingerprints traced back to Antwan Weiss, a known associate of Jude's, from a late model Porsche allegedly stolen from Thomas' residence during a burglary during the Christmas holidays in December of 1997. Police also found items linked to the Dave Thomas burglary at Jude's Columbus apartment on Maize

Road.

Weiss was arrested on January 5 while driving the Porsche and was also charged with another breaking and entering in Columbus, Ohio.

"Our interview with Weiss showed collusion with David Jude, and Jude's name keeps coming up more and more as we investigate the burglaries and car thefts," Schamps said.

Jude, who was expelled from the Martin County Alternative School for violent behavior in 1995, was indicted January 24, 1998 by a Delaware County Grand Jury on four counts of Burglary and Receiving Stolen Property.

Detectives had served a search warrant on Jude's cousin, Jeffrey Cornett, at their apartment on January 9.

According to police reports, Jude walked up on the search as it was in progress and was able to flee on foot. He had been a fugitive until being apprehended by Martin County Chief Sheriff's deputy F.D. "Pete" Fitzpatrick and Volunteer Deputy G.L. McCallister last Monday at Moore's Trailer Park at Lovely.

Jude, who is currently on probation for a 1997 conviction for Receiving Stolen Property, remains lodged in the Delaware County jail awaiting arraignment on the new charges.

Magoffin County clerk's office robbed

A second burglary within a month's time has taken place at Magoffin County Courthouse.

Following a similar method of entry as the previous theft, which occurred in the Magoffin County Circuit Clerk's office, only with more success, the office of County Clerk H.B. Arnett was broken into during a recent weekend and a large sum of cash was stolen.

Employees found evidence of the burglary when they reported to work on Monday, January 26.

Entrance was apparently gained into the first floor office through a rear hallway where one or more persons entered through a hole directly over the back door. Reportedly, a large trash can placed just outside the back door gave burglars the boost they needed to reach the opening and then they were able to remove ceiling tiles to gain entry to the office.

One employee reported that the cash register had been pried open and emptied

during the robbery.

"Ninety-nine times out of one hundred, anyone breaking in here would only get about \$20 that we keep for change," said Clerk H.B. Arnett. "Just that evening it had been forgotten to transfer the cash to the safe."

Arnett estimated approximately \$2,938 in cash was missing from the cash register. Checks that were also still in the cash register drawer were left untouched. A set of keys that went to the cash register and var-

ious desk drawers containing important papers were also taken.

The exit from the office was easier than the entrance as the lock that secured the back door was removed, allowing for easier exiting.

Bars have been placed across the hole in the wall. Locks have been replaced and a new cash register purchased.

The theft is still under investigation by the Salyersville Police Department. —From the Salyersville Independent

Cabinet for Health Services approves more than 50 certificate of need projects

In Lawrence County, the Three Rivers Medical Center Home Health Agency in Louisa was approved to establish/expand home health services to include Lawrence and Martin counties for \$1,000.

In Pike County, a rehabilitation agency was approved for the Williamson ARH Rehabilitation Agency in South Williamson, while the Pikeville Methodist Hospital's Home Health Agency had a county establishment deferred.

Principal certificate suspended or 90 days, training required

Although a state Department of Education report found no instances of outright cheating at Louisa Elementary last year, former principal Toni Armstrong was handed out punishment last week by the Education

Professional Standards Board.

Armstrong's principal endorsement was suspended for 90 days, along with an agreement that she not serve as a principal until June of 1999. Marcia Seiler, an attorney for the standards board, said. Also, she must attend three hours on KIRIS Code of Ethics training.

The state launched an investigation into the school last year after a group of fifth grade teachers complained that cheating had taken place, causing the school to post high scores on the state testing and receive over \$112,000 in reward money.

Following the investigation, a report issued by the Department of Education pointed out several "improprieties." The school's scores were rolled back to zero for the testing period, which will likely put the school in a "crisis" category when new scores are issued later this year. — *The Big Sandy News, Louisa*

Judge-Executive Gail Gillem recommended that the commissioners vote for this proposal after saying the court had too many problems with the Humane Society. "We have contributed \$3,000 plus to the situation since May, and the number of stray dogs keeps growing, and there seems to be no end to that," Gillem said. "I'd rather do it at home but that situation hasn't been workable. We asked at one time that a contract be signed and nothing came out of that."

As part of an agreement with Tri-County, the court will pay the shelter \$400 a month plus \$15 per animal taken to the shelter. "To me, \$400 and \$15 an animal beats \$2,000 a month and no contract," Gillem told the court.

The agreement is effective for one year, with each party having the right to cancel the contract after a 90-day notice. — *The Paintsville Herald*

Flu-like illnesses on the rise

With a recent out-break of the flu in some surrounding counties, Johnson County has witnessed an increase in cases with flu-like symptoms treated in the emergency room as the health department continues to give preventative inoculations.

"In the past three or four months we have seen a rise in the number of cases," said Dr. Bagri, emergency room physician at Paul B. Hall Regional Medical Center.

Most of the cases that the emergency room has treated can't be identified as the flu but have similar symptoms.

"Gastroenteritis and viral-type pneumonia," said Bagri, are common cases for this time of year and what the hospital has treated most recently.

Still no leads in Ezel murder

State Police and the Morgan County Sheriff's Department said Tuesday they still have no leads in the slaying of Michael Dean Bartley of Ezel, and have again issued a request for information from anyone who may have any knowledge of anything that might possibly have a bearing on the case.

Bartley, 42, was found bludgeoned to death in his yard at 5:40 a.m. on January 21, by a neighbor who had been summoned by Bartley's wife when her husband failed to return to the house from feeding his dog.

Investigators say he died almost instantly from a crushed skull. An autopsy revealed he had been struck three times with a blunt instrument.

Residents and family members have launched a community-wide drive to solicit donations to offer a reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of Bartley's killer. — *Licking Valley Courier, West Liberty*

Another time, my father was dismayed to learn that one of the people he had helped get a job had an opponent's bumper sticker on his car. When Dad asked him about it, he replied, "But, Buzzy, I got fired from that job."

Let me pose a hypothetical question:

Two candidates are running for political office. You, as a constituent, are in need of a road. You approach the first candidate, and he tells you if he's elected, he will do what he can. The second candidate assures you that he will build the road as soon as he's elected.

— Hard Times for Canadian Strippers: According to December news reports, Mexico stepped up what had been a low-key immigration policy: Canadian and U.S. nude dancers would no longer be permitted into the country to work under the special "high technology" skills category of NAFTA. And in Winnipeg, Manitoba, stripper Carole Levesque filed a lawsuit against the local police because officers forced her to raise her hands over her head during a drug raid despite her truthful protest that recent breast-enhancement surgery had left her unable to do that without pain.




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

Motss stages an entire war campaign and films a stirring video showing a young Albanian girl fleeing the horrors of rape in a war-torn village. The "victim" is actually an aspiring Hollywood starlet filmed behind a blue backdrop into which



take a look at it and see what happens. We're going to see if we can gain anything by it, and then we'll go over the results after the test."

Pontiacs won two of the last three races last season, but those were the only Pontiac wins of the entire season. Fords won 19 races, Chevrolets 11.

Team Hendrick provides engines for the Pontiac team of Ernie Irvan.

NO MOORE: Bud Moore, one of NASCAR's most familiar names, has had to postpone the return of his No. 15 Ford team due to lingering medical prob-

lems with driver Tim Steele.

Three-time ARCA champion Steele injured ribs and suffered a concussion while testing Moore's Ford Thunderbird last fall at Atlanta Motor Speedway.

Recently Steele suffered dizziness and rib pain while testing the car at Daytona.

According to the car owner's son and team manager, Greg Moore, it could be July before Steele returns.

Bud Moore Engineering did not compete on the Winston Cup Series last year, although the team attempted to make starting fields twice.

STRONG WORDS: According to Dan Davis, director of Ford Special Vehicle Operations, the Winston Cup switch from Thunderbird to Taurus is the biggest challenge ever faced by the carmaker in North American motorsports.

"At least in my limited experience in motorsports in the United States, I would say that this would be the biggest challenge," said Davis. "I would say that in some of our other venues, we have faced similar challenges, but this certainly is the biggest one in North America."



He moved from there to Cale Yarborough's No. 98 at the end of 1996, and that move culminated in Andretti's first Winston Cup victory in July, 1997, at Daytona. Oddly enough, Daytona was the scene of his uncle Mario's lone Winston Cup victory in 1967.

Now, the match made in heaven is alive again. Andretti replaces Bobby Hamilton in Petty's Pontiac beginning with the Daytona 500. Hamilton won single races in both 1996 and 1997 while driving for Petty.


