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## Couple of accused of blackmail

PRESTONSBURG — The Floyd County Sheriff's Department arrested two suspects Friday after a Kentucky Bureau of Investigation probe indicated that they were involved in an alleged plot to extort \$20,000 from the Citgo gas station in Stanville.

Karen Warrix, 54, and her husband, Steve Warrix, 60, both of Prestonsburg, were taken into custody after Steve Warrix went to the store to col-

lect what he thought was going to be a \$1,000 cash payment — the first of 20 — that the store was allegedly going to pay after Karen Warrix claimed she fell at the store.

Karen Warrix was charged with one count of theft by extortion and her husband will face one count of abetting extortion for allegedly making the trip to Citgo to collect the money.

Sheriff John K Blackburn noted that his office was more than happy to aid the KBI and said that

## Police searching for missing teen

PRESTONSBURG — A young woman who went missing for five days in March 2005 has disappeared again and is being sought by the Floyd County Sheriff's Department, which found her the first time she went missing.

Authorities are currently searching for Fallon Blackburn, 16, who has been missing since June 24.

Last year, the teen was found after a five-day search that saw the sheriff's department get aid from the girl's father, who steered authorities towards a Maytown home. Deputies found several teens at the home of Sabrina Blakeman, 41, and one bore a resemblance to Blackburn. When questioned by officers she denied her identity, as did Blakeman, though a call to Prestonsburg High School raised more questions when the name officers were given matched an adolescent who was then at the school.

Returning to the Maytown home, the deputies were able to determine that the teen they had questioned was Blackburn and she was reunited with her family. Blakeman was taken into custody on charges of hindering an investigation and an unlawful transaction with a minor.

Blakeman later received a two-year probated sentence and was ordered to have no children, other than her own, in her home for a period of two years.

While the temperature reached into the 90s all weekend, deputies were on the lookout for Blackburn and had searched several residences of acquaintances of hers but had not been able to find her.

The sheriff's department asks that anyone with information on the whereabouts of Blackburn contact them at (606) 886-6171. Fallon is 5 feet, 4 inches tall, has brown hair and gray eyes, and weighs approximately 120 pounds. She was last seen in Prestonsburg.

## 14-year-old boy killed in scooter accident

Davis was rounding a curve at the time and attempted to stop before striking Anderson, according to police. Anderson was pronounced dead at the scene by Pike County deputy coroner Mike Hall.

The accident was still under investigation by state police. No charges have been filed.

## EPA sues East Ky. Power over air guidelines

LEXINGTON — East Kentucky Power was sued in the U.S. District Court Friday by the Environmental Protection Agency for allegedly not following guidelines mandated by the Clean Air Act.

The suit alleges that the company's Ford plant, in Clark County, employed two units whose emissions standards

were not acceptable and that the company did so in violation of EPA programs that monitor emissions which impact ozone layer depletion and acid rain production.

The suit alleges that East Kentucky Power has used the out-of-date units since 2000, though they were reported to have been replaced by more modern ones in 1998.

The older units don't meet the standards for acid rain emissions which

have been in effect for six years, the complaint says, and could cost the company a hefty fine. The EPA is asking that East Kentucky Power pay \$27,500 for each each day of use between January 2000 and March 2004. They further seek a \$32,500 fine for every day the units have been operating since March 14, 2004.

The suit also alleges that the power company never sought permits and has been operating without them.

The EPA is petitioning the court to order the company to cease and desist using its outdated units and to comply with EPA standards. The action also asks the court to order the company to apply for permits that conform to acid rain provisions and ozone regulations, and that it take appropriate actions to offset the harm to public health from operating outside those guidelines.

East Kentucky Power will have 20 days to respond to the action.

### A feast of alternative theories

We endorse this alternative theory on why people are getting so plump. We have long considered that tired theory on how to avoid this — move more, eat less and better — as way too long in the tooth.

Researchers in the International Journal of Obesity report 10 other possible reasons, confirming what many of us have long suspected. That is that being big-boned has some validity as a root cause.

Well, they don't quite say big-boned. Among the hypotheses they offer: inadequate sleep, endocrine disruptors, temperatures that prevent you from sweating and shivering, fewer people smoking (resulting in less appetite suppression) and medicines that cause weight gain.

Our favorites, however, are those along the big-boned theory. These include assortative mating. This means like people mating with other like people producing other like people. This has big bones written all over it.

Our clear favorite, because in a stretch it kinda says some of us are immortal, is Darwinian natural selection. This theory holds that fatter people "outsurvive" skinny ones, though we're not certain the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the National Institutes of Health are on board.

One of the researchers hastened to urge folks not to start smoking just so they could eat less and insisted that no food- or beverage-makers funded the report. We echo that first caution, applaud the second assertion and add that folks should not turn down their thermostats and throw off the blankets to shiver more nor wear that parka at Summerfest to sweat more.

The report, no doubt, is eliciting some scoffing. But be honest. We all know people who seemingly eat all they want and don't exercise all that much yet remain slim, even if not exactly healthy.

Nonetheless, we should all still pledge to move more and eat less as the only healthy thing to do despite these other theories. Big bones need not be destiny.

But that doesn't mean that we plumper people will resent the skinnier ones any less while we're doing all that moving more and eating less.

### Are B.C. & A.D. P.C. enough?

When the going gets tough, the tough get going—and the not-so-tough start making excuses.

In early April, the Kentucky Department of Education issued its new "Program of Studies," the state's unofficial curriculum guide, in which the terms B.C. and A.D. were dropped from date references. B.C. means "Before Christ"; A.D. stands for "Anno Domini," which means "In the Year of the Lord." These were to be replaced by the more politically correct B.C.E. and C.E., which mean "Before the Common Era" and "Common Era."

The uproar soon had education officials scurrying for political cover and the big state media in a dilemma: either support something most people thought was at best silly and at worst anti-religious, or (and this is not for the journalistically faint of heart) having to side with conservatives on a high-profile issue.

Department of Education officials basically threw up their hands and declared that it had never had any intention of dropping B.C. and A.D. from the curriculum guideline and that the version presented to the School Board included both designa-

tions: B.C./A.D. and B.C.E./C.E.

But anyone wanting to investigate what the Board was actually presented can look at the document in the Board agenda for its April 10 meeting, a version which completely drops B.C. and A.D. It is still online for all the world to see.

Besides blatant falsehoods uttered by education bureaucrats, two other things made the Department's declarations even less convincing. The first was the fact that the Program of Studies document was held close to the vest until just days before a meeting of the State School Board at which the document was scheduled to be approved. Why be so secretive unless there is something you know the public will likely not appreciate?

Then, there was the matter of why the Department of Education staff was so determined to have the document approved at the Board's April meeting. It just so happened that the April meeting was the last meeting of a School Board dominated by more liberal Patton appointees. As of June, the Board would be completely peopled with Fletcher appointees—appointees, as it turned out, who would be far less inclined to sign off on policies that try to hide the influence of religion in our history.

Unfortunately for the Department, FOX News reporters were there, which resulted in national attention to the issue the next week.

There was also the response of the

major state media—most notably the state's two largest newspapers: the Louisville Courier-Journal and the Lexington Herald-Leader. At first, they too had to disassociate themselves from what was perceived by most people to be a silly attempt to secularize history. But the prospect of being on the same side as conservatives on the issue was apparently too much to bear.

In editorials written after the new School Board reinstated the traditional calendar, both newspapers blasted The Family Foundation, which had led the opposition to the change, saying that it had been responsible for making a mountain out of a mole hill. But in editorial responses to both papers, it was pointed out that it was the big newspapers, not The Family Foundation, which had made a big deal out of the issue.

If the controversy was "not a big deal," (in words of one paper), then why did both papers put it on their front pages—several times? Their own actions belied the fact that people don't like it when attempts are made to expunge the importance of religion from history.

# Four charged in escape from Hazard jail

HAZARD — A Perry County man and three other individuals have been charged in connection with last week's escape from the Kentucky River Regional Jail in Hazard.

The Hazard City Police Department received a call at approximately 2:30 p.m. Tuesday afternoon stating that a male inmate had escaped from the jail and to be on the lookout for a blue Chevrolet van.

Troopers with the Kentucky State Police found the van shortly after the call came out at the Whispering Pines Apartments located at Gorman Hollow. Officers with the Hazard Police Department, Perry County Sheriff's Office, and the Kentucky River Regional Jail quickly responded to the scene, launching an extensive search at the apartment complex for 28-year-old William Feltner, who was arrested the previous Saturday by Deputy Danny Miller and charged with the alleged armed robbery of the Texaco service station at Exit 56 just

outside of Hazard.

Officers with the Hazard Police Department received information that Feltner was possibly at apartment 324 in Eastern Pines. Police said Feltner's sister, Mazzie Trent, allowed officers into the apartment to conduct a search, during which they say Feltner was located inside a closet underneath a blanket. Police say Feltner was initially non compliant, but was taken into custody and subsequently back to the regional jail.

Feltner was charged with felony second-degree escape and resisting arrest, while Trent and two other individuals were charged with second-degree complicity to escape, those individuals being William Feltner's wife, Elizabeth, and Porshia Patrick. Sgt. Isaac Whitaker with the Hazard Police Department said more charges could be filed pending the outcome of the investigation.

Whitaker noted that Feltner's quick apprehension was due to the different law enforcement agencies working together. Feltner was caught in Hazard approxi-

mately two hours after he escaped from the jail. "It was a good effort between different officers and different agencies," Whitaker said.

Kentucky River Regional Jail administrator Tim Kilburn said last week that Feltner was able to escape from the jail because of a door left open in the facility. "An employee had left the door open to the visitation room," Kilburn said. "And when [Feltner] came out of visitation instead of going left out of the cell he ran out of the door."

Kilburn said Feltner was able to flee the jail in the blue van after he was given a set of keys from the people who had come to visit him at the jail.

Feltner's escape was not the first from the Kentucky River Regional Jail. Randy Campbell, who was a trustee at the time of his incarceration in Hazard, escaped using ventilation ducts in October of last year. Campbell was later apprehended during a traffic stop in West Virginia and is currently serving a five year sentence at the La Grange state penitentiary.



cooperating with other law enforcement agencies was a hallmark of his department.

"We can work with everybody," the sheriff said.

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# Mumps marches across Midwest, may threaten Kentuckians

They used to be rites of childhood passage: A red rash announced the coming of measles or chickenpox, and a swelling around the jawbone trumpeted the arrival of mumps.

But for years, mumps and measles have been far less commonplace, largely defeated by the measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine.

Until last December, the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports more than 2,500 cases of mumps were treated in 12 states, including Missouri and

Illinois, and many of these patients weren't children, but college students. No confirmed cases of mumps have been reported in Kentucky at this time.

The problems? Those people who have never been immunized and the fact that some people who received the vaccinations, remain unprotected. "It is estimated that 10 percent of any large population is unprotected - even if they have been immunized," said Dr. Greg Moore, director of University Health Service at the University of Kentucky.

"In addition to people who

never received the MMR vaccine because they lived in areas with nonexistent or unenforced requirements for typical childhood immunizations, we have others who got the vaccine but are not fully protected.

"We estimate that of those who receive one MMR vaccine, 80 percent are effectively protected. That protection increases to 90 percent in people who have received two MMRs.

"Many of those who contracted mumps in the current outbreak had been immunized as children," Dr. Moore said.

Mumps is passed either by airborne droplets or from direct contact with the saliva of an infected person. Because they engage in the kinds of social interaction, living environments, and travel that could lead to encounters with the mumps virus, college students are particularly vulnerable.

For the most part, mumps sufferers experience discomfort characterized by the swelling of one or more of the salivary glands. In more severe cases, the virus can attack the testes, ovaries, breasts, pancreas and brain.

But according to the CDC, complications of mumps can include meningitis, encephalitis and orchitis that can require hospitalization - and may cause death in rare instances.

The CDC and the American College Health Association have urged all American college students to reduce the risk of mumps by making sure they have received two doses of the MMR vaccine or have other evidence of immunity.

"MMR is a very safe vac-

cine, even if a person has already been inoculated or has had the disease," Dr. Moore said.

He recommends an individual have two MMR vaccinations, timed a month apart. The vaccine's effectiveness is evident within two to four weeks.

Dr. Moore cautioned against overdoing it.

"Repeated inoculations do not improve protection against the disease," Dr. Moore said.





## Summer slump at new civic center has state senator worried

PIKEVILLE — Less than a year after it opened, business at the Eastern Kentucky Exposition Center is slowing down.

The lights from sold-out concerts featuring rocker Kid Rock and comedian Larry the Cable Guy have faded, leaving at least one state official asking the state to step in and keep the facility financially solvent.

"It's a state-built and state-owned facility," said state sen-

ator Ray Jones (D-Pikeville). "The governor appoints the board. It should be funded by the state. Period. End of story." The 7,000-seat center opened last October amid much fanfare at a cost of \$29 million. It has hosted at least 30 events over 59 days, but with school out and the schedule a little less crowded than it was six months ago, the arena's executive director and general manager is worried about the bottom line.

Donna Damron said the arena has collected \$740,000 in operating revenues while spending \$1.03 million. And while Damron isn't concerned about the arena closing — it already has events booked into 2008 — she acknowledged the arena may have to get "creative" when it comes to finding ways to make money.

"We will definitely stay open," said Damron, who added the role of manager in April to keep the center from having to add another employee. "Like any business, we will have to look at ways to operate more efficiently and create more revenues."

They'll likely have to do it without any more help from the state, at least in the near future. The state had designated \$400,000 in the state biannual budget in 2002-04, but the \$100,000 in coal-tax money approved by the General Assembly in this year's budget was vetoed by Gov. Ernie Fletcher.

Stan Cave, Fletcher's chief of staff, said while the state would help one of its civic centers under "extraordinary circumstances," he's not sure problems at the arena are so bad it has to step in.

"When I spoke to Mrs. Damron, I told her I would look to see if they had an extraordinary situation here, which I don't believe they don't, according to her," Cave said. "I told her we would look to see if there were discretionary funds available. I'm not optimistic there would be."

Cave said the state expects the Expo center to stand on its own, just like the other civic centers in Kentucky. He pointed to the Northern Kentucky Convention Center in Covington, which is in its 10th

year, and the venerable Louisville Fairgrounds as examples of how the arenas can take care of themselves.

Terrie Smith, director of the 6,500-seat Viking Civic Center in Bristol, Tenn., said slumps like the one the Expo center is currently enduring is not uncommon during the summer.

"What she is saying is true," said Smith, who pointed out that crowds thin between May and October because people would rather watch performances in outdoor amphitheaters.

Still, some area residents are worried they'll be put on the hook for the arena if things continue to stay slow.

Pete Runyon called the project "the Titanic" when it was first being discussed. He's a little more optimistic now, but is worried the money problems he warned the Pike Fiscal Court about in 1998 are beginning to appear.

"The thing that's beginning to happen to them is the thing I warned them about: Funding is going to be an issue," he said.

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

Things we all experience. Usually, they come by us for only a few seconds and then they're gone, without us ever recognizing that they may have a real meaning to them. With some thought, we can learn a good lesson from a bit of nonsense. Each little offering is centered around an individual thought and each one teaches us something we should know."*

Time flies by so fast these days that I'm surprised that people get anything done. This past January, I thought to myself that if the days could get any shorter, I think they would. It was dark by 4:30 in the afternoon and it stayed that way until 8:30 in the morning. For me, I only had time to notice more than two or three things during those short few daylight hours.

One particular day, I saw that it was raining again and that the clouds were dark and dreary. Sometimes I would see the sun trying to shine but it would be very weak and lazy and stayed around only for a very short time. I saw the school buses go by and I wished I could have been at the school to welcome the children to happy days like I once did. I noticed my wheelchair too, sitting in the corner of my bedroom and felt good to know that I didn't have to use it right then.

I watched the mother redbirds come to my bird feeder to get a good meal but I seldom ever saw a male come by. I guessed that they must go out and find their breakfasts the old fashioned way - by working for it.

The thermometer on my porch on this day read 56 degrees. That's too warm for a good, big snow. I would have liked to have seen one, though. A good, deep snow like the ones my children loved to roll and play in. A snow where sleighs glide smoothly in. One where snowballs stick together and children scream when one hits them in the face. A snow so deep that boots don't keep it from getting down inside around your already ice cold feet. Do you remember that ten years ago, on the 6th day of January, a big blizzard came and covered us with twenty inches of snow? That was 1996. We'll talk more about that time later.

For now, 2006 has already begun and is already half over. I am still trying to figure out where 2005 went. Wherever it went, it sure was in a hurry to get there. I'm guessing that this year will be just as anxious as the last to travel on. In thinking about years traveling on, my mind goes back now to about 49 years ago. Forty-nine years ago, on January 29th, the biggest flood we ever had around here occurred. I remember this flood, plus, I'm old enough to remember one that came

around in 1928 or so. That one covered all the level land from mountain to mountain here at the mouth of Cow Creek. Emma bottom was completely covered with muddy water and trash; Clorox bottles, milk jars, dead chickens and even horses, and many trees. I was about 8 or 9 years old at this time and I remember how all that filth filled our little house almost to its ceilings. People threw their garbage in the creeks and rivers away back then, they didn't know any better.

Twenty years ago, on the 28th day of January, the space ship Challenger blew up just seconds after takeoff. The little school teacher aboard helped me remember this date because one teacher loves another, no matter where they teach.

Well, as I said before, ten years ago, on the 6th day of January, a big blizzard came through here and covered us with twenty inches of snow. The cold winds howled around our chimney and puffed soot down from the flue into our house. Our gas froze off, too.

This past January, I saw many dreary days. Days that were very cold when a gloomy blanket of fog hung around. It was hard even to see the church house across the road. Hardly no one ever came by. But the little dog that lives across the street sure did cry a lot. It made me feel like crying, too. I thought to myself that the little dog and I both needed some company to come calling. I even thought, in one of my drearier moments, that I would yell at him to "not hold your breath."

This one is for you.

Please stay with me. This is depressing, this is heart-breaking, but this is real. Ignoring it will not make it go away. In fact, the only way for us to get control of the problem is to understand it. So I am not going to go into graphic details; I just want to present the facts. Trouble is, the numbers are so high that it is difficult to make them seem real. Until you have seen them firsthand, it is hard to think of them representing individual animals.

Did you know, that in the United States, we kill around 350 healthy, adoptable animals EVERY MINUTE? Now don't go blaming the shelters for that. Those animals are the lucky ones. They were given a chance for adoption, and many found new homes. As for the others, they were cared for and well-fed and their lives were humanely ended. We don't have statistics on the others that were abandoned, lost, or otherwise unaccounted for. Litters of puppies are set off beside the road. (Sometimes this is done by misguided owners who fantasize that they will toddle off to find good homes. Other times it is done by a person who just wants them out of sight and out of mind.) Barn cat populations get out of hand and go feral. Roaming dogs join up to form packs that are more wild than domesticated. Many of these animals live short, miserable lives and meet a violent death.

The sheer reproductive ability of our domestic pets is staggering. For every person born today in the country, seven puppies and kittens will

also be born. This discrepancy makes it obvious that there are just not enough homes to go around. Most dogs go through two heat cycles per year, producing an average of 6-10 puppies per litter. In six years' time, one female dog and her offspring can theoretically produce SIXTY-SEVEN THOUSAND dogs. Cats are even more prolific—able to produce three, and sometimes four, litters per year with 4-6 kittens per litter. That has the potential to become FOUR HUNDRED AND TWENTY THOUSAND cats within seven years.

So what, you say—you don't even have a pet. It doesn't concern you. Well, actually it does—on the average, it costs around \$100 to capture, house, feed, and eventually kill a homeless animal. Guess whose taxes pay for this? And if you've ever had your garbage knocked over by stray dogs or endured the sound of roaming cats fighting and mating under the house, you've been affected directly by the problem.

So, now that you're aware of this, what can we do about it? Obviously, responsible care of our own pets is the first step. Don't let them roam, and have them fixed. In fact, spaying and neutering as many animals as possible is the single most effective thing we can do—shut down those kitten and puppy factories!

Public education is important, too. So now that you're conscious of the problem, make others aware—talk about what you can do to help. Call your local shelter, rescue organization, vet's office, or

just the neighborhood "cat lady". You'll be surprised at the number of ways you can be of assistance. They can put you in touch with programs and organizations you may not have even known existed. You don't have to scoop poop or deal with injured or homeless animals if it distresses you too much. You can help with a fundraiser, drive your elderly neighbor to the vet to keep her cat's spay appointment, drop off a book of stamps or some copy paper to the SNOOP folks. You might be able to transport a furry passenger with you on your next trip for the TRAIN organization. Buy a Spay/Neuter license plate for your vehicle instead of a regular one. Borrow a live trap and help the man down the road catch the feral cats he's been feeding so he can have them fixed (so they don't turn into 420,000 felines!)

If we know about a problem, we can face it, and if we face it we can fix it. It's going to take time and it's going to take cooperation, but we can do it. We have to, if we call ourselves humane.

beneficial. Can't remember why he said that, but he was probably referring to something I read in the paper years later about dandelions attracting ladybugs and ladybugs eating aphids and aphids being bad for your lawn.

I also read somewhere that the dandelion's long root system helped aerate the soil, which is also good for your lawn. Mr. Bailey might have also had that in mind.

Obviously, my mother also

thought dandelions were beneficial because when she would pick greens, she'd pick dandelions and mix them with poke, lamb's tongue and hen's teeth, and all the other varieties of wild greens she could find, and cook them up for supper.

Although as a kid, I didn't much care for them, she'd tell me they were good for me, and again, much later in life I read somewhere that she was absolutely right. According to the U.S. Department of

Agriculture, one serving of dandelion leaves contains 280 percent of the daily requirements of beta carotene, and half the requirements of Vitamin C.

But regardless of whether the plant is good, bad or indifferent, I feel as if I've been personally challenged. I'm determined to rid our driveway of that little critter. I'll try vinegar and if that doesn't do it, I might just pave over it.



CINCINNATI — Adam Dunn, who achieved one of baseball's rare milestones Friday night against the Indians, will donate to the Cincinnati Reds Hall of Fame and Museum the bat he used to hit his walk-off grand slam in that 9-8 victory.

He will keep the ball in the family and give it to his mother, Pat.

Ken Griffey Jr. also donated the batting gloves he wore when he hit his 548th home run last week at New York, which gave the Griffey Family 700 career home runs.

Dunn's grand slam home run in the bottom of the ninth inning against Cleveland that scored the deciding run was only the second-such walk-off grand slam home run in Reds history. The last time it happened was in 1936, when Sammy Byrd brought the Reds back from a 3-0 deficit in the bottom of the ninth.

"It's only happened twice in 135 years of Major League baseball in Cincinnati," said Greg Rhodes, Executive Director of the Reds Hall of Fame. "It's much more likely you would



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# Stewart makes it two straight in Daytona

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — Tony Stewart's slump is over, his shoulder is fine and his fence-climbing is as good as ever.

His moves in a mosh pit leave something to be desired.

Stewart was back to his on-track dominance and off-track hijinks, winning at Daytona International Speedway by charging to the lead with two laps to go Saturday night. He then celebrated with his trademark climbing of the fence, but made the mistake of jumping into the crowd — where he found himself overwhelmed by rowdy fans.

He had to be rescued by his crew and several NASCAR officials, who cleared a path through the mob for the beleaguered NASCAR champion.

"I made the mistake of going down the ladder," he said. "I thought there was a gate there. I didn't find the gate and was in the mosh pit for a while."

But Stewart, who started

climbing fences with this race last year, wasn't going to disappoint the expectant crowd.

"There was no way I was going to let those race fans down," he said. "It started here ... I was either going to get all the way up or I was going to fall off and fall on my butt. But I wasn't going to stop."

"It was every bit as big, if not bigger, than it was last year."

But the race was nothing like last year, when he rolled to a dominating victory in which he led all but nine laps. Instead, he had to earn it after two late cautions nearly yanked the win away from him.

Stewart, who led 85 of the 160 laps, was out front when Jimmie Johnson bumped into Bobby Labonte with 14 laps to go to bring out just the fourth caution in what had been an unusually calm race. It set up one final round of pit stops, and Stewart dropped all the way back to 10th on the restart.

Boris Said, the surprising pole-sitter, didn't pit and inherited the lead. But he kept a nervous eye on his rearview mir-

ror, all too aware of Stewart's bright orange No. 20 Chevrolet closing in on his bumper.

Stewart jumped all the way to second in one sweeping move on the low side of the track, and was preparing to pass Said when a wreck behind him brought out the fifth caution. It gave him time to figure his strategy, which was to sit back and let Said jump out to a huge lead on the restart with three laps to go.

It left Said without any drafting help, and Stewart used a full steam of drafting help to pass him on the outside with two to go.

"I felt like we had a better shot of getting around Boris than we would anybody else," Stewart said. "Not because Boris isn't a great driver, but he hasn't had a lot of experience on restrictor plate racing and knowing what to do and what to watch for."

"I knew some things I could do that he wouldn't be looking for."

He was back out front when the race was stopped on the final lap for a debris caution,

earning his second win of the season and ending a slump that began six races ago when he broke his shoulder blade in an accident in Charlotte, N.C.

Stewart had finishes of 42nd, 25th, third, 41st and 28th since the accident, and dropped from fourth to seventh in the standings. The victory pushed him back up to fifth.

"This team needed this," he said in Victory Lane. "We've had two really rough weeks the last couple of weeks."

Stewart celebrated with his climb to the top of the flagstand, then took it a step further by going over into the crowd.

"I don't know why I do half the stupid stuff I do," he said. "I really felt good at the end of the race until I got stupid and went up the flagstand."

Kyle Busch finished second, his older brother, Kurt, was third and the two were disappointed not to get a chance to team together to chase Stewart down on the final lap.

"I would have done any-

thing Kyle needed me to do for him to go to Victory Lane," Kurt said.

"What a brother," Kyle replied.

"It takes two to pass Tony," Kurt added.

Said, running in just his second race of the year, wound up an impressive fourth and was thrilled with the outcome.

"I just feel like Rocky Balboa in the 15th round, and I just won," he said.

Matt Kenseth finished fifth and was followed by Elliott Sadler, Casey Mears, Jamie McMurray, Kevin Harvick and Clint Bowyer.

Johnson, the points leader, was running in fourth when he wrecked with Labonte. It cost him a shot at his third restrictor-plate victory of the season,

and he wound up 32nd. His lead was sliced to 13 points over Kenseth.

Jeff Gordon, who was trying to tie the late Dale Earnhardt with 11 plate victories, was among the contenders all night until he was caught in the final accident. The five-car wreck occurred when rookie J.J. Yeley and Greg Biffle made contact, and Gordon was caught in the carnage.

He finished 40th and dropped all the way to 12th in the standings.

"There were so many guys out there, and I want to bad mouth every one of them," Gordon said. "But I'm not going to. If I don't have anything nice to say, I shouldn't say anything at all."



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
