LET US FACE THE FACTS

We may as well face the facts. With Red Cross aid withdrawn from all the needy except those farmers who cannot avail themselves of the federal farm loan, many Floyd county families will be in want, with the head of the house, unemployed, needing work and helpless dependents at the mercy of fate or of alms-givers.

If we will consider these harrowing conditions that are about to beset us, and then go about the task of fighting back courageously, honorably and sensibly, the worst can be averted.

Suppose each man in Floyd county now in business, receiving a steady income or occupying a job at a comfortable salary should spend, say, three, four, or even five dollars a month in the employment of the heads of needy families. The result would be a monthly expenditure in this county among the needy of thousands of dollars. Thus would only those willing to work and actually deserving of help receive aid. In this way the man in need would retain his status as an independent, self-supporting citizen, and so can the county as a whole with honor discharge its duty to these citizens who are in distress.

Each town in Floyd county should have contemplated municipal improvements done now, using the labor of only those who actually need work. The county itself, in proposing a road-building program for this year, should open this labor up to the heads of needy families. Spring gardening, preparations for this year's crops, chores about homes in the various towns offer jobs, and those who will need work done should start now wherever possible.

More can be done now at less cost to the employer and to a greater advantage to the laborer than ever before or probably at any later date.

### TO ALL EX-SERVICE MEN

The new Adjusted Compensation Act providing for loans at 4 1/2 per cent interest on the purchase of the face value of each certificate has become a law with the passage of the measure over the President's veto.

Veterans who have their certificates in their possession should apply to their loans to the nearest Regional Office of the Veterans Bureau and meet with their Adjusted Compensation Certificate with their application or file on Form 1187. Where loans have been made previously, application should be made direct to the Veterans' Bureau office which made the loan. Where loans have not previously been made, the certificate of identification is not again required.

The American Legion anticipates that both their offices and those of the Government will be overworked in the matter of emergency assistance under the new Adjusted Compensation Loan Act, and those veterans in urgent need of money. The American Legion, therefore, suggests that veterans not actually in immediate need defer their applications for sixty or ninety days, so as to permit the needed applications to be ready for action. For the same reason, those veterans whose financial plight forces them to make immediate application for relief should do so and then refrain from following up the application with telegrams or letters, as these will only result in slowing down the work in getting out the relief. The Veterans' Bureau estimates that it can get over \$2,000 loans in all offices during the first month of the fiscal year.

These are 41,000 certificates in the control office of the Veterans' Bureau in Washington. Those are the certificates of veterans who have secured loans during the war and upon the loans remaining unpaid the certificates and notes were sent to Washington for payment by the Veterans' Bureau. Veterans whose certificates are in this status should send their applications for further loans directly to the Veterans' Bureau at Washington.

Adjusted Compensation loans are not available and do not pay the loan, the principal and compound interest will almost entirely consume the value of the certificate at the end of the twenty year period. The American Legion will be glad to assist all veterans in filing their applications for loans on their adjusted compensation certificates. 
