EXPLOSIVES TRUCK WRECK KILLS ONE

Investigation extending over twelve hours at West Virginia, slight injuries to the identity of the driver of a 16-cylinder automobile that early Saturday morning forced a heavy truck loaded with 3,000 pounds of all wool explosive, off the Eighth street road, Huntington, killing one man and injuring another.

The body of the dead man, Hayes Adams, of Charleston, W. Va., employed by the Charleston Transfer Company, was removed there.

Trooper Bailey, attached to the Huntington state police post, who investigated the accident, reported that he was unable to obtain any information as to the identity of the driver of the automobile.

The truck was driven by John Bodwin, also employed by the Charleston Transfer Company, and was en route to Louisville with the explosive. At a point on the Eighth street road, five miles south of Huntington, the automobile, which was going in the same direction as the truck, straddled into the heavy vehicle's front wheels, causing it to roll over an embankment the truck turning over twice with Bodwin

SENATOR A. H. HARGIS FREE, TO PAY ALIQUOT

Lexington, Ky., Aug. 1.—Former State Senator Alex H. Hargis, president of the closed Hargis Bank and Trust Company, Jackson, today was released from the Fayette county jail, where he had been kept since July 15 on a contempt of court charge.

The order of release was signed by Lexington Judge King Swope, who sentenced the aged Jackson banker and politician to jail when he failed to pay \$250 monthly alimony to his divorced wife, Mrs. Joanna E. Hargis, who is making her home at 140 Park avenue, Lexington. Mrs. Hargis obtained her divorce decree in the Fayette circuit court after establishing residence in this city. Senator Hargis had failed to pay the alimony for several months,

which she was fined \$10 and costs. She then purchased three used cars and parked them in front of her home to keep others away.

For these she paid County Clerk A. M. January \$80 in license fees. Warrants were taken out by Police Chief James Robertson charging Mrs. Cochran with violation of an ordinance forbidding parking for a twenty-four-hour period.

The notion of Judge Swope in freeing Senator Hargis from jail was taken after he agreed to meet the alimony payments. At the same time Senator Hargis withdrew the \$40,000 suit against Judge Swope, which was dismissed at his own cost, and retracted "book and every allegation contained in the affidavit."

Sensor Hargis and his wife had been married 40 years when she obtained the divorce.



PIPE LINE WORK SHIFTED TO PIKE

Contracting Firm Fails to Reach Agreement With Strikers in Floyd

Failing to offer a compromise with striking workmen on the construction of the Columbia Gas & Electric pipe line in the vicinity of Besse Lanes, this county, the Ashland Contracting Company, contracting firm on the project, was reported this week as having moved to Holman, Pike county, to begin work there leaving completion of work in Floyd to a later date.

At the same time, according to this report, strikers were ordered to return to work at the terms already submitted by the company or leave the new scene of operations. It is believed that the work in Pike county will go forward without the complications which have hindered operations in this county.

At Holman, where construction of the steam compressor station is under way, approximately 75 workmen were held off last week, it is said, when the strike at Harold assumed serious aspects with the wounding of one workman, one of whom was killed Tuesday. The work there was progressing with fair regularity.
