## STATE BASKETBALL FINDS HILL TEAMS OF CHAMP CALIBRE

### Hazard Boys Win State Title; Paintsville Girls Are Finalists ARE GREAT FIGHTERS

That Kentucky basketball must look unto the hills, whence comes its strength is the consensus of opinion arising from the showing of two Eastern Kentucky teams, one of which went through to win the Kentucky championship, the other fighting to the finals and bowing only to the champions of last year.

These two teams, the Hazard boys and the Paintsville girls, followed the footsteps of other famous mountain boys, such as the "miracle team" from Carr Creek, the Ashland Tomcats and others. The Hazard boys, rated as underdogs in every contest following their encounter with Virgie, champions of the district, which they defeated, 27 to 10. Defeated Male, of Louisville, Saturday night in the finals, and Paintsville's girls finally lost to the champion Woodford girls—20 are they champions—25 to 20.

The great defensive work of the Perry county boys, defeated the cream of Kentucky basketball teams, while Paintsville's girls flashed a fine offensive, crushing one team, 35 to 13. The Eastern Kentucky team won the applause of a crowd of 5,000 which jammed the University of Kentucky gymnasium. Saturday night the Hazard boys by their great fight from behind to get into the lead with only a few seconds to play, the Paintsville girls by their dash and courage while playing what was conceded to be the greatest feminine five in Kentucky.

## EXPLANATION OF NEW SCHOOL LAWS

Considerable misunderstanding of the new law which provides for the election of the county superintendent of schools by popular vote exists in this county for which reason the following explanation of the act is given:

As the result of a bill introduced in the House by Dr. A. L. Hill, the educational qualifications for the county superintendent are the same as those for a high school teacher who must be a college graduate. This bill repealed a previous act requiring eligible for the office present county superintendents, even though they do not possess these qualifications and makes the requirements apply to all.

The new trustee act provides for the election of three trustees in each subdivision, one to hold office for three years, another two for the latter two years. Term of office of successful candidates is to be ascertained by the board of trustees in each district at the time of the election, and each succeeding trustee for a three-year term, thus providing all ways for vacancies caused by expired terms. The first election to be held under this act will be on the 1st of Saturday in July, this year. Vacancies occurring in the trusteeship of any sub-district are to be filled by appointment of a trustee by the county board of education, with the recommendation of the superintendent of schools.

### SIX IDEAS ON THE THREE-MEAL ART

**These Won a Prize**  
The first prize in a recent radio cookery contest was won by the mother of four children, who keeps her cookie jar full of her prize-winning "hand-lice." She mixes, then this way, and when you taste one you won't blame the judges.

**DATE JUMBLES:** 2 1/2 cups flour, 2 tps. baking powder, 1/2 tsp. salt, 3/4 cup nut meats, 1/2 pkg. pasteurized dates, 1/2 cup shortening, 1 1/4 cups sugar, 3 eggs, grated rind of 1/2 orange, and 1 tsp. orange juice.

Stir dry ingredients together; add coarsely chopped nut meats, and the dates (sliced). Cream shortening; add sugar gradually, then beaten eggs from dried orange rind. Stir in dry ingredients and orange juice. Drop mixture by teaspoonfuls on a well-oiled baking sheet or inverted dripping pan. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375-400 F.) for about 10 minutes. Four dozen cookies.

**NEW WAY TO "FIX" OYSTERS**  
Everybody knows how to make an oyster stew, but a real blisque of oysters is something else again. A well-known New York hotel chef prides himself on this specialty, and gives his directions, as follows: Heat a quart of oysters, quickly to the boiling point, in their own liquor; drain and strain like Hagen. Then strain half amount out; in three cups of cream add a teaspoon salt, a half

three tablespoons cornstarch, to thicken the sauce and make it creamy. When frothy dilute with the oyster liquor, let simmer ten minutes and keep hot over hot water. Pound the oysters, pass through a sieve, then re-heat in the sauce. When ready to serve, dilute with hot milk or cream.

**IN JACK HORNNER'S CORNER**  
The woman who makes home-made bread or rolls should save one pan for a special sandwich loaf. Just knead one cup of finely cut pasteurized yeast into dough as it is being shaped for the final rising in the pan. This makes an entirely different bread from the usual recipe, and is delicious spread with cream cheese and nuts.

**MAKES CAKES KEEN LONGER**  
Oakes, and cookies made with syrup keep moist longer than when made with sugar, and if flavored syrup is used, have a new and delightful flavor. In making this substitution in a recipe, remember that for each cup of corn syrup used to replace sugar, the amount should be reduced by one cup.

**CREDDLE WASHES TILED ROOF TO MAKE THEM SHINER**  
A simple recipe for cleaning tiled roofs is as follows: Dissolve one cup of soda ash in a gallon of water. Dip a brush in the solution and scrub the tiles. Rinse with clean water.

**NEW ORLEANS PRALINES**—1 cup brown sugar, 2 cups white sugar, 3 tps. corn syrup, 1/2 cup water, 2 tps. maple flavoring, 3/4 cup evaporated milk, and 1 1/2 cups nuts.

Put first five ingredients into a heavy sauce pan and cook with occasional stirring to a thick syrup. Add Evaporated milk slowly so that mixture does not stop boiling. Stir continuously and cook to a soft ball stage (236 F.). Cool. Add nuts. Beat until stiff and creamy. When mixture is stiff, drop rapidly from a spoon on to a buttered sheet in patties about 4 inches in diameter. If candy becomes too stiff at the last, to drop into smooth patties, add a little hot evaporated milk. Yields 1-2 1/2 pounds.

**FOR COCONUT LOVERS**  
Homemakers who like to keep shredded coconut on hand for pies, cakes, candies, cookies, and the score of other things it helps to make tasty, should take care not to remove the waxed wrapper which covers the package. Snip the top to open, but leave the waxed paper on the package, and the coconut will remain fresh-keeping until eating time.

Louisville, Ky.—The War Against Depression, or the United Action Campaign, being sponsored by the American Legion in cooperation with the American Federation of Labor, the Association of National Advertisers and the American Legion Auxiliary, to place a million unemployed persons back to work, has averaged approximately 10,000 jobs a day since the drive was inaugurated in February. Starting with less than one hundred communities, more than 1,500 are now organized and actively engaged in the war.

The Louisville sector is now the scene of a "big push," which started Thursday, March 17, and will continue until 3,000 men are placed in jobs, and 8,000 in new contracts for construction or repair work are secured. Nearly 1,000 members of Jefferson Post No. 15, American Legion, and the American Federation of Labor took to the field in open warfare Saturday morning, March 19.

Brigadier, Elbert W. Carrier is in command of the Louisville sector and has all the "big" trade and commercial groups of the city cooperating. Department Commander Bacon R. Moore, Prestonsburg, again announced that the war would be carried to every county of the state if it took all year and that the Legion expected to keep on until the campaign had a lot of good times had been reaped from the straggling forces of depression.

## LEXINGTON HOSPITAL TO TREAT PSYCHOTIC CASES

Louisville, Ky.—Advice has been received from Congressman Maurice H. Thatcher, by Bacon R. Moore, Department Commander of the Kentucky Department, American Legion, that he had been informed by General Frank T. Hines, director of veterans affairs, that building No. 2 of the U. S. Veterans' Administration Hospital, Lexington, will be utilized for neuro-psychiatric cases.

Hospitalization will be offered first to the forty-five psychotic ex-servicemen now on the waiting list. This is the first time beds have been made available for mental cases in any U. S. Veterans' administration hospital in Kentucky; most cases of this character having been cared for in state institutions.

## 3,000 SCHOOL CHILDREN STORM THEATER DOORS

Newport, Ky.—Calls for the life-saving extra police, Chief of Police and a minor accident characterized the exciting scenes that occurred at the Strand theater, this city, Friday, March 11, when approximately 3,000 school children stormed the doors of the theater seeking to pay their way into the charity matinee (with donations of food and clothing for the Campbell county relief committee). Earl Dietz, commander of James Wallace Costigan Post No. 11, the American Legion, under whose auspices the charity matinee was given stated that in all his experience he had never witnessed anything like it. The schools were dismissed early and the response of the children was almost 100 per cent. When the crowd became unmanageable, members of the Newport police department shared staves and ropes were stretched by the life-saving squad.

New newspaper publishers, such as are than a comfortable living, and scarcely one is reported wealthy from money made in the newspaper business. They deserve to be treated and to be understood by the people. It is the editor and not the plant that makes a newspaper useful in a community, though a honest publisher is a necessity if the paper is to be of any use to the community. (Mass. News)

## FINS WRITTEN TO ASSEMBLY SESSION

### Governor Vetoes Warrant Act

Legislature Ends Term On Discardment Note

After a session which grew more and more turbulent toward the end after a beginning marked by unusual harmony, the General Assembly adjourned last week.

Though Governor Laffoon was thwarted in the veto bill which he sponsored as a revenue-getting measure, as a whole the plan, outlined by him in his message to the Assembly were carried out.

Veto of the Stephenson warrant act was made by the Governor Monday in his first session of this legislative year. Senator E. D. Stephenson, Pikeville, author of the bill, reported himself to have asked its veto, disclosing glaring weaknesses in the bill as passed by the General Assembly.

The veto was made necessary, the Governor said, by the fact that the Legislature failed to provide new revenues and failed to provide any funds to retire the present indebtedness.

Under the circumstances, Governor Laffoon said that his signature on a bill to do away with the warrant system "would imply the outstanding obligation of the state to such an extent as to render them practically valueless."

The Stephenson bill would have repealed the warrant act under which warrants are issued to meet appropriations. Irrespective of whether funds had been provided to meet the charge, then, as soon as funds reach the treasury, the oldest warrants are called. New claims, instead of being paid in cash, are paid in new warrants, which go to the foot of the priority list.

Since the Stephenson act would have done away with calling of old warrants, it would have left \$15,000,000 of the state's debt "floating" without any due date and with only a probabilistic expectation of ever being repaid.

Governor Laffoon relied upon the Stephenson bill to put the state on a "pay-as-you-go" basis, he added the General Assembly to provide revenues by pay off the state debt and to pass legislation putting the state on a modern budget basis. The Stephenson bill was the answer to his request for a budget plan. It would have restricted issuance of warrants to 90 per cent of the anticipated budget funds of the current year.

Warrants could not have been issued except against current revenues and they would have been required to be called for payment as soon as funds reached the treasury. The old system of a new warrant yielding precedence to old warrants for payment would have been abolished.

Since the state's income does not flow into the treasury evenly, while expenses generally are uniform throughout the year, the Stephenson act recognized that it was impossible to do away with treasury financing entirely by pay off the state debt and to pass legislation putting the state on a modern budget basis. The Stephenson bill was the answer to his request for a budget plan. It would have restricted issuance of warrants to 90 per cent of that amount in warrants or by outright borrowing.

**Lump Debt Proposed**  
The treasury would have been allowed to borrow a lump sum in anticipation of revenues, instead of doing the same thing piece meal through warrants on individual dates.

The 10 per cent margin against which the treasury could not borrow which the Stephenson act recognized that it was impossible to do away with treasury financing entirely by pay off the state debt and to pass legislation putting the state on a modern budget basis. The Stephenson bill was the answer to his request for a budget plan. It would have restricted issuance of warrants to 90 per cent of that amount in warrants or by outright borrowing.

Andrew Venters is the son of Mrs. Roy Venters, of this place. He was born at Millard, but moved to Pikeville a number of years ago. His father preceded him in death four years ago.

Andrew attended Pikeville high school three years. He then left school and worked as mail carrier with the local postoffice for a short time. He left Pikeville more than two years ago and went to Woodville, New Hampshire, where he secured a position as reporter for the Woodville Times.

It was his intention when he gave up his job with the Times to make his way across the continent, by foot, auto and rail. The Bible, which he was taking to the young movie star, was to have been autographed by every Jackie Cooper movie fan he came in contact with on the trip.

The body arrived in Pikeville on the noon train Monday and was taken to the Moore cemetery near Shelby for burial, following the services here on Wednesday.

Besides his mother, Andrew is survived by three sisters and two brothers, all younger than he.
