Production Shows Heavy Increase Over Last Year in March

COLONIAL TO OPEN

Steady improvement in the coal business in this section lifted to a new high last week the coal loading in the Big Sandy division of the Chesapeake & Ohio system. Figures made available to The Times this week show:

Last week, 3,124 cars were loaded by the Big Sandy division, as compared with 2,988 in the same week of the last year, representing an increase in loadings of 32 per cent.

Two months ago, production in the Big Sandy field was off 45 to 47 per cent. Now, it is only 10 to 12 per cent below par. It was indicated a few days ago when it was said that production figures are 30 per cent better on an average over the C. & O. system than it was six months ago.

September is expected to see an even greater activity in the coal business, in this section. The Glogora Coal Company at Glogora, this county, resumed operations Monday after an extended lay-off. A summer current here this week states that consideration is being given to a plan for re-opening of the Colonial Coal Company mines here.
