21-YEAR SENTENCE GIVEN NEWMAN IN SLAYING OF BATES

Wiley Howard Draws Eight-Year Term for Connection With Wireman Killing

Wiley Howard was given an eight-year sentence for his connection in the slaying of Dayton Wireman.

This Newman drew a 21-year penitentiary sentence Saturday at the hands of a jury in the Floyd circuit court which held him guilty of the slaying recently of Wilson Bates on Left Beaver Creek. His conviction came after less than two hours' deliberation by the jury.

His brother, George Newman, is to be given trial at a coming term of circuit court here for the same crime, in brief, showed that Bates, as he walked along the railroad leaving the Newman home, fired a shot into the ground. Newman thereupon fired three shots at him as he walked away from the home, this evidence continued.

The defense sought to show by its witnesses that Bates was shooting in the direction of the home where the Newman were when he was fired.

As this was the first of a two-day trial of Wiley Howard, charged with the murder of Dayton Wireman on Lick Creek, was drawing near.

Howard is charged with shooting at Wireman after his son, Wilt Howard, had mortally wounded Wireman. He was recently captured in Ohio and returned to jail here after having been a fugitive since the day of the slaying.

APPOINTS ATKINSON FOR COMMISSIONER

Paintsville Man Re-Named To U. S. District Post by Judge Ford

From a field of approximately a dozen applicants for the post of United States Commissioner Fred Atkinson, Paintsville, a Republican and holder of the position for the past four years, emerged the victor last week when Federal Judge H. C. Church Ford announced Mr. Atkinson's appointment for another four-year term. The appointment was dated March 30.

Commissioner Atkinson's first appointment was made four years ago by the late Judge A. M. J. Cochran to succeed the late L. T. McClure as Commissioner. During his term of office he has made an excellent record.

The notification of the appointment also specified that offices of the Commissioner are to remain in Paintsville.

WALLIS ADDRESSES FLOYD-CO. VOTERS

Democratic Candidate for Governor Opens Eastern Kentucky Campaign Here

Frederick A. Wallis, Paris, Democratic candidate for Governor, opened his Eastern Kentucky campaign in Prestonsburg Tuesday evening. First, Mr. Wallis entertained approximately 50 admirers to dinner at the Auxier hotel, then appeared at the courthouse in an address before a large crowd.

"Extensive governmental reforms were advocated by the speaker. Reduction of state expenses, correction of crowded and otherwise unwholesome conditions in the penal and charitable institutions of the state, removal of the paralyzing power from the Governor's hands and placing the matter of election of the hands of a non-partisan board and elimination of taxes against property holders assessed at \$2,000 and under.

Of the sales tax, Mr. Wallis said that, while this form of taxation ends automatically in 1936 unless a bill is passed renewing it, the tax should be eliminated entirely or reduced, and that it should not in any case apply to the necessities of life.

SAYS MORE THAN HALF ON RELIEF HAVE FAILED TO REGISTER FOR WORK

Of the 25,000 able-bodied, employable men on relief in the 11 counties of this section, more than 15,000 have failed to register with the National Re-Employment Service in order that they may be considered for work with private industries, W. A. Peterman, district manager of the Re-Employment Service, said last week.

All able-bodied persons on relief rolls should register for employment by private industry, Mr. Peterman urges. "The National Re-Employment Service not only is an agency created to handle employment for the unemployed toward securing permanent jobs in private industry."

MAGOFFIN FISCAL COURT INDICTED

Failure to Publish Audit As Required by Law Cause of Action

The six members of the Magoffin fiscal court, including the five Magistrates and the County Judge, were indicted at the last session of the grand jury of the Magoffin circuit court on the allegation that neither had, as provided by law, published a statement of their receipts and disbursements in detail.

Statute 1846 provides for a fine of \$50 against each member of the fiscal court if the court "fails or refuses" to publish a statement of the claims allowed during the past fiscal year, together with the names of the payees and the purpose for which they were allowed. Such a statement was not published at the close of the last fiscal year, and the fiscal court had consistently refused to comply with the law regarding its publication, according to the Salyersville Independent.

W. P. Carpenter, treasurer of Magoffin county, was also accused of violating a section of the statutes dealing with public utility of the county financial affairs, this section being 3747-a1, which provides for a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$500 against "any official" whose duties are to collect and disburse funds of a county or any political subdivision less than a county, who fails or refuses within 30 days from the close of the fiscal year to cause to have published in a newspaper published in said county a statement of receipts and disbursements of the county during the fiscal year just passed.

Upon the presentation in court of these indictments, a demurrer to each indictment was filed, which was sustained by the court, with the right reserved by the Commonwealth's attorney to re-appear on these cases to the next grand jury. It was said that the indictments were drawn by a grand jury of 1935, which grand jury also dispensed the law terms of office was not available for wards minister of the county's transactions.

MAY, FIRST FLOYD COUNTIAN TO PASS WEST POINT EXAM

Prestonsburg Boy, Junior at Berea, To Enter Military Academy in July

David D. May, of Prestonsburg, last week received notification that a meeting at the requirements to admission to the West Point Military Academy, he had won an honor, heretofore not attained by a Floyd countian.

Mr. May is a son of the late David F. May and of Mrs. Byrd Callahan May, of Prestonsburg. He is a junior in Berea College. He was graduated from Berea high school in 1931 and is a member of the State championship country putting team and represented Kentucky I-H clubs at the National Dairy Show in St. Louis that year.

Mr. May leaves for West Point July 1.

The following letter from Congressman A. J. APPROVAL OF TWO PROJECTS IS MADE

Road Work at Wayland, Street Surfacing at Martin O. K. D.

Approval of two more relief projects on which a total of \$6,610.80 will be expended was made last week by E. A. Murry, director of works for the Kentucky Emergency Relief Administration.

One of these projects is surfacing of the county road at Wayland to the Kent county line. 22 men to be employed for 120 days at \$1.50 per day. The other project is the surfacing of the county road at Martin, 24 men to be employed at a total expenditure of \$2,620.

Start of work on these two projects will bring the KERA project total in Floyd county to 29. Further efforts may be made soon by officials to gain the approval of projects for the improvements of county roads on which work has not been done this year.

NEW REGULATIONS FACILITATE LOANS

Applications for mortgage loans may now be sent direct to the Federal Housing Administration state headquarters in the Martin-Brown building, Louisville, as a result of recent amendments to the regulations, it was announced last week by T. Noonan Ryan, chief underwriter. He said "Since this change was put into operation 20 applications have been received direct from persons eager to borrow money either to build a house or to re-finance a mortgage debt against their property. Of the 20 applications, aggregating \$127,000, six were for refunding burdensome existing mortgages and 14 were for the construction of new houses at a total cost of \$78,000.

EXPENSE CUT MOVE LEADER IN EAST KY.

Wheeler Heads Drive in This Section for Tax Reduction Group

The movement started by the Tax Reduction Association to present a united front in preparing and pushing through to adoption a program of economy in state and governmental expenditures at the 1936 General Assembly session is being headed in Eastern Kentucky by H. H. Wheeler, president of the Sandy Valley Grocery Company, Paintsville, and a director of the Association. It was announced this week.

Mr. Wheeler said that taxpayers of every class from all parts of the state are responding to the call of the Association in preparing for the proposed reforms.

The program includes budgetary control and audit of all public expenditures, abolishing all useless offices, abolishing the fee system which is the backbone of local political control of public offices, merging of overlapping functions of government, and elimination of waste and unnecessary expense.

The association has been investigating the cost of government in Kentucky, including all the counties, cities, towns, and special taxing districts, and finds it is now \$85,000,000 a year, based upon re-

ports of the U. S. Census Bureau, and reports from counties, cities and cities compiled by the research staff of the association.

The total cost in 1920 was \$40,000,000, which shows a greater rise in 15 years than in all the 128 years' history of the state prior to that date. "Adoption of our economy program in full," says the statement of the association, will bring expenditures down approximately to the level of 1920, which is an undertaking requiring the unselfish efforts of a great mass of taxpayers. It will take years of such effort."

An effective start toward this objective was made by the association last year, when five laws were enacted that provide means of reducing the total cost of government in Kentucky approximately \$5,000,000 annually.
