ATTACK MADE ON JUDGE'S ORDER

'Fight to Finish' On Roadhouses Is Envisioned

A fight to the finish over the regulation of roadhouses was in prospect this week as J. B. Ratliff, lance roadhouse owner, filed a petition in the Floyd circuit court for a writ of prohibition restraining County Judge R. P. Hill, Jr., from enforcing the opening and closing hour issued by him last week. A temporary writ of prohibition, granted by Circuit Judge Henry Stephens, Jr., was construed as permitting roadhouse operators to keep their places of business open until April 26 at all hours, if they desire to take the risk of paying the penalty. In the event Judge Hill's order is held valid, it was explained that granting of the temporary injunction was mandatory and that the possible "open house" period to exist between now and April 26 is a result of the 10-day notice necessary to be given Judge Hill before final hearing of the case. Judge Hill's order last week specified that all Floyd county roadhouses may not open before 8 a.m. and may not remain open after 8 p.m.

Mr. Ratliff's petition, filed by Atty. Joe P. Tackett, asked that Judge Hill be prohibited permanently from attempting to enforce either the state law empowering County Judges to regulate roadhouses or his recent order stating the hours during which roadhouses may be operated.

Doctor Here Named In \$10,000 Suit

Alleging that Dr. D. H. Daniels left a roll of gauze in the incision he made at the Prestonsburg General hospital when he performed an appendectomy on her, Jan. 17, last, and that, as a result, the three-year-old child suffered a severe laceration injury, Opal Hall, of Auxier, this week filed suit in the Floyd circuit court asking \$10,000 damages.

The plaintiff, whose suit was filed by Atty. Joe P. Tackett, alleged that the gauze remained left March 9 when another operation resulted in its discovery and removal.

HENRY HARRIS DIES AT 61

West P'burg Man, Paralysis Victim, Monday Morning

Henry Clay Harris, prominent West Prestonsburg man, died Monday morning at 10 o'clock at his home, six hours after having been stricken by paralysis. He was 61 years old.

Eldest son of the late Robert W. and Agnes Fitzpatrick Harris, the victim was one of the county's best-known citizens. For years he was a teacher in the Floyd county schools, later engaging in the lumber and mercantile business at West Prestonsburg. He had, since early childhood, been a member of the Methodist church here. His friends were all who knew him.

His wife was, deceased, Dec. 21, 1914 to Miss Jane O'Dell, who survives. To this union were born two daughters, Miss Agnes Harris, Norfolk, Va., and Miss Anna May Harris, a sophomore at Lees College, Jackson, Ky. He is also survived by one step-daughter, Mrs. C. P. 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TWO 'CLEARED' OF MURDER CHARGES

Officer Is Named In False Arrest Accusation

Two of the 31 indictments returned this week by the grand jury of the Floyd circuit court named five men as murder charges, and another accused an officer of false arrest.

The murder indictments were returned in the slaying of Willie Shortridge near here, two weeks ago, and of Monroe Salisbury at Hunter, a few days earlier.

Isaac Sturff, Joe Wheeler Horn, Isaac McDowell and T. J. Fitzpatrick were named in the Shortridge case. Willie Salisbury was accused of the Monroe Salisbury slaying. The officers accused of false arrest is Deputy Constable Jim Hall, who, it was alleged, arrested C. A. Kidd, of Harold, on a drunkenness charge. Kidd claims he was not guilty. Kidd also told the grand jury that the officer refused him permission to see MacArthur Derry Roberts, instead, brought him here to jail where he remained 10 days.

The two murder trials of the week resulted in acquittal. Part Hall Stone, charged with murder in allegedly abetting the slaying of Levi Taylor at Drift by her husband, Doliver Stone, was acquitted Monday. Witnesses told of Taylor striking her and advancing on her husband after the latter fired a warning shot in the ground. Doliver Stone in a previous court term was given a 10-year term for the slaying.

Trial of Vernon Cremons, Carroll, for the slaying of his brother-in-law James McKee, resulted in his acquittal Wednesday. He contended that he fired in self-defense after being attacked in his home by McKee.

Next murder case is that of Ben Tackett and his wife, Mary, of Mud Creek, for the slaying of his cousin, Byrd Tackett. The trial is slated to begin Friday. The Tacketts have been in jail here since the crime was committed several months ago. Shooting and wounding robbery

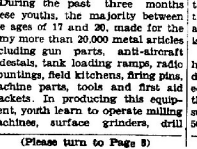

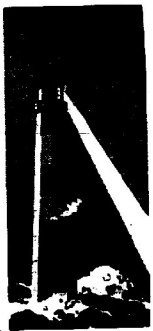

Floyd County Idle Receive Benefits Totalling \$4,153

Unemployed workers in Floyd County, covered by the Kentucky Unemployment Compensation Law, received benefit payments totalling \$4,153 during February. Executive Director V. B. Barnes, of the Kentucky Unemployment Compensation Commission, announced last week. A total of 30 new claims were filed in the county during the month, Barnes said, while 148 unemployed workers continued claims which they had previously filed. The cumulative state total for February, Barnes said, was 8,246 new claims filed; 30,740 continued claims filed; and \$208,007.22 in benefits paid.

Generally speaking, Barnes said, an unemployed worker who during the year 1941 earned as much as \$200 in wages from employers subject to the Kentucky Unemployment Compensation Law (for the most part this includes employers of four or more regular employees), and who is unemployed through no fault of their own, are now eligible for unemployment benefits.

back and called, "Marion!" As the officer turned he was shot twice, one bullet passing through his hip from left to right, the other entering below the hip and ranging upward to emerge from his right armpit. He died Friday afternoon in the Hurst hospital, Hazard.

One of Hall's bullets "parted" the hair of Policeman Combs, a brother of Atty. B. and A. B. Combs, Prestonsburg, who whined and fired Hall dead through a rear window of the restaurant before it was known he was hit. He died in the Stumbo Memorial hospital, Luckey.



Constitutionality of the law giving County Judges power to regulate roadhouse hours was attacked in the petition. The plaintiff contends that the permitting of roadhouses in incorporated towns to remain open longer than those outside such towns amounts to "class legislation" and is therefore unconstitutional.

Regulation of hours in incorporated towns rests with town councils. The petition also alleged that Judge Hill failed to provide by the provision in the law that he enter within 30 days after entering office an order fixing hours of roadhouse operation. He failed to enter any

order of the kind for several months, the petition alleges. County Attorney Woodrow W. Burchett declared roadhouse operators are "barking up the wrong tree in this case." He predicted that Judge Hill will be upheld in circuit court.

Ridgill's position also claimed that the 8 p. m. War Time closing hour is unconstitutional. He predicted that this would deprive the public of an opportunity to secure recreation during the hours which they as a general custom are wont to do.

Right of the Club Rustique here to operate later hours than roadhouses elsewhere in the county because of its inclusion in the city limit, of Presonsburg was challenged this week by Judge Hill by issuing a warrant for its owner, Frank H. Lippie.

Judge Hill contends that the Club Rustique is not legally a part of Presonsburg.

FOUR NABBED BY F. B. I.
