



### Battle Veteran Given Promotion Overseas








Caddy, in his address, said that during the past production of the World War I, 740,000 American coal miners produced six hundred and seventy million tons of coal.

"Our coal production this last year represented half of the total production of the world," he said. "The American miner did this despite the fact that the coal industry was compelled to use old equipment which had to be constantly repaired to keep it in."

"That you may further understand," Caddy added, "the value and use of coal in fighting the enemy, consider this—It requires 10 tons of coal to make a B-29 bomber. Now 100 B-29s—five over Tokyo and five over Berlin—require 100 tons of coal to produce one 2,000-pound aerial bomb. The American boys on one of these B-29 bombers tossed their load of destruction on the city of Tokyo, and you read in this... It takes 32,000 tons of coal to make a battleship, and when the battleship is sunk it floats recently sent the Japanese to the bottom of the deep, the coal miners of Kentucky put in coal that glorious victory. You read in the papers that 10,000 tons of bombs were dropped on Berlin. It takes 100 railroad carloads of coal to conduct one of these bombing raids. Unless you dig the coal the boys cannot carry out these bombing raids."

Kentucky & West Virginia Power Company, which allows it to concentrate where the population is dense and the revenue per mile much greater than is required by the R.R.A. This, of course, will make service to the remoter sections, both from a standpoint of income and from the lines and part of the water problems. For example: the power lines would allow the construction of the various creeks to reach the more populated areas as the mouth of the creeks. In order for the Company to extend its service to all the people living on the particular creek it would become necessary to build a line parallel to the power company's line for several miles in order to reach the people living in the remoter sections. They could not receive any revenue from any of the lines which have been granted to the power company.

"It is still the plan, and intention of the Cooperative to furnish electric energy to every person who would desire it, and every effort will be made to do this. At the present time the power restrictions do not permit the cooperative to connect members unless they can qualify under certain conditions."

Opposition to encroachment upon territory they desired to serve was expressed at hearings last summer by the Big Sandy, Fleming-Mason, Licking Valley, Cumberland and Jackson Rural Electric Co-operatives. The Association which filed petitions seeking authorization to make extensions themselves.

Chairman McCree said these intervening petitions seeking permits to build additional lines by the co-operatives had been dismissed without prejudice, enabling them to file applications later for any construction they might propose.

The chairman declared Kentucky & West Virginia was granted the certificate "because the evidence shows clearly that the power company is better able to supply the energy to consumers and at a lower cost. The commission holds it is in the public interest when applications are filed either by power companies or co-operatives for the one best able to serve at the lowest rate to consumers be the one to be granted the permits."
