COURT HIRES ROAD CREW NUCLEUS

**Sammons Employed
As Foreman; Work
Soon To Be Begun**

Bennie Sammons, former Kentucky State Highway Department maintenance employe in this county, was named as foreman of a road crew at its special meeting Friday to supervise road work in the county this year.

Employment of Mr. Sammons and three others hired on a salary basis under the county highway department was set at \$175 a month. Others employed—Kenneth Caldwell, Leonard Joseph and Sol Sammons, tractor and grader operators—will be paid \$10 a month.

These employes this week began reading machinery for grade and drain work on rural roads. These road improvements will begin as soon as weather and road conditions permit, officials said. The county has earmarked \$8,000 for rural roads this year.

County Judge E. P. Hill said Wednesday the court has been notified by the county highway department that the 6,000 tons of gravel ordered for application on farm-to-market roads in this county will not be ready for shipment till June or July. Officials here are debating the advisability of applying gravel at that season when roads are harrowed and the gravel will not adhere to road surface. The opinion was expressed that gravel applied in October or later would be more immediate and lasting benefit to the roads.

Sgt. Calhoun Wins Silver Star

Major General Maurice Roe pins the Silver Star on 1st Sgt. Denver Calhoun after the Floyd countian had distinguished himself against heavy odds during Rundstedt counter-offensive.

First Sergeant Denver Calhoun, of the Floyd county soldier whose photograph casting overseas, was honored in the Presidential election by being named to millions of newspapers, readers over America, has been awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in fighting the Germans during the Rundstedt breakthrough in December.

Although ordinarily a mess sergeant and not expected to do active fighting, Sgt. Calhoun distinguished himself in the face of a formidable force of German soldiers in the defense of the town of Stanton, Mo., in January, 1945. He was awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in fighting the Germans during the Rundstedt breakthrough in December.

Quickly selecting squad leader, and men, Sgt. Calhoun posted them at strategic positions, manning the few machine guns and bullet-proof Tommy guns in the headquarters area.

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The 3rd armed division headquarters to which the Floyd countian was attached had paraded after the afternoon to reconnoiter in a small town in Belgium in the area of the latest German offensive. Leaving a small party of the headquarters company to join them later, the forward echelon departed for a more distant town.

AN interminable discussion of the selection of Ashland as the site for the proposed district tuberculosis sanatorium will achieve no change in the action already taken, and this newspaper does not propose to engage in any desultory editorial exchange with any other newspaper about the matter.

But, since The Ashland Daily Independent has presented the Ashland case while belittling the merits of Allen, at the same time flaying The Courier-Journal for its espousal of the Floyd county site, THE TIMES cannot refrain from commenting on some of The Independent's editorial statements. This comment is also prompted by a clipping of the Ashland newspaper's editorial mailed us from Frankfort and marked, "Please print."

The Independent vehemently declares The Courier-Journal failed to consider the reports of the engineer, the architect and the State Board of Health favoring the Ashland site. We counter with the truth that The Independent and the Commission as a whole have failed to consider the report of the Sites Committee, the five men who actually went on the ground and inspected the sites, and who voted, 4 to 1, for the Allen location.

The Independent—surely not in earnest—cites the fact that Ashland has a population of 29,537 to Allen's 368, thus implying that the size of the two places should be a factor in arriving at a choice of site. We would remind The Independent that this line of reasoning would have constrained the Commission to vote for the largest city in Kentucky—Louisville. Would an enlargement of Hazelwood at Louisville or a concentration of tuberculosis sanatoria in its vicinity be the answer?

But let us not become trivial. The sanatorium now in the blue-print stage would have been built at Allen, a place of 368 souls, to the same specifications as those of the hospital to be erected in the city of Ashland. It would have housed the same number of patients. That appears to The Times as a matter of importance, the number of patients to be served. All of Ashland's 20,000-odd inhabitants and Allen's 368 are not tubercular. The region a hospital located at either site will serve is the all-important consideration.

Then let us take a glance at the figures: List Lewis, Greenup, Carter, Rowan, Elliott and Lawrence along with Boyd as nearer the Ashland site than the proposed site at Allen. You have a population of 160,073 (as of the 1940 census) nearer Ashland than Allen. Then on the Allen side of the ledger list Menifee, Morgan, Johnson, Martin, Wolfe, Magoffin, Floyd, Pike, Breathitt, Knott and Letcher. Those 11 counties have a population of 296,397! Ashland and Allen are mere dots on the map in this huge area, it must be remembered—a small dot and a larger dot.

The matter of water supply and sewage is discussed by The Independent—in Ashland's favor. But there was no question ever raised at any time as to Floyd's ability to provide those necessities, just as a site was guaranteed and that guarantee never violated.

Then the Ashland newspaper points with pride to the fact that at least 12 passenger trains come into Ashland daily, that there are eight highways leading into Ashland. There is ever any question about transportation facilities to either site being inadequate to handle the tuberculosis patients and their relatives going to and from one hospital?

Well, Allen has six passenger trains daily. Allen, according to The Independent, has only Route 80 for a highway. Has our esteemed contemporary forgotten U.S. 23? That trunk highway, as well as Route 80, is within a stone's throw of the proposed site at Allen. We have no intention of quibbling about those eight highways into Ashland, but the only trunk highways we have been able to discover are Route 23, the same highway that passes the hamlet of Allen. Route 60 and Route 52 which crosses from Ohio at Coal Grove into Ashland then soon drops Kentucky for West Virginia.

Oh, well!—both The Independent and The Times are merely talking talk. The die has been cast, Floyd county lost. The Courier-Journal might have naively hoped the Governor would veto the Ashland selection. We are not biased, not particularly cynical—but we have never toyed with such an idea.

As for The Courier-Journal and the attack made on it, that newspaper is quite able to defend itself. In its behalf, however, we would say this: That newspaper was far enough away from the forest to be able to see it in spite of the trees.


DFC, Purple Heart Won by Sgt. Martin

Small Cooke and K.P.'s raced for their weapons leaving the hot-cake batter to remain unscathed. Within 30 minutes the battle was under way. The first Panzer tanks made their appearance, with their infantry troops perched atop, and began firing at the small garrison of Americans. Bazookas and 50-caliber machine guns were used to great effect. It wasn't a case of armor against armor, it was German against a superior force of 10 to 1, plus heavy weapons.

Five rounds of fire greeted the enemy each time he tried to advance. Shells and mortars came pounding in, making things more and more difficult. The defenders ducked as best they could, but didn't budge an inch from their line of defense or from their posts.

At one spot the enemy managed to advance about 100 feet to where the squad of Sgt. Jesse W. Free, of Cherryville, Kansas, was posted. The group moved down the advancing Jerries as they came into view. This squad consisted of Cpl. Raymond E. Arnold, N. Y.; Sgt. Fred W. C. Richard, N. Y.; Sgt. Richard A. Walters, of Evert, Wash., and Pfc. Edward Manfredi, of Crookston, N. Y. They accounted for at least 50 Germans, dead and wounded, and two enemy vehicles destroyed.

At another post were Cpl. Troy S. Winters, of Anna, Ill.; Pvt. Felix W. Boyer, Detroit, Mich.; Pvt. Melvin J. Housenbeck, Roanoke, Va., and Cpl. Paul A. Paggiugli, Chicago, Ill. An enemy tank was advancing. Cpl. Abraham Moskowitz, Bronx, N. Y., put in a timely appearance with a bazooka which knocked out the tank. Sgt. Calhoun further distinguished himself by his handling of the bazooka that he used.

Down the line, using a lumber pile for a defense barrier was Sgt. Henry S. Kennedy, of Elmira, N. Y., with his squad consisting of Sgt. Anton A. Drynalla, of Wallace, Texas; Cpl. James A. Anderson, of Brookport, Ill.; Pfc. Ed. W. Fuller, of Princeton, W. Va., and Pvt. Angelo Maccaro of New Rochelle, N. Y. They had managed to set fire to a German jeep, and account for its Nazi occupants.

The soldiers worked tirelessly throughout the battle, hauling ammunition, distributing food rations and setting up fortifications as well as taking care of the wounded.

The crew, in addition to S/Sgt. Laus, were: Cpl. Melvin C. Hallman, Chicago, Ill.; Cpl. Arthur L. McFadden, Springfield, Ohio, and Cpl. Arthur O. Jensen, Slaton, South Dakota.

In charge of communications was S/Sgt. F. Allan McKenzie, in the command post of the headquarters who kept the line open for use. He found it necessary at times to trouble-shoot the wires and do his own repair as well as fire his when things got too hot about the building. Sgt. McKenzie was instrumental in locating Capt. Rodman to organize a swift and effective defense against an enemy tank supported by numerous infantry coming over the bridge into the town.

Throughout the night and the next day, and the day after it was the same story—the Germans attempting to storm the garrison being repelled each time they tried. There was no sleep for the defenders, nor were there re-inforcements to relieve them, but the cold-blooded, weary soldiers kept at it until the morning of the 24th when the German threat was finally removed. Sgt. Calhoun's wife, Mrs. Susan Blackburn Calhoun, resides here; his mother, Mrs. Bill Calhoun, at Water Gap.
