(Continued From Page One) By this week-end mine operation may be settled by a paralyzing stoppage, unless an 11th-hour settling of differences of governmental intervention is forthcoming. Nearly 50,000 Kentucky miners were polled in the U.M.W.A. balloting Wednesday in the Hazard, Big Sandy and Harlan fields, but union spokesmen said the voting procedure hindered production little. Other thousands in Western Kentucky cast their ballots. Two major results of a walkout in state mines would be: The daily loss of approximately 160,000 tons of coal production, vital in war and other industry and utilities; and: To the miner, personally, the loss of pay—at the rate of about \$650 a year, or on the basis of an approximate 50,000 miners, an overall \$425,000 daily in Kentucky. Miners were given an opportunity to vote before each shift at polling places near the mines and, spokesmen asserted, in most cases without loss of time. Balloting places were open in the fields from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Should the Washington negotiations break down entirely, or should the government fail to play the ace-in-the-hole—seizure of the mines—the miners will leave the pits, union spokesmen stated, even though a strike call is not issued from national U.M.W.A. headquarters, because: "No contract—no work." Kentucky miners together with U. M. W. A. member-workers elsewhere in the soft coal belt, are seeking, among other concessions: 1. A quarter hour more portal pay each day. 2. Vacation pay of \$100 annually instead of \$50. 3. Ten cents an hour wage differential for the second shift, 15 cents an hour for the third shift. 4. Ten cents a ton royalty on all coal mined (to be used for hospitalization, insurance and other benefits for the miners). 5. Elimination of wage differen-



Fewer "Hands" Make Heavier Work!



SPRING brings a new lamb crop to the western ranges—and a new crop of wartime problems. For instance, experienced lambing crews are increasingly hard to find. But in spite of fewer hands and other difficulties, millions of lambs are being dropped and raised to provide the nation's wool and meat. Beyond the "scarceness" of sheep ranching lies a great deal of hard work. When early lambs arrive in wintry weather, there's no time to be lost in moving them from the "drop corrals" to the lambing shed. Called lambs often must be revived in heated incubator. It's not unusual for a good "night man" to "lamb out" 125 ewes in a night—and that is work. There's the feeding and, later on, trimming, docking, brand herding, shearing, and finally the trailing of the "suds" to the summer ranges in the high mountain country. And always herders must be on the alert to protect their bands from coyotes and other predatory animals.

WHAT'S HAPPENING TO THE MEAT SUPPLY

We're faced with a serious shortage of meat for the civilian population. The current meat situation is not peculiar to any local area. The problem is national in scope.

LARGE DECREASE COMPARED WITH LAST YEAR Government figures indicate a decrease of 38% of civilian meat supplies is expected during this quarter (January to March, inclusive), as compared with a year ago. The decrease will vary on the different types of meats. It is also estimated that during the second quarter of this year (April to June, inclusive) a decrease of 35% is expected.

GOVERNMENT REQUIREMENTS

- BEF: 60% of choice, good, and commercial steers and heifers, except extremely lighters, heifers and cows. 80% of all cutters and canners. PORK: 60%, approximately, of dressed weight. LARD: 75%, approximately, of production in accordance with recent order. The Government is also taking a large proportion of Swift & Company's lamb and veal production: LAMBS: 40 to 60% of choice and good lambs. VEAL: 60%, approximately, of choice, good and commercial veal produced within specifications. Whether these percentages will continue at the same level throughout the year cannot be foretold. HOW THE DOLLAR IS DIVIDED

There's an old proverb, "One picture is worth a thousand words." So I decided to draw this month's column instead of writing it. The picture is below, and it tells this story... 75 cents (on the average) out of every Swift sales dollar goes to agricultural producers for their cattle, lambs, hogs, etc. And 11c out of every dollar goes to the people who work in Swift plants, preparing these farm and ranch products for market. Transporting meat, etc., an average of 1,100 miles from producer to consumer takes another 2c. But, after all, the picture tells the story better than words of mine. Few business operators on such a narrow margin—few return such a large slice of their sales dollar to the suppliers of raw materials. F.M. Simpson, Agricultural Research Dept.

another important factor that does not show up in these figures. The civilian population has more money now than in 1939 and fewer goods on which to spend it. Also, more people are working longer hours and need more food, particularly meat. The demand for meat has, therefore, increased tremendously. The Government in a recent statement said that the average American, at present income levels, would consume 170 pounds of meat this year, if it were available. In contrast, the Government estimates that there will be available during 1945 only about 127 pounds per capita.

NON-FEDERALLY INSPECTED SUPPLIES

The Government takes only federally-inspected meats. Therefore, the shortage of meat available for civilians is not so acute in the case of local packers who do not operate under federal inspection. Non-federally inspected processing plants have been able to supply a larger percentage of the product they produce during normal times as compared with federally-inspected plants.
