Housing Director Tells Changes in Regulations Governing New Building

State FHA Director Roscoe R. Dalton announced last week that all FHA field offices are authorized to waive the provisions of Title 24, Part 2, and Title 24, Part 2, regarding accommodations to be held for sale to veterans for a specified period after completion of the construction of a building, in those cases where the building is to be used for the following purposes:

(1) One or more units in the project have been completed and satisfactory steps taken during construction and for 30 days after completion to publicly offer the unit or units for sale to veterans without finding a veteran purchaser; (2) the applicant agrees to take affirmative steps to publicly offer all uncompleted units for sale to veterans, and apply the waiver only to units after they have been completed; and (3) the applicant agrees to give any subsequent prospective veteran purchaser preference over non-veterans in the sale of available completed units.

Those builders who have built under preference ratings for sale to veterans and desire a waiver and have complied with the conditions indicated above should make requests in writing to the Federal Housing Administration, Postoffice Bldg., Louisville, Ky. If more than one project is involved, separate requests should be made for each project. Such waiver, if granted, does not affect the maximum sales price established whether the house is eventually sold to veterans or non-veterans.

EXPLAINS KY. JOBLESS LAW One-Employee Business May Be Subject When Changes Are Often

Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 24—A reminder to employers of only one employee business is the subject of provisions of Kentucky's jobless insurance law was issued today by the Kentucky Unemployment Compensation Commission.

The Commission explained that many employers with less than four employees are under the impression that they are not covered by the state unemployment insurance law. It was pointed out that this is an erroneous impression because the state unemployment compensation act defines an employing unit as any individual or organization which has—or subsequent to Jan. 1, 1936 had—one or more workers performing services for it within this state. Such "employing units" are required to submit reports to the Unemployment Compensation Commission in order that a determination can be made as to whether the unit has become subject to payment of contributions to the unemployment benefit fund.

The employer having only one worker at a time may become subject to the law, the Commission explained, through turnover of his personnel. For instance, it was pointed out, an employer with one worker only, might hire four different men in a calendar quarter of 13 weeks, although not more than one of these four was working at any one time. This being the case, the employer would have had during the calendar quarter four workmen to whom he had paid as much, say, as \$50 during the quarter. If this occurred for at least three of the four calendar quarters, this would be a factor that would bring him within the scope of state law requiring unemployment insurance.

An employer to whom this occurred, therefore, would be subject to the reports with the state agency on a quarterly basis and make the required contributions of 2.7 per cent of his taxable payroll, plus an additional tax of 3 of 1 per cent of the total taxable payroll, payable on an annual basis, either to the federal government or to the Kentucky Unemployment Compensation administration fund.

Emphasizing the manner in which an employer of only one worker might come under coverage by the law, the commission cited a section of the state act which defines a "subject employer" as "any employing unit which, in each of three calendar quarters in the preceding calendar year, had in covered employment four or more workers—whether or not the same workers—at as many as four of whom at least \$50 in wages was payable to each with respect to such covered employment in each such quarter."

The commission urged that any employer who is in doubt as to his status as affecting his coverage under the unemployment insurance program contact the agency's central office at Frankfort. This action on the part of the employer will avoid the annual of any penalties or the unpaid contributions in the event that liability for contributions has been established.

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE EMPLOYEES OF THE PRINCCESS MINING COMPANY IN ANSWER TO A LETTER ADDRESSED TO ALL MEN, NO. 1, P. 1, DAVID, KENTUCKY, SIGNED BY DAVID L. FRANCIS

The numerous misleading statements in this letter were intended, in my judgment, to further confuse and mislead the employees in an effort to weaken your local union.

The statement is entirely erroneous with reference to the action of the joint board. The board did not agree to dismiss the grievance as Mr. Francis claims. The board was not to dismiss the case, as Mr. Francis claims. The board split in their vote with the operators voting not to hear the case, and the mine workers on the board voting to hear the case. The motion was made by President Caddy that the case be heard. The mine workers did not agree with the operators to not hear the case as stated in Mr. Francis' letter.

Mr. Francis' reference to a statement made by Sam Caddy in the presence of Tom Raney, in Lexington, Ky. January 10, 1946, is entirely untrue statement and does not contain one word of truth.

In the last paragraph in Mr. Francis' letter, he says the management of the mine has sincerely tried to maintain a policy of being friendly, honest, and helpful in carrying out the friendly policy. I wonder who Mr. Francis thinks he is kidding. Mr. Francis knows that his company has been in violation of the contract under the past custom clause.

Mr. Stollings did agree with me in the presence of the mine committee representative Hibbits. Le. Miller, U.S. Navy, that if we failed to settle Sam Manuel's case that the case would be tried at the joint board. This conference was held Oct. 20, 1946. Mr. Stollings further made the statement that he would call H. S. Roman and arrange for a board meeting, and he said that if the Princess Election lost the case they would accept the decision of the board or umpire, and if the union lost the case they hoped the miners would be so fortunate enough to accept the decision. I made this statement at the joint board, and Mr. Stollings did not deny this statement because Mr. Stollings knew that the mine committee would know that he had broken his word to his employees and to Le. Miller of the U.S. Navy.

I thought Mr. Stollings was a man of his word; in other words, he acts as if he is extremely religious; therefore, every member of the mine committee was deeply shocked when we heard Mr. Stollings stand before the board and ask that the Sam Manuel case not be tried, because this was a wide departure from the agreement made by Mr. Stollings that the case would be tried.

I repeat, I wonder who Mr. Francis thinks he is kidding when he writes circular letters stating that his company has always tried to be fair? I ASK YOU, MR. STOLLINGS, IS IT FAIR FOR YOUR COMPANY TO KICK OUT AN OLD ESTABLISHED CUSTOMER OF SENIORITY? I ASK YOU, AGAIN, MR. STOLLINGS, WHY DID YOU AGREE WITH THE COMMITTEE TO TRY THIS CASE ON OCTOBER 26, AND CHANGE YOUR OPINION AND ASK THAT IT NOT BE TRIED ON FEB. 20?

DO YOU BELIEVE THAT YOUR EMPLOYEES THINK THAT YOU ARE BEING FAIR WHEN YOU TELL YOUR MEN ONE THING WHEN YOU MEAN SOMETHING ELSE?

Mr. Francis stated that Tom Raney apologized to Mr. Stollings and said that he took full responsibility for the safety committee's action. I do not deny that I did advise the safety committee to comply with every recommendation in the Federal Safety Code, and did insist that the local union place a fine upon any man who was caught violating this safety code. I further urged the committee to insist that the Company comply to the code, and I did not apologize to Mr. Stollings. I did keep my promise and my word to Mr. Stollings and the committee, but Mr. Stollings did not keep his word to try the Sam Manuel case.

I regret that it is necessary to resort to writing this public letter; however, I felt it was the only means to combat the company's propaganda system of circulating the employees with erroneous and misleading letters to all employees.

Your company has discharged Bill Ratliff, one of the oldest employees and chairman of the mine committee, and Mr. Crawford, Mine Superintendent, told field representative Hibbits that he would not state exactly what Ratliff was fired for; however, every miner knows in his heart that Bill Ratliff was fired for no other reason except that he is a leader in the local union, and that Bill Ratliff did lead a committee to the Navy Department and explain the miners' case to Capt. Schneider, and I further think that the com-

pany fired Bill Ratliff in order to throw a scare into other good union men who were in the local union.

In fourteen years of contract negotiations with operators in the Big Sandy field this is the first time that any Coal Company ever attempted to be brazen enough to ignore the contract and refuse to try a grievance before the joint board; all other companies keep their word to their employees when making an agreement.

No other Coal Company in this District has ever resorted to circulating their employees in an attempt to discredit the representatives of the union by publishing erroneous and misleading statements.

The Mine Committee can tell the men at this mine that the statement made by Mr. Francis or Mr. Stollings that Carson Hibbits withdrew a case of Hansen Holbrooks stating that the men had no seniority is erroneous and misleading because the committee knows that T. W. English, Commissioner for the operators, was present and told Dean Zornas that according to past custom of seniority that they would have to put Holbrooks on the job and that Holbrooks was given the job which he had claimed through seniority.

The mine committee can tell the men and each employee also knows that every grievance under seniority has been settled based on seniority ever since the mine has been in operation up until the Government seized the mine, and we believe the Company is taking advantage of the Smith-Connolly Law to force the employees to give up their local seniority at this mine.

Safety Improvements At Drift Mine Told As Needs Are Cited

Although endorsing the many important safety improvements carried out recently at the 500-ton-a-day Better No. 1 mine of the Beaver Coal and Mining Company at Drift, government inspectors suggest correction of remaining deviations from the Federal Mine Safety Code in a final inspection report released by the Bureau of Mines.

The Floyd county mine employed 91 men when it was examined in November by Inspectors Matthew I. Duncan and Malcolm Davis. Inspectors Duncan and Davis, citing nearly between-inspection safety advances, said that they indicated printed timbering rules and diagrams, suitable explosives-transportation boxes, storage of not more than a 48-hour supply of explosives underground, removal of a booster fan from the mine, driving of rock cuts at proper intervals, rock dusting of the main haulageways, re-rulers for all locomotives, guarding of the trolley wires on both sides of doors, fuse-equipped switches for the pump electric circuits, and several other electrical safeguards.

The inspectors also commended the use of permissible electric lamps by all underground workers, increased fire protection underground, an effective employee-identification system, wearing of dust-proof clothing by the haulage men, and employment of a safety director.

Noting that hazards still existed in several phases of operation, Duncan and Davis recommended setting permanent timbers closer to the faces in two active sections and removal of more effective support of loose roof and overhangs along haulageways, maintenance of unobstructed clearance, a ban on the hand-coupling of moving cars, use of sprags, chains or car blocks to hold standing cars, and numerous precautions against electrical hazards.

Additional suggestions called for generally improved ventilation in the working sections, air-lock doors, solid fireproof stoppings between the intake and return airways of the main and cross entries, and pre-shift tests for explosive gas and other hazards, safer location of an explosive magazine in the No. 3 section, an expanded coal-dust control

program, further mechanical safeguards, and universal wearing of protective clothing.

The inspectors also recommended prohibition of smoking in the mine in conformance with Bureau of Mines safety standards.

Otis Conley, who has been critically ill at Prestonsburg General hospital, suffering from a heart condition due to a blood clot, has a chance for recovery, it was said Wednesday.

ers connected to existing lines that
did not necessitate any additional
hole line. "It is an interesting fact
that there are hundreds of prospec-
tive lines that are connected to the
reach of existing lines that for one
reason or another have never been
connected to the existing lines," the
statement said.

The general rural electrification
program is based on area coverage
which will ultimately bring electric
service to virtually all farms and
rural establishments in the compan-
ies' territory. The rural extension
plan requires only \$4 per month
or \$1 per customer where there are
as many as four customers per mile,
is among the lowest in the country
and brings electric service within
the means of all who plan to make
use of it, it was pointed out. Custom-
ers desiring electric service for
the first time are making applica-
tions faster than the lines can be
built to serve them under existing
conditions. Until shutouts of mate-
rials, manpower and transportation
can be overcome, the company em-
phasized, prospective customers must
have patience.

During the period January 1-Fe-
bruary 5, 1946, 1947 miles of new rural
lines were built and 2,381 new cus-
tomers connected. At the close of
the period there were another 47,322
miles under construction with 488,429
ready to be placed under construc-
tion. Hundreds of other miles were
in the various stages of being made
ready for actual construction. Bar-
ring any unforeseen difficulties and
with the wholehearted cooperation
of those desiring electric service in
rural areas, 1947 should prove to
be a record rural line construction
year.

The Kentucky & West Virginia
Power Company has been working
for the past two and one-half years
on an extensive program in Floyd
and surrounding counties. This
program, developed in connec-
tion with a similar program by the
Appalachian Electric Power Com-
pany in Virginia and West Virginia,
is to continue through 1947 and un-
til electric service is available to
everyone in the territory who de-
sires to use this service. P. M. Baker,
district manager of Kentucky &
West Virginia, said.

In 1946 the Kentucky & West Vir-
ginia Power Company completed 25
miles of rural extensions to serve
434 customers in Floyd county. It
plans to build 75 miles of line to
serve 800 customers during 1947.
