Prestonsburg's Black Cat baseball team got back on the win side this week, defeating the Martin Purple Flash here Saturday, 16 to 6, without being extended but having to fight every inch of the extra-inning way to defeat the Paintsville Tigers Tuesday afternoon, 5 to 7.

That game with Paintsville was a hand-ripper and it had a storybook finish. After Burchett, starting Prestonsburg pitcher, had lost the range in the sixth and had been pounded for enough runs to permit the visitors to tie up the contest, he went to third base and in the ninth made his relief, Bill Gebbe, the winner by pounding out a home run.


