

to do with the war effort, war contracts, or any other business affecting the United States government," he said.

It was an involved transaction, May and some others had, in his own words, "gone broke" trying to mine manganese in Greenbrier county, W. Va. Murray Garson and Joseph Freeman, a fourth defendant, dismissed by the court on Wednesday, offered to buy the property and organize a new firm.

May said he signed these notes in April 1941, on which Murray Garson borrowed \$10,000. Garson and Freeman signed a document acknowledging that they were the real debtors, even though the money was borrowed over May's signature. Apparently this is a fairly common device in which May played the

part of an "accommodation maker" of the note.

May was to receive \$7,000 to repay his prior losses in the company and the stockholders of the old company were to receive 48 per cent of the stock of the new company as part of the deal.

Thus, he contended, when Garson paid off the two \$2,000 notes in New York in June, 1942, he was simply paying back money which had been borrowed in May's name, but which Garson had received originally. The other \$5,000 note still is outstanding against May's name, but constitutes an obligation of Murray Garson.

May identified all of the documents involved in the deal and his attorney, Wayne Mace, read them to the jury.

Similarly, May explained, the \$2,000 check from Murray was part payment for his interest in the manganese mining venture.

This was as far as he got in an-

swering the charges before Federal Judge Henry A. Schweinhart called a halt.

Earlier, he had gone into detail about himself and his career on examination by Mace. He told how he was appointed to the House Military Affairs Committee in 1931, served on no other committee and became its chairman in 1938.

TUESDAY—Andrew J. May today said he posed as the owner of a Letcher county lumber firm because of alleged reluctance of residents to work for out-of-town employers.

"I hesitate to inject this answer into the case," he told Attorney Warren Magee, who was questioning him about his reasons for cloaking the Garsons' interest in the Cumberland Lumber Company, "but if I were known that an outside corporation, owned by people from Chicago who were Jews, was in control they couldn't have hired anybody. A man from right across the river in West Virginia couldn't get anyone and had to leave timber standing. I regret to say that, but it's a fact."

The situation was aggravated by the pressing labor shortage in the mountain district, where 3,000 men had gone to the armed forces and most of the remaining able-bodied men were in the mines, he said.

May's statement was the second reference to anti-Semitism by the defense. Charles J. Margiotti, counsel for the Garsons, to get broken up at my time of life."

The explanation: "I was referring to the money put up by Henry Garson. I did not then, never did, and don't now own any interest in Cumberland Lumber Company. I never had any agreement to give Fields a stock and he knew I was not."

May said both Fields and Brown knew that Henry Garson was the owner of Cumberland although both testified they had not known it, and although May, in explaining one of his statements, said he wanted Fields to think he, May, would lose if the job were a failure.

May identified the letter, in which he said: "I am being financially interested in the company, my preference is on the ground that I induced these men to put money in the property and it is my duty to help them get it out and when I was responsible for getting them in this mess by securing

the wrong man for them I feel obligated to help get them out..."

"If he (Brown) claims I made certain promises or wrote a certain letter, he was dealing with me as an individual and not with the company (Cumberland) and furthermore, all that I said to him was contingent upon the acquisition by me and I of the property which we were never able to do."

Such was filed in federal court and dismissed when Brown bought the land, mill, and all assets of Cumberland for \$40,000. Henry Garson got this money.

In all, May identified a score of letters and documents relating to these transactions introduced to strengthen the defense theory that May acted only as the Garsons' agent, motivated solely to help the war effort.

May also denied statements of a prosecution witness that he was a participant in a Miami conference at which Murray Garson and several other cut up the expected profits of a government contract for tent poles.

He attended the conference in an attorney's office, merely to pass the while waiting to see an old friend who had offices in the building, he said. He paid no attention to the subject matter and was surprised when his son, Robert V. May, told him he, the son, had been given a contract for 50 per cent of the profits.

"I told him to have nothing to do with it," May said. "He said he'd already signed the contract but said he'd get the agreement with May, and he had recommended they invest in it. Both L. W. Fields and A. C. Brown, of Whitesburg, had been hired by May to run the mill profitably and both had failed, he said."

Further, Brown had asserted claim to an interest in the land, based on an alleged agreement with May, and blocked the sale to Virginia men for \$50,000. So, in January, 1946, May wrote Attorney J. W. "Jack" Howard, Prestonsburg, former State Senator, instructing him to sue Brown for possession of the land and \$8,000 profit Brown had deposited in his wife's account.



youngsters are all down front, the very smallest in the first row of seats and so on back to the oldest in the farthest back. After the minister, pointer in hand, has told the story depicted by his drawings, pointing to each separate scene, he gives the youngsters a quiz. After seeing names and places and Biblical characters appear before them on the blackboard and almost come to life before their eyes, the children readily answer questions that would sorely test the Biblical knowledge of many of their elders.

From Sunday to Sunday, a small child is picked at random from the audience to go to the blackboard and explain the lesson. For examples: Sunday, May 11, the Bible lesson told of Elijah the prophet of God and the prophets of Baal. For that lesson the minister had sketched in black color, on the 4 by 8-foot blackboard, these scenes: The Israelites bowing to the god of Baal; Elijah in the mountains, the warriors bringing him food; the top of Mount Carmel, the altar of Baal and the altar built by Elijah of 13 stones, and Elijah standing by his altar, as depicted in prayer and the fire falling on his flaming altar.

After the pastor had made his "ill-lustrated lecture," he called on six-year-old Christine Whitaker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Allen Whitaker. Unabashed, the little girl took the pointer and for the next five minutes explained every detail of the lesson, pointing out to the others each individual scene.

It sounds almost unbelievable that a child that young could do this, but I have no doubt that there were 50 or more children there that day who could have done the same thing," the Reverend Durham said.

After the children have held the stage for 25 to 30 minutes, the various classes have their individual testing period in separate classrooms. But, by and large, the Sunday School is what the pastor calls it—"the Sunday School of Childhood."

Emphasis on teaching of youngsters has paid off in results. The Reverend Durham attributes, high interest in the Sunday School almost exclusively to the blackboard lessons and the prominent part the children play. When he went to David from Nelly, W. Va., in January, 1945, Sunday School attendance at David averaged 35. During the past winter, he said, the average attendance was 130. This in a town of around 500 population.

Besides his work as minister, Sunday School leader and Scoutmaster at David, the 26-year veteran of the pulpit is no mean shakes of a printer. With the tall, angular minister there came to David his printing press and fonts of type. On the press, which he has used for 20 years, the Reverend Durham publishes a weekly "Bulletin" for the church and the community. The publication of 700 (free) not only covers David to the saturation point but also extends to outlying territory, into Prestonsburg and several out-of-state cities.

Maybe the David Sunday School is different because its genial, soft-spoken leader is different.



ADVISES VETS ON INSURANCE

McKinney Points Out Settlement Options Veterans May Use

The Veterans Administration again this week urged veterans who have national service life insurance to give careful consideration to the settlement provisions of their policies.

Del L. McKinney, of the VA office here, explained that the insurance Act of 1946 opened a large field of new settlement options designed to provide for the various needs and circumstances of veterans' benefits.

The new optional settlements range from lump sum payments to monthly installments during the life of the first beneficiary. Under the original law, the only settlements authorized were monthly income and annuity payments.

If death occurs before the insured veteran has selected one of the optional settlements, the insurance is paid in 36 monthly installments to his beneficiary. Mr. McKinney said the beneficiary may elect to receive installments over a longer period. Under no circumstances, however, may a beneficiary receive a lump sum settlement unless the insured selected that type of option before he died.

One of the main advantages of the new settlement provisions, Mr. McKinney said, is that the veteran may now select a combination of payments. For instance, he may specify that a certain amount of his insurance be paid to the beneficiary in a lump sum at time of death and that the remainder be paid in monthly installments over a given period or during the lifetime of his beneficiary.

When electing a settlement option for G.I. insurance, the veteran should consider what his beneficiary's future circumstances may be, Mr. McKinney said.

Veterans who have allowed G.I. term insurance to lapse were reminded they can now reinstate their policies at little cost and minimum requirements.

KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH

By EWING GALLOWAY

Kentucky is probably the only state with two governmental agencies with the same objectives that cooperate not at all.

For a good many years the state Department of Agriculture and the Kentucky Experiment Station have been co-operating no better than it one were in Iceland and the other in Little America.

The results right now is that our Agriculture Department is little more than a name. Its appropriations have been curtailed for so long and so much of its work taken over by the Experiment Station that the general public, which includes most of the farming population, hardly knows it exists.

In reporting something the Committee for Kentucky's report on agriculture omitted, I am putting personal blame on nobody connected with either agency. Maybe all the work of the two agencies should have been consolidated and the Agriculture Department job taken over by the Experiment Station. That would have eliminated conflicting interests, particularly in pressure campaigns for funds every year the Legislature has to appropriate operating money.

Also it would have eliminated all the departmental jealousies that have helped to make co-operation next to impossible.

A state Senator told me recently that he believed the two agencies could be made to function together and that a majority of the General Assembly was in favor of whatever legislation that may be needed to get the best results.

If the two departments could be worked together, they should be consolidated, perhaps with the Experiment Station taking over.

The Experiment Station has one very important advantage. It is farther removed than the Department of Agriculture from the whims of politics, from changes in its higher personnel every few years.

The present set-up is bad. That we know. How to remedy it is something for a committee in the Assembly to find out and report upon, then for the Legislature to act upon. After enabling legislation is enacted, then it will be up to public officials of the right sort to do the rest. It can be done.




