4— "Such action," the statement continued, "is not democratic and we hope it will serve as a warning in the future to our good citizens to be more careful in the selection of their public officials."

"It is tragic and dangerous for self-government when the normal functioning of our whole people—more than 70,000 of them—can be disturbed by such a warning."

The statement added that "this and other actions by the wets will be fought every step of the way until..."

Prutt asserted that the court was determined to allow him time to deal with a docket of some 100 cases in the quarterly court and he described the suspension as "routine."

"It is far better to have legal sale. The return of prohibition will mean a bootlegger on every corner, and a moonshine still in every hollow," the judge commented.

Prutt, who started serving his present term in January, 1945, when he said, "All I've got to say is that I've done no wrong, they have the remedy, and they ought to use it."

Asking whether there were legal means to compel the recording of the vote without delay, he declined comment.





### Thirty Deaths Are Not Horrifying

SLOW DEATH isn't so horrifying?

It isn't? Otherwise, we would be doing something about it. Otherwise, we would feel such mounting horror that every man and woman of us would do something—anything—to halt the fearful threat at our doors.

If it were death from infantile paralysis or spinal meningitis or some other disease that sweeps dramatically down to snatch from us loved ones who, only a few short weeks ago, were healthy and delightfully alive, the full sense of horror would be ours.

But tuberculosis doesn't work that way. In widely segregated homes there are isolated cases. At first, the malady is only seldom recognizable either to the sufferer or others. Following the loss of weight, the spasms of coughing, the awful death that creeps by inches, inexorably to demand full satisfaction.

Within a year, 30 residents of Floyd county died slowly in towns, up the creeks, in hospitals, in sanitariums. Week by week, this newspaper reported the great but undramatic toll . . . a toll of humanity which, nevertheless, was truly awesome.

If those 30 had died within a few weeks, in one or two communities, we all would have been properly impressed. But the slow death, stretched over weeks or even months, insistently crept up on us unimaginative souls, stalked us so tediously that none of us became frightened.

Thus has tuberculosis infiltrated our communities as successfully as any foreign invader or any wartime enemy, without disturbing the defenders to action.

The Floyd County Tuberculosis Association has done a fair measure of good work. But it cannot ever achieve its major aims unless the rank and file of the people become aware of the threat tuberculosis presents to persons of all ages, in every walk of life.

As of this year—while persons were dying being drawn to the grave by it—the County Tuberculosis Association could not get as many as a dozen of all the thousands of persons in this county to meet to plan further work and to carry on drives for funds. This, despite the fact that every person who lives as much as \$2 worth of Tuberculosis Seal has a right to vote in the Association's affairs, as much as even an official of the Association.

Floyd is one of the two Kentucky counties designated by the State Tuberculosis Association as demonstration counties for an experiment in intensive work toward the early and eventual eradication of the White Plague. Under this plan the state association will pay one-third the salary of a full-time nurse, or up to \$800 a year, with the county association paying the remainder, or about \$1,900. This is a three-year plan and if the results at the end of that time justify such support, it has been authoritatively said, the U.S. Public Health Service will pour money into Kentucky in an all-out drive on tuberculosis.

It should be explained, too, that the county association itself retains a larger share of funds raised locally through Seal sales than are retained by any other group in similar public health endeavor. If the people of this county, for example, buy \$5,000 worth of Seals, the Floyd County Tuberculosis Association retains, for work in this county, fully 75 per cent of that amount.

Last year, there were 30 known funerals resulting from the ravages of tuberculosis, as deadly a killer as ever stalked humankind. There doubtless were some whose deaths were unexpected. Next year, many more may die. Those who have died had their contacts; there is no way to meet the foe without public interest and the public support necessary to employ a nurse spending all her time in seeking out the sick of tuberculosis, all their contacts, all the breeding places of the disease.

That is only a small part of the story. What the people of Floyd county, particularly the leaders and Floyd county parents, do this year will write another chapter for next year and the years to come.
