**Reinspection Report Notes Safety Gains In Jones Fork Mine**

Further coal-dust control measures and additional haulage safety checks are recommended in the Evans Elkhorn Coal Company's 85-ton-a-day Jones Fork mine near Lacey, in a formal reinspection report issued by the Bureau of Mines which also cites a number of between-inspection gains. Forty men were employed at the mine when it was re-examined in October by Inspector Russell Shaw.

Although Inspector Shaw noted that "the greater part of the mine" had been rock-dusted, he recommended more extensive rock-dusting of the Nos. 1 and 2 back entries as well as application of additional rock dust in several other areas. Use of water to allay dust during cutting and loading operations and cleaning "excessive" coal-dust accumulations from haulageways also was suggested.

Regarding haulage, the inspector proposed cleaning of obstructions from the haulageways and crosscuts, use of shelter bolts, rerailing devices for the locomotives, use of portable trip lights, and employment of chains, sprags or blocks to secure standing cars.

Among the extensive recent safety advances reported by Shaw were prying down of loose roof at one working place, provision of suitable explosive-storage magazines, transportation of explosives in special containers, adequate clearance at the switch throws, proper bonding of the haulage tracks and several other electrical safeguards, guarding of the drive belts for the fan and pump, effective fire protection underground, and universal wearing of safety-toe shoes.

Fifty-six thousand feet of drain tile were installed on 128 farms in Clay county last year.

**Mrs. Mary Ann Allen Victim in 63rd Year**



**OF INTEREST TO VETERANS**

The number of World War II veterans taking educational and job-training courses in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky decreased slightly during December, totaling 139,745 on January 1, Veterans Administration Branch Office in Columbus, O., reported this week.

The total, which was 6,390 less than the December 1 enrollment, included: Ohio, 165,551, decrease of 4,645; Michigan, 130,519, decrease of 1,083; Kentucky, 42,689, decrease of 887.

The figures represent veterans enrolled under both the G.I. Bill and Public Law 16 (eligible veterans).

While the decrease was reflected in both educational and job-training programs, most of the decline represented veterans enrolled under the G.I. Bill, VA said.

In Ohio, there were 121,204 veterans in educational institutions and 45,483 taking job-training courses on January 1. Michigan has 112,200 in educational programs and 18,519 in job-training, while Kentucky showed 37,972 in educational institutions and 9,997 in job-training.

Latest Veterans Administration figures show that 2,323 seriously disabled World War II veterans in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky have received automotive vehicles at government expense under the law passed by Congress in August, 1946.

Cost of the vehicles was \$3,692,652. The totals include: Ohio, 1,039 vehicles, \$1,653,463; Michigan, 890, vehicles, \$1,297,083; Kentucky, 494 vehicles, \$662,124.

The law provides an automobile or other conveyance, at a cost not to exceed \$1,200, for any World War II veteran who lost, or lost the use of, one or both legs at or above the ankle as the result of service-incurred injuries.

Under the present law, eligible veterans should submit their applications for vehicles at government expense to VA prior to June 30, 1948.

**QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**  
Q. I am a World War I veteran and would like to know if there is any limit for filing a claim for compensation for disability caused by my war service?  
A. There is no time limit set for filing claim for compensation under existing legislation.

Q. I was told that my disability, which I claim was due to service, cannot be service-connected because I had it before I entered the service. Am I eligible for compensation?  
A. If you decide that your illness was incurred in or aggravated by your service in the armed forces you will be entitled to receive compensation, if it exists to a compensable degree.



**HERE IS WHAT KEA WILL ASSEMBLY TO DO FOR SCHOOLS**

The Kentucky Education Association and the new Superintendent of Public Instruction, Rowell B. Hodgkin, have prepared a 14-point program to be presented from time to time to the General Assembly during this session.

Last week, four points were presented, and from rumors in Frankfort, they were "received favorably" in the House of Representatives. Apparently the No. 1 and 2 items dealing with the biennial budget and the teacher-retirement system, are certain of passage. Both measures passed the House last Wednesday by 95-0 votes.

To make the retirement system actually sound, Kentucky must advance \$4,639,006.84 to make up the funds required for those teachers who had been teaching several years before the retirement law was enacted in 1941. Since that date, the state has been required only to match teacher contributions, but prior to that date, the total obligation falls upon the state.

The budget as passed falls short of the \$34,000,000 the teachers desired. It does not provide sufficient funds to meet item 2, an "adequate" appropriation for the State Department of Education and institutions of higher learning.

The sixth point of the program is legislation already introduced. This sought to reduce the cost of collection of school taxes from 4 per cent to 3 per cent. "I believe that 4 per cent is exorbitant," at present, school-tax collectors, usually the county sheriff, receive 1 per cent out of the tax now levied. Newly-elected sheriffs are to receive 4 per cent. The K.E.A. hopes to eradicate this bill before it becomes effective.

A proposal of interest to Louisville educators is the one requesting fiscal independence for the Louisville Board of Education. Louisville is the only school district of the 248 in Kentucky that is not fiscally independent, since it is the only city of first class in Kentucky. Omar Carmichael, Superintendent of Louisville public schools, remarked, "My position on fiscal independence should be well-known to the people who are interested. I believe that in the long run, fiscal independence will be reflected in an improved school system."

The No. 8 measure seeks authority for school districts to share in the net proceeds of publicly-owned utilities. This means that a municipality should take over a utility such as a light-and-power plant, the municipality shall be given authority to pay the local board of education annually a sum equivalent to the school taxes which were paid by the utility when privately owned.

The ninth item calls for legislation to permit members of all school and college boards to serve out the terms for which appointed unless removed for cause. "This aims to prevent a Governor from removing without cause a member of the board of trustees of the University of Kentucky, any member of the board of regents of the teachers' colleges, or any member of the board of trustees of the University of Louisville during the term, for which appointed except for some, specifically stated cause."

Number 10 is aimed at extending the compulsory school-attendance age from 16 to 17 years, or to the 17th birthday. Hodgkin expressed the hope that schools could be set up which would interest boys and girls of this age, so that attendance would not be so difficult to enforce. He was referring to either local or regional vocational schools to furnish education to those pupils whose aptitude does not lie along academic lines.

publicity director for the K.E.A. "It will lighten the tax and machinery for tax assessment so that everyone will pay his share."

A minimum school term of nine months instead of the present eight hinges upon the appropriation for teachers' salaries. Brooker explained by saying, "If sufficient funds are provided to increase the monthly salary of teachers in the state and add another month, then this proposal will be made. But we will not ask teachers to work an additional month for the increase." The budget bill as it stands now will add approximately \$107 to teachers' annual pay. This, of necessity, will cancel the above proposal, since the K.E.A. was aiming toward an annual salary of \$2,400, and the present budget bill would make an average of not more than \$1,400.

The other four measures are to ease administration. Grouped together they include (1) the granting of authority to boards of education to request public health officers to approve permits allowing teachers' absences from school because of ill health; (2) the establishment of a state revolving fund from which loans may be made to local boards of education at a low rate of interest to assist in the purchase of school buses; (3) amendments to modernize and liberalize the present antiquated textbook-adoption laws, and (4) to make the fiscal year coincide with the school year, that is, to begin on July 1 and end on June 30 in all municipalities of the state.

The transportation measure will request the state to set up a fund of \$500,000 to be lent to local boards of education for purchase of buses.

As to textbook-adoption laws, the K.E.A. hopes this time merely to reduce the adoption period from five to four years, and to permit a 50-per cent change in books, instead of the 33-1/3 per cent now permitted.

In addition to these 14 points, Brooker said the K.E.A. would like to attempt legislation to amend the State Constitution so that the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction will be made appointive rather than elective. He said the association would oppose any legislation injurious to education, such as the lowering of certification requirements by popular election of local school superintendents.


