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**Pike County Boy Flees Boys Town With Two Others**

Fourteen-year-old Crawford Casebolt, Fort's Branch, Pike county, was in custody in Lexington, Neb., Tuesday after running away from Boys Town last week.

Casebolt was admitted to Boys Town last fall after his life sentence on a robbery charge, given him at Pikeville, was remitted. The case attracted wide attention because of the offender's age.

A charge of being a juvenile delinquent was filed against Casebolt Tuesday after he and two companions, also from Boys Town, were arrested at near-by Gothenburg, Neb. County Attorney John Neir, of Dawson county, Neb., said juvenile delinquency charges were filed against all three boys in connection with the theft of a car. After a hearing before County Judge M. O. Bates the companions—James Fritter, 15, Miami, and Charles Stakelin, 15, Mathias, Ky.—were ordered to the Boys' Training School, Kearney, Neb. Casebolt's case was continued until a parole officer arrives.

Conley said Blair returned later and as he entered the Legion home with a knife in his hand he said: "This is it."

A prosecution witness called to the stand Tuesday, Bill Conley (no relation to the defendant), testified that Conley, not Blair, had made the remark. However, Conley insisted that the victim had said it.

Conley said he had "emplified his gun" at Blair only in fear of his life as Commonwealth's Attorney J. B. Clarke rigorously cross-examined the defendant.

Three other witnesses were called by the defense, including Patrolman Proctor Hannah who made the arrest shortly after the shooting. The officer said he took a .38-calibre pistol, containing six shells, from Conley.

The Commonwealth has maintained that Conley sent a companion, Reece Ratcliff, to bring Blair back to the Legion home after the card game and that Conley shot Blair as he entered the lobby.

Ratcliff, 24, his father, Press Ratcliff, 46, the victim's step-mother, Mrs. Lillian Dean Blair, and Reuben Webb, Conley's brother-in-law, all are charged with murder in the slaying.

In his opening remarks to the jury, seated after a 48-member panel had been interviewed, Clark demanded the death penalty.

**We Might Break Clear**  
THE recent news-story in The Times of the Kreis plan for synthetic fuel production may have created false hopes for this section.

The fact of the matter is, we are not misinformed, neither Floyd county nor any other county in Eastern Kentucky has a Chinaman's chance of being the site of one of these big plants, as matters now stand.

The "matters" referred to are contained in one word, "transportation."

A news-story printed in the daily newspapers, and only a few days ago reaching this desk, points out that while the program proposed would provide for the construction of 75 to 100 plants over a 10-year period, the plants must be not only near coal but also near large quantities of water and first class transportation.

We have the coal. We have a railroad that has rendered the section good service, within the limits of its capabilities. But, it is explained, first class transportation means more than one form of transportation; it means rail, highway and water transportation.

And water transportation is contemplated by Governor Earle C. Clements.

We had hoped a change would be made. Any departure from the record of failure compiled over the years by the present system would have been a welcome relief.

Although this newspaper has maintained that handling of state rural road funds by the fiscal courts of the several counties is desirable, it is not inclined to predict failure for the other plan which would place the whole road matter with the state.

Rural roads can be built by the state, if the Administration in power chooses to build them. If the state will stick to road-building and eschew the business of political fence-building, the big job ahead is not too great.

Whatever the success attained by any change made now or later, it will be better than the system now in effect, whatever its failures, they cannot be more dismal than the state-and-county cooperative system which features much talk, little action and everybody passing the buck.

The Times favored direct control of rural highway building by the counties with careful planning and trained supervision, because it has always felt that the government unit closest to home knows more of home needs, can get most done for the least money and is more directly responsible to its people than the state administration.

But it may be that we have seen the entire matter only from the Floyd county angle. Here we have been impressed by the fiscal court's interest in rural roads. Maybe there are fiscal courts in other counties that would have abused their newly-given power.

But there is no maybe about this—the fiscal court that did so fail its own people would be in range and directly in line with the wrath of the voters who put them in office.

we do not have. One railroad and one main highway, it is considered certain, will be regarded as inadequate when time comes for location of these plants if the program gets beyond the planning stage.

With the best coal in the world for synthetic oil and gasoline production, Floyd county and Eastern Kentucky are, for the present, too hemmed in by lack of transportation facilities for the federal government to invest heavily in such a plant here.

But the section could break its bonds within the next 10 years, well before the synthetic fuel program is completed. And so there is hope.

The bonds will be broken when, and if, the Big Sandy river is canalized.

What I have in mind is this: The Floyd County Fish & Game Club in its re-stocking program this year should add fish to Johns Creek rather than to the Big Sandy, since the completion of the Derby dam now appears to be a certainty.

If the club goes this, and places a special officer in the Johns Creek area to give the fish full protection, the Johns Creek reservoir will be well-stocked and ready for fishing when the dam across the valley is completed and the lake is formed.

You might say, the fish will go out Johns Creek into the Big Sandy. That's not likely, but if they did it wouldn't be fatal. That's since we've been trying to get 'em all these years anyway. Then, again, you might say, the fish will be in the Big Sandy in the lower edge of the county or in Johnson county. That's not certain, either, for they are more inclined to trap upstream, than down. If I don't forget my well-worn pocket manual on the habits of bass.

In all seriousness, this is a phase of the club's work that should be given more than passing thought. Personally, I'm interested in flood control. That dam, I trust, will be a big help to that department. But, being a poor, selfish dope who won't let a little thing like a fish discourage me, I'm just a little more inclined to believe the fishing possibilities over on Johns Creek than I am the other benefits.

And I don't want to wait, along with hundreds of others, three years after the lake is formed for good fishing we should have as soon as the lake will float a boat.

Until his retirement a few years ago he had been for many years connected with the Brownsville Deposit Bank, of which he was cashier. He was also a farmer and landowner.

Gillis Vincent was a cousin of the late United States Senator Marvel Miles Logan.

Mrs. Gillis Vincent, the former Calverna Willis, died about 10 years ago. They had been married 52 years.

While their 10 sons have all achieved prominence individually, they are unique collectively in that they are members of the famous Ten Brothers Corporation of Kentucky, formed by them in 1935 to promote "mutual aid and assistance" of the family.

The sons are Beverly Mills Vincent, Brownsville, former United States representative from the Second Kentucky district, former assistant United States attorney general, Conrad Vincent, Corinth banker; Elbert Vincent, Providence, R. I., teacher; Patrick Vincent, Ashland, former Boyd county judge and state representative; Raymond Vincent, Covington, commonwealth's attorney at the 15th judicial district; Clyde Vincent and Howell Vincent, Covington attorneys; Haskell Vincent, West Virginia coal-mine operator; and Paul Vincent, Brownsville.



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### KEA TO PUSH FOR \$2,400

As Average Salary For State Teachers; Look for New Revenue

Louisville, Ky., Feb. 25.—The Kentucky Education Association wants an average salary of \$2,400 a year for public school teachers. And it's seeking also extension of the minimum school term to nine months.

This was announced yesterday by John W. Brooker, the Association's public relations director, in discussing the Association's plan for using new forms of state revenue for education.

Presidents and secretaries of the 11 educational districts have been asked by K.E.A. President Heman McQuire to meet Wednesday in the office of Russell E. Hodgkin, state superintendent of Public Instruction, at Frankfort. Possible new sources of state revenue for education are to be discussed.

Slated for discussion, Brooker said, are the part-month tax measure and the bill to raise the cigarette tax one cent. Most of the revenue under both bills would go toward teachers' pay.

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





**Mrs. Hall's Statement**



Dear Editor:  
I am enclosing a letter from our Nation's Prayer Tabernacle that is praying a special prayer for God's will to be done on Feb. 13, 1948 in a trial in circuit court for writing a letter to Les Frausto. I wrote the letter with divine guidance. I wrote it on a Bible. I wrote it with a blood-stained fountain pen taken from the pocket of my late husband, Levi Hall, Chief of Police of McDowell, who was murdered Aug. 22, 1937, by a man in a drunken rage. Four so-called preachers testified against me.







The third win and twenty-first victory of the season for the Devils came at the expense of McDowell last Monday night in the Garrett gym as the Devils from Lexington Beaver put up a stubborn fight during the last quarter to cut Garrett's big lead down to a measly four points when the final horn sounded. The score was, 45-41, as "Wild Bill" Stumbo took scoring honors for the visitors by netting 15 points. Garrett's two leading scorers were Dewey Duff and Gene Mullins, both boys netting 11 points each.

The McDowell game was Garrett's last home game and the Devils have
