Red Cross Drive Now Third of Way to Goal With \$3,225 Collected

A countywide volunteer organization of workers had brought the total of Red Cross contributions past the one-third mark toward the goal of \$10,000 for the Red Cross drive today Monday. The contribution total at that time stood at \$3,225.


