The premiums may be raised to cover "unforeseen contingencies," under this plan. But the policyholder must be notified 20 days in advance, and the raise approved by the state commissioner of insurance.

Anyone may join. The one of the major differences between the new proposal and a previous plan the K.S.M.A. considered. The previous plan was to be sold only to persons with low incomes.

Dr. Miller said that under state law 51 per cent of the physicians in each county must agree to join before any policies may be sold in that county.

"It is hoped, as experience is gained, the provisions may be broadened," he said. The insurance corporation would consist of the association's house of delegates. It could either hire somebody to run the plan or pick an established insurance company to do it.

Some of the indemnities in this plan follow:
Removal of appendix, \$100; removal of carbuncle, \$25; amputation of single breast, \$50; reduction of dislocated shoulder (closed), \$20; removal of cataract from eye, \$75; removal of kidney, \$150; single hernia, \$75.

The policy provides a waiting period of 12 months for obstetrical cases. It pays \$40 toward cost of pregnancy and delivery of babies, with certain limitations.

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Measure and sift dry ingredients into a bowl. Cut or work in fat until the mixture has a coarse granular appearance. Add liquid and combine thoroughly. Turn dough out on lightly floured board, gather up into a ball and knead lightly until the dough appears somewhat smooth. Roll up in a 1/2 inch thick sheet. Cut into four, cut biscuits and place upon ungreased baking sheet. If crumbly biscuits are desired place about one inch apart, otherwise biscuits may touch each other. Bake in hot oven, (450° F.) for about 10 minutes.
