babysitting, interferes with the maneuvers of Uncle Sam's air force. Although only 20 years old, he's a "baby-sitter" from way back. As a kid in Prestonsburg he used to "babysit" for neighbors while taking care of a younger brother.

Quoted as to how he happened to take up baby-sitting in the army while his buddies pursued other obvious means of off-hour leisure, he replied that he needed the money to supplement his army pay of \$100 per month and, "besides, I like it!" His only competition on the post is two girls and the baby-sitting agencies' services are preferred over the girls, his "customers" assure him. His regular rate is 25 cents per family call per hour. His rate jumps to 50 cents if he is called on a night when he has a date or when babysitting services are at a premium.

The busiest nights are Wednesday and Saturday—and sometimes Sunday, he added. He has earned as much as \$20 in one month. The hours are hard, he says, when folks stay out "overtime" on occasions until 4 a.m., leaving scant time to get back to his barracks, grab a few winks and report for early morning roll call. Some of his customers complain the non-coms on such occasions "bunk him for the night" and feed him breakfast as a bonus.

On one occasion he handled five tots representing three families which made the night worth \$150 per hour. Three of the babies started bawling at once. Even a sergeant has only two arms, so he began walking the floor with one on each arm and left the third sitting in the middle of the floor carry on as it was. While he pacified the two babes in arms, number three crying the floor-pacing of the baffled sergeant began to grin and give encouragement which made the situation all quiet on the baby-sitting front.

On his very first assignment he had to face the diaper-changing problem and, he confided, "I was making the night worth \$150 a poor job." He's used to it now and doesn't mind it at all. "Girls"—yes, he likes girls, all right. But girls for a steady partner—definitely, no! Not yet, anyway. For the present he has other ideas. Furthermore, he avows, girls are more trouble and expense and, most of the time, less interesting than babies.

He is saving his money from baby-sitting and army pay so that when he gets out of the army in May, 1949 he may enter college. If it becomes necessary, he plans working his way through college, baby-sitting. This likes youngsters, who enjoy a marked measure of popularity among the folks at home and with his buddies in the army, says, "I like to get along with 'em and the little fellows like to get along with me." He does just that, so well that mothers, marveling at his knowledge of his kids, ask so their "resting along" problems with their offspring.

He hopes to leave college as a lawyer to follow a life-work of helping people to get along "or helping grown-up babies" who can't get along with each other to settle their problems according to law.

2 Burned, House Destroyed
In Powder Keg Explosion
Louisia, Ky.—Luther Hogston, 29, and Bernard Adams, 27, of Cherokee, near here, suffered third degree burns of the face and body and the Hogston home was destroyed by the explosion of a powder keg in the house.

Hogston was sitting on the bed of powder, which was used for mining coal, engaged in conversation with Adams when the powder was ignited by two small children who were playing in the room. A visiting neighbor rushed Mrs. Hogston and children from the blazing house and aided the victims to safety.

The county president, Spence Carlick, and school officials would be asked to explain any objections to the consolidation. If there are no "real obstacles," an organization will be formed to promote the merger, he said.

Meanwhile, the proposal appeared wide open.

Of the 10 members of the two boards who take office next month only two would express tentative opinions. The Lexington Leader said after a survey of board members.

R. D. Short, incumbent on the County Board, said, "From studies to date it looks like the merger has great possibilities."

Another County Board incumbent, Melbourne Mills, said he would like to see it on a good, equal footing, taking all phases of it into consideration.

'Set' Branham Adds 'All-Southern' To His 'All-State' Grid Laurels

To the all-state laurels recently won by "Set" Branham, Prestonsburg high school basketball coach, was added last week the laurel of a berth on the all-Southern football squad selected from grid stars of an area covering 12 Southern states.

Branham was one of five Kentucky football players so honored. Joining him on the all-Southern are Louisa's David Preston, also a backfield man, Ronnie Cox, Raeland tackle, Harold Gruner, Louisville Manual back, and Mayfield center, Bob Cresson.

The selections were announced by Bob Hayes, sports editor of The Orlando Morning Sentinel, and chairman of the all-Southern selection board. In all, 80 high school stars—five from each of the 12 Southern states—were honored as choices for the all-Southern "first" team. Honorable mention went to 72 others, six of whom are Kentuckyans.

Branham was named to the all-State eleven recently, although he played in only three games this year—a record probably never before

made by a Kentucky prep athlete. He became ineligible because of age after his third game. The strong endorsement of his coach, Ted Benedict, and his outstanding performances in every game last year and the three in which he participated this year brought him honors a year over-due.

All-Southern choices were made by a panel of 123 coaches and sportswriters, with 19 seats assisting each state chairman in the selections. Johnny Carrico, of The Louisville Courier-Journal, was the Kentucky chairman.

Although Branham may wear a Georgia uniform in his college play, Preston and Cox, his all-Southern teammates, have accepted scholarships to the University of Kentucky, it was announced Saturday. 



Bake in hot oven (450° F.) for about 10 minutes.


