Prestonsburg, One Of 26 Communities Having Air Markers

The Kentucky Department of Aeronautics announced this week that its goal of having every community in Kentucky properly "air-marked" is making substantial progress, and listed Prestonsburg among 26 communities of the state which are markers meeting CAA specifications.

The Department's safety director, Charles B. Beatty, said work on markers is going ahead in 17 other communities.

The markers of the communities where work is finished have been supplied either by the Civil Aeronautics Administration, the Department of Aeronautics, a private oil company or civic groups.

To top on the program the Kentucky Air Marking Association, with headquarters at Lexington, has been organized with civic and industry representatives composing it. A standard air marker consists of the name of the town, latitude and longitude coordinates, a central tower, a windmill and an airport directional symbol indicating the nearest usable airport.

Other communities with markers meeting CAA specifications are: Paintsville, Pikeville, Whitesburg, Cumberland, Hartan, Manchester, Somerset, Jamestown, Columbia, Liberty, Campbellsville, Glasgow, Smith's Grove, Bowling Green, Hodgenville, Danville, Richmond, Winchester, Oventon, Warsaw, Covington, Hopkinsville, Murrah, Paducah.

Work is in progress now, with markers being constructed by either public funds, airport operations, civic bodies or private resources at Ashland, Falmouth, Middleboro, Everts, Sebree, Maysville, Taylor, Frankfort, Paducahville, Harrodsburg, Loretto, Badgett and Williamsburg.

Beatty explained that Louisville, Lexington and some other towns are in no need of the standard type air marker where radio facilities, control towers and other facilities exist.

OF INTEREST TO VETERANS

One of the most important things for ex-servicemen to do about their National Service Life Insurance is the naming of a beneficiary or beneficiaries of their policies, the Veterans Administration said today.

Unless a veteran dies this matter thoughtless consideration, he may fail to set the most out of his insurance. For instance, if no beneficiary is named, the policyholder's estate will be named as beneficiary. If he dies before July 1, 1946, it was not absolutely necessary for the veteran to name primary, contingent beneficiaries because the law provided for payment of the insurance to legal heirs in a specified order.

However, if the veteran dies without naming a beneficiary, or if the beneficiary should die before the policyholder, the insurance will be paid in a lump sum to the veteran's estate.

In this happens, and the insurance becomes part of an estate, it is subject to all the laws governing estates, including claims of creditors, administrators' fees and court expenses. This the veterans' heirs might easily lose some of the insurance money which they might otherwise have received.

On the other hand, if the veteran names a specific beneficiary and the insurance is paid to him or her, it is exempt from taxation and from any claims made by creditors. The money is set aside to attachment, levy or seizure under any legal process, either before or after receipt by the beneficiary. The only exception to this rule is that the U. S. Government may make claims against the insurance.

Hence, veterans can protect their heirs against possible financial loss by naming a beneficiary and they can add to that protection by naming a contingent beneficiary to whom the insurance is to be paid if the first beneficiary should die without receiving the money.

Officers of the court, however, the jury reported, have been "diligent in their work and in combating crime but... are handicapped by lack of assistance from the public generally and are finding it difficult to secure information that will lead to the conviction of known violators."

Presence of Mack Lewis, lieutenant at LaGrange reformatory, on the streets of Prestonsburg recently was secured by the grand jury to the "carelessness of the warden of the state reformatory and of the guard who brought Lewis to Prestonsburg." He was not here, the report emphasized, in answer to any court order, and no Floyd county officer was responsible for his release. The offense, if any, the report continued, was committed in Oldham county by the warden of the reformatory.

The jury recommended that bedding and other supplies be furnished except for these deficiencies, well-kept and in sanitary condition.

SPORTS AFIELD

Popo land makes poor hunting and fishing. The importance of the fact is receiving growing attention from hunters, farmers and middle-class sportsmen throughout the nation. At last beginning to realize that modern soil-conservation farming does more than restore wastes and most crop yields. It also brings back the game and fish.

In the process of rehabilitating worn-out acres of his farm in Ohio, noted author Louis Bromfield observed that the game and fish population increased in the course with the rising fertility of the soil and with the decline of erosion.

He writes that America is still suffering from the spoils' tradition in relation to our natural resources—a tradition which polluted streams and lakes, cut and burned over forests, and wore out farm after farm.

It is a tradition for which we are paying heavily in terms of living standards, health, recreation and sport.

Within the last four or five years a new approach toward providing fish and game has been gaining ground. It is based upon the premise that we can have maximum fish and game populations without the aid of artificial stocking, where food, shelter, and general conditions of habitat are right.

Providing adequate wildlife habitat requires the proper use of land and forest, the establishment of clear streams and lakes, and the wise expenditure of wildlife funds.

The creating of such habitat conditions lies primarily in the hands of the farmer, but the sportsman can play a great role in educating the public and helping the farmer do his part of the job.

Soil conservation and good forests are necessary to the economy of the nation, but they are also vital to the interest of all those who want good hunting and good fishing.

\$250,000 GET \$68,000,000

John L. Lewis Reports Almost Million Checks Sent Out In 20 Months

Washington, Jan. 22—A quarter-million soft-coal miners or their families have received welfare benefits of \$88,000,000 in 20 months, John L. Lewis reported recently.

More than a million separate checks have gone out. The fund comes from a 20-cent royalty added to the price of each ton of coal produced under contract with Lewis United Mine Workers. Last year bituminous output was 630,000,000 tons. There is a separate welfare fund for the 80,000 anthracite miners in Pennsylvania.

Lewis said that 200,123 got checks from the union's welfare and retirement fund since it began. These went for pensions, deaths, and disability payments, and hospital care claims.

Reports showed 11,689 retired miners now receiving the \$100 monthly pension for which Lewis called a strike last spring. Most of these are disabled. Their average age is 64, with 35 years' service in the mines, the U. M. W. Journal said today.

Eligible for the retirement payment, a miner must be a U. M. W. member, 62 years old or older, and have worked in the mines for 20 years. The \$1,000 death benefits now are being paid within 24 hours after death, Lewis' report said. There have been 16,489 of these payments.

Bulk of the total payments goes to the disabled, their widows, orphans, or other dependents. A total of 83,350 have shared to date. The schedule is \$60 a month for a widow, \$20 extra for his wife, and \$10 for each child.

A week ago Lewis announced the opening of 10 regional offices to put his large hospital and medical-care program into full swing. There are now 278 beneficiaries on these rolls. This includes 218 paraplegic miners with broken backs now in specialized hospitals from New York to California.

"Already many of these miners with broken backs, formerly regarded in their own communities as virtually beyond help, have completed their hospital treatments and are back home applying themselves to useful tasks utilizing newly acquired skills," the Journal said.

"Many have been aided with artificial limbs and prosthetic devices to enable them to get about once more. Life again has been made worthwhile for these formerly neglected victims of mine accidents."

The fund grew out of the 59-day strike of 1946, while the government seized the mines and made a deal with Lewis to re-open the pits. The government, through Secretary of Interior J. A. Krug, agreed a five-cent royalty on each ton Lewis had struck over his demand for a 10-cent payment. The government contract yielded \$68,000,000 before the coal operators took back their mines in July, 1947.

The operators agreed for the third and fourth years of the industry. That brought in \$48,000,000 in the year ended last July 1, when a new contract was signed boosting the royalty to 20 cents. As the industry figure the fund is expected to receive \$100,000,000 a year.

He was a victim of a heart attack, Jan. 28, at his home.

Other survivors are his widow, Mrs. Myrtle Burns Hall, two sons, Burns Hall, Wheelwright, Blaine Hall, McDowell, two daughters, Mrs. Elmer Easwick, McDowell, Mrs. Lillian Ratliff, Price, one sister, Mrs. Dora Newsome, three half-brothers, Phillip, Ben, Milton Ramsey, all of McDowell, and one half-sister, Mrs. Sam Martin, McDowell.

The services were in charge of the Reverend Frank Hopkins, Mitchell chaffin, Willie Collins, Troy Nickles and McKinley Moore. Burial in the Lucy Hall cemetery was under direction of the Arnold Funeral Home.






