Section's School Officials See County Mining Centers

County Superintendents and Attendance Officers of several Eastern Kentucky counties were guests, last Wednesday, of the Floyd County Department of work of his department discussed reasons for delinquency and how the courts help solve these problems.

The visitors were here for one of a series of meetings being conducted at various points in the state by C. T. Ward, Frankfort, director of Census Bureau, and the value of education, and attendance problems which have been solved, and Dr. Marvin Ransdell, director of the Floyd County Health Department, on work of his department with the schools.

The tour was planned and conducted by Paul Colby, Floyd county, at McDowell and Palmer L. Hall, superintendent of Floyd county schools, gave the welcome in behalf of the county. In after-dinner talks County Judge Alex L. Davidson discussed reasons for delinquency and how the courts help solve these problems.

Dr. Ransdell declared restaurants in Prestonburg are as good as will be found in larger communities. Thomas Hereford, Jr., Lions Club president, pointed out the need of readying restaurants for the influx of sportsmen and vacationists expected with the opening of the Dewey reservoir.

Dr. Ransdell commented on the type of restaurant-help employees currently, saying it is much higher here than that of a few years ago. He said Prestonburg's milk supply is excellent only by Louisville's, with all milk sold being pasteurized except for a relatively small quantity sold by one ranchlike dairy in this vicinity.

Indictments May Be Void; Knott Jury Unqualified, Attorney Here Charges

Burnis Martin, Prestonburg attorney, this week stated there is a possibility that every indictment made by the last grand jury of the Knott circuit court will be voided. This, he said, is a possibility because a member of the jury was not on the county's tax list.

An indictment in which Martin was the complaining witness, charging County Judge C. B. Bates, with malfeasance in the alleged overpayment of jurors, disappeared from the Circuit Clerk's office, soon after it was returned. Martin said this was the only indictment missing.

News of inter-county highways being studied by the State Highway Commission is that which would connect the Left Beaver Creek road with the Right Beaver branch of Knott county, which is destined to become a coal development center.

This information was supplied by Floyd county officials upon their return here from Frankfort Friday.

Two routes are being considered, and the Commission indicated both will be surveyed. One of these, the route preferred by Floyd county, would go up Jack's Creek, across the mountains and connect with Crook Creek. The other, preferred by Knott officials because the one landowner over whose property the road in that area has promised to give rights-of-way, would follow Wolf Pen branch at Buckingham and across the Old House branch in Knott county. This, maps indicate, is the shorter route.

Two-and-a-half miles from Left Beaver highway to the blacktop on Right Beaver in Knott county.

Other work of the Commission at this time is a road, as outlined by the Commission.

Ky. Route 7 up Licking River, Magoffin county, into this county. It will build a distance of five miles this year to the Floyd-Magoffin line at the head of Grassy Fork of Licking, and from there will lead, one-fourth mile, to the Salvers Branch forks of Salt Lick Creek to connect with the Allen-Lacey highway at Boone.

The old Middle Creek road connecting via Brush Creek with the Allen-Lacey highway will be built this year. Spritway has already been begun.

For the David road, construction of a bridge at the forks of Middle Creek will come first, then gravel surfacing.

Plans for the Martin bridge are virtually complete and a contract is to be let soon.

The State Board cannot legally refuse a license to any person meeting the qualifications of the law governing the granting of licenses. This was decided by the Kentucky Court of Appeals, 297 Ky. 432, May 5,

1944, granting a whiskey license to O. L. Hall in Fayette county after his application was rejected by the County Judge, the State Board, and the entire community who by petition had vigorously protested the presence of this saloon.

Teacher Requirements Established By State Named By School Head

Regulations released by the State Department of Education, County Superintendent Palmer L. Hall announced last week, provide that six semester hours of college training will be required to restate or renew any elementary or high school education certificate. This work shall be done in residence or workshop.

Teachers entering the profession will be required to have 32 semester hours' college credit for an elementary permit or be a graduate of a standard college to get a high school permit.

Teachers who can meet these requirements may be employed by the Board of Education prior to the opening of the first summer term on the condition that they earn necessary credits before the opening of the school term for positions which cannot be filled by qualified teachers by that time.

All teachers who expect to teach next year on an emergency permit should plan to do at least one summer term. Mr. Hall said. It is not yet certain whether a workshop can be held in Floyd county this summer, but it is hoped this can be ascertained in time for teachers to make their plans, he added.

The work-stoppage ordered by Lewis became effective Monday, and reported 100 per cent effective in this section, had a dual purpose—to serve as a memorial to dead and injured mine-workers and to protest the appointment of Dr. James Boyd as head of the U. S. Bureau of Mines. The protest against Boyd apparently was ineffective as the Senate Monday bestirring of the work-holiday, approved his appointment by a 10 to 1 vote. Senator Boyd, Virginia Democrat, had urged Boyd's confirmation "as a reply" to the mine shutdown.

George H. Love, president of the Pittsburgh Consolidation Coal Company, world's largest commercial coal producer, said of the shutdown: "Just an ordinary strike with a little black ribbon tied on it. Mr. Lewis not only wants to cut the coal mines but also to take over the appointment of important government officials." Lewis, it was said, considers Boyd undrafted for the Bureau of Mines post because he never was a miner. Another question stemming from the holiday was being discussed this week: Will the miners be entitled to unemployment compensation. It was indicated they will apply for it.

Bates, on charges of malfeasance in office because he, Judge Bates was overpaying the men and women who served on the jury in county court.

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
