### KNOTT MEDICAL VETERAN SAYS SANITATION NEEDED

Dr. John W. Duke, for 33 years a physician at Hindman, and Knott county health officer over that long period of years, declared last week in Louisville that sanitation remains the chief health need in the rural areas of Kentucky.

Dr. Duke views the story of his work in Knott county as told in a Courier-Journal feature by Fred Minshall.

He said about half the families in Knott county have sanitary-type privies. The remainder have the unsanitary open privies.

He would like, if he had the money, to add a sanitarian who could aid all families, financially and otherwise, in building the kind of toilets that would protect health. Many of the present sanitary-type privies in Knott county were built by WPA workmen.

Dr. Duke and a clerk make up the health department personnel of his county. But, he said, if he had two health nurses besides the sanitarian he believes he could conduct a good health program in Knott. He added that his county is one of those which offer even fewer local health services than in the past.

Knott, at least, has a few counties which had health departments in the past now have no health workers at all. Knott spends 40 cents a person for health services. That is about the same as appropriated in the past. But the money does not go as far.

Dr. Duke has been trying to obtain a nurse to replace one on leave of absence. But the nurses prefer private duty because they do not wish to take the smaller pay the job offers, Dr. Duke said.

When he had a nurse on his staff up to seven months ago, she visited families and schools and assisted in immunizations and pre-natal clinics that are held in Knott.

The State Health Department lends him workers from time to time for special services such as surveys. Dr. Duke is an ardent supporter of Dr. Bruce Underwood, state health commissioner, in his efforts to revitalize health work in Kentucky.

Dr. Duke started his career as a schoolteacher when he was 14 years old. And he almost remained a teacher instead of becoming a doctor.

### Two Weeks' Search Fails To Disclose Any Traces Of Man Thought Drowned

Pikeville, Ky., March 30—Nothing has developed in the two-week search and dragging of the Big Sandy river for 20-year-old Junior Smith, believed to have been wounded and drowned on the night of March 17 in flight from a constable and his deputy.

Constable W. Talmadge Jones, of Grapevine, 10 miles west of here, and the deputy, also named Jones, attempted to place Smith and his brother-in-law, Junior Keene, under arrest on charges of being intoxicated.

Smith fled on College street and jumped a steep cliff to the flat along the river. Four shots were fired, and he was seen to break stride, but he leaped into the water and started to swim downstream.

The constable, from the bank, saw him hold momentarily to a bush in low water along the shore, and then lose his grasp.

Sheriff D. T. Moore said that a search on the shore failed to show any footprints where Smith might have left the water.

A Pikeville man paid Keene's nominal fine on the drunkenness charge today, and he was released.

**Three Men File Appeal On U.S. Liquor Charges; Farmer, Turner Fined**

Lexington, Ky., Mar. 30—Attorneys for three men convicted of transporting liquor to legally dry Perry county last year, have filed papers to carry the case to the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals at Cincinnati.

William Oscar Farmer, Hazard businessman, was given a maximum two-year sentence and fined \$5,200.

Wilbur L. Turner, Hazard, was fined \$3,100 and sentenced to two years in prison.

Floyd L. Turner, operator of the Drive-In Liquor Dispensary on the Winchester pike near here, was given a two-year sentence and fined \$100. The dispensary also was fined \$12,000 in connection with the same case.

Clifton C. McMullin, Lexington, and Truman Combs, Hazard, were placed on probation for 12 months without being sentenced. Another defendant, John V. (Dick) Robinson, Lexington, salesman for the Wheelman Liquor Company, was tried on five counts but the jury failed to reach a verdict in his case.

The Federal Alcohol Taxation unit arrested the men last Aug. 23. Agents (testified they watched the men remove from the dispensary large quantities of whiskey and take it to a farmhouse rendezvous, where it was reloaded onto a truck and camouflaged as a load of concrete blocks. The shipment was halted in Clark county.



## 160,363 State War Vets Get 'Rockin'-Chair Money' Totalling \$74,969,473.00

More than half of Kentucky's estimated 315,000 war veterans have drawn "Rockin'-Chair money," the unemployment benefits under the Servicemen's Readjustment Allowance program, O. B. Hannah, Unemployment Insurance Division, Department of Economic Security, said recently. The veterans' unemployment benefit program, though financed entirely from federal funds, is administered through the state's U.I. divisions.

Of the estimated number of veterans in the state, 160,363 have drawn benefits totaling \$74,969,473 since September, 1944 when the national program was instituted. Average time and amount drawn has been 23.4 weeks and \$499.70, Hannah said.

Veterans who have exhausted their benefit rights, having drawn \$50 for 52 weeks, total 26,609 or 16 per cent of the total number drawing, according to Hannah. Exhaustion rate for the United States as a whole is less than 10 per cent. He explained that the figures are on unemployment alone and do not include self-employment allowances.





**Six County Boys Named From 4,880 Men; Prater Rates All-State First 10**


