


Sudden Seizure Claims Retired Miner at Emma



Well-Known Rig Builder In East Ky. Gas Field Succumbs at Hueysville

Malcolm (Mack) Horn, veteran rig-builder in Eastern Kentucky gas and oil fields, died late Friday night at his home at Hueysville, a month after he had suffered a second stroke of paralysis. He was 78 years old.

A son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Ned Horn, he was a native of the Auxier road section, and was widely related in the county. He had resided on Right Beaver Creek for years, and had many friends.

Rites for Cpl. Clark, Shrapnel Fire Victim, Held on Abbott Creek

Last rites for Cpl. John Clark, who was killed on March 22, 1945 by a shrapnel burst during the fighting for the Rhine river in Germany, at the age of 19 years, were conducted Sunday afternoon from the Community Church on Abbott Creek with American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars posts attending military honors.

The veteran's body was first buried in the U.S. military cemetery at Henri Chapelle, Belgium. His body was returned to this county Saturday.

Seventeen days before he was killed, Cpl. Clark won the Bronze Star for heroic action at Belfry, Germany. There he and two companions extricated his battalion from a trap by mounting a machine gun and forcing the surrender of the enemy.

He was a son of the late John Clark and Mrs. Minnie Clark Gibson, now a resident of Prestonsburg. He was a native of Beatty Lane but spent most of his boyhood at Springfield, O., and there was employed by the Crowell-Coker Publishing Co. and Bauer Brothers. His survivors include his mother and step-father, Edward Gibson, of Prestonsburg, a sister, Mrs. Ernest Baderidge, Lima, O., a brother, Filmore Clark, and one half-sister, Dollie Clark, both of Wooten, Ky. Also surviving are his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Collins, East Point, and Mrs. Jane Clark, Wooten, Ky.

Officiating at the funeral were the Revs. H. C. Church and Dan Gibson. Burial was made in the May cemetery under direction of the Arnold Funeral Home.

GRAYSON TO USE STATE CURS

Frankfort, Ky., May 25—State police announced today Grayson has become the 118th Kentucky city to invite the organization to exercise its powers within the city's boundaries. There are 147 Kentucky cities of the first five population classes in which the state police can function only upon invitation.

At the old F. F. Martin farm at the mouth of Racoon, the barn was destroyed, two porches were blown in from the residence, a portion of the roof ripped away and strewn a distance of two hundred yards. One tree from a neighboring orchard was blown the same distance.

Up Racoon, approximately 200 yards, the school building was blown from its foundation. The nearby home occupied by Worley Ratliff and owned by J. C. Martin, was literally blown away, leaving Ratliff and his son, Jimmy Patton, lying unharmed on the floor, the only part of the structure remaining.

On Salyers Branch, less than a mile away, barns of Zeb Onley and Willie Sparkman were blown away, and a tree crashed through the roof of Lee Prater's store.

In Prestonsburg, four power lines were reported, roads were badly damaged, roads temporarily blocked by fallen trees, power lines out.

Roof of a home owned by Grace Webb at Allen was ripped off and blown an estimated 200 feet. At Gibson on Left Beaver Creek, a young couple saw their preparations for housekeeping come to wreckage as the wind blew their home from its foundations and tumbled it down the hillside while they slept.

Knott county had similar experiences, it was reported here. The school at Lark's Lane, on Jones Fork, was jostled from its foundation and badly damaged.

One death resulted in the state from storm, and that in Pulaski county.

Damage elsewhere included: Filmore in Lee county—A house torn from foundation; fences, trees, other property scattered over the countryside.

Richmond, in Madison county—Radio tower at state police district station damaged.

Witt Springs, in Estill county—Willie Lane and his mother, Mrs. Nannie Lutes, 80, injured when their house wrecked. Other property damaged. Storm hit there Saturday.

Irvine, in Estill county—Grandstand of ball park unroofed.

Lee and Outley counties—Wide-spread crop and property damage caused by heavy rain followed by freakish winds.



PLANS HEARD TO LOWER COST AND IMPROVE MAINTENANCE
Floyd County Highway Men in Meeting at Pike

Plans for improving maintenance operations on Kentucky highways, in line with proposals issued recently by Highway Commissioner John A. Keck, were discussed in Pikeville Monday with supervisory personnel of the seventh district.

Maintenance Director M. F. Johnson, Equipment Director W. A. Timmer and District Engineer for L. Purker outlined methods of cutting maintenance costs in the field and providing a more efficient maintenance program.

Both the aims were strongly called for in a recent speech delivered by Commissioner Keck at Frankfort. A recording of the entire speech was played at the meeting.

"The record of the Commissioner's statement is being presented to the supervisory personnel of every district because we want you to know exactly how he feels about your job," Mr. Johnson said. "This business of maintaining Kentucky's highways is a very important one. It means business. Supervisory personnel involved in shabby maintenance will get no sympathy in the central office for any. Poor maintenance is not only a poor service to the public but a waste of public funds."

"Every necessary piece of equipment will be provided for every operation," Mr. Timmer assured the group. "What we do not want, however, is idle equipment. If a bulldozer or loader is needed in an adjacent county and is not being used where it is stored, we want that piece of equipment placed in operation where it is needed. It is better economy for our good business to have idle equipment anywhere unless we have no immediate use for it. Make every piece of equipment you have earn its keep."

District Engineer Parker expressed appreciation for the opportunity afforded the district personnel for a discussion with central office representatives of the vital maintenance program, and assured every cooperation on the part of the district to provide improved maintenance operations.

Speaking to district engineers and maintenance superintendents at Frankfort, April 28, Commissioner Keck expressed dissatisfaction with the current maintenance program. "The Department now has 2,000 maintenance personnel," Mr. Keck said. "This is entirely too many. The holiday for maintenance employees is over; if any members of our maintenance crews do not work to the full extent of their ability, they are going to go off the payroll. And there will be no additions to our maintenance personnel."

Commissioner Keck said weaknesses in the maintenance program spring mainly from lack of equipment and weak supervision in the field.

"Both these situations are being remedied," he said. "Equipment is now more easily available and is being purchased as speedily as possible. To insure better use of equipment and better supervision, we are swinging from maintenance operations on a county basis to maintenance districts composed of three or four counties."

Attending the meeting of district foremen and road engineers from Floyd county were Graden Howard, maintenance supervisor, Benny Simmons, rural highway foreman, Jonathan Fitzpatrick, assistant foreman with rural highways, and Sol Crisp, highway sub-foreman.


