Brownsville Man Named At State Convention Held at Paintsville

Nesbit Alexander, of Brownsville, was elected state commander of the Disabled American Veterans Saturday, succeeding James M. Howard of Louisville, at the DAV state convention at Paintsville.

New officers were installed, moved up to senior vice-commander from the position of junior vice-commander, and McCoy Cochran, of Ashland, was named to replace Vice.

More than 200 delegates from throughout the state attended the three-day meeting.

The convention was installed Saturday night preceding a dance at the Paintsville Country Club. Assistant National Adjutant John Feigler, of Washington, conducted the installation ceremonies.

DAV delegates joined Monday with the Paintsville American Legion Post in a Memorial Day observance. The convention closed with an executive committee meeting.

Among resolutions adopted was one calling for all World War II veterans disabled as much as 10 per cent to receive compensation for dependent disabilities as such legislation is now pending in Congress.

The convention also approved a resolution for pensions for all widows of all World War II veterans regardless of whether they had service-connected disabilities or not.

Other officers elected included: Edward A. Gafford, of Louisville, adjutant; J. Harry Stamper, Lexington, in charge of public relations; and A. M. Longmire, Frankfort, legislative chairman.

Mrs. Mary Ford, Louisville, was elected president of the DAV Auxiliary.

Thomas A. Dugan, Morehead, state commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, one of the convention speakers, urged an all-out membership drive by all veterans groups to combat what he described as undermining efforts of anti-G.I. forces.

The V.F.W. head said, "it is the duty of each of us, regardless of which organization we might be affiliated with, to get into our ranks thousands who are not at this moment members."

He said strengthening veteran ranks would help fight "certain anti-veteran groups... who are doing their utmost to undermine our very existence." He added that large membership is also needed to protect gains made in Congress in veteran legislation.

Representative Carl D. Perkins, of the Seventh Kentucky district, disapproved Congressional bills applying to disabled veterans and urged support of the Big Sandy canalization movement.

Vivian D. Corby, Cincinnati, national head of the D.A.V., urged delegates to help save the U.S. rehabilitation program.

He said there is an urgent need to work for an improved program for the disabled veteran. He cited a recent slashing of 16,000 Veterans Administration Hospital beds and said a united organization is necessary to avert further slashes.

"Every disabled war veteran must remember," Corby said, "that the benefits they are receiving today—whether compensation or pension or entitlement to hospitalization, and medical treatment are being seriously threatened."

"Only by constant vigilance and active support of the D.A.V. program will be able to protect them. By active support, I mean through membership in the Disabled American Veterans."

Corby said before the recent war there was only one bed in a V.A. hospital for every 45 veterans. That average has been reduced, he said, to one bed for every 150 veterans.

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

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

AUDUBON—THE SPORTSMAN'S ARTIST

No man has loved American wild-life more than John James Audubon. It is his affinity of his with the wilderness that makes him important to us today. The lessons he learned from experience still have a real value for the sportsman of today.

He was actually a creature of the forest rather than a studio artist or scholarly naturalist. According to historical writer Moran Tudor, he shared its secrets. Not even the Indian knew our wildlife any better.

There was nothing in his appearance to suggest the artist. Dark eyes and leggings were his dress. He possessed great physical strength and less energy. He was an excellent marksman; hunting quail and grouse was his favorite sport. The only meat he thought worth eating was game—especially venison.

Audubon was a sportsman's artist. He had the wilderness color and feel. His great fame today makes us forget the obstacles he had to overcome in securing his pictures. We forget that this was the work of a penniless enthusiast. To get his pictures, he roamed the American wilderness for years, and at a constant risk of life and limb. He thought nothing of walking 200 miles to draw a single picture. But none of these things mattered to him—danger or privation or discouragement.

He was born in 1785 on what is now known as Haiti. The call of the wilderness came early to him, and his boyhood was filled with a single passion: he wanted to hunt, to sketch birds, to be a taxidermist—to him.

Division Releases 900 Adult Crappie in River; Lake Stocking To Wait

The crappie fishing should pick up in the Big Sandy, sportsmen here believe, with 900 adult fish added to the stream last week by the Division of Game and Fish. The fish ranged from six to seven inches in length and were scattered over a long stretch of the river.

Anglers here are still unconvinced of the practicality of stocking the Big Sandy with crappie. Fingerling crappie were placed in the river, two years ago, but few fish of the species have been caught and fishermen doubt they thrive in these waters.

Crappie will be added to the Johns Creek reservoir this fall when impoundment of the water is expected to begin, it was said.



4 tsp. tartaric or phosphate 4 tsp. fat
baking powder 2 1/2 c. milk

Measure and sift dry ingredients into a bowl. Cut or work in fat until the mixture has a coarse granular appearance. Add liquid and combine thoroughly. Turn dough out on lightly floured board, gather up into a ball and knead lightly until the dough appears somewhat smooth. Roll to one-half inch thickness. Dip cutter into flour. Cut biscuits and place upon greased baking sheet. If crumbly biscuits are desired, place about one inch apart, otherwise biscuits may touch each other. Bake in hot oven (350° F.) for about 10 minutes.



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
