

11 U-K GRADS FROM COUNTY

Record-Breaking Class in 82nd Commencement; Barkley Gets Doctorate

Twelve hundred and seventy students, the largest graduating class in the history of the University of Kentucky, received degrees at the school's 82nd annual commencement held on Stoll Field last Friday evening. It was announced by the U.K. registrar's office.

Vice-President Alben W. Barkley delivered the commencement address to the record-breaking number of graduates which far surpasses the previous high of 918 established last year, and nearly triples the largest pre-war class of 455.

The 1949 class includes students from 109 Kentucky counties, 26 other states and six foreign countries. Two doctorates, 106 masters and 1,162 bachelor degrees were awarded. The registrar's office reported, students who completed requirements for degrees in February are included in the year-end total.

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

KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH
By EWING GALLOWAY

Multi-millionaire James C. Ellis, of Owensboro, was discussing cattle-raiding with me at the Evansville stockyards the other day. A veteran talking to a beginner, Mr. Ellis has fed 60,000 steers in the last 20 years, on farms he owns in Kentucky, Indiana, Illinois and New Mexico. He was chatting with a grass cattleman operating on a small scale.

"When I was a youngster," said Mr. Ellis, "the old folks in my neighborhood insisted that one should graze cattle and feed hogs, and I'm inclined to think they had something."

It was Mr. Ellis' way of saying maybe he had been wrong and maybe I was right.

Feeding grain to cattle never drew Mr. Ellis for serious losses, otherwise he wouldn't have kept at it for three decades. What he probably meant was that producing cattle on grass was more profitable over the long stretch than feeding grain. In the last few years our Hereford brood cows have earned \$100 a year on bluegrass, getting perhaps 85 worth of hay in extremely bad winter weather. With mixed pastures farmer can make each good brood cow produce a \$100 weaning calf. In less prosperous times, the weaning is worth \$71. If the net on each cow is only \$30, is there any other product of the farm in the same year as profitable? For the average farmer hay may be \$15 per brood cow, substandard block soil 65c, and next to no labor at all.

That's why I write so often urging hill farmers in Kentucky to plow less and grow more grass.

In my section of the state—Henderson, Union, Webster, Davies, Hancock, Ohio, McLean, Hopkins, Christian and Crittenden counties—good pastures have doubled in the last six years. Ditto the number of beef brood cow herds. An offhand guess would put the grain in feed lots at much less.

Raising cattle on grass is the surest way of making money on farms that I know of. The only way a cattle grazer can lose is to have the animals die on his hands.

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
