Prestonsburg Upsets Inez Here In Tuesday Surprise

The Prestonsburg Blackcats provided the upset of the year Tuesday night here by defeating the Inez Indians, 43-39. It was also Prestonsburg's first victory over an Inez team in regular season play in many, many moons.

The loss marked the fourth defeat of the year for Inez who lost only to Maysville twice by one point and Catlettsburg once at the Gate City. Inez holds a convincing victory over the strong Pikeville Panthers.

Demonstrating the brand of defense shown against Pikeville here earlier, the Blackcats performed a third quarter stunt heretofore not experienced by the Indians. The Prestonsburg boys held the highly-touted Inez scalars to mere two single-point (one) shots and completely bottled up their field goals for the full period!

Willis, Prestonsburg puny, operated on the nets for 20 points to take individual high scoring honors. The defensive play of Lafferty was a brilliant performance and the team play of Runnels was outstanding. Hunley, tall Blackcat center, limbered up for more shots than usual. Inez defense while operating effectively against the Inez pivot players, Outley Blackcats performed their best especially well in the last half.

During the last half Prestonsburg hit 47 per cent of their shots.

For Inez, Stone and Harmon pushed the attack getting 13 and 10 points respectively.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

ASKS HELP FOR STATE POLICE

Editor, The Times:

As you know, the Kentucky State Police is asking the Legislature for additional funds to carry on their work. This is an urgent matter, and your full cooperation would be appreciated.

The state spent \$655,000 for building 100 miles of road, yet the Kentucky State Police's year-end budget is much less. Meanwhile the highways are overrun with lawlessness, drunken driving, rape, robbery and murder. The murder of the 17-year-old girl in Prestonsburg tears at the heart of every Christian-minded man. Had the police been able to reach the scene of this crime in time, this criminal would have been apprehended. As it is, he remains at large.

Likewise, the recent bank robberies in Western Kentucky stick out like a sore thumb as far as law enforcement goes.

Unless Kentucky has an adequate state-wide police force capable of meeting conditions such as these, lawlessness and murder will continue on the rampage.

I do not know what budget figure Commissioner Crowe is asking for; however, he needs the help of the Legislature and the citizens very badly. Ten to 15 cents of every dollar spent for highway construction and maintenance should be earmarked for enforcing the laws and making the highways safe for travel. It does very little good to construct super-highways if they are overrun with drunken, reckless drivers, and criminals.

The rural residents of our Commonwealth depend almost entirely on the Kentucky State Police for protection of life and property. This, of course, is no reflection upon our local county officials, but their jurisdiction is necessarily limited by their county lines.

I would appreciate it if you would do all you can by editorial comment, etc. to see if some kind of pressure can be brought to bear on the present meeting of the legislature to appropriate sufficient funds for adequate law enforcement. The State Police's facilities are 10 years behind the times with men and equipment to meet present conditions.

I am not affiliated with the Kentucky State Police nor have I any political connections at all. My only objective is to secure adequate police protection for the people of our state and particularly for the rural residents.





WHERE ARE THE CONNELLEY PAPERS?

By HENRY F. SCALF

William Elsey Connelley, a native of Magnolia county who died in Kansas, was one of Kentucky's most remarkable men. He came from a little-better-than-average hill-and-hanna, but by dint of superior ability and intellect acquired an excellent education in a section north of his lack of educational facilities. He applied his abilities to politics, history and banking.

He left Kentucky while in the prime of life and joined the great trek to Kansas. There he engaged in politics. Being successful on the local level, He engaged in banking and amassed a comfortable fortune. Having acquired a worldly competence, he began a study of the Indians—their customs and language which earned for him the respect of his neighbors. He wisely quitted today by historians who study Eastern Kentucky or the Indians of the mid-west country.

Before his immigration to Kansas, Connelley began to collect historical and genealogical data on Eastern Kentucky in preparation for a task to which, some day, he meant to apply himself—the writing of the history of the section. He was a thoughtful man—a worker who sought no detail and shirked no task however arduous, and in a few years he had amassed a file of historical and genealogical facts sufficient for volumes.

Out of this fund of information he wrote in 1910 a book that was to be one of a series called "Eastern Kentucky Papers," and the title of the book is "The Founding of Harpagon's Station and the Wiley Captivity." To a student of the history of Eastern Kentucky it is one of the most interesting of books. It gives the detailed story of Matthias Harmon, Jennie Wiley and scores of family histories of the Connelley, McCarthy, Burke, Blair, Fairchild and Langley families. But he did not use a fraction of his data in this book nor in the "History of Kentucky," edited by Judge Charles Kerr and written jointly by Connelley and E. M. Coulter, of the University of Georgia, which was issued by the American Historical Society in 1922.

It may have been Connelley's intention to compose of the accumulated data of a lifetime, to some institution like the Kentucky or Kansas Historical Societies, but if such was his intention and act, we have no knowledge of it. He died a few years ago and the Connelley papers disappeared. Tracing these papers, let us quote from his book, "The Founding of Harpagon's Station and the Wiley Captivity": "I recognized the necessity for some reliable record of the historical events in the settlement of Eastern Kentucky while but yet a boy, seeing that no man set his hand to the task and believing it is the duty of every one to labor for the common good as best he can. I began then to collect and preserve

Schools Fall Short Of Ideal Expenditure On Library Materials

Kentucky's schools have fallen far short of the State Board of Education's ideal expenditure of \$1.25 per child in school each year for library materials, and in all probability will continue to do so unless passage of the school amendment and action by the legislature do not make available state aid for this purpose. It was pointed out here this week.

In 48 school districts of the state, figures released by Howell B. Hoopes, state superintendent of Public Instruction, no appropriation whatsoever was made for elementary school libraries during the 1948-49 school year and in 16 districts no money was spent for this purpose in the high schools. Over the state the average amount spent by boards of education on elementary libraries was 34 cents per child while \$1.07 was being spent on high school libraries. In addition to the amount spent on high school libraries, \$37,591.69 was raised by school activities to augment this outlay. Figures are not available on aid from school activities to elementary libraries.

The Floyd County Board of Education, said County Superintendent, Palmer L. Hall, last year spent only 9 cents per elementary pupil and 74 cents per high school student. The high school outlay per pupil, however, was raised in this county to \$1.37 by school activities which raised an additional 63 cents per pupil.

Prestonsburg high school received an average of \$1.12 per pupil, and the grade school average was 26 cents. Added to this was \$23.20 from school activities. While the reports do not cover the money spent by the schools themselves on elementary libraries if this county Mr. Hall said that the total raised by the schools for these is probably less than that spent for high schools. As a result, Floyd county's average library expenditure per pupil is probably better than the state average, yet below the \$1.25 minimum recommended by the state department of education after its library service had made an exhaustive study of needs by Kentucky schools.


