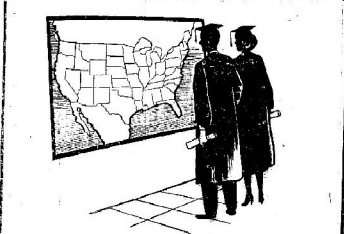

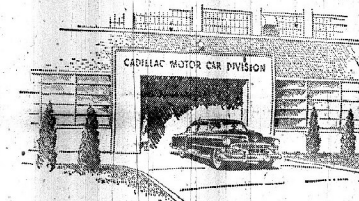

WITH APOLOGIES TO TROUT, ET AL TOWN-WORLD is a column without ambitions. It has never attempted to shoulder the cares of the world or solve any of the problems which have annoyed the old sinner. It hasn't even had a fling at those esoteric matters which, perplexing riddlers, connoisseurs and their kind find their way into Allen Trout's column. Now comes, however, a contribution which belongs to one category or another, and so this column deviates from the even tenor of its way to give one man's views on why dogs walk straight but run with their hind legs stowed staunchwise. Remarking that this is a natural phenomenon which has baffled many great thinkers, our contributor drops it out this way: "A dog's hind legs are longer and faster than the front legs. Once upon a time, when I was at the most impressionable age, I was served restaurant-made cornbread which had sugar in it, and to this day I eschew companies at public eating places. It just goes to show what you can do to a young fellow by making a terrible mistake like that. I have always maintained that corn-meal wasn't intended to be used for cake-mix and that anybody who'd adulterate it with sugar might be all right as a concrete-mixer, or might get by temporarily as a moonshiner, but certainly is not qualified to prepare food for human consumption. For a more serious discussion of this grave offense, I refer you to the burning indignance of Henry Watterson, famous editor of The Courier-Journal. Wrote Marse Henry in part: "Cornbread with sugar was an idea born of the devil, planted in New England and sent South by our enemies. It is to threaten the life of our birth. It makes men trifling and women frivolous. It is impossible for most of the murders, suicides and divorces. It is the mother of Bell-shyism and the daddy of anarchy. It weakens the brains, infuriates the liver and makes people pot-bellied. It makes the more ching and the skin purper. "It drives husbands down town of nights. It creates an appetite for moonshine. "It emboldens men to refuse his wife's request for money. But for sugar in cornbread there would be no war, no flies or mosquitoes, no empires or republics, no I.W.W., no Republican party..."

from the bulldozer but the 18-inch trunk smashed onto him, pinning his head against the track of the machine. Three miles from other company employees, Strickland alone extricated the body from beneath the tree, then notified other workmen. The tragedy occurred at 5:30 p.m. but the body was not brought to the Arnold Funeral home until around 9 o'clock Wednesday night. Some of Thornton's death is approximately 2 miles from Prestonsburg, and could not be reached by ambulance. It was said here that Horn was injured when a fellow-worker, atop a pulling rig, dropped a 24 timber which struck the Huesvilly man on his head. He was taken to the Methodist hospital, Pikeville, with the timber still in his head and was taken to Lexington without an operation or an effort to remove the timber, it was reported here. Horn's recovery is extremely doubtful, a relative here said he had been told. Victim of the Johns Creek accident was a native of Hazardsburg, Ga., and he had resided here since working the Johns Creek reservoir area with the Wooming Valley Nursery Company in clearing work. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Tina Strickland, his mother, Mrs. E. H. Thornton, and three children by a previous marriage. The funeral arrangements are incomplete. It was said by the Arnold Funeral Home this morning.

**KENTUCKY'S Flying CLASSROOM**  
by George Yates.

**Luerne, Switzerland** — For our party to come directly from the Communist hub of Milan, Italy into democratic and tolerant Switzerland gave us a clear picture of the operation of the two ideologies.

At Milan the "iron curtain" was lowered and we were denied entry to a plant which our party was scheduled to visit, this denial was made in the face of a threat from Communist workers at the plant that they would strike if any of our party entered the grounds.

Finally, a group of business men did participate in a conference with some of us, but the meeting was closely guarded by police and the business men were careful to avoid discussion of either economic or social conditions. In fact, none of the group was permitted to know the name of the plant to which we were denied admission.

Earlier, we visited the International Trades and Industrial Fair at Milan where manufacturers from all over Europe and the world display their products. From the quality and type of products one would not think a world war was just fought in which all industry in the warring nations was devoted to war materials.

The political turmoil, domestic unrest, and general inefficiency of the Italians in what I would call at least a quasi-political state was pointed out by our observations in Switzerland.

As opposed to the apparent Italian resentment to our presence, the Swiss staged a wonderful reception for our Flying Classroom and had the American flag flying and a band played our national anthem. I don't believe any nation could improve on the Swiss hospitality.

The Swiss are prosperous, and although they play a game of armed neutrality they want us to understand that they are keenly interested in the problems and "troubles of their European neighbors. They do not participate in the Marshall Plan, but Swiss spokesmen cite that while the BGA costs the American taxpayer about \$27 per person, they made a voluntary contribution of \$30 a person to assist. In a conference with Senator Suber, an American made a figure in Switzerland, we were told the Swiss feel America is producing too much and we are getting rid of our surplus in Europe, but he added that it is a blessing for Europe.

The Swiss labor unions are very friendly and strikes are practically nonexistent. The Swiss do not believe very much in nationalization of industries, having been hit only the railroad, postal service and some electrical services.

The importance of local village and canton, or state, is of great significance. In the cantons rests the sovereign power. The national government is not nearly so centralized or powerful as in our own country and need other nations.

The Swiss impress me as a very tolerant nation. For example, they are about 88 per cent Protestant and 12 per cent Catholic, and it is quite common for both Protestants and Catholics to hold services in the same church. The fact that they also speak four languages causes no difficulty whatever which is indicative of their respect and tolerance for one another.

All the nations of Europe could adopt the Swiss attitude of tolerance and respect for the individual all of their troubles would be over.

**THE RAINS CAME, AND AS A WELCOME RELIEF TO HARASSED FIGHTERS OF FOREST FIRES**

To none in this section have recent rains brought deeper sighs of relief than to the Division of Forest's firefighters, Palmer Crum, Floyd Unit leader, said last week.

Till the rains came, the forest firefighters were having their toughest season since the county began its participation in the state's forest conservation program. From Jan. 1 until May 1, 62 forest fires had been reported to Crum, as compared with 86 for all last year. Crum estimated that 1,200 acres of woodland had been burned this year. "There probably was more, for we had so many fires we couldn't get men on them all," he added.

Three-fourths of the fires, he said, were caused by persons burning of pasture fields and newly cleared hill land without taking proper precautions. Commenting on the situation, Crum said:

"When some person in your section of the county is burning weeds or brush, see if he is taking about it in a safe manner and is taking care of the fire. If he isn't, report it to me, or the deputy ranger in your area. I think every person who appeared before the recent grand jury was asked about these fires, but nobody was indicted. Closest competition seen was in the one-man classification. Roger Johnson, Hazard, won first place honors with a 107 and second place Wendell Eganminger, Prestonsburg, who shot a 106.

Courtesy represented by their champion high school marksmen, Roger Johnson, Perry Knox, Pike and Magdon, Letcher, Leslie, Drexelhart, Martin and Johnson counties, although county matches were held in order to determine a representative title holder to enter the district meet, were not represented.

The district champions, in addition to the honors won, also earned the right to advance to the state rifle matches.

Mill Cyrus and Tommy Blackburn were named official umpires.

Opening rounds for the eight teams will see four games on Wednesday. Following the Inez-Becky game, Martin and McDowell will take to the diamond at 11 a.m. Wayland and Meade Memorial club at 1 p.m. and Paintsville and Prestonsburg lead the timber swinging efforts of each other at 3 p.m.

Wednesday morning's upper bracket winners are scheduled to meet in their semi-final try at 1 p.m. Thursday. The lower bracket winners from Wednesday afternoon will take the field at 3 p.m. Thursday. The final for the district championship and the right to enter the regional at Grayson, will take place at 3 p.m. Friday.

### SPORTS AFIELD

**By TED KESTING**  
Just what does a trout see? The easiest way to explain that is by comparing his eyes with a man's. The human eye has sensitive elements of two kinds: rods and cones. The rods seem chiefly concerned with seeing an object clearly in good light. The rods, most abundant at the sides, give only a vague image but they are very sensitive to movement and light. You may know the trick of looking in a very dim light for one side of an object; this throws its image on the rods which see it well enough for identification, when direct vision (with cones) would not see it at all.

The retina of a fish's eye consists almost entirely of rods; also there is behind it a reflecting membrane that helps it see still better in a dim light. Since he has mainly rod vision he can see something almost at right angles to his pupil about as well as if it were directly in front. He is very sensitive to movement in a wide range; and he can see in dim light.

Too, because of the laws of refraction, the more overhead his movements are magnified; the closer he is to the surface the less a trout can see him and the smaller his appearance.

So JACOB LACAS, our favorite angling authority, says all this means that in stalking a trout in the open you should crouch as low as possible, sometimes to the extent of crawling up and casting while lying on your side.

Where creeping up is impractical try proceeding very slowly directly toward the trout, avoiding side movements when possible. Then the image that he sees is getting larger so gradually that he may not notice it. When you are close, a long frozen pause may lull any suspicions that you're not a bush moving slightly in the water.
