Floyd County Historical Notes

EDWARD DORTON (1751-1850)

Edward Dorton, Revolutionary War soldier, was born in Powell county, Virginia, in 1751. His second is from the family Bible of the Dorton family and was written by the father of Edward, whose name is unknown. The Dorton family was living in Washington county, Va., when Edward at 25 years of age entered the Revolutionary service.

The Indians, in the spring of 1776, were beginning their campaign of the British and the massacre of their own institutions to murder and massacre, the devastation and horrors of savage warfare on the western border of Virginia were being, or attempting to be, the mountains into Kentucky.

In the spring of 1778, the dreaded Shawnee came up out of the Ohio country, and began to harass the settlements on the Clinch River. For the third time it was necessary for the Governor to raise a company of border volunteers. In March, 1778, Edward Dorton, who was certainly by this time a western frontiersman, enlisted for a period of one year, and the men were divided into two companies for the purpose of scouting and spying. In the summer of 1778, through the winter of 1778-1779, Edward Dorton, joined several and served with the frontiers. The Shawnees, after their initial appearance on the Clinch, disappeared into the forests and the mountains. They later, through the scope of their scouting, beyond the Cumberland, down the Kentucky and the Sandy rivers. The journey into Big Sandy may have influenced him favorably to think of the Sandy country as a future home. His year of service having expired, he was again discharged, and although the Virginia Governor, Patrick Henry, was at the time so busy with this quasi-military service, the men were never paid.

The crisis of the Revolution was then approaching. The British, after their victory at Camden, were pushing to subjugate the entire Southern Colonies. Since the back-country or Ohio-mountain men were taking more and more interest in the patriot cause, Major Ferguson was ordered by Cornwallis to advance through the western part of the Carolinas. By word of the commander and hear the "robber" leaders that were like Campbell, Cleveland, Wilkerson, Sevier, Shelby and McDowell were not leaders so easily base of. They had always maintained a sort of loose contact and cooperation through the Revolution, and Isaac Shelby, who afterwards became the Governor of Kentucky, was their acknowledged leader. He was at Kings Meadows (what is now Kingsport, Tenn.) and one day there came to him an emissary from the British Ferguson. This emissary identified himself as Samuel Phillips, and he was a prisoner of Ferguson's but was to be given this freedom for delivering the message, now handed to Shelby. The message of Ferguson's was couched in the most threatening terms—demanding resistance or he handed this threat, crossed Shelby, and mounting his horse, he rode 40 miles to Mullhobby to see John Sevier. Sevier was at that time attending the races. Here Shelby found him and the two sat upon a log and formulated plans. Sevier was to rally Washington county, North Carolina; Shelby, Sullivan county, Tennessee; Campbell, Washington county, Virginia; Stearns, Ford on the Western way to be the place and Sept. 21, 1780, the day.

It has been said by one historian that this was the most remarkable gathering of backwoodsmen that has ever occurred on the western border. Another has said: "A momentary white, white, white, half-Indian in appearance and technique of war, carried their Deshler rifles and tomahawks to the Evronment Schools. In five days they were across the divide at Roan's Knob, with eighty miles behind them."

After this larger view of the Revolution, what of Edward Dorton, the unpaid, unsung backwoodsman of Washington county, Virginia? For the fourth time he rallied to his country's cause, enlisting with another brother for no stated time, as Col. Campbell knew not how long he would be needed.

In early April, 1777, the Indians burst into the Clinch and Powell counties, murdering, plundering wherever their visitations occurred. The settlers who had not yet before returned to their homes after a near complete absence the summer of 1776, now found it necessary to flee again to the protection of the forts. It was, indeed, a time of crisis on the border. The crisis of the preceding year had been due to the intermittent fighting and the return to their homes, but only after a short period of labor on the farm, fled again to the forts for days.

A new volunteer company was organized by Col. Campbell and Capt. John Robinson, of the year before, became Lieutenant Robinson. The subject of this sketch, Edward Dorton, volunteered for another six months. The company took the field under the immediate command of Capt. Standley, for Col. William Campbell was addressing himself to the larger aspect of the military campaign of the Revolution and neglected the field operation to his subordinate.

The company soon found itself marching to the mouth of the North Fork of the Holston. It moved towards the Powell valley settlements, evidently upon information of Indian wariness. Here, daybreak on an August morning, in 1777, the Indians attacked and after a running fight the whites continued to retreat. Edward Dorton's brother was killed. His name, like so many of the unsung guardians of the border is unknown and his body was not retrieved by the retreating company. Another soldier, named Ligon, was killed, as were William Priest and Michael, brother.

(This Michael Auxler was connected in some way with the early Auxlers of Virginia and Kentucky,

short or long would be the campaign against Ferguson. He started from Abingdon, Va., under a certain Captain Laney or Loney. He was followed, as were the other Washington county men. He crossed the Catawba, climbed high up into Burke's country, North Carolina. It was here that he was killed. He afterwards said, "of the mountain we all hitched our horses, and left them in care of some militia company. We searched up. They were on the other side of the mountains. The British with their bayonets charged upon Cleveland's men and forced us to get back; but we all took cues." Just what he meant by taking "cues" is uncertain but one certainty is that the British were annihilated, and the fortunes of the Revolution had turned in favor of the Americans. After the battle he was at Charlotte, N.C. He was at Charlotte, N.C. in January, 1781. "I hired my horse to the Governor of North Carolina and belonged then to the Light Infantry." After this he was in the Battle of Compens, and the Battle of Guilford Courthouse. Upon his return journey home, and being required to swim a river, "I caught what has produced a dropsical disease on me and it has very nearly taken me several times. I served about 30 months of constant service."

the defendant, she, Bert Shepherd, Jake Hughes and Hughes' young daughter, Sylvia, were at the Hughes residence on Salt Lick Creek when Billie Hughes came into the house, armed with a shotgun and a revolver. At the time Shepherd was sprawled, asleep in a chair. Hughes walked up to Shepherd, kicked him, then shot him with the revolver, she testified.

Both the defendant and his son, Willard, who was jointly indicted with him in the Shepherd slaying, claimed Willard fired the shot which killed Shepherd. This testimony contended that Shepherd attacked Billie Hughes with a knife and that the two men were scuffling on the floor. Young Hughes ordered Shepherd to turn his father free and when this order was not obeyed the youth fired a shot into the door. When Shepherd continued to grapple with Hughes, Willard Hughes fired a bullet into his body, the defense contended.

Testimony also was introduced to the effect that the bullet ranged from Shepherd's side upward to emerge at the shoulder, the defense thus attacking the Commonwealth's claim Shepherd was sitting in a chair when shot. Commonwealth witnesses in the Smith case claimed the two men argued over a poker game and that Hall shoved Smith back. Thereupon Smith drew a revolver and shot Hall. This testimony claimed Hall was unarmed and that after one shot had been fired Hall begged Smith not to shoot him again. Three shots in all were fired, two taking effect in Hall's body. The Commonwealth also elicited from Smith the admission that he had shot a man in Alabama before coming to Kentucky.

Smith pleaded self-defense, claimed Hall knocked him down and then went for his pocket as if to draw a weapon. He testified he knew the other was a dangerous man and said Hall told him, "You're gonna have to use that big gun."

One witness produced by the defense claimed he went to the hospital as Hall's friend to give him blood and that Hall told him the trouble was his own fault. Another jury this week did not act as decisively as the two murder juries. In the case of Russell Wallen, of Allen, the jury failed to agree after Wallen had testified the 38 half-pints of whiskey officers found hidden on his premises were for his own personal use. He claimed he secreted the liquor to keep it from his son.

Farm NEWS and VIEWS

YOUR GARDEN

The people that are lucky enough to have their gardens planted should be on the lookout for some damaging insects that come out early in the spring.

The first insect to come out will be the green worm on cabbage, also some cabbage lice and the small gray beetle that chews out the slip's heart leaves may have come. Rotenone (or spray) stops all three, though for the lice, a coarse sulfate or stout "tobacco tea" is better, provided the air temperature is above 50 degrees. Cabbage plants should be inspected before they are set out to see if there are any cabbage lice on them. If lice are present it will be easier to treat them before setting. Don't worry about buying too much rotenone for the cabbage plants because what you have left will come in mighty handy when beet bugs show up.

The next insect probably will be the flea beetle which is a pest of the potato leaf and does some damage and usually is not noticed. The flea beetle rides potato leaves with many small holes. This damage is serious throughout the crop's life and may be severe just as the plants break through the ground. A good way to tell if flea beetles are present is to break a potato leaf, hold it up toward the sky and look at the small holes in the leaf. If these holes were all together, a big part of the leaf would be gone. To control the flea beetle dust your potatoes with a 5% D.D.T. dust. If you want to use a wet spray use a 50% wettable D. D. T. two level tablespoons to a gallon of water. Three applications are necessary (1) when the potatoes are all up, (2) ten days later, and (3) ten days again.

Controlling the flea beetle is the easiest and cheapest way to increase your yield.

SECRETARY OF STATE HATCHER DELIVERS PARK LANDS DEEDS TO FEDERAL OFFICIALS; ARGUES 'SKYLINE HIGHWAY' TO BREAKS AREA

Kentucky's Secretary of State, George Glenn Hatcher, has just returned from a mission to Washington, D. C., to make delivery to the Department of Interior and the U. S. Attorney General the final group of deeds for land purchased and acquired by the Kentucky National Park Commission. These deeds comprise Kentucky's share of the acreage to comprise the Cumberland Gap Historical National Park.

Mr. Hatcher, as custodian of all State owned real estate, in performing his duty, was interested in expediting the details involved in the transfer of the acreage to the National Park Service for examination and abstracting of titles by the federal authorities.

Several months ago he made available 139 other deeds involving a part of the proposed park area. Mr. Hatcher stated that when they are finally approved the Commonwealth of Kentucky will convey the entire acreage of the 154 deeds totaling around 12,000 acres (perhaps in one blanket deed) to the Department of Interior as Kentucky's contribution for the national park.

An Act of Congress in 1940 and other enabling legislation enacted in 1943 authorized the Cumberland Gap Historical Park and provided for a compact to be entered into by Kentucky, Virginia and Tennessee, and authorized the purchase by these states of the acreage with state money.

Many War Veterans Lose Insurance Pay

Many World War II veterans are not eligible to receive the special National Service Life (G.I.) Insurance dividend scheduled for distribution this year. VA officials pointed out that only those veterans who had GI insurance policies in force for three months or more after their policy's anniversary date in 1948 would be eligible to participate in the dividend.

No application is necessary for this year's dividend, which will be paid automatically to all eligible veterans. Writing to VA about the dividend, it was explained, may cause the veteran's check to be delayed, since answering inquiries would interrupt the work of getting the dividend payments ready.

Veterans who do not now have insurance in force, but who are entitled to a dividend check for a three-month or more period since 1948, should notify their post office if they have moved. It will not be necessary to notify the VA of the new address unless it is requested.





turn it, the consumption of coal by the end of 10 years will be only 40 per cent of that of last year, the survey showed, Mr. Francis said. In general, the coal business will not be so sorely beset as domestic coal may be, it was pointed out, but this area's production is primarily for the domestic market and whatever affects domestic use of coal will make itself felt in particular in this field.

Mr. Francis said the development of a new, low-cost stopper promises, however, to take up some of the slack in the market. Franklin Delbert Conkey, Prestonsburg high school orator, added to the interest of the program by delivering the oration which has won him district honors and a chance at the Kentucky oratorical title.

A Green Kentucky Will Not Be a Dead Kentucky

It is encouraging to note that Floyd county has joined in the Green Pastures program which is designed to improve pastures already growing and to get into pasture those thousands of acres which now are being eaten away by erosion.

From the experience of the eleven county men who have enrolled this year in the program many others should profit. Richer pastures, more livestock, particularly cattle, less wasteland and a good part of the hope Floyd county has for a future which is uncertain at the best.

Then there is another program which should be the perfect complement to the Green Pastures work. This is the Keep Kentucky Forests Green movement. The Kentucky Chamber of Commerce, which is taking a far-sighted interest in this work, supplies the information that the state of Kentucky last year lost a potential of \$46,000,000 board feet of lumber as a result of 1,215 forest fires which devastated 255,000 acres of forest lands.

As an agricultural product in this state, timber is second only to tobacco. The value of forest products, says the Chamber of Commerce, is estimated at \$81,000,000 a year. That is the value on the market. The greater value lies in the protection the forests afford the land, preventive erosion, helping maintain the water table and staving destruction of fish forests. "Green pastures" and green forests will mean more for Kentucky, over the generations, than all the state's present mines and manufacturing plants.

What are a few pine trees, for instance, worth? Ralph McGill, editor of The Atlantic Constitution, tells the story: A fellow came in to see me and before he had settled well he was telling me about his baby. It was a curious thing, he said, but this child of his was the most remarkable one he had ever seen. At three months the boy was smart as a whip and saying words which, while perhaps slightly unintelligible to illustrate, were perfectly clear to them with even a slight understanding of language.

It was not until he said he had just finished planting the boy's entire annual costs, prep school and college, including the price of a medical school degree, that I really gave him any attention. "Planted?" I asked. "Yes," he said, "planted it. You know that old oak field of mine. Well, it is about 150 acres and there hasn't been anything on it since the Civil War. I got the cotton back in 1922. With my own practice and the inability to get any help, I just let it go. Now, I have had it tractor plowed and I have had one of those machines set out pine trees. I am going to have a really tremendous forest there in about 12 years. By that time I can begin cutting it for pulp. By just thinking I can pay his prep school expenses, T. I. Replant, of course, and by the time he is ready for college and medical school I can pay all his bills by cutting down just some of the trees. This has got insurance beat a mile," he said, warming to his subject. "There are no premiums to pay, policies to lapse if you get sick or run short of cash. They just keep growing. You can almost see pine trees grow."

"This boy of mine is so smart," he said, "that I am sure he will pick out a smart good girl to marry. I have got it all figured out. I will be able to give him a wedding trip and build him a house. The day his first child is born I will give the boy the land and, by replanting, had boy can educate himself and get married and we can keep generations going on 150 acres of pine trees." He was right about those trees. If a man has enough idle land it can be planted in trees and, if properly managed, those trees will support a family for generations. Careful cutting and replanting will keep them in perpetuity.

Pew persons in the South realize the enormous use already being made of pine trees in the whole field of synthetics.





Basil Hubbard Pollitt, a retired Miami attorney, has something to say in the current issue of the Kentucky Law Journal, a quarterly publication edited by University of Kentucky students, on the subject of not getting along with one's mate.

"Have Sir Knight and Fair Mistress Lady wooed one another in an ivory tower and were wed in the Little Church on The Cape By The Sea. Showers with ribs and trails by old shoes and tin cans, they boarded the Good Sloop Domestic Felicity and set out to sail the sea of holy matrimony. For a period all was smooth sailing and they enjoyed conjugal bliss to the full. Shortly, however, there came a great storm at sea and the waves of temper, jealousy, selfishness, cruelty, thoughtlessness and misunderstanding drove them on to the rocky coast.

"By great good fortune the unlucky people were washed ashore still alive though badly bruised and battered. Each blamed the other for the loss of the ship. They called one another odious names and even swore plates. They could endure each other no longer, and resolved to abandon the voyage to Sailor's Snug Harbor and to obtain a divorce."

Mr. Pollitt lists thirteen interesting ideas which he thinks would better the law of marriage and divorce. Here are half a dozen of them:

1. The home, not the institution, is the hope of society and here lies our salvation;

4. In view of the modern economic independent status of women, alimony payments should be lessened;
5. No divorce should be allowed during the first five years of marriage;
6. No divorce should be allowed while the youngest child is under the age of ten.

And there may have rabbits and everything. May they live on the fat of the land. May there be the Victory forever and ever."



He is a machine-gunner and has recently been commended for excellent work in inflicting large losses upon the enemy.

His regiment was originally known as the 17th Infantry (Kentucky), and has a history almost as long as the history of our Nation.

During the Korean Campaign his regiment has participated in two amphibious landings and spear-headed the United Nations advance to the Manchurian Border. More recently they have been successful in capturing several enemy strong points during "Operation Killer."

Corporal Clifton is a veteran of 3 years service.
