



KNOW YOUR SCHOOLS

And What They Are Doing



By County Superintendent's Office

IS YOUR CHILD STARTING SCHOOL THIS YEAR? Most rural schools will begin July 25th. Others will begin a few days later. Many parents are not sure whether their young child is eligible to enroll this school year—or whether he must do so.

Please note the following points: (1) Children who have reached their 7th birthday must enroll and attend.

(2) Children who have or who will have reached their 6th birthday by September 1st may enroll in the rural schools which begin this month. If the parents fail to enroll these children, they must attend regularly, under the school law.

(3) Children who do not reach their 6th birthday on or before September 1st shall not be enrolled nor taught by any teacher, in the rural schools which begin prior to Sept. 1st.

Why does the law forbid children who are not 6 years of age by September 1st to enroll and attend school? This law is to protect the physical and mental health of the child. It has been found that the average child is not ready to do all of the things that he will be expected to do in the first grade in school until he is at least six years of age. Many children are not really ready for these activities until after they are six or seven years of age. Many children suffer severe mental and physical strain and acquire a hatred for school that may not be overcome for many years if they are forced into activities for which they have not sufficiently matured.

By sufficient testing it may be determined just when each individual child is ready to begin school. This is the legislature has determined by law. Superintendents and teachers who enroll and/or permit children who are not of legal age to attend school are in violation of this law, and may be doing the child serious harm.

Your teacher will be glad to discuss with you the advisability of a child who comes within the law but is under seven years of age enrolling. For the sake of your child's health and to save your teacher the embarrassment of sending your child home do not send him to school unless he has reached the legal age. Wait until he is of age, then send him every day!

Your child is eligible to enroll in school this month if he will be six years of age by September 1st.

**Dams Not Feasible Here?
Then Can They Be There?**

CANALIZATION of the Big Sandy river would affect the fine river bottoms of the valley little, if at all, and the project would "pay for itself". Yet the Corps of Engineers now balks at it because of the increased costs of materials and construction.

On the other hand, the Engineers favor construction of flood control dams on the Licking river which would inundate thousands of acres of fertile farming land in a dozen counties. It would result in no dollars-and-cents return on the costly investment.

Considering these economic engineering and economic theories, one wonders how economic ratios are arrived at by the engineers, and why.

W. E. "Smooks" Crutcher, editor of The Rowan County News, in the following editorial discusses the two projects:

The United States Senate has created so many committees like that probing the RCP and the Kefauver group that we suggest they might do well to appoint one to investigate the proposed Licking River dams and the opposed Big Sandy canalization.

They would find that big business, principally railroad companies, is operating behind the scenes to thwart the dams on the Big Sandy and to promote here that members of Congress themselves would be involved, for pressure is being applied to the Licking River dams the investigation would disclose that Cincinnati and Ohio Senators and Congressmen are doing everything they can to eliminate four or more Kentucky counties possessing some of the finest farming land in America. Surveys disclose that the canal on Big Sandy would be self-sustaining on large tolls, opening up river traffic to America's greatest bituminous coal field. It would give Big Sandy, always best competitively because of high freight rates, a chance to compete with other coal producing regions. And, it is to be found that members of the Congress from Pennsylvania, the Kanawha valley of West Virginia and other coal producing regions don't want the canals on the Big Sandy.

The Big Sandy dams are feasible but have met a bitter and unrelenting fight from big business.

The Licking dams, on the other hand, are being pushed under the guise of flood control, to give Greater Cincinnati a source of pure drinking water. The counties of Bath, Fleming, Bracken and Harrison would practically be exterminated while others as Rowan and Morgan would lose a large portion of their farm land. Any English river will listen to any proposals for a series of low dams and are only awaiting an opportunity time to re-subsidize the project. Unfortunately they will likely succeed. So far, only the fact that Eighth District Congressman, Joe Bates wisely forsook personal prestige in sacrificing his place on the Rules Committee to gain a strategic position on Appropriations has kept the Licking dams from being built.

There is evidence of false propaganda all along the line. For example, many people have been led to believe that the Licking River valley would become a great fishing and resort center. Actually, the valley will become one of mud flats because the proposed calls for impounding the water to capacity during flood seasons and dropping it during dry seasons.

The Licking is a lazy stream meandering through the eastern part of the Bluegrass section of Kentucky; the Big Sandy is a mountain river and the loss in farm land would be negligible if the canalization comes. Yet, there is evidence that Congress will eventually dam the Licking and there is no indication that the money will be forthcoming for the Big Sandy.

The people of the Licking and Big Sandy valleys have made their voices heard but the opposing forces are only awaiting the time when the preparatory program legs and Congress is in the mood for "interim improvements" appropriations. A travesty of the public's interest is in the making.

LATE POTATOES—On potatoes that up, swarms of black fleas beetles will be found working. Their injury is puncturing the leaves with many the holes. In themselves these holes may not appear as being injurious, but taken together they represent quite some leaf surface loss, and being left surface means losing potatoes.

Dusting with 3 or 5 per cent DDT dust stops this insect and, as well, the leaf hopper that is responsible for later drying up of the leaves, again curtailing the crop. Two dustings, 10 days apart, may increase the crop over half, as against plantings on which these insects are permitted to have their way.

Further, here is a reminder that late blight may cause potatoes to die down when the crop has just started to set on. For blight insures, at least two sprays should be given with any of the coppers heretofore recommended for blight of potatoes. The first is given when the blossom buds are made; the second, 10 days later. Even though there is no specific blight, the "wax" effect of sprayed-on copper will repay the expense many times over.

BEAN BEETLES—On what has been done toward controlling the earlier generations of this pest depends on how serious it will be on beans now. The third batch of eggs is now being laid, and control should be kept. Dusting with 3-4 percent or better, 1 percent rotenone should be done immediately any are seen. Otherwise the "fall beans" soon to be planted

will suffer, sometimes quite badly. Fortunately, in extremely hot weather, the percentage of Mexican bean beetle eggs hatching is low, but not too much of that should be taken for granted.

TOMATO BLIGHT—As this is written, the first authentic report on tomato blight has come in. In this instance, dusting was done rather than spraying. From his own experience, the writer can say that unless the blight signs are severe, a very thorough spraying (drenching, in fact) can stop the blight, but at best there must be a very early start. Much better to have sprayed from the start, however.

A Disabled Veteran GIVE A POOR BOY A CHANCE

From the bottom of my heart, I want to thank the good citizens and christian people for their kindness in supporting me in my race for Commonwealth's Attorney. To those of you who are sympathetic and feel that the people should help and support a young man who is trying to make something out of himself, I shall always be grateful, and I take this means of acquainting you with my past life.
My father was Alex Martin who lived on Right Beaver Creek in Floyd county at Esdill, Kentucky. On my father's side, my grandfather was Wyatt Martin and my grandmother was a sister to Green Stumbo of McDowell, Floyd county, Ky. My mother was Dora Taylor who married my step-father, Jess Gibson, and they lived on Left Beaver Creek at Orkney in Floyd county, Kentucky. On my mother's side, my grandfather was Calvin Taylor and my grandmother was Aunt Nancy Mullins.
I married Betty Jean Clark, daughter of Willie F. Clark of Little Mud, and Lillie Martin of Left Beaver Creek. My parents are both dead and at the tender age of five I was picked up and taken in by the Caney Creek Community Center at Pippasaw, who put a shirt on my back and shoes on my feet and literally adopted me and schooled me for some twelve to fifteen years as many another orphan boy has been done from Floyd county. I worked my own way through college and law school and in 1941, instead of setting up my shingle and establishing my law office, I donned the uniform of my country, and in 1946 came out of World War II a service-connected disabled Veteran.
Six years ago I set up my law office with one book and a Thousand Dollar bank note, and began to represent the humble and defenseless, the orphans and widows, the one-gallus farmers and the down-trodden coal miners who have set up such a howl about the political corruption of our local Government from wholesale election thievery to wide open pay-offs in the liquor traffic that I, in defiant opposition to the political clique supporting my opponents, filed for the nomination and now seek the office of Prosecuting Attorney of this county. And I hereby announce to every freedom loving Floyd County citizen that neither intended election steals, scandals, lies, whiskey bottles, nor imported gun thugs from the Blue Grass can deter me from my course and keep the good citizens and christian people from electing me as their next Commonwealth's Attorney. New Topographic Maps Ready To Distribute

Frankfort, Ky., July 25 (Sp.)—Work on Kentucky's topographic mapping program is 30 per cent complete, although only four per cent of the maps have been published, it was announced today by Phil M. Miles, chief of the Maps and Minerals Division of the State Agricultural and Industrial Development Board.

This announcement came as new topographic maps were made available for part of Jefferson, Oldham, Bullitt, Spencer and Shelby counties. Military maps have been converted to civilian type in the Camp Breckenridge area in Union, Henderson and Webster counties.

Each of the maps covers approximately 90 square miles of area and show roads, streams, rural houses, wooded areas, pipelines, principle electric transmission lines and anything of a landmark nature. Principle buildings within a town such as schools, courthouse and factories are also shown.

The purpose of the maps is to give basic information as to the location and character of the area covered.

The maps are published by the U. S. Geological Survey under a co-operative arrangement between the state and federal governments.

They are on sale at the U. S. D Board office here or the U.S.G.S. in Washington at 20 cents each.





Five Floyd Students Enrolled at Pikeville For 2nd Summer Term

Pikeville, Ky., July 19 — Four young women and one man from Floyd county are among the 39 students who enrolled last week for the second term of summer school at Pikeville Junior College. Six Kentucky counties and the states of West Virginia and Virginia are represented in the group, according to an announcement today by President A. A. Page of the college.

Two thirds of the number, including four of the Floyd Countians, are registered in the teachers' course at Pikeville, preparing to become public-school teachers. Nine of them are expected to be in the graduating class of about 35 at summer commencement August 10.

All this summer's graduates will receive their diplomas in the teachers' course, which will make them eligible to obtain the Provisional Elementary Certificate, awarded on completion of the minimum training required of a legally qualified teacher in Kentucky.

Curie Jarvis, Endicott, is one of the eight OI students included in the group. Dr. Page said. Six of the veterans are registered for their first college work and five are taking the course which leads to the teacher's certificate.

The Floyd county students at Pikeville are Mrs. Ruth Akers, Lacey; Garnett L. Cox, Garrett; Joan Hall, Bypro, and Virginia O. Rath-Baldridge, East Point, also is enrolled in the teachers' course at the Pikeville school.






