Veterans Will Find It Hard To Qualify For New Pension Pay

Eligibility for new pension benefits for certain totally and permanently disabled veterans, recently voted by Congress, are extremely rigid. The new law becomes effective November 1, 1951, and raises benefits from a maximum of \$72 a month to \$120. Under it benefits must be specifically applied for. It applies to Veterans of World War I and II and those who served after June 27, 1950, Say R. Adams, Manager of the VA Regional Office, said today.

"A great deal of incorrect information apparently has spread rapidly regarding new pension benefits recently voted by Congress," Adams said. "Many veterans are drawing a pension for total and permanent disabilities not service-connected and they will be eligible for the increase. As a matter of fact, those found eligible are likely to be a small fraction of those who think they are qualified," he stated.

"Eligibility is rigidly reserved to those veterans who are blind or are so helpless that their need for constant attendant care can be established," he said. Veterans otherwise eligible undergoing care in VA hospitals or other institutions at government expense are ineligible, Adams added.

This Is Our Crusade

IT IS but natural that the people of this county should be curious, these days, about every movement that is started, lest they be lured into some left-wing or Communist front scheme.

So The Times devotes this space to assuring readers of this newspaper that the Crusade for Freedom is everything that Communism is not. It is a movement designed to let the individual, you and me, in on this job of letting the world know where we and our country stand in the battle for world freedom.

Earlier this year, Floyd county voted its part admirably by supplying several thousands of names for the Freedom Scroll wherein we went on record as opposing to Communism and other isms which would destroy a free world.

Now, the Crusade is on again—this time to permit the ordinary woman and man or child to have a part in getting the message of Freedom to the peoples of Europe and Asia and on behind the Iron Curtain. Our contributions in money are now sought—not, necessarily, much money, but some- enough for each of us to have a part in the battle which must be won if freedom is to exist.

Why the Violence?

If newspaper reports received from Leslie and Clay counties are true, the enemies there of organized labor have become so desperate that human life is merely a pawn in the growing struggle. And we had thought the days when lawlessness as a weapon in such matters were gone forever.

What have coal operators there at stake which justifies violence? What more than the operators of Floyd or Pike or any other county?

True, they have been selling coal there when operators in organized fields have been begging for markets, but that is no reason for dynamiting and machine-gunning miners such as news dispatches report.

If the miners there want to organize, they should be permitted to do so. That would force operators to compete with those of other organized fields of this section on an even basis, with no wage differential in their favor—and, it occurs to The Times, this is as matters should be.

Violence is no more justified in these Kentucky counties than it is in Ohio where the United Mine Workers are accused of deprivations in an effort to unionize a coal field.

KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH

The first installment of the Paintsville story, which nobody should have missed, told how, back in 1947, a group of citizens planning a recreation center, raised \$3,500 to start the project moving, and how in 1948 Junior Wom-mer's League raised \$10,000 with programs broadcast by the local radio station.

Now we move on to the rest of the story, well told by Irene S. Cole, secretary of the Paintsville Chamber of Commerce.

By March 29, 1950, or three weeks after our campaign opened, we had received \$23,000.00 in cash and \$2,000.00 additional in pledges. Since that time we have collected the \$2,000.00 in pledges and also received another \$10,000.00 making a total of \$35,000.00 received from public subscriptions. We had previously set as a goal \$30,000.

"The City Water Commission in August, 1950 awarded a contract for the construction of a swimming pool, wading pool and bath house. This contract cost was \$52,000.00 however, the bath house and swimming pool are now completed and the cost has been \$10,000.00.

Other facilities to be placed on the site besides the swimming pool, etc. include a soft ball diamond, three tennis courts, two croquet courts, volley ball court, basketball court, swings, slides, etc. picnic tables and barbecue pits. We proposed to finance the installation of these added facilities by means of a \$50,000.00 City Bond Issue which was voted on last November 7th and was carried by a majority of 5 to 1.

"Paintsville now has under construction a new high school building and gymnasium, \$64,000.00 was paid for the site and the building with equipment will cost in the neighborhood of \$300,000.00 when completed. This new building will give eleven additional class rooms and the gymnasium will seat 2,000 for a basketball game and 3,000 when used as an auditorium."

Paintsville is also building a modern water system that will cost \$228,000 when completed. The water will be treated with sodium fluoride, a chemical that prevents tooth decay.





Roundup**

The Kentucky Judicial Council, reviewing the special judicial circuit court dockets, has announced that the State more than \$14,000,000 last year, has come up with the suggestion that two roving circuit court commissioners be employed on a full-time basis to relieve crowded court dockets.

Last year the State spent \$14,076,154 at the rate of \$20 a day and expense for special judges in twenty-seven of the state's forty-two judicial districts. Special judges are named for the trial of cases where the regular judge is disqualified or unable to preside. Over a one-year period the State spent on this service \$93,018.

Amos H. Ethen, secretary of the Council, declared that the proposal of two roving Commissioners has been suggested by bar association groups as a means of expediting the situation.

Assistant Attorney General W. Owen Kehler ruled that school lunch rooms must restrict their sales to school personnel, and may not enter into open competition with the general public.

The Kentucky Aeronautics Commission removed its equipment from the local Silver Lake Airport here the result of failure to arrive at an agreement over rental figures demanded by the owner. The equipment was removed to other airports here and at Lexington.

Opponents of a constitutional amendment to be voted on by the people this fall that would permit easier amendment to the State's Constitution opened headquarters here under the name of "Committee of One Thousand." A Joe Asher, Jackson attorney, will direct the campaign against ratification of the proposed amendment.

The State Property and Buildings Commission announced allocations of more than \$31,288,200 for capital outlay improvements during the last three years. The sum included more than \$7,000,000 each spent for improvements at welfare institutions and for educational establishments—the University of Kentucky and Teacher Colleges.

The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, through Chairman Guy C. Shearer, announced extension of its ban against saloons catering in drunk establishments to include pool rooms. The order extended the original anti-lottery rule.

The Attorney General's office held that police court records are open to the public and subject to inspection, in reply to a query from a Campbellsville newsman who protested that the doings of the Police Court in that town were withheld from public inspection.

Guy Lawrence Wetherby named Charles B. Jones, Trenton, former Veterans' Administration official and one-time former school teacher and basketball coach, as executive secretary of the Governor's Coordinating Committee for Highway Safety. Jones will be attached to the State Police offices here, and will be assigned the task of coordinating all phases of safety organizations designed to combat Kentucky's rising highway death toll.
