



old friends and it remains to be seen if personal friendship will be stronger than political ambition as the proposed re-districting becomes law. Some envision a three-cornered fight for Congress between Speck, Batts and Lowman, for the House majority leader from Boyd will be in the new district.

Along this line Speck had this to say: “I'm sorry they put me in the same district with Joe I don't like to have to run against a colleague who is a good friend. Why it always has to draw a fellow congressman in these redistrictings I got Ralph Gilbert in my district in 1942. They can't expect me to like this but there's nothing I can do about it.”

The new Fifth will be a prime example of gerrymandering, say some. It begins with Lawrence county on the east and runs along the Ohio river, looking like a wall thrown up against the stream until it reaches Trimble county and stops. But the district that will defy all description is the new Second. Some say it looks like a caricature of Donald Duck, with Dogan, Weiser and Hopkins in its bill. The new First certainly resembles a mason's trowel with the trowel handle extending against Donald's throat.

These geographically distorted districts are, in all probability, headed for enactment into law, for the present. Administration wants the state re-districted this year in order to head off election of congressmen by state-wide elections of the present. Two reasons for this—first the possibility that if the races were held statewide all the state's congressional representation might be Republican in case of a GOP landslide; second, in the case of Congressional-at-large elections the three arch-opponents of the present Frankfort set-up, Happy Chandler, John Young Brown and George C. Hatcher, might make a fight of it and come up winners.

The bill as introduced by Lowman has administration backing. It does not satisfy everybody—no re-districting bill ever does. It will satisfy the leaders like Clements, Beaumont and Webber and this, as a matter of partisan politics, is of prime importance in settling such a controversial matter as writing a re-districting law.

found the cartridges and his mistress began begging him not to shoot, she testified. The wife said it was then she struck her on the head with the gun. After that, she added, he fired at shot which went through the radio in the living room. She said she did not know the gun aside, she said, the charge “would have shot her legs off.”

“Puller was drunk,” Mrs. Hibbins said. “He said, ‘We don't kill a good woman like that.’ He started crying and begging to him and told him if he wanted to kill me, I would kill a man—he said, ‘Kill me!’”

After Thompson had announced this intention of calling an officer, her husband said he would kill him if he went down the road or up the road. When he sighted Thompson outside the house she said, her husband dropped to his knees and fired through the window at the man.

Mrs. Hazel Hibbins, the slayer's mother, told Commonwealth's Detective Davidson that both men were drunk but that her son was much drunker than Thompson, who was her brother. She corroborated her daughter-in-law's story of Hibbins' shouting that she would shoot and of Thompson's pleas.

Later, she said she and Thompson were outside the house leaning against a well box when the shotgun came to the door, shotgun in hand, and said, “Get in the house, both of you.” Thompson, he said, according to her statement, “if you start up the road or down the road you will be a dead—.” She added that she went into the house and that as she shut the door she heard the gun fire.

“He is a dead—,” she quoted her son saying. Mrs. Hibbins said her son was standing in the crowd around Thompson's body when he was arrested. She said Hibbins had two bottles of bay rum and a half-pint of pint of whiskey.

Hibbins had been taught the big building trade by his uncle, it was said, and while he was threatening Thompson, the younger man said he loved his uncle, according to the slayer's wife. The Hibbins couple have three children, the youngest 15 days old, the eldest 17 months.

The victim was a son of the late Wesley Thompson, of the Jagan Creek section, and of Mrs. Teley Thompson, of Lancer. Besides his mother he has three sons, Hillary Thompson, of the Marine Corps, Parris Island, S. C., Buster Thompson, Grand Rapids, Mich., and James Thompson, Wyandotte, Mich. Lancer, Marion Thompson, West Virginia, and Ayres Thompson, of West Virginia, and one sister, Mrs. Eubank of Wayne.

The body was prepared for burial at the Carter & Callahan Funeral Home, then taken to the home at Bay Lays of Mrs. Maude Eggt. The funeral awaits the arrival of his sons. Burial will be made at Bodman.



Barnes, Reeves Keep Tab On State's Fiscal Status

(Third in a Series)
Clifford R. Barnes has served as commissioner of Finance or acting commissioner since last winter, when he was elevated from his position as director of the Budget.

Barnes, 38, is a native of Montevideo, Minn., but has spent most of his life in Kentucky. He attended public grade and high school and Ashbury College in Wilmore and still calls Wilmore home.

He also attended American University in Washington, D.C., while working for the Federal Government from 1935-40.

Barnes is a member of the executive committee of the National Association of State Budget Officers and a past president of the Kentucky Chapter of the American Society for Public Administration. He is a Methodist. He is married to the former Ruby Combs.

H. Clyde Reeves, commissioner of Revenue, has served in that capacity under four Kentucky governors. He was first appointed by A. B. Chandler in July 1939, served under Chandler and Keen Johnson until 1942 when he entered the Coast Guard and returned to serve under Earle C. Clements and Lawrence W. Werberly in 1948.

Reeves, 39, was one of the youngest men ever appointed to head a department of State government at the time of his first appointment. He had previously served as executive assistant to the commissioner of Revenue.

He spent three years in service during World War II and is a lieutenant commander in the Coast Guard Reserve. He was general manager of the Louisville Railway Company before returning to State government in 1944.

In 1947 he was an administrative consultant to UNESCO in Paris while helping to set up a budgetary system for that branch of the United Nations. He directed a revenue survey of Gunn in 1950, was a consultant for the legislature of Alaska for a budget bill in 1951 and was a consultant for the governor of the Virgin Islands on fiscal and administrative problems, also last year.

He is vice-president of the National Tax Association and is a past president of the National Association of Tax Administrators.

Reeves has A.B. and M.A. degrees from the University of Kentucky and an M.S. degree from Syracuse University. He is a native of Scott County and is married to Emerin Bradley Reeves. They have a son and daughter.



Soil Equipment Loans Made To 72 Counties

Frankfort, Ky. — Loans totaling \$81,317 have been made since 1948 by the Division of Soil and Water Resources to help conservation districts purchase equipment.

Marshall W. Qualls, director of the Division, said that 72 counties had received help from the loan assistance program at the end of 1951.

The loans were started with an appropriation of \$60,000 provided by the General Assembly for a revolving loan fund. It is the only appropriation the fund has ever received. Repayments have totaled \$31,425.

Under the program, counties that have formed soil conservation districts may buy crawler tractors, drag lines, the trenching machines, hog harrows and other specialized equipment that they could not otherwise afford.

Qualls said the equipment purchased with the loans have been used to:

• Renovate 17,720 acres of pasture, construct 1,720 farm ponds, clean and repair 277 ponds, clear 17,575 feet of fence rows, improve 81,019 feet of stream channels, clear and grub 3,874 acres of land, establish 147,885 feet of the chinquapin, and move 143,720 cubic yards of dirt in building levees and in other extra-rain, build 608,195 feet of terraces and build 62 miles of farm roads.




