## SPORTS AFIELD

There are four basic types of bugs fishing — surface, shallow deep and bottom. Judging by the size tackle chest you see someone fishing, you need a lot of lures to catch bass. Or do you? Just what is the minimum number of plugs you need? Could you get along with just one?

We asked Jason Lucas, who has the biggest tackle box I've ever seen, and his relationship to the question will actually believe I need for him to get along on one or two or even three plugs. But what follows should give you a hint of how to assemble a well-balanced selection of plugs. A huge majority of tackle boxes that we see are equipped for surface and shallow fishing only.

If you were limited to just one plug, Lucas suggests a floating shallow runner, perhaps of natural scale or an orange color. His type of surface lure on which he gets the most bass, isn't a surface lure at all but a float which he retrieves very, very slowly with occasional jerks of the rod tip. You could convert this into a deep plug by adding split shot or lead but you'd have to be very careful not to wreck the action.

If you were to be a two-plug angler, the other plug would be a sinker. One that sinks quite slowly does very well to depths of six or eight feet—and a slow sinker hovering in midwater looks most natural when worked slowly with little jerks and dead pauses.

This makes that man fishing where the water is rarely over 10 feet deep or so will generally do best with a slow sinker; but where it's over that, unless you have the patience of Job, you'll want something that goes down faster, perhaps a metal lure. For really deep water, a small, heavy metal pork-rind lure.

A chin, flatfish or will weave and wobble too much to go down very rapidly and the smaller heavy one won't have much action of its own at reasonable speed, so it needs the action of the rind. A simple spinner-blade at its head not only gives it a flash but sets up a slight jig that gives the rind a good action.

## TO PRESENT SCOUT STORY

### Eagle Scout Wallace Representing Council Before Governor Today



Eagle Scout Quail Wallace, of Troop 21, sponsored by the Men's Bible Class of the Prestonsburg Methodist Church, has been selected to represent the Lonesome Pine Council in a report on Scout achievement to Governor Lawrence W. Workman today (Thursday).

This annual program at the state capital is a part of the state-wide celebration of Boy Scout Week, which marks the 43rd birthday of the founding of the Boy Scout movement.

Eagle Scout Wallace was nominated by Lonesome Pine Council as a candidate to represent Region Four in a report to the President of the United States; however, another Scout from Youngstown, O., was selected by the Regional Committee for this honor. Wallace has had four years' experience in Scout leadership and has served as patrol leader, senior patrol leader, and junior assistant scoutmaster. He has been on the honor roll at school for three years, participates in the school band, and is a member of the Key Club. He is active in Sunday School and church.

The report which Wallace will carry to Governor Workman will carry to Lonesome Pine Council the largest increase in membership of any Council in Kentucky during 1952. The Council started the year with 2,108 Scouts enrolled in 106 units, and ended 1952 with 2,813 Scouts enrolled in 146 units, representing an increase of 25%. This was the third highest record in Region 4 out of 43 Councils according to figures received by the regional office.

Another outstanding achievement of the Council during the year was the building of a new Scout camp on Dewey Lake, representing an investment in materials and cash of \$45,000. During its first season of operation, the Camp was attended by 435 Scouts and 28 leaders. Floyd district led the Council in camp attendance with 121 Scouts and eight leaders.

There was more advancement by Scouts than at any time in the Council's history during 1952. A total of 1,380 merit badges were passed by Scouts in the Council. A total of 388 Scouts achieved the second class rank, 110 Scouts became first class, 69 Star, 12 Life, and four Eagle Boy Scouts.

The program of Cub Scouts for younger boys, 8, 9, and 10 years of age, showed a steady increase. At the end of the year there were 225 Cub Scouts enrolled in 60 Packs, as compared to 16 Packs at the beginning of the year.

Explorer Training for older boys over 14 years of age, proved to be more popular. As of December, 1952, there were 178 Explorer Scouts enrolled in 18 units, as compared to 92 Explorers in five units at the beginning of the year.

For the first time, the Lonesome Pine Council did a good job of teaching boys in all age groups, from eight to 17 years.



At that time, according to the report, the principal town within a 50-mile radius of the reservoir had a total population of only 10,000—a figure exceeded by only three towns: Prestonsburg, Pikeville and Paintsville.

### LIVING FENCE IS ENVISIONED

By Using Multiflora Rose And Bicolor Lespedeza, Says Conservation Service

To increase food and cover for game, the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources will give thousands of acres of multiflora rose and other plants to interested farmers in Floyd county.

Multiflora rose will make an effective living fence in as little as three years, with proper care. It is about eight feet high and eight feet wide, and does not spread into cultivated or wooded land. It requires no maintenance and is resistant to contour fences. To some birds and small game it furnishes food and protection against enemies.

Bicolor lespedeza will produce enough seed on one-eighth acre to winter a cover of oak. One-fourth acre is better, especially during unfavorable years like 1952. Most of the seed will fall in January and February, when other oak foods are scarce and covered with snow. Bicolor will not withstand grazing, but will grow on very poor soil, and along woods borders.

Other plants include black walnut, Russian olive, and Russian mulberry, which is a good post tree. Most of the plants will be distributed through the Floyd County Soil Conservation District and L. R. Johnson, Soil Conservation Service technician, will advise farmers on where to make plantings and how to care for them.

Bernard Badridge, conservation officer for Floyd county, and Terry McCowan, district biologist, will deliver plants to individual farms or to a central location similar to fish deliveries. They will also advise farmers on where to make plantings and how to care for them, or on any other problems regarding wildlife.

Frankfort, Ky. — Constitutionality of Kentucky's real estate licensing law—applying equally to brokers and dealers, requiring written examinations as the part of licensees and maintenance of a minimum of \$10,000 on the part of all—has been upheld by Judge William S. Anderson in Franklin Circuit Court. A group of Lexington brokers attacked validity of the measure.

**AGAIN** it's Brotherhood Week, the period between next Sunday and the next. Those seven days are set apart to emphasize a pattern of living for the entire year—to point the way to tolerance, to direct us away from prejudices and hatreds, to strengthen us in the humanities.

Brotherhood is simply the doctrine of living on an equality. That is the theory, and it is age-old. To get the theory into practice is the aim of this Week which will be emphasized in newspapers, editorials, a radio program broadcast by television and radio over the land. The gap between theory and practice is wide and hard to bridge, but slowly it is being closed.

Veterans' groups this year observed Four Chaplains' Day. That day commemorated the heroism of the four men who, representing differing religious faiths, met death, arm in arm, on a sinking ship, their last thoughts on the same ultimate goal, their prayers directed to the same God, and their lives sacrificed for the same purpose—that others might live. That is Brotherhood.

A wealthy man gives his poor neighbor on common ground, as one man to another, without condescension; a white man's life is saved by the skilled hand of a yellow surgeon; the glorious voice of a black singer claims the rapt attention of a fashionable white audience and draws enthusiastic acclaim; a white missionary, lives and walks among savages and their disease and superstition, devoting his life to them—these are the things that spell Brotherhood.

It is perhaps no mere coincidence that Brotherhood Week begins immediately after the birthday of the immortal Lincoln is observed. The observances certainly have a strong relationship. Lincoln, somebody has said, is all men grown a little taller.

And it was St. John who wrote:

"If a man say, I love God, and hateth his brother, he is a liar; for he that loveth not his brother whom he hath seen, how can he love God, whom he hath not seen?"
