The report was the third to be made after the fiscal year had entered an order requiring every public official in the county to file a schedule of receipts and expenditures for the year by April 1.

BAR MEMBERS GET BRIEFING—On New Court Rules Effective July 1st; Changes Explained.

Prestonsburg attorneys who attended the briefing on the new rules of court practice, held at Lexington, recently returned with at least a rudimentary knowledge of the new procedure. The full changes in practice will not be known until the rules are published and furnished attorneys by the Court of Appeals. March 10, 1933. B. Clarke, W. W. Burchett, Joe Hobson, Kliner and Paul C. Conner and Robert S. Westman, all of the Floyd county bar, attended the Lexington conference. Also attending were members of the Court of Appeals, John L. Davis, Lexington, who instructed the attorneys, along with Great F. Knuckles, Pineville, and Glenn Denham, Middletown.

Clark released a statement to the Times this week clarifying for the general public the major changes in practice that are of interest. "A great measure of the new rules of practice follow the federal code of practice. Designations of actions are changed from ordinary and equitable actions to complaint. In other words, there are to be no forms, and all pleadings are equitable and ordinary actions.

"The court is given more discretion under the new rules and has a greater burden of work. All civil actions are tried by the court, unless a jury trial is requested, either at the time of filing, or I believe, 10 days prior to the trial date. There will be more cases tried in open court by the court than formerly and less disposition work. Actions stand for trial or pleading 30 days after session of summons.

"In strict, our courts will be in continuous session in the same place after sessions are made up the actual stand for trial, whether there is a designated term at that particular time or not. The only trial term which we might designate as terms of court, will be the period when the court sets down jury cases for trial. This is left largely to the discretion of the court. You will see it will save a lot of unnecessary jury expense.

"The right of appeal is greatly changed in relation to appeals as well as in the Court of Appeals and will be greatly expedited. Another thing, the liberality in pleading removes a lot of technical procedure which attache lawyers used to win cases rather than under the merits of the case. The new rules are effective July 1.

Revenue Department Says Law Violated On Cigarette Tax.

Frankfort, Ky., March 6 (Sp.)—The Kentucky Department of Revenue has found numerous violations of the state cigarette tax law following the lifting of price ceilings on cigarettes. In most cases where the price per pack has gone up, additional state tax is due. A typical violation is selling a popular brand for 25¢ a pack with only a 2¢ tax stamp. The law requires a cigarette tax for each 10¢ retail price of fraction thereof. Therefore, if the retail price of a pack of cigarettes is at least 21¢ before tax, 3¢ in "tax stamps" is required. Revenue Department field men have been ordered to make a state-wide check for violation. Retail cigarette inventories are to be checked for proper tax stamps. For selling under stamps cigarette, the dealer must pay additional tax the plus 100% penalty, and may be required to purchase a wholesaler's license.



CAR LOADINGS SHOW DECLINE

In Floyd Last Month, Altha Slight Gains Noted in Last Week

Although the last two weeks of February were record periods in car loadings of coal by the operations associated by the Big Sandy-Kirkhorn Coal Operators Association, there was a slight increase toward the end of the month, data learned this week shows.

The second week of the month was the best in February, but was only slightly higher than the first week. A total of 4,235 cars of 30 tons each were loaded the second week, or 2,520 in the third week. It recovered to 3,900 in the last week. Cars loaded in the first week were somewhat lower than the peak figure of the second week.

One thing that has fluctuated a great deal more than the total number of cars loaded is the number of mines working a full week. Sixteen mines worked full time, the first week of February, but this figure dropped to four mines in the third week. The last week showed an increase to eight mines working five days.

The number of mines loading tonnage equal to the corresponding period of last year shows slight variation. Mines equalling or surpassing last year's tonnage for February were, for each week, 7, 5, 7 and 7. In that week-order, Floyd county mines offering full schedule employment during the last week of February were Glenora Branch Mining Company, Kathryn Elkhorn, Turner-Elkhorn and Sizemore Mining Company. Truck mine operations hit a low this week, with only 12 cars loaded that week. The situation with these mines has improved until the last week of the month, with 37 cars loaded. But this loading leaves them with only 390 cars loaded this year as against 1,000 cars for the same period last year.

Captive mines belonging to the Association seem to be holding their own better than other mines. Still, their better production record cannot do much to overtake the 798,700 tons of coal lacking to equal the group's lag behind the corresponding period for last year.



4 MEETINGS ARE SLATED

Town Hall Gatherings Of Industrial Group Held This Week

The recently organized Eastern Kentucky Industrial Foundation, Inc., comprised of 14 counties in this section of the state, has instituted a series of Town Hall meetings in each of the member-counties for the purpose of informing business people of its plans to develop industrial growth in the area.

The first of these county-wide Town Hall meetings was held at Pikeville, March 9, in the circuit courtroom at 7:30 a.m. Three additional county meetings were scheduled for this week, one at Sayreville on March 10, at Vanceburg on March 11 and at Grayson on March 12th. Other meetings are now being set up for the following weeks and will be continued until a Town Hall meeting is held in each of the counties.

A Town Hall meeting in Prestonsburg, March 25 is being planned, but the date has not been definitely set. A. Joe Asher, executive director of the Foundation, said.

Cooperating with and assisting the new organization in these meetings was a representative from the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce and one from the agricultural and industrial development board, a state agency at Frankfort.

Each Town Hall meeting is being patterned after the first which was held at Ashland, November 21, at which more than 450 persons heard Gov. Lawrence Wesley pledge the full cooperation of his administration to aid Eastern Kentucky and also heard telegrams read from both Kentucky U. S. Senators pleading their support of plans and their action. There was a short period of discussion upon assigned topics by representatives of these organizations and also by a member of the new Foundation, and these talks were followed by a panel session with questions presented to these and what may be done to answer them.
