In the matter of the alteration of boundaries and location of voting precincts in Floyd County, Kentucky.

**ORDER**

It appearing to the court that Precinct No. 1, Prestonsburg, No. 1, Mouth of Beaver No. 10, John Art No. 2, Clear Creek No. 21, Drift No. 26, and Betsy Layne No. 27, voting precincts in Floyd County, Kentucky, each have more than three hundred fifty (350) registered voters and that the alteration of boundaries and public good requires the creation of certain other voting precincts and the elimination of the boundary lines of said precincts, it is therefore ordered and adjudged by the court that the voting precinct No. 46 be so designated and established by the following description: The boundary line of said precinct shall be as follows:

**BOUNDING** at a point on the top of the point of Richmond cemetery hill in line with Graham street; thence down the hill and with Graham street toward Big Sandy river to Arnold avenue; thence with Arnold avenue south to Big Sandy river; thence across the river on a straight line with Arnold avenue to top of W. P. Moore property; thence with the property line of W. P. Moore to the Big Sandy river; thence across the river to the upper property line of W. P. Moore; thence with the property line of W. P. Moore to the top of the ridge; thence down the ridge to the place of beginning.

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### 1952 COUNTY SAVINGS HIGH

**Floyd's Bank Deposits For Year Were Equal To \$182 Per Capita**

(Special to The Times)

SAVINGS were at a high level in Floyd county during the past year, exceeding the "great" gains recorded in most other parts of the county.

The findings, a barometer of good times, are based on a report just released by the Federal Reserve system, showing bank deposits in every county in the United States as of the end of the last fiscal year.

Deposits in Floyd county savings and commercial banks reached the high figure of \$10,000,000, gain of 44 percent over the \$6,917,000 reported a year earlier, according to a previous survey, conducted in 1951.

This rise compares favorably with that shown by the national banks generally in the period, 44 percent. It is also better than the composite advance made by banks in the South-Central States, 44.6 percent, and in the state of Kentucky, 41.3 percent.

The figures include time deposits (savings accounts) and demand deposits (checking accounts) of individuals, partnerships and corporations, but exclude interbank and Governmental deposits.



## GAME REFUGE AREA POSTED

12,000 Acres of Land Around Lake To Form Sanctuary for Game

Conservation officers working under the supervision of E. R. Burke, Seventh conservation district supervisor, last week completed the work of posting approximately 12,000 acres of land in the Dewey reservoir area which this was converted by the Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources into a game refuge.

The area posted includes all government-owned lands from a point below the Dewey dam to the mouth of Brushy. The regulation sign used by the Department was posted, but signs marked, especially for the area will replace these later.

The work effected forbids hunting of any kind except for migratory waterfowl in season. Trapping of dogs in the area also is forbidden. Already pen-reared turkeys have been released in the area, and Larry Gale, of the Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources, said recently that Virginia white-tail deer will be released in the refuge this year.

Widely-trapped turkeys may also be added during 1953.

No hunting will be allowed, Mr. Burke said, until such time as when there is a surplus of game in the area. By creating a surplus of game in the protected area, the Department holds, stocking of adjoining lands will result as the game spills over the boundaries of the reserve.

Burke also said the Department plans some migratory waterfowl development at the lake this year with the planting of food plots.

The permanent nesting areas to be erected later around the entire area will read:

"Posted Dewey Refuge Restoration Area. No Hunting Except Migratory Waterfowl. U. S. Corps of Engineers. Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources."

## Both Kentucky Senators and Congressman Perkins Behind Lake Deepening

Whatever the U. S. Corps of Engineers may do in response to requests of the Senate and Congressman Perkins, they are behind in response of Deway Lake. They by this time are aware that both Kentucky Senators, the Congressman and the Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources are solidly behind the move for more water to the impoundment.

The Times has received from Senators Clements and Cooper, Congressman Perkins, Governor Wetherby and the Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources copies of letters and telegrams in which they have urged the Engineers' approval of all of the above. Some of these letters were addressed to the Huntington district office, others to Major General Samuel D. Sturgill, acting chief of the Corps of Engineers. All have asked full and immediate consideration and Senator Clements has added that the Corp of Engineers recommend that funds be made available at the earliest practical date in order that a study be made to determine feasibility of the chance. The study was authorized on recommendation of Senator Clements by the Senate Public Works committee several months ago.

In response to a letter from Governor Wetherby Col. J. O. Coleman, district engineer, wrote that "at such time as funds are made available, you may be assured that careful consideration will be given the desires of local interests."

Conservation Commissioner Ward expressed his interest in the lake during his visit here this week in connection with the proposed Hawks Lake state park.

**If You Remember . . .**

One hundred years ago, the Leslie, Marries and Maynards of Johnson Creek arranged the acquisition of the Methodist Church of a plot of land upon which was built Sively Chapel. When the church was built, an old log structure used by the faithful was torn down. Since the year 1883, the old families of the community have congregated to worship in the little chapel by the side of the road.

Anne Leslie Maynard, descendant of the pioneer founders of the church, was born in 1870. She grew to womanhood, married, and after the death of her husband continued to live in the community that held her memories so worshipped a lifetime, according to the faith of her fathers, in the old chapel.

People and institutions grow old. Men and women die but things like faith and Christianity are imperishable. Anne Leslie Maynard grew old with Sively Chapel, but the church stood marked the decades and approached the centennial of its erection. In 1950 the site of its erection. Time marched on. In 1951 the chapel was 81. In 1962 the old church lacked one year of the century mark. Just one more year to go and the Centennial observance would be held.

**WORDAGE APPROVED**  
 FRANKFORT, KY. — Attorney General J. D. Buckman, Jr., has approved the form and wording of a constitutional amendment to be submitted to the voters this year on distribution of public school funds. The present provision calls for distribution on the basis of school age on the census rolls, whether in public school attendance or not. The proposed amendment would leave the question to the General Assembly.

The amendment as it will appear on the ballot this fall reads: "All funds accruing to the school fund shall be used for the maintenance of the public schools of the Commonwealth and for no other purpose; and the General Assembly shall be general law prescribe the manner of the distribution of the public school funds." Blacks are provided to indicate their approval or disapproval.

## HEALTH NOTES

### DRY CLEANING DANGERS

If you're doing dry cleaning at home these days, remember the saying can be costly. Most home cleaning is done with preparation consisting of the chemical carbon tetrachloride. Although there is no danger from dry cleaning unless you breathe the fumes.

Fumes may result from inhaling carbon tetrachloride vapors. A brief exposure to a high concentration is immediately dangerous, as well as daily exposure to smaller amounts, according to W. W. Skalko, Director, Division of Occupational Health.

To avoid carbon tetrachloride being absorbed into the blood stream through the skin, it is wise to wash exposed skin immediately after handling the chemical.

To prevent any disturbance from the dry cleaning fluid, work outdoors or provide lots of ventilation in the room. If the fluid is spilled be sure there is plenty of fresh air in the room when removing the deadly liquid from the floor. It would be advisable to wear an air supplied type mask to protect you from the fumes. Remember to fasten the bottle in a closed container after using the solution.

The Division of Occupational Health allows 50 parts of carbon tetrachloride per million parts of air when inspecting industrial activities according to Mr. Skalko. But if you dry clean in an average sized kitchen and use two ounces of carbon tetrachloride ten times as much, the chemical will be in the room as it is allowed in the same sized room of an industrial dry cleaning plant. A small quantity will cause unconsciousness if used carelessly. With any notice of weakness, dizziness, sleepiness, nausea or difficulty with vision, see your family physician at once.
