## NO PROMISE ON HIGHWAY, PARK HEARD

Party in Lake Tour, Courthouse Program Told County's Needs

Governor Lawrence W. Wetherby and party of about 60 press and radio representatives and business leaders left Prestonsburg last Friday afternoon with a clearer picture of Floyd county and some of its needs, but when something will be done about these needs remained as doubtful as the weather.

In conversations at Dewey Lake and addresses at the courthouse here, the governor said Construction Commissioner Henry Ward made no definite commitment as to either the state park at Dewey Lake or a Howard Branch road. "One of our main aims was to get the people here to see the need for a road," he said.

Condition of the state's finances apparently is the big drawback to the development of a park area at the lake. Mr. Ward said, "I will encourage the building of a state park at Dewey Lake when we have the funds." In Frankfort recently Highway Commissioner W. P. Curran assured a Floyd county delegation the road would be built at the northwestern





### Will Floyd Miss This Boat, Too?

FOR an initial investment of \$6,000 and about \$3,000 a year after that Floyd county can, as it should, join the Kentucky Bookmobile Project, an undertaking in which a group of the Commonwealth's leaders have dedicated themselves with an enthusiasm which counts almost to consecration.

These people who are giving of their time and money to the undertaking want Kentucky's people who heretofore have had no access whatever to libraries to have good reading matter brought within their reach. They are shocked by illiteracy in Kentucky; they want to see their state move from next to the bottom to the top. Their goal is 100 Bookmobiles in operation by year's end.

Surely this county will not be the last in a state that is almost last in literacy row to take part in this splendid program. The Phillips Petroleum Company which has its main offices in Bartlettville, Okla., a long way from Floyd county, already has contributed \$1,000. There aren't there a few residents of Floyd county who have the means and the understanding of the needs of others, who will help make at least one Bookmobile possible here?

The truck in which these books are transported will cost about \$2,000; the books, another \$1,000. That's \$3,000 to be raised. After that, the county and its school board can without undue strain finance operation of the Bookmobile. The state will be asked to appropriate \$200,000, and maintenance of the program will become less rather than more, difficult for the individual counties.

Floyd county has never been able, for one reason or another, to do anything about work upon the county library idea. Now comes this opportunity to do something which could be even better, inasmuch as it will carry out to the isolated sections, to the people who need it most, the wealth that lies in good reading.

### Stevens Plans First Silo For Floyd Farm; Is Dairy Farm Owner

Willard Stevens, of the Middle Creek road, is expected to be the first Floyd county farmer to build a silo. His plans to build a trench silo of 150-ton capacity were laid here this week by County Agent O. E. Boice.

Mr. Stevens, who is operating a successful dairy farm on Middle Creek, has a herd of about 80 and he plans to complete the silo in time for storage of grain and grass this fall.

Week will begin on the project as soon as a specialist from the University of Kentucky arrives to advise Stevens on plans and specifications.



**SAFE VACATION**

# FLOYD-CO. BROILER MARKET REVIEWED BY LOCAL MAN

Four thousand broilers could be sold locally every week by Floyd county farmers if they were on the market—It. That second "if" turns what was first thought to be an opportunity for chicken-risers in this county into just a lot of reasons why it can't be done.

It would look like a sure shot for a man to go into the chicken business and make money if the market was at his door, as it is here. But not this business. A lot of things prevent the marketing of these chickens at a profit. Let's look at the prospective business through the eyes and understanding of Cleo Brown, of the Sandy Valley Poultry Company, Prestonsburg.

Brown goes to northern Georgia each week and brings back approximately 4,000 broilers for his trade. He would like to buy them here, but, of course, chickens in no such number exist. He buys a few in this county and pays about two cents more per pound than the broilers cost him in Georgia. But a few is a long way from 15,000 a month.

Broilers are slack-necked in northern Georgia. Slack-neck is the removal of feathers by water at a temperature of 125 degrees Fahrenheit. It takes a big plant, a large volume of chickens and plenty of capital to operate a slack-neck plant. To operate one in a moderately large way requires about 10,000 broilers per day. The nearest slack-neck plant in Eastern Kentucky is at Knoxville, Tennessee.

Charleston, West Virginia, or Mt. Sterling, Kentucky. The plant process processes 800 chickens per day. The others are big processors. Chickens picked and cleaned at home for sale are hard-scaled. This allows the meat to turn dark in cold storage. Big buyers say they can't sell dark and discolored chicken meat. So the purchase of any considerable amount of hard-scaled chickens is out.

If Floyd county consumes 4,000 broilers per month, then why doesn't somebody put in a slack-neck plant here? That can be answered by asking who would raise the broilers. The answer, it seems, would be that if we had the slack-neck plant and the market, farmers would raise the chickens. Brown went to explain why it can't be done at a profit.

For one thing, he says, the attitude here is too low for the raising of broilers. The price of broilers is too great. Floyd county's altitude runs in the bottom, around 600 feet above sea level. A low mortality rate at an altitude of 2,000 feet is the approximate altitude of Northern Georgia.

"Five years ago successful chicken farms up in Southwest Virginia. Their equipment and conditions were about like that of any Floyd farmer, but the Virginia chickens were healthy and had a low rate of mortality," Brown explained. "The same chickens and the same conditions here would have caused the death of great numbers."

Another thing in Eastern Kentucky that makes for low profit on broilers is the high cost of feed. Brown sees no way to lick it. If the section had a favorable differential on freight rates for feed, imported there might be hope. The feed can't be produced to feed chickens when it has to be raised with high-priced farm labor on a terrain unsuitable for farming.

"Anybody got any helpful ideas?"
