the son of James P. and Cynthia May Stephens. There were ten children born to this union, three of whom died young. The parents made plans to go west and as a preliminary move James P. went to Kansas to look the country over. When he reported to his wife of the level, rich plain the decision to move there was soon made. But for awhile they would have to wait. The tenth child was on the way.

Cynthia Allen Stephens died in childbirth Dec. 9, 1866, when her son James was born. On her deathbed she enjoined her husband to go ahead with their plans to move west. He remembered his promise to her while the baby James, cared for by George and Mahalia May, grew from infancy to the toddling age of four Daniel married and became the father of two children of his own. It was then that James began to make preparation to go west with his family.

Here Doc Stephens retreats into reminiscences of his childhood, one of his remembrances being how he got his nickname "Doc" for he was really christened Solomon. He was the seventh son and mountain boys lead it that a seventh son would make a doctor. Solomon or Sol he was called until the day he was the toothache. His father had it pulled and it bled so profusely that someone in the family went for old Doctor Cullman. He was a doctor.

Meantime, while the horseman was riding towards Prestonburg, Solomon tried the experiment of putting a finger in the cavity. The bleeding stopped and when the finger was removed, it did not resume. Some of the family recalled that he was supposed to make a doctor anyway. Ever afterwards he was Doc. Few remember or know his right name.

After telling this, which was prompted by an inquiry as to his real name he tells of the beginning of the western trip. They made a loss from popular lumber and sold the bottom with tar. Preparations went apace with one of the children of preparations being the matter of eating for the toddler James on the long journey. But they reckoned without the babe's own wishes and his Aunt Mahalia's.

The day of the break-off from Maysville they gathered at the water's edge. Handshakes, perhaps tears from the children and some loo from their Aunt Mahalia. The father ordered all into the boat. James ran to the sanctuary of his Aunt Mahalia's lap. The father reviewed him and set out for the boat. James escaped again towards Aunt Mahalia. Here the father interposed and James P. hastily agreed for her to keep his youngest Mahalia and George. May returned him and today he keeps the name May.

Finally the boat drifted down the river and with the exception of difficulty in negotiating the many mill dams that crossed Beaver Creek in that period of time, the boat moved away, carrying the father and six sons, Will, Daniel, David, Matt, George and John. There was the wife of Daniel and his two children. Will, who afterwards lived to the ripe old age of 80, was somewhat younger than Daniel who was 20. They reached the mouth of Beaver without mishap.

James P. loaded his sons on the steambath, "Jerry Osborne" and rode it to Cadesburg. Here, after a night of turmoil with weary boys, James went aboard a tramp steamer, boat freighter that was working its way to Cincinnati. One stop Doc recalls vividly was at Ironton where negro stevedores loaded their cargo on the freighter. Perhaps what makes it a point of vivid remembrance was the big whip the overseers of the job used to urge the lagging negroes.

Cincinnati was the nearest point on railway traffic at that time and John P. took the boys to the rail road station to buy tickets to Kansas. It was here he was introduced to the pickpockets and the youngsters scouted around him. The father pulled out a pocketbook and paid for a supply. A few moments later there was a sudden rush of men in a hurry and James P. was enveloped by them when he reached for his pocketbook to buy the necessary tickets. He found it gone. He remembered the rush of men around him a few moments before and knew where his money had gone. He went to a secluded spot and took from around his body his reserve cash from a money belt around his body. Just enough to buy the tickets. He gave one to each boy with strict orders for each to look after his own ticket.

The train reached St. Louis and as there was no bridge there across the muddy Father of Waters in 1873, the passengers ferried. The migrants reached Newton, Kansas, March 22.

Newton, was at that time, the terminal of the railway pushing towards the Pacific. James P. purchased a farm of 400 acres from an old German and with it acquired all the necessary implements to till the farm. It was one of the finer homes of the period in that section and while other settlers lived in sod houses, James P. lived like a king in a house built of lumber.

"Dodge City had nothing on Newton," Doc states. It was full of dives, saloons, bad women, railway

Doc grew into manhood and began the herding of cows himself. One thing worse than having cowboys, he thinks, was the cyclone storms. One blew a horse five miles away, he avers. But worse than that was the mighty rush of wind that carried the horse so far as one night when another kind of storm broke over him as he herded 400 head of half-wild cattle. It was a giant display of an electric storm. You could feel the accumulation of static electricity in the air and it played on the horns of the frightened cattle.

David Stevens joined the 5th Kansas Cavalry, was stationed at Fort Dodge when General Custer suffered defeat and extinction at the hands of the Indians. There was a forced march but Stevens was picked up in time to help pick up a few of the scattered bodies.

"Doc became a wheat farmer and having married an Ohio girl reared his boys in the West near Oklahoma, in 1888 when his wife died several years ago. He recalls without the aid of glasses, dresses neatly and reminisces about those golden days when the West was young.

Corn Needs Fertilization

As we raise our sights toward higher and higher yields of corn we find it necessary to give more attention to those practices which supplement the soil's own inherent ability to yield up nutrients to the crop. As we move toward those higher yields, the soil becomes more and more a medium through which nutrients are conveyed to the plant rather than a direct source of those nutrients. The native fertility remaining in our soils is not released to the crops being grown in sufficient quantity to meet the nation's present demand for food and fiber.

Therefore, corn soil must be used as a "reservoir" that "replenishes" the soil rather than a source of nutrients that "take" them.

Kentucky farmers grow nearly 200,000 acres of corn for grain in 1953 than they grew in 1949, but they harvested nearly eleven million more bushels of corn in 1953 than they did in 1949. This increase in production from fewer acres resulted from wiser selection of land for growing corn and the use of improved varieties and the use of more fertilizer per acre.

Corn is hard on the land if we take crops according to the amount of plant food removed from the soil by the degree of erosion to which the land is exposed. Many farmers have the idea that corn land needs to wear it out. This is true when farmers misuse and fertilize their corn crop so that it produces 40 bushels or less per acre, but when farmers produce 80 bushels or more per acre the fertility of the land can actually be improved while raising five or six crops. When the cover is built up to the soil, as organic matter.

Of all 120 crops grown in Kentucky, corn is one of the least fertile. It takes 100 pounds of fertilizer to produce 100 bushels of corn. The crop should have available to it at least 150 pounds of nitrogen, 125 pounds of phosphorus and 225 pounds of potassium. doing under Dr. Ransdell's direction without friction or lessening of interest in the public health work.

M. V. Clark, sanitarian with the department, said Monday there is a "critical shortage" of health directors in the public health service. He added that 50% of the 130 health officers are now working in the state, in a few cases one doctor serving two small communities. He said a medical director on either a full-time or part-time basis.

STATE CONSERVATION WORK GAINS NATIONAL ATTENTION

Frankfort, Ky., June 3 — Since 1944, Kentucky's progress in wildlife conservation has made the entire nation sit up and take notice.

In that year, upon the advice of more than 15,000 sportsmen in the state, a nine-man commission was named to head the Division of Game and Fish with Earl Wallace as director. It was also decided at the time that all money derived from the sale of licenses was to be used for the conservation of fish and wildlife resources.

Last year by act of the General Assembly, the division became the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

In 1944, fishing licenses sales totaled 77,238. Resident hunting licenses sold that year numbered 68,252 and 279 were non-residents. The total income for the year was \$1,047,792.81.

In 1952, there were 266,986 state and non-resident fishing licenses sold. Hunting licenses for last year, both resident and non-resident totaled 283,502. Total income for the year was \$1,040,044.00.

In the field of law enforcement, there were 44 conservation officers for the entire state in 1944. They issued 246 arrests, which resulted in 100 convictions. Licenses checked that year totaled 11,929.

In 1952, with 140 men working in the field, there were 2,533 arrested violators. Convictions totaled 2,102. During the last year, officers checked 115,886 hunters and fishermen.

They still have good hunting and fishing with a minimum of interference in spite of the national trend toward increased supply of game and fish and ever-tightening legal restrictions.



STATE TO DO WORK IN '53

On Howard Branch Road, Carlin Says; Jacks Cr. Highway Bids Are Asked

Highway Commissioner W. P. Curdin told County Judge Henry Stumbo this week in a telephone conversation that the right-of-way already acquired for the Howard Branch road linking Mayfield and Floyd counties are satisfactory to the Commission and that the state definitely will build the highway this year.

Judge Stumbo said he is interested that whatever delay there may be will be of possibly two or three months and that this will result from a wait on funds.

The decision to build the road, regarded as one of vital importance to Floyd County, was reached after Gov. Lawrence Wetherby and others visited this section recently on the 11th Governor's tour. At that time he was told the importance of the road.

The highway will link this section of the county with a highway to the Beechmont county coal operations.

Contractors have been invited by the State Department of Highway to bid on a road construction project in Floyd county. Bids will be opened June 12.

The project planned call for grade drain and traffic-bound surface, near 4.5 miles of the Jacks Creek road from Ky. 122.

J. P. Neenan, district highway engineer, has written County Judge Henry Stumbo that satisfaction of the Bull Creek and Abbott Creek roads cannot be begun until repair work on the Prestonsburg-West Prestonsburg bridge is completed, since the span in its present condition is limited to an eight-ton load and only one-way traffic can be accommodated by the temporary bridging over the break in the bridge.

Judge Stumbo said the contractor on the bridge project expects to complete repairs by the end of the month. A bid for widening of the Bull Creek and Abbott roads will be shipped to West Prestonsburg by rail and from there taken to an eight-ton motor plant via trucks across the bridge.

U. S. Court Hearing Under Way This Week For Twelve Defendants

Two Floyd county men are on the jury in Federal court at Pikeville trying the 12 union men and peace officers charged with violating the law without union affiliation on Cumberland Mountain, May 10, 1951. The two jurors are Abe Green, clerk, and Millard Tolson, foreman.

The trial began Monday of this week with Judge Mac Swinford, of Cincinnati, sitting. The first trial in January of this year ended with a deadlocked jury that stood 9 to 3 for conviction. The present jury was summoned from the Eastern Kentucky Federal judicial district.

On trial are Dock Barley, Ralph Ratliff, and Dal Mullins, former Pike county deputy sheriffs; Carson Hibbits, Joseph Davis, Sherman Maggard, Harry Ratcliffe, and Bob Newsom, all of Pike county; and "Doc" Hill, Charles Minion, Carl Conley, and T. N. Fleming, all of Letcher county.

Hibbits, a former representative in the Kentucky Legislature, and Davis, Ratcliffe and Newsome are field agents for the United Mine Workers of America. In charge of the Pikeville office, Hibbits is a district representative of the union's District 30.

Hill is a former deputy constable. Originally there were 12 defendants but one of them, M. B. Bloomer, Letcher county, was acquitted by a directed verdict in the first trial when Judge Swinford ruled that the Government had not made out a case against him.

The prosecution contends that the defendants were involved in the beating and forcible swearing into the union of Kentucky employees of a nonunion mine in Virginia. The disturbance occurred in Letcher county, Kentucky.

In his opening statement to the jury of 12 men and four alternates, including one woman, District Attorney Claude F. Stevens, Prestonsburg, pointed out that the defendants are charged with violating the Labor Relations Law.

John Y. Brown, Lexington attorney, opening for the defense, explained that the union men were on the mountain that day to establish a peaceful picket line and persuade Kentuckians not to help break a strike that was going on in Virginia.

First government witness was Joe Iron, who said his truck was halted by a crowd of 20 to 30 men a few hundred feet on the Kentucky side of the state line in Letcher county. One of the men he identified as William "Doc" Hill, one of the defendants, waved him to the side of the road with a pistol, he said. "Others handed him a union membership card and demanded that he sign 'or we will run you, truck and all, over this mountain'."

He signed.

A little later, he continued, two of the men in the crowd tossed a coin to determine which would whip him. A man identified only by the name of "Curley" won the toss and they went after each other, Joe said, but others joined in signing him, and he was being dragged up when one of the union men caused them to let up on him.

Hill said he saw about 15 men wearing uniforms, badges, or officers' caps in the crowd but none attempted to stop the fight.

Glen Killian, who moved from Jenkins to Clintwood, Va., after the trouble, said Hill pulled a pistol on him and forced him to sign a union card. Then he said about 20 other Kentuckians working in nonunion Virginia mines, he said, were forced to line up on the roadside, three deep, and "take the union obligation."

Ray Buchanan, Payne Gap, testified that Hill, with a pistol in his hand, cursed and threatened him. When he objected to signing a union card, Buchanan said Hill told him, "You will sign it or die on this mountain" so he signed two of them, just to play safe. When some of the mob threatened to whip him, he said, "Joe Davis told them to leave me alone." Davis is one of the defendants.

"Glen Gilliam, Jenkins miner, said he was kicked and beaten and said that "You are getting off easy for what you have done." All he had done, he said, was work in a mountain mine in Virginia.

Refusing to swear, because he is a minister in the Church of God of Prophecy as well as a coal miner, Joseph J. Hughes was allowed to testify when he "affirmed" to tell the truth.

"They lined us up and made us take the obligation," he said. "Then somebody yelled, 'We've got a preacher. Let's baptize them in the name of the Father, the Son, and John L. Lewis, and I didn't like that very much.'"

Other witnesses testified that the union men blocked the road, forced them to sign union cards and told them they couldn't go to their jobs in Virginia.

CLEVELAND — Robert Owens, 50-year-old press operator, suffered a broken arm in falling three stories from a kitchen window in his apartment. Police said Owens told them he had gone to bed and the next thing he remembered he was on the ground.

the board, a list of all registered voters.

2. Challenges by a committee or a citizen must be made within 10 days after the registration books close before a primary or general election, and shall be in writing giving the name and address of the challenged voter and the reason for the challenge. The board shall then meet on the eleventh day following the closing of the books and may sit for a period of five days the last day to be not less than 20 days prior to the primary or general election.

A number of voters have, through new registration, changed their party affiliation, in most cases making the change in order to vote for a close friend or relative who is the candidate on a ticket they do not usually vote for. Since this has been done the question of their eligibility to vote in their new party's primary has arisen, and it has been pointed out that the law prohibits their voting in the primary if they are challenged. This law, it is explained, was enacted to prevent one party from transferring voters in order to control the naming of nominees by the opposition party.

COURT OPINION ENDS DISPUTE

Combs Writes Decision Holding Publication Act Demands Detailed Audits

The Court of Appeals last Friday handed down a decision which ended the dispute over the duty of local governmental agencies to publish detailed financial statements every year.

The opinion, written by Judge Bert T. Combs, and concurred in by every member of the court, held that the state General Assembly in 1928 enacted the publication law "to bring the light of publicity on the financial affairs of local governmental units."

The showdown on the question came last year with a suit in which the two newspapers published at Paris, Ky., filed a suit against Bourbon county officials filed for publication an abbreviated financial statement.

The Appellate Court held that abbreviated financial statements are not sufficient under the law, which it said is clear on the subject.

"But it is not the prerogative of the courts to weigh the wisdom of the statute," the Legislature has the constitutional right to pass it and it is the duty of the courts to enforce it," said the justice.

"The court's opinion provided the 'yardstick' to measure compliance: 'The legislative intent, implicit in the act, was to require those officers who administer public funds to publish annually a statement which will inform the taxpayers of the amount of money collected, when and to whom expended, and the purpose for which spent.'"

The law says the statements must be printed in full in the newspaper of the county "that has the largest bona fide circulation in the governmental unit or district for which the statement is published."

Copies of the statements and newspaper clippings showing its publication must be sworn to and filed with county clerks, the law states.

And, it adds, officers required by law to publish the statements also must file copies of newspapers containing them with the State auditor by August 31 after each fiscal year ends June 30.

Failure to file the newspaper containing the statement with the auditor shall be a misdemeanor, the law says, punishable upon conviction, with a \$50 to \$500 fine.

The Kentucky Press Association had advised its members through the years to insist on detailed money statements for publication. However, it said some officials had been "confused as to what actually constitutes full compliance" with the law and asked for a clear-cut ruling.

Such a ruling, it said, "will throw a most helpful light upon this matter for the guidance of all persons, institutions and political subdivisions."

Judge Combs wrote: "The main question in the case is the proper construction of Kentucky Revised Statute 61.280, which provides that except in cities of the first class (Louisville is the only one) and cities otherwise required by law to publish an annual audit of their financial affairs, every public officer of any county, grade-school district, city or subdivisions or (except less than a county whose duty it is to collect, receive, have the custody, control or disbursement of public funds, shall at the expiration of each fiscal year prepare and submit to the auditor a statement of the funds collected, received, held, or disbursed by him during the fiscal year just closed."





Neither Above Reprach

The Times can easily understand the indignation of Senator McCarthy and others at Clement Attlee's verbal attack on the United States, but it agrees with Kentucky's Senator, John Sherman Cooper that hot-headed retorts from the United States and hasty action on this country's part will serve no good purpose. Attlee, leader of England's Socialists, rendered Communism an invaluable service when he accused the United States of non-cooperation and some of its citizens of not wanting peace. At the same time, we joined him in helping the Red cause by driving deeper the wedge between the two great English-speaking countries of the world and the great hopes of democracy. We widened the breach by leaping to the counter-attack.

It is difficult to maintain a stolid composure and to keep one's own counsel when unjustly attacked, but true statesmanship and leadership in a time fraught with peril demand of us forbearance and wisdom such as Senator Cooper advises. Without the United States, and Winston Churchill, England long ago would have been a German satellite; so would have been Russia but for our aid during World War II. Hence, we are the avowed enemy of the democratic way of life, either England or the United States is weak without the other.

International business which too often dictates our international politics and thinking is too devoid of the simple practices of Christianity. The United States refused to buy British electrical supplies at a big saving to the taxpayers, because the purchase would have cut into the business of manufacturers and suppliers here at home. Britain and others of our allies say, then, they must have trade, and that this trade must be with the Reds if not with us. Last week, while the International Chamber was in session in Vienna, the Reds were negotiating with business bigshots of certain Allied nations for purchase of supplies of this and other kinds — this, while pledges of unity of purpose and effort were being heard.

Attlee expressed the belief, that there are Americans who prefer war to peace. That may be. We wouldn't say there aren't, although the possibility seems intempestively fantastic. But certainly there are as many Britons of the same thinking (or lack of thinking). We do not regret Attlee's charge, because we are convinced that when the dollar rules any man to the extent that he will sell millions of war or the means for an enemy nation to maintain itself or an offensive against this or any friendly country, that man cannot be praying for peace as he should.

But Britain just now appears to be the big offender. So it appears that the note is in that eye, not in ours. Whenever it is, stolid recommendations in the British Parliament and the Congress of the United States, and demands that ships be sunk, and so on, will help nobody but the enemies of both countries.

Where Shall Work Begin?
THIS may sound like a simple picking a fight, but there must be one let's get on it early.

The report persists—and it is more than mere rumor—that the gate is ready to go ahead with construction of the Prestonsburg-Dewey Dam-Fainville road, and that work will begin on the Johnson-county end of the route.

Now, The Times has been an advocate of this highway which would connect the area's big attraction, Dewey Lake, with its home county, Floyd, and the neighboring county, Johnson, and also provide for residents of other sections access from either the Floyd or Johnson end to the lake. It also would serve to bypass Abbott Mountain, one of the dangerous features of that miserably poor stretch of the Mayo trail between Painlva and Pikeville.

We advocated this road as a public improvement. We expressed disapproval of any idea of throwing up a bar against the road and agreeing to the dam from Johnson county. It was our contention, as in the case of the Howard Branch road sought to link Floyd and Magoffin counties, that the closed-door policy is a medievalism.

But in urging the Open Door policy we did not subscribe to the Good Neighbor doctrine so completely that we were willing to surrender Floyd county's interests. We do not propose to remain silent, and we do not expect Floyd county to submit quietly, in the face of any plan to begin work on that highway from the end most distant from Abbott Mountain and in a county in which neither Dewey Dam nor Dewey Lake is located. This road must pass from Johnson county through Floyd in order to reach the dam, and there's a matter of rights-of-way for Floyd county to supply some cooperation toward procuring.

There need be no bickering about the matter. If the Highway Department will give Floyd county a green check, and an open break, and an open break does not mean that Painlva shall have first direct access to this dam which is in Floyd county.
